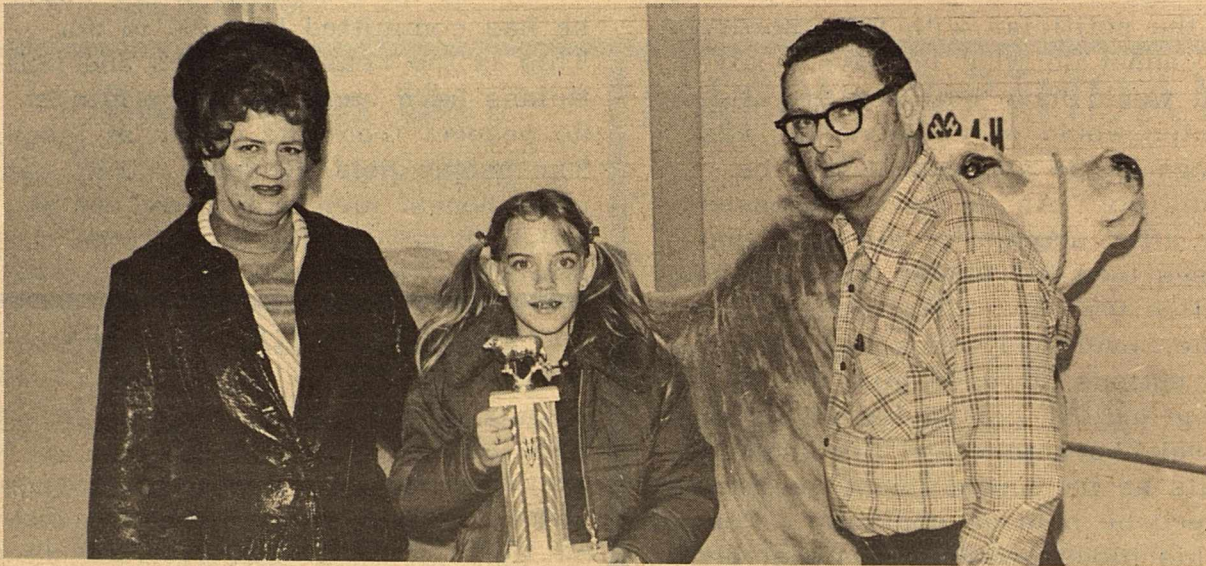
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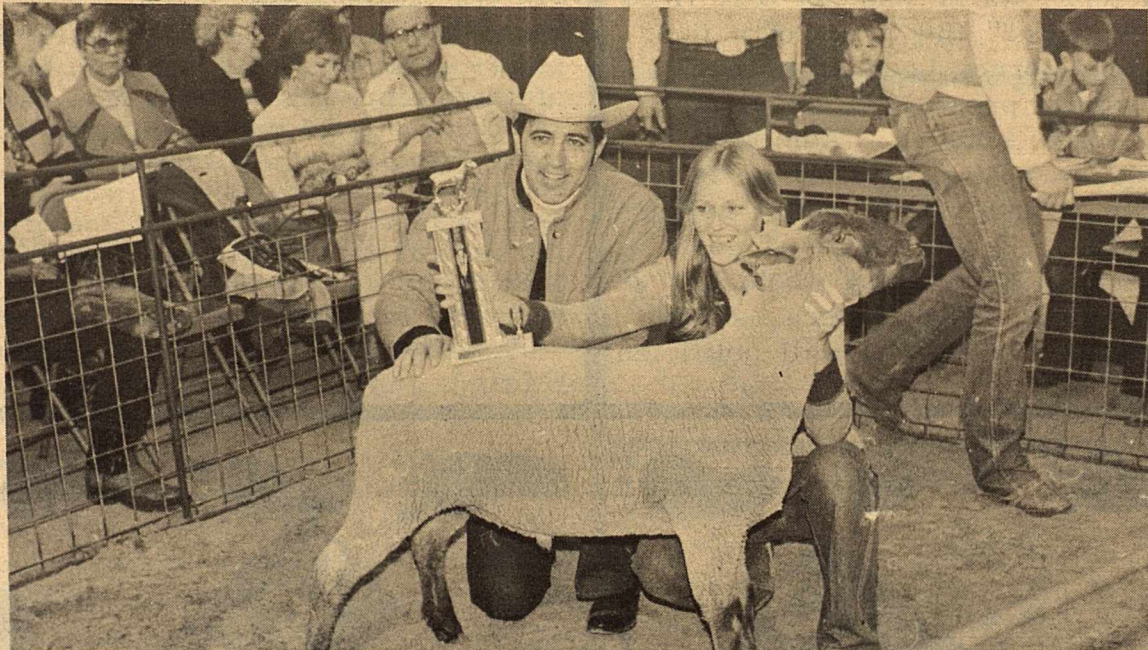

