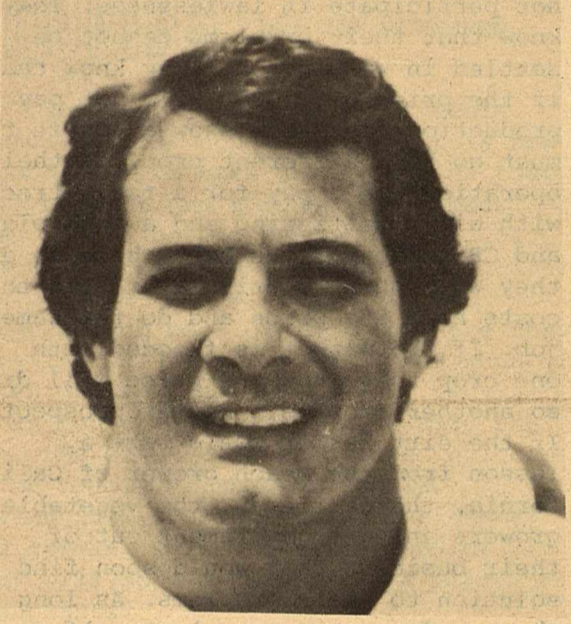

Alamo Village, site of many major westerns including "The Alamo", "Two Rode Together" and "Bandolero", has once again opened its doors to the movie industry. Production is underway on Mapaho Productions, Ltd.'s first motion picture venture-"JODY".

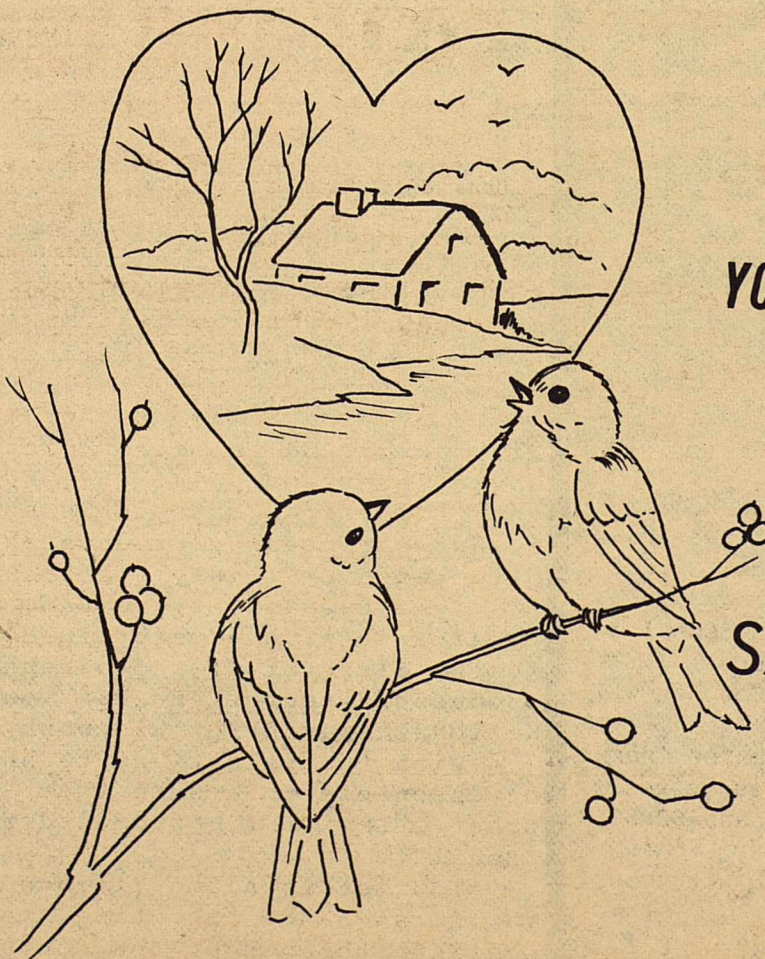

The "government" owes people financial benefits. This fallacious promise must have been generated by Communist Russia as a thinly disguised vehicle of destruction so the United States can fall its prey without a shot being fired. There is no better greased shide to fiscal destruction than this. The tragedy is that America is now so far down the path it is questionable whether the trend can ever be reversed. This is the root cause of the outlandish welfare program, of the totally irresponsible Social Security program, the energy program, and the "farm crisis". With slight mental gymnastics anyone can show a loss in any kind of business. With inept operation anyone can actually lose money in any kind of business. The farmers plight is a picture of all. The farmer gloried for years in his welfare (subsidy) check from the tax payers via the government. He generally lived "high on the hog", wore out a pickup a year (many times on tax free gas and butane bought to be used only on the farm). Traded his equipment every thime new and more convenient equipment came out and in general lived to-day as though there was no to-morrow. When prices were high he spent high, bought or leased more land so he could cash in on the high prices. When a crop brought a high price he planted more of it the next year. Then when prices fell and cost of production rose he began to blame everyone but himself. When the cotton farmers on the plains saw the high price of corn he changed to corn. It doesn't matter that at the general price of corn he cannot possibly produce it at a profit. He feels he can pressure the tax payer (though elected repre-

