The 32nd Annual Rio Grande Co-op meeting was held Saturday morning in the Civic Center, with 112 members registering. A very delicious barbeque was served for lunch.

Guest speaker, David Hamil, administrator of the Rural Electrification Administration in Washington, D.C., congratulated the members on their accomplishments and progress over the almost 40 years of organization.

"You've met and overcome a lot of problems, you now have problems and you'll have them in the future," Hamil told the crowd. He praised highly the electric power grid system that covers Texas and has been designed to cut out duplication and furnish best possible service.

He was particularly pleased to report, he said, that fine cooperation between REA systems and public utilities (investor-owned) had helped solve many problems. He said it was wonderful the way the two industries had solved many problems by learning it was better for all to work together than to fight one another, as both had been guilty of in times past.

He urged that members do all in their power to assist in seeing that dams will be properly constructed and to utilize to the fullest the capacity of the Rio Grande and other river systems. He noted that some power in no great amount might be generated at some future time from Amistad Dam.

Natural gas, long a mainstay, will eventually be replaced by lignite, imported coal or nuclear fuel, all at cost much higher than gas, he said.

The only way to hold down some of these costs, he said, is by savings and collaborating of efforts. As example, he cited, use of insulation and proper weatherizing is not an expense, but an investment.

Hamil said that the cooperatives have moved and must move away from government subsidization. We must also adjust to the oil situation, he pointed out, we are now importing 46 per cent of our oil from OPEC nations and paying them an artificial price.

At REA we have ample credit to help you when you need it, he said. Over 83 per cent of our funds last year had no subsidy involved and that strengthens us. We have enough monies to meet your needs from now on. At 9½ per cent interest investment can be amortized successfully.

The same officers were elected at the directors meeting and include L. S. "Bit" Terry of Del Rio, President; James Bader, Vice president; Roger Rose of Sanderson, Tresaúrur and Tommy Seargeant, Secretary. Several others from Val Verde and Kinney Counties are active in the organization.

Indian dancing, and a raffle.

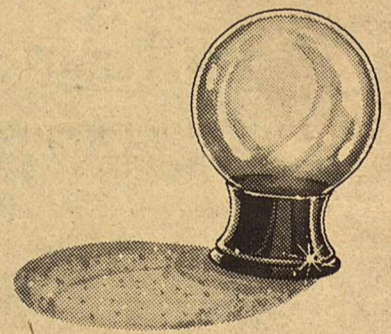

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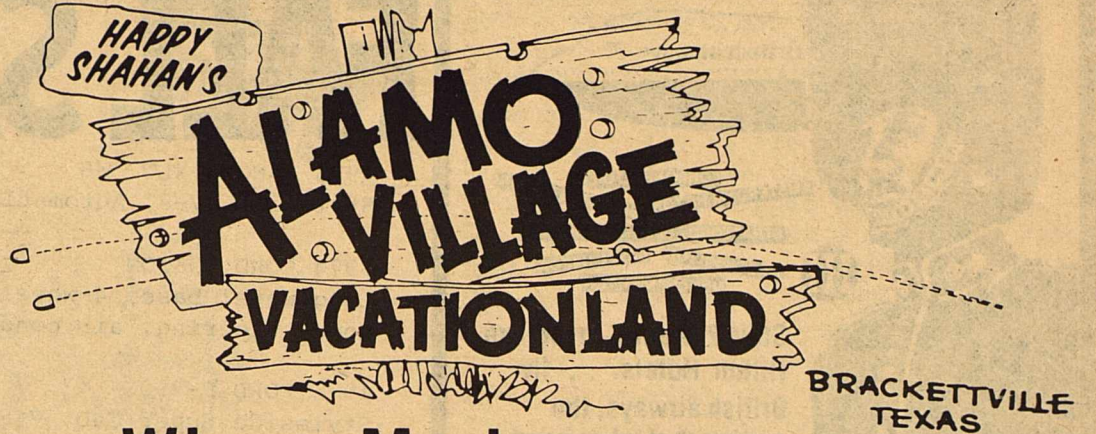

ADULT LEADERS TO SEEK 4-H PROGRAM IDEAS

LEAVEY--Boning up on judging skills, looking at new 4-H projects and sharing community service ideas will be among concerns here when Southwest Texas 4-H Adult leaders convene at the HEB Camp, Oct. 4-5.

