The object of the food show, she explained, is not necessarily the delicious food, but the opportunity provided youth to sell themselves.

The government was able to meet its cash requirements by and large through the use of land sales and tariffs and did not tax the citizenry to any great extent.

By the beginning pf the 1900's, the population of the country was stablizing and growing inward. The First World War caused American to need large amounts of money and this was raised by the sale of war bonds. At the end of 1920's, our government had a large debt but it was of a manage able size.

Then the Great Depression changed the rules and World War II kicked over ne playing table.

The election of 1932 clearly offered the people a choice between a new deal or a continuation of existing policies. The people chose a new deal.

Many social spending programs were ushered into existence and were paid for, not through tax monies but by the federal social programs of the 50's and 60's, government borrowing money. This represented a break with the past in that

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the government had an obligation to influence the economy.

World War II caused the federal debt to grow enormously, thereby creating a need for a larger cash flow into the government.

In the prosperity booms and great taxes were increased in order to pay for government spending and to do all

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

Following the awards program a Tasting Tea was held.


SErving as 4-H foods and Nutrition

In the Boys Division Brackett won it's opening round game by defeating the Sabinal Yellowjackets. Then lost to the Leakey Eagles in the second 'round.


In the Girls Division Brackett lost it's opening round to Bandera and then won against Asherton before losing again to Nueces Canyon to eliminate the Tigerettes.

Tigerettes played also and lost by a score of 64-28.



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


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Pity Poor Bobcat

The bobcat ordinarily isn't the subject of much sympathy, but it's a different matter when the little predator gets mixed up with the federal government.

It turns out that one agency is trying to protect bobcats and another one wants to wipe them

The pro-bobcat fellows work at the Endangered Species Scientific Authority, which banned the export of bobcat pelts, apparently the demand for raw pelts by European fur salons is threatening the bobcat's survival.

But the ban means nothing at the Interior Department, which is continuing to kill bobcats as part of its predator control program. Government trappers killed 2,559 of the critters in 1975 and 1,500 last year.

Just another case of one paw not knowing what the other is doing.