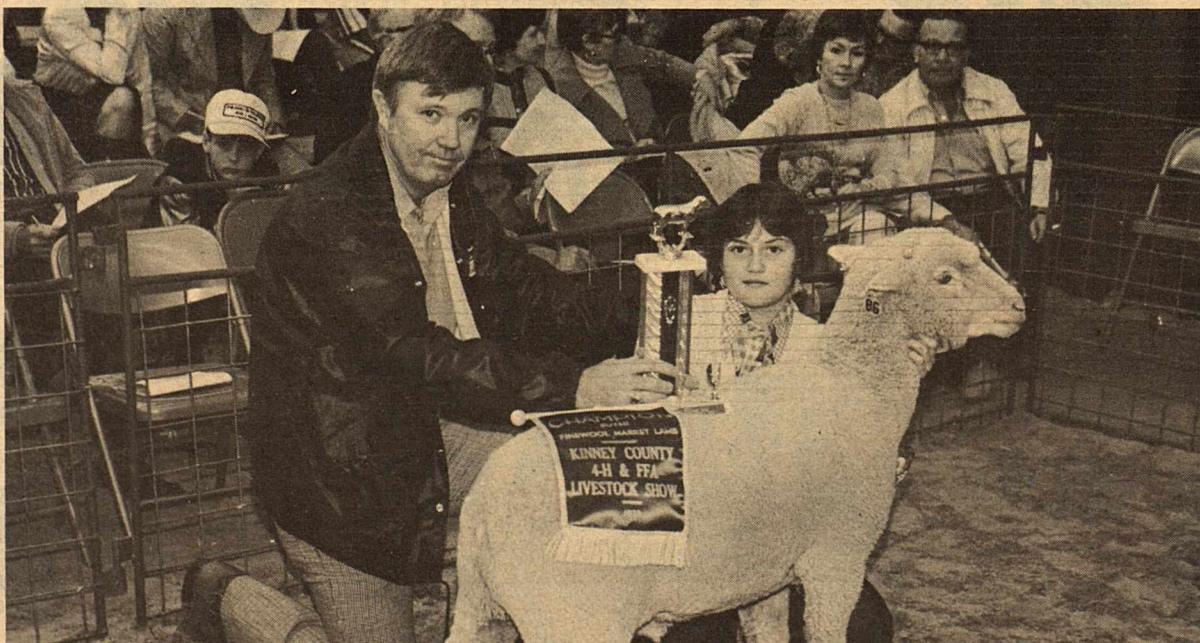
## LIVESTOCK SHOW

James Bevel, Vo. Ag. teacher from La Pryor, slapped the rump of an 1100 pound Charloais cross steer, exhibited by Brenda Foust, for the Grand Champion Market Steer. It was bought by the First State Bank of Brackettville for \$1.00 a pound. Immediately following the reserve champion steer was selected and shown by Adrian Reyes. It weighed 1075 pounds and was bought Saturday afternoon by North American Towns for \$.75 a pound.

In the market swine judging also judged by James Bevel, Kimberly Baxter took both Champion and Reserve Champion Swine honors. The Grand Champion Market Swine was bought by Fred Johnston and Associates for \$1.40 a pound and the Reserve Champion was bought by the First State Bank of Brackettville for \$1.20 a pound.

