




Prominent Brackettville rancher Happy Shahan, was re-elected in Austin, yesterday as a director on the Texas Tourist Council board.

RETAMA GARDEN CLUB


The October visit of the Retama Garden Club to the Amistad National Park North of Del Rio, was an experience enjoyed by all the members. The Park is located in a beautiful scenic setting overlooking Amistad Lake on the Lake's East Border. Mr. E. C. Lehnert is Park Superintendant. The guide for the group was a most interesting and knowledgeable young woman, Mrs. Elizabeth B. Armijo, Park Technician and Naturalist.

Beginning with an explanation of the terrain, she told the group how this land was once a small ocean or inland sea, and pointed out fossil rocks there which may also be found in spots all through this part of the country.

Next the group followed a trail past many types of native cactus, shrubs, and native fall flowers. It was interesting to learn the many uses the Indians made of these plants for food, medicine, clothing, and dyes. Many people are aware of the Prickly Pear's uses for food and cosmetics, but some of the uses of our well-known Texas Sage (Cenizia) are: browse for goats, sheep, and deer; as a treatment for chills and fever (by Indians); a tea; and as a source of Vitamin C. Our common use in yards and flower gardens is as a hedge and an ornamental plant. The Indians used most of the desert plants for food, cloth, rope, soap, and medicines.

Amistad Park personnel work constantly to preserve the plants of our ecological environment. Many plants and ahrubs are endangered. All of the public needs to understand the necessity of saving these for future generations to observe and enjoy.

Sure there is! Brackett High School graduates have several opportunities. They can go to college, trade school, join the military, or work. The college bound individual will discover that college can bring him in contact with many interesting students and staff members as well as prepare for a career. Each student should select a college which fits his interests. He should find the things he values, such as a strong educational program which will help in his career, an atomsphere that can help him grow as an individual, and the opportunity to make good friends.

In preparing for college a student will need an acceptable high school transcript, or GED scores. He will also need ACT or SAT test scores. Evidence of the following immunization is required by state law: diptheriatetanous, polio, if under the age of 19, and a complete health card and physical.

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
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