Group sessions, ceremonies, singing and fellowship will fill the two days in the Singing Hills section of the Foundation Camp. Leaders will brainstorm over subjects such as the "Design for Discovery" approach to 4-H work; new 4-H projects available; and ideas for community service.

Exhibits also will be available on junior and senior 4-H record books, national 4-H awards, national 4-H Club week, fund raising ideas and Citizenship and Careers.

Program personalities will include Texas Agricultural Extension Service 4-H and Youth Specialists Lanny Bullard, Lynn Copeland and Geronimo "Jerry" Chavez and District Extension agent Mrs. Gloria Schwarzlose.

Leaders from 19 Southwest Texas Counties will participate in the annual event.

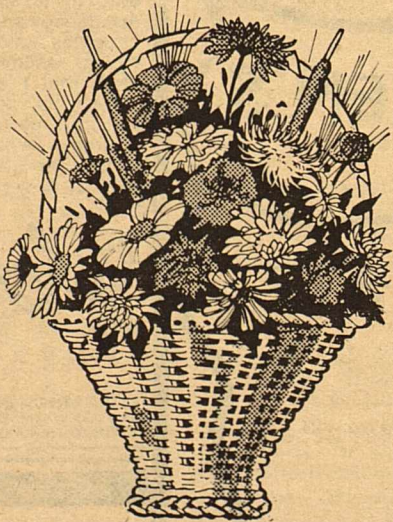

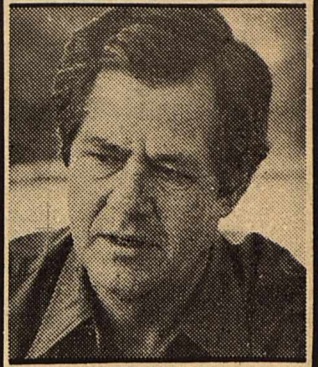

"I have announced my candidacy for Governor of Texas. I'm confident I can and will win.

"According to a statewide poll, 6 out of 10 people are ready for a new governor. The poll only confirmed what I've been hearing all over Texas this year. People are against the idea of anyone holding the state's highest office for 10 years. No governor has asked for 10. No governor has been given 10. It goes against a tradition that's as old as Texas itself.

"There are other reasons folks are ready for a new governor. State spending has jumped from \$3 billion to \$8 billion the last 6 years. The Dallas Morning News reported, 'during Briscoe's years in office, nearly all state government will have gone on a spending spree.' And the Governor has done nothing to discourage it. He's vetoed less than two-tenths of one per cent of the two previous budgets and not one penny's worth of the current appropriations; it's the first time that's happened in twenty years. In a related story, the News pointed to the fact that during the Briscoe years the number of employees paid by the state has risen by 50,000.

"And, while we've heard the boast of 'no new taxes,' we've seen our property taxes increase by \$1 billion along with substantial hikes in state licensing fees.

"I've traveled the state this year, visiting with folks. Whatever their overall assessment, most Texans lacked confidence in the present governor's persuasiveness and vision. They felt he had failed to measure up to their expectations and to live up to his promises.

"Texans are hungry for an effective gubernatorial spokesman on energy policy. They are frustrated that our governor hasn't been able to get the Texas viewpoint across in Washington. They are wondering, too, why our governor hasn't been speaking out forcefully for a farm policy that would help our beleaguered farms and ranches.

"I fully agree with the people's assessment; that's why I'm seeking the office of Governor.

"I'm proud of my record as Attorney General and Secretary of State. It shows that I'm not afraid to roll up my sleeves and work hard. It indicates that I have the ability to assemble a capable staff, that I prefer to work closely with people, and that I'm not reluctant to make changes when they can benefit the state. I'll be this kind of governor, given the job."

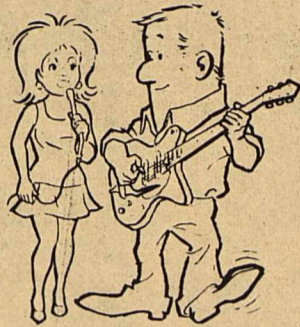

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS
GENERAL ELECTION NOV. 8, 1977

NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT
(S.J.R. 18)

S.J.R. 18 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to provide for expanding the Court of Criminal Appeals from its current membership of five judges to nine judges and to permit the court to sit in panels of three judges.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment increasing the size of the Court of Criminal Appeals to nine judges, and permitting the court to sit in panels of three judges."

NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT
(S.J.R. 13)

S.J.R. 13 proposes a constitutional amendment to provide for an additional \$200 million in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the Veterans' Land Fund and to allow surviving widows of veterans to purchase tracts under certain circumstances.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide for an additional \$200 million in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the Veterans' Land Fund and to allow surviving widows of veterans to purchase tracts under certain circumstances."

NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT
(S.J.R. 3)

Under current Texas law a person charged with a felony offense who has previously been convicted of two felony offenses may be denied bail. S.J.R. 3 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution which would also result in the denial of bail, for a limited time and subject to appeal, to a person accused of committing a felony while on bail for a prior felony for which the person has been indicted, or accused of a felony involving the use of

a deadly weapon after being convicted of a prior felony.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment permitting denial of bail to a person charged with a felony offense who has been theretofore twice convicted of a felony offense, or charged with a felony offense committed while that person was admitted to bail on a prior felony indictment, or charged with a crime involving the use of a deadly weapon where there is evidence such person has been convicted of a prior felony offense; providing for a 60-day limit to that person's incarceration without trial; and providing for that person's right of appeal."

NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT
(S.J.R. 5)

S.J.R. 5 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution authorizing the legislature to grant exemptions or other relief from ad valorem taxes on property designated for the preservation of cultural, historical or natural history resources.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing tax relief to preserve certain cultural, historical, or natural history resources."

NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT
(S.J.R. 19)

S.J.R. 19 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution authorizing the formation of associations authorized to collect certain refundable assessments from producers of poultry, livestock, and other raw agricultural or marine products and validating the 1967 law regarding the formation of such associations.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the formation of agricultural or marine associations which may mandate the collection of refundable assessments for improvement of production, marketing, or use of their products."

NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT
(S.J.R. 49)

S.J.R. 49 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to permit the legislature to authorize state and national banks to exercise banking privileges by use of electronic devices or machines located at such places as may be provided by law and authorizes the sharing of such electronic devices or machines among banks on a reasonable, non-discriminatory basis.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to give the legislature the power to authorize state and national banks to exercise banking and discounting privileges by use of electronic devices or machines."

NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT
(S.J.R. 30)

S.J.R. 30 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution changing the name of the State Judicial Qualifications Commission to the State Commission on Judicial Conduct and making several changes in its powers and procedures. The most significant change would authorize the Commission to suspend from office judges and justices under indictment.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment changing the name of the State Judicial Qualifications Commission to the State Commission on Judicial Conduct, and relating to the commission and the powers and proceedings of the commission, a master, and the supreme court, or court of civil appeals justices serving in place of the supreme court, for the suspension, censure, removal, or involuntary retirement of a justice, judge, or justice of the peace under certain circumstances."

PROPOSICION No. 3 EN LA BOLETA

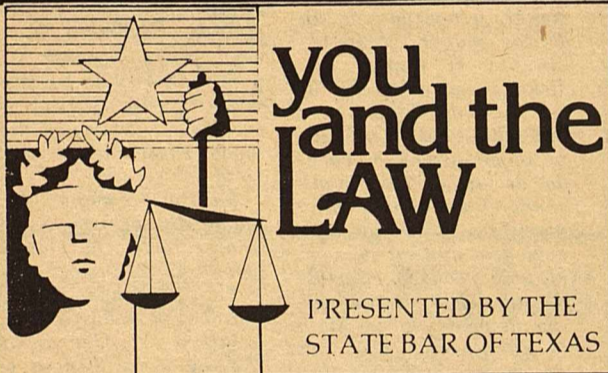

you and the LAW

Q: My husband and I both were previously widowed, and I have children from my first marriage. My first husband left me considerable real estate. How can I make sure my children will receive this property? Will a will, designating the property to the children exclusively, be sufficient?

A: Property left to a widow by her first husband is defined by law as the widow's separate property and can be willed to anyone of the widow's choosing, including children from a first marriage. In the absence of such a will in this case, the law provides that the surviving second husband would receive one-third of any personal property and a life estate in one-third of any real property, with the remainder passing to the woman's children.