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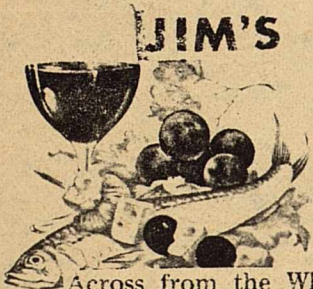
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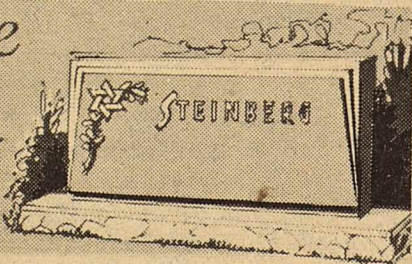
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## PRESENT DAY MYTHS

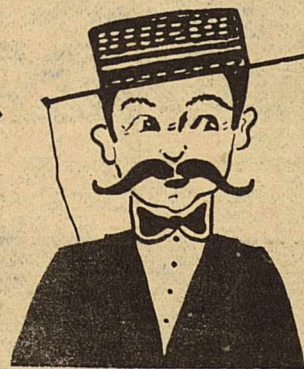

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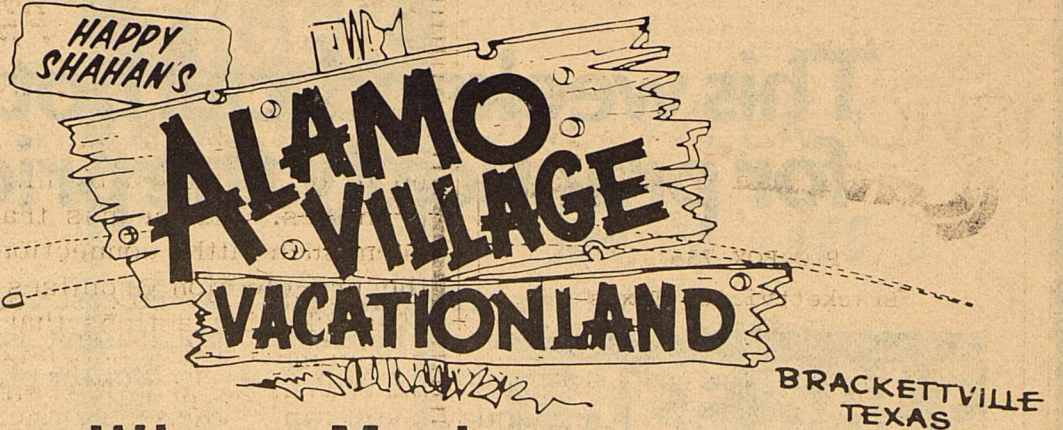


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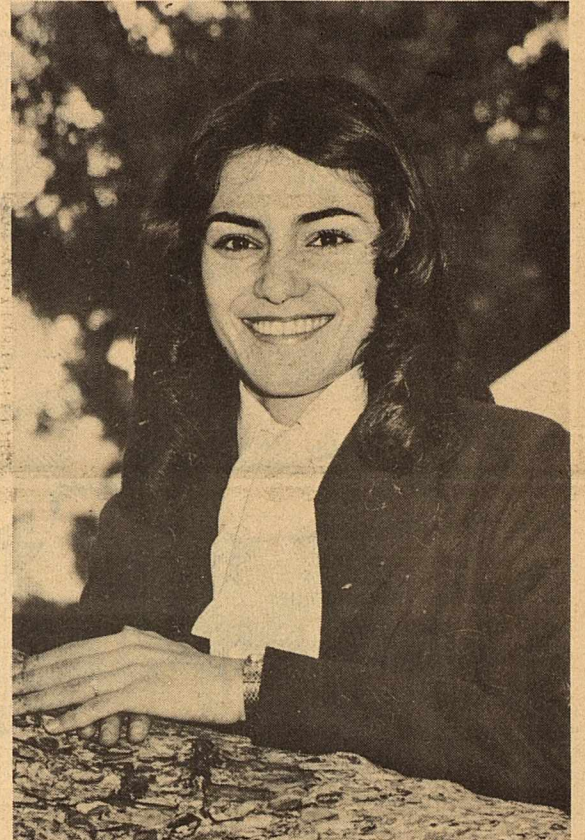

The Retama Garden Club held their January 17th meeting in the Parish House of the Episcopal Church at 3:00 p.m.

