The 32nd Annual Rio Grande Co-op meeting was held Saturday morning in the Civic Center, with 112 members registering. A very delicious barbeque was served for lunch.

Guest speaker, David Hamil, administrator of the Rural Electrification Administration in Washington, D.C., congradulated the members on their accomplishments and progress over the almost 40 years of organization.

"You've met and overcome a lot of problems, you now have problems and you'll have them in the future," Hamil told the crowd. He praised highly the electric power frid system that covers Texas and has been designed to cut out duplication and furnish best possible service.

He was particularly pleased to report, he said, that fine cooperation between REA systems and public utilities (investor-owned) had helped solve many problems. He said it was wonderful the way the two industries had solved many problems by learning it was better for all to work together than to fight one another, as both had been guilty of in times past.

He urged that members do all in their power to assist in seeing that dams will be properly constructed and to utilize to the fullest the capacity of the Rio Grande and other river systems. He noted that some power in no great amount might be generated at some future time from Amistad Dam.

Natural gas, long a mainstay, will eventually be replaced by lignite, imported coal or nuclear fuel, all at cost much higher than gas, he said.

The only way to hold down some of these costs, he said, is by savings and collaborating of efforts. As example, he cited, use of insulation and proper weatherizing is not an expense, but an investment.

Hamil said that the cooperatives have moved and must move away from government subsidization. We must also adjust to the oil situation, he pointed out, we are now importing 46 per cent of our oil from OPEC nations and paying them an artificial price.

At REA we have ample credit to help you when you need it, he said. Over 83 per cent of our funds last year had no subsidy involved and that strengthens us. We have enough monies to meet your needs from now on. At 9½ per cent interest investment can be amortized successfully.

The same officers were elected at the directors meeting and include L. S. "Bit" Terry of Del Rio, President; James Bader, Vice president; Roger Rose of Sanderson, Tresasurer and Tommy Seargeant, Secretary. Several others from Val Verde and Kinney Counties are active in the organization.







The Dallas Morning News reported, 'during Bris-coe's years in office pearly News reported, 'during Bris-coe's years in office, nearly all state government will have gone on a spending spree.' And the Governor has done nothing to dis-courage it. He's vetoed less than two-tenths of one per cent of the two previous budgets and not one pen-ny's worth of the current appropriations; it's the first time that's happened in twenty years. In a related story, the News pointed to the fact that during the Bris-

coe years the number of employees paid by the state has risen by 50,000.

"And, while we've heard the boast of 'no new taxes, we've seen our prop-erty taxes increase by \$1 billion along with substantial hikes in state licensing fees.

"I've traveled the state this year, visiting with folks. Whatever their overall assessment, most Texans lacked confidence in the present governor's persuasiveness and vision. They felt he had failed to measure up to their expectations and to live up to his promises.

"Texans are hungry for an effective gubernatorial spokesman on energy pol-icy. They are frustrated that our governor hasn't been able to get the Texas view-point across in Washington. They are wondering, too. They are wondering, too, why our governor hasn't been speaking out forcefully for a farm policy that would help our beleagured farms

"I fully agree with the people's assessment; that's why I'm seeking the office of Governor.

#### NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 18)

S.J.R. 18 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to provide for expanding the Court of Criminal Appeals from its current membership of five udges to nine judges and to permit the court to sit n panels of three judges.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as ollows:

"The constitutional amendment increasing the size of the Court of Crim-Appeals to nine judges, and permitting the court to sit in panels of three judges."

#### NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT

(S.J.R. 13)

S.J.R. 13 proposes a contitutional amendment to provide for an additional \$200 million in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the Veterans' Land Fund and to allow surviving widows of veterans to purchase tracts under certain circumstances.

The wording of the oosed amendment as it will oppear on the ballot is as ollows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide for an additional \$200 million in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the Veterans' Land Fund and to allow surviving widows of veterans to purchase tracts under certain circumstances."

#### NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 3)

Under current Texas law a person charged with a felony offense who has previously been convicted of two felony offenses may be denied bail. S.J.R. 3 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution which would also result in the denial of bail, for a limited time and subject to appeal. to a person accused of committing a felony while on bail for a prior felony for which the person has been indicted, or accused of a felony involving the use of

a deadly weapon after being convicted of a prior felony.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment permitting denial of bail to a person charged with a felony offense who has been theretofore twice convicted of a felony offense, or charged with a felony offense committed while that person was admitted to bail on a prior felony indictment, or charged with a crime involving the use of a deadly weapon where there is evidence such person has been convicted of a prior felony offense; providing for a 60-day limit to that person's incarceration without trial; and providing for that person's right of appeal."

#### NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 5)

5 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution authorizing the legislature to grant exempvalorem taxes on property designated for the preservation of cultural, historical or natural history resources.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing tax relief to preserve certain cultural, historical, or natural history re-

#### NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 19)

S.J.R. 19 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution authorizing the formation of associations authorized to collect certain refundable assessments from producers of poultry. livestock, and other raw agricultural or marine products and validating the 1967 law regarding the formation of such associations.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as

The constitutional amendment the formation of agricultural or marine associations which may mandate the collection of refundable assessments for improvement of production, marketing, or use of their products.'

#### NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 49)

S.J.R. 49 proposes an amendment to the Texas de tres miembros. 

Q: My husband received an inheritance before we married. Did this property become community property after we married? And, he invested part of his inheritance in other property and savings accounts. A: A spouse's separate property is defined as property owned before marriage or property received by gift or inheritance after marriage. The owner of separate property, whether a husband or wife, is free to manage and own it independent of the other spouse. Income from separate property, such as interest on a savings account, is community property and is owned jointly by the husband and wife.

### GLAUCOMA? WHAT IS THAT?

Glaucoma is the most common of blindness. This is usually no pain of warning signs. However, once the disease progresses to the point of vision impairment the damage cannot be undone. Early diagnosis is important to arrest the disease and save sight.

A free Glaucoma eye examination clinic will be held Sunday, October 9, at the Kinney County Civic Center from 1:00-3:00 p.m. An ophthalmologist will be present to test eyes for Glaucoma.

Testing is done painlessly with an instructment called a tonometer which is place over the surface of the eye. Everyone 35 or older should have this test every two years at least.

Symptoms of Glaucoma include headaches, loss of peripheral vision, need for frequent changes of classes (particularly in older people), and the seeing of halos around lights.

Some forms of the disease progress very rapidly; others develop slowly. Early diagnosis is essential. The disease can often be effectively treated through surgery or the administration of drugs.

The Glaucoma Screening on October 9 is sponsored by your Extension Home Economics Advisory Committee, The San Antonio Branch of the Texas Society for Prevention of Blindness, and coordinated by Rebecca Rogers, County Extension Agent-at-Large. The test is for Glaucoma only. It will not be a complete eye examination.

The Glaucoma Screening was to be held last June but had to be cancelled.