Q: Four months after I renewed my apartment lease for another year, I was notified that my lease was terminated because of increasing costs. Are apartment owners allowed to raise rents in the middle of a lease?

A: Most apartment owners use a standard lease form which prohibits rent increases until the end of the

lease term, or until the expiration of any renewal or extension period. These leases also require that a 30-day written notice of a rent increase be provided if the landlord intends to increase the rent when the lease expires. Unless a lease specifically allows rent to be raised during the term of the lease, the landlord cannot raise the rent.

Q: My husband received an inheritance before we married. Did this property become community property after we married? And, he invested part of his inheritance in other property and savings accounts. Are these new investments community property belonging to both of us? Also, would the law be the same for my inheritance?

A: A spouse's separate property is defined as property owned before marriage or property received by gift or inheritance after marriage. The owner of separate property, whether a husband or wife, is free to manage and own it independent of the other spouse. Income from separate property, such as interest on a savings account, is community property and is owned jointly by the husband and wife.

GLAUCOMA? WHAT IS THAT?

Glaucoma is the most common of blindness. This is usually no pain of warning signs. However, once the disease progresses to the point of vision impairment the damage cannot be undone. Early diagnosis is important to arrest the disease and save sight.

A free Glaucoma eye examination clinic will be held Sunday, October 9, at the Kinney County Civic Center from 1:00-3:00 p.m. An ophthalmologist will be present to test eyes for Glaucoma.

Testing is done painlessly with an instrument called a tonometer which is placed over the surface of the eye. Everyone 35 or older should have this test every two years at least.

Symptoms of Glaucoma include headaches, loss of peripheral vision, need for frequent changes of glasses (particularly in older people), and the seeing of halos around lights.

Some forms of the disease progress very rapidly; others develop slowly. Early diagnosis is essential. The disease can often be effectively treated through surgery or the administration of drugs.

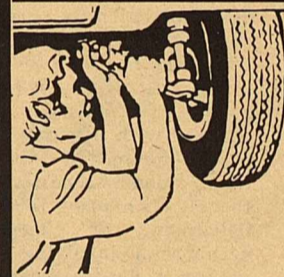
The Glaucoma Screening on October 9 is sponsored by your Extension Home Economics Advisory Committee, The San Antonio Branch of the Texas Society for Prevention of Blindness, and coordinated by Rebecca Rogers, County Extension Agent-at-Large. The test is for Glaucoma only. It will not be a complete eye examination.

The Glaucoma Screening was to be held last June but had to be cancelled.

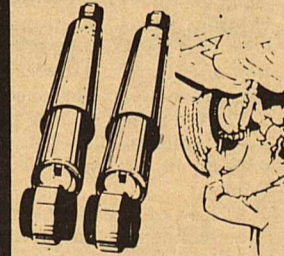

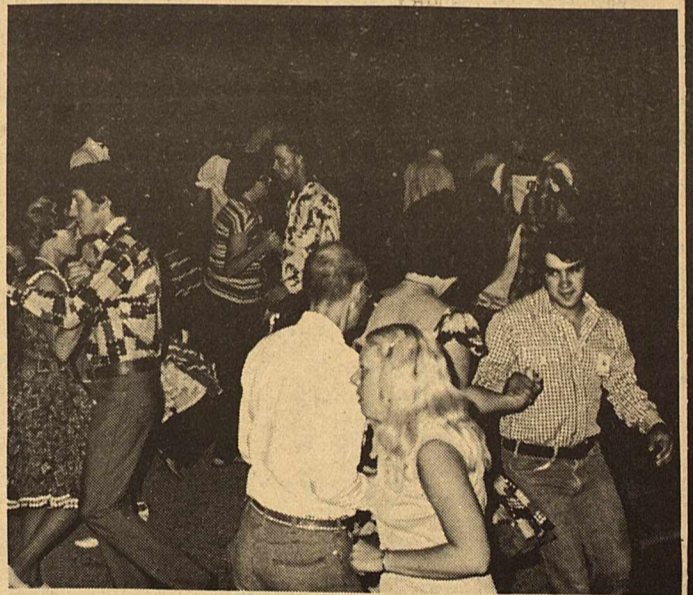