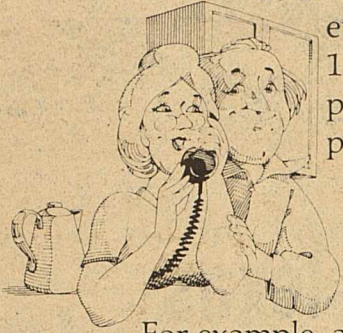

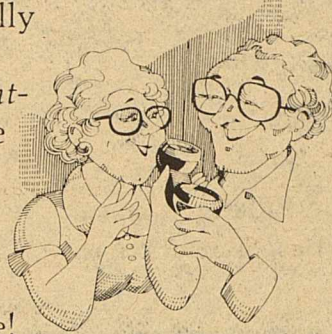


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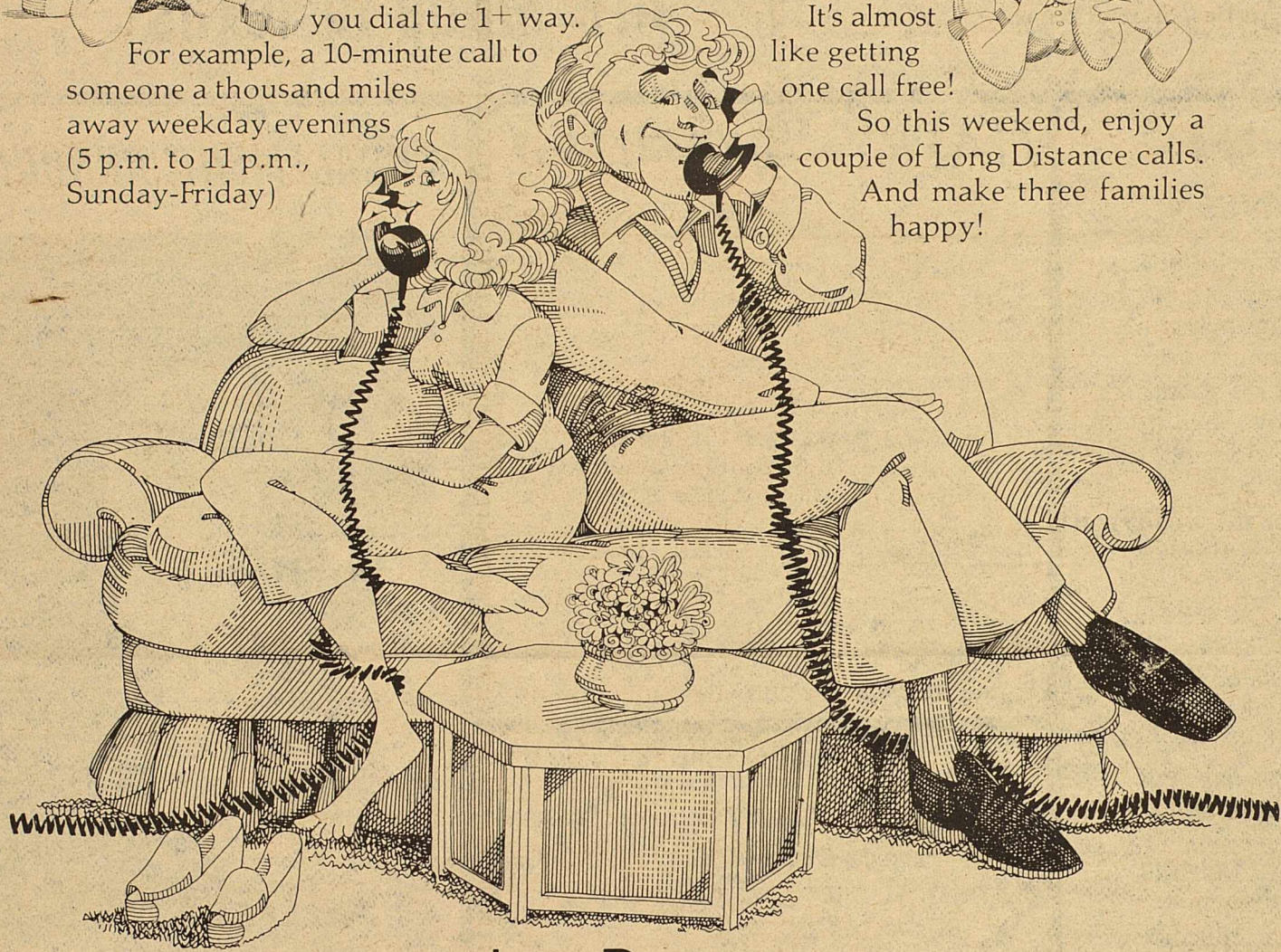

## Senator Lloyd Bentsen Watching Washington

It comes as no surprise that the average Russian lives about one-third as well as the average American; that he consumes, for example, less than half as much meat.

It is somewhat more surprising to learn that the standard of living in Russia is also lower than that of either Poland or Hungary, two Eastern European satellite countries of the Soviet Union.

And the Central Intelligence Agency reports that even harder times are ahead for the people of Russia over the next 10 years.

The C.I.A. projection was included in a report on the economies of Russia and China to the Joint Economic Committee of Congress. As a member of that committee, and as co-chairman of its Subcommittee on Economic Growth, I studied the report with a great deal of interest.

The C.I.A. expects the Soviet economy to grow by as little as 2 to 2.5 percent in the early 1980's. By way of comparison their rate of growth was 3.7 percent last year, while the United States economy expanded by 6.1 percent.

The most serious threat to the Russian economy is a looming oil shortage. At present the Soviet Union produces over 10 million barrels of oil a day; the C.I.A. anticipates production will fall as low as 8 million barrels.

Last year the Soviet Union sold \$4.5 billion worth of oil, mostly to countries in Eastern Europe. By 1985, though, they may be forced to spend \$10 billion a year to buy oil from non-communist countries.

Soviet leaders in Moscow will face some hard choices in trying to deal with this shortage, as it helps to intensify their economic woes.

The expected economic difficulties will likely trigger intense debate in Moscow over how much they spend for military arms.

The Soviet military effort last year accounted for almost 12 percent of that country's total economic output, compared to 5.5 percent for this country: they spent about \$1.40 to every \$1 we spent.

Communist China, according to the C.I.A. report, has already made the decision to reduce military spending. As of last year such spending had remained at roughly the same level since 1969 and their aircraft, missiles, ships and ground equipment are basically copies of Soviet designs of the 1950's.

Even so, the Chinese had a rough time of it economically last year. Partly because of severe earthquakes in some sections of the country and partly because of political disruptions stemming from the deaths of Mao Tse-tung and Chou En-lai, their economy showed absolutely no growth in 1976.

It would be difficult to speculate on what the economic difficulties in Russia and Communist China will mean, insofar as their relations with the U.S. are concerned.

Will the leaders of these nations decide it is in their interests to take a hard-line position in their dealings with us? Or will the need for U.S. technology—particularly oil development technology—and the need for easy access to our credit markets push them to seek closer ties with this country?



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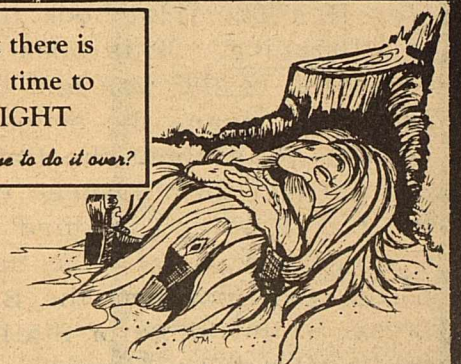
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## GREEN THUMBS JOE TOWNSEND

We have had a number of inquiries as to the advisability of moving trees. Now is the time. After leaves begin to come on trees it is too late to safely move them. The best way is to have the hole ready for the tree you plan to move. If the tree is two inches or less in diameter, the tree can be rather easily moved. Dig around the tree to when you have a ball of dirt about eight inches out from the trunk and about as deep as the ball is across. Dig this out and move dirt and all to the new hole. Smaller trees, one inch or less in diameter, soak the ground well around the tree. Dig carefully and get out all the root system possible. You can shake the dirt from the root and immediately place in the hole prepared for it. Water heavily and fill the hole. If dirt is prove to pack, mix some wood bark mulch with the dirt. Keep the ground moist to touch. Do not fertilize a tree when you move it. It is better not to fertilize it for a year. Using root stimulator in the water when you plant the tree will help. Trees properly moved should do as well or better as before the move. Shade trees when moved should be topped. About 1/3 of the upper growth should be lopped off. The tree will do better and make a better tree.

A Hearing Commission of the Texas Department of Water Resources will conduct a public hearing at: 1:30 p.m., February 22, 1978, at the Neighborhood Service Center, 300 E. Main, Uvalde, Texas, and at 1:30 p.m., February 23, 1978, at the County Commissioner's Courtroom, Nueces County Courthouse, 901 Leopard, Corpus Christi, Texas, in order to receive testimony concerning Volume I, Basic Data Report, of the Water Quality Management Plan for the Nueces Basin. This document is the first of two volumes which, upon completion of Volume II, will form the Water Quality Management Plan for the Nueces Basin. Volume I, Basic Data Report, includes information on existing wastewater treatment facilities; existing water quality; existing land use patterns; existing population; and projections of economic growth, population, and probable land use patterns. Volume II, Plan Summary Report, will present the recommended plans for water quality management and the legal, financial, and institutional requirements of each plan. Also included in Volume II will be descriptions of feasible alternatives, and environmental assessment, and a summary of the public participation activities conducted during the development of the plan. The Water Quality Management Plan for the Nueces Basin is being developed to satisfy the requirements of Section 208 of the Federal Water Pollution Control Act Amendments of 1972, and pursuant to Title 40 Code of Federal Regulations Parts 130 and 131 and the State of Texas Continuing Planning Process. The public hearing shall be conducted in compliance with Section 26.037 (formerly Section 21.089), Texas Water Code. The study area for this plan includes most of the Nueces River Basin. This plan will not address the planning required in the Corpus Christi Designated Areawide Planning Area; detailed planning within that area will be provided through the development of the Corpus Christi Areawide Waste Treatment Management Plan and will not be considered at this hearing.

Copies of the Basic Data Report will be made available for public inspection at the following locations: Texas Department of Water Resources Offices, Stephen F. Austin Building, 1700 North Congress Avenue, Austin, Texas; Texas Department of Water Resources District 8 Office, Dellcrest Plaza No. 2, 4713 Rigsby Avenue, San Antonio, Texas. 78222 Texas Department of Water Resources District 11 Office, 420 South Missouri Ave., Weslaco, Texas 78596; Texas Department of Water Resources District 12 Office, Klee Square Building, Suite 515, 505 S. Water Street, Corpus Christi, Texas 78401; the Costal Bend Council of Governments, Parkdale Square Office Tower, 4600 Parkdale Drive, Corpus Christi, Texas 78411, and the Nueces River Authority, 300 E. Main Street, Uvalde, Texas 78801. Copies of Volume II, Plan Summary Report, will be made available at these same locations when completed in June, 1978. However, the hearing cited in this notice will consider only Volume I, Basic Data Report, of the Water Quality Management Plan for the Nueces Basin.

The public is encouraged to attend the hearing and to present evidence or opinions as to the accuracy of the existing and projected data compiled in the Basic Data Report. Written testimony which is submitted prior to or during the public hearing will be included in the record. The Hearing Commission would appreciate receiving a copy of all testimony at least five (5) days before the hearing. The testimony and questions concerning the public hearing should be addressed to Gordon W. Houser, Texas Department of Water Resources, P.O. Box 13087, Capitol Station, Austin, Texas 78711 or call (512) 475-5516.

The date selected for this hearing is intended to comply with deadlines set by statute and regulation. Any publication or receipt of this notice less than thirty calendar days prior to the hearing date is due to the necessity of scheduling the hearing on the date selected.

This public hearing may be continued in order to fully develop the evidence.

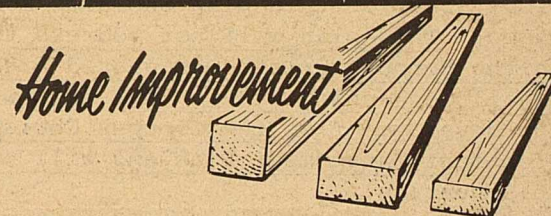

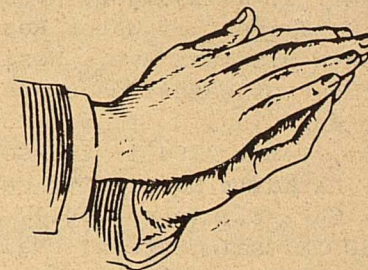