sentatives) to take money from someone else and give it to him. Now the militants and radicals have decided they can blockade the borders, stop trucks, stop trains, cut off the food supply to Americans and they will come crawling with out stretched hands full of money to beg the farmer to plant something so he won't starve. They even dare to drive into a field and force a farmer who wants to plant to quit. They even have plowed up fields of growing wheat when a farmer refused to go along with their radicalism. In the time of the year when they have nothing to do anyway they use their time to cause trouble. Not long ago some men yelled so loudly about "outsiders" coming into Georgia to support "civil rights" and now they are "outsiders" coming into Texas to cause trouble and where they find law enforcement officers who take seriously their responsibility they cry like babies because they aren't given a free hand. This is not true of the bulk of the American farmers. They are in general as fine people as are to be found in America. They a conscientious, hard working people. They neither support nor participate in lawlessness. They know that their problems cannot be settled in Washington, They know that if the price of a crop will not pay production costs and show a profit they must go to a different crop. If their operation won't pay for a fancy tractor with air conditioning and a tape player and CB radio for the hired hand to drive they will have to drive a tractor that costs half the price and do the same job. If the market is flooded with one crop they know the price will drop so another crop is a better prospect. If the dirt farmer would take a lesson from the peach grower of California, the cattleman, the vegetable growers and get government out of their business they would soon find solution to their problems. As long as the cry for more government welfare (subsidies) they will see their problems mounting, look at the dairy industry and see.

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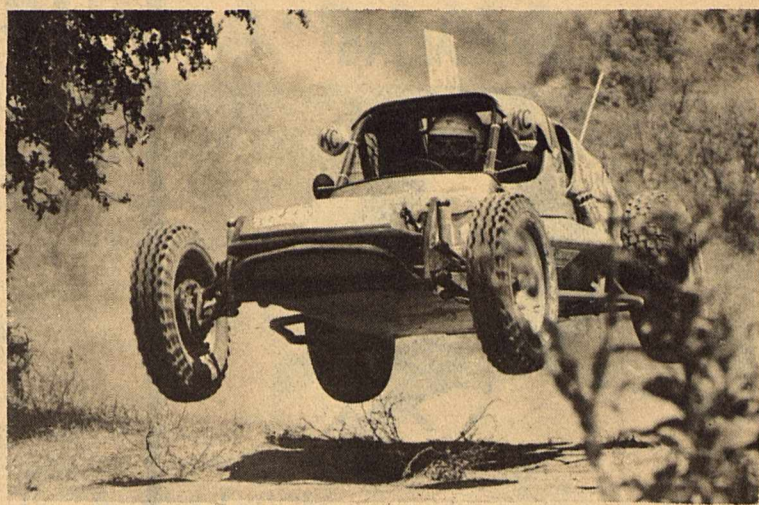

This has been a most difficult winter on most house plants. It is now a good time to take those outside that will be left and through the summer. They should be put where they can be somewhat protected from the harsh spring winds and will need to be watered much more often than where they were inside. They should be fed when taken outside and about every two weeks for a while. The fresh air, the sun, the outside is even more invigorating to plants than to people. Giving them a chance to get oriented and growing well before the summer heat will soon make them look like new plants.

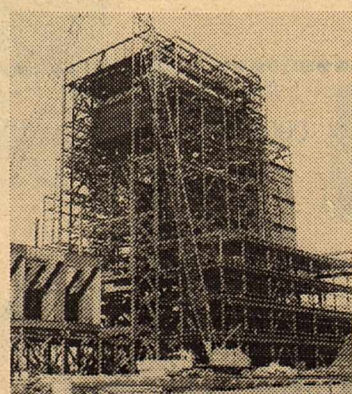

# In the immediate future, much of your electric supply will come from coal and nuclear plants.

As supplies of natural gas have become scarcer, state regulations have curtailed the amount of this fuel Texas utility companies can use to make electricity. The Texas Railroad Commission has ruled that future deliveries of natural gas for production of electrical power must be curtailed. In addition, the Public Utility Commission of



Coledo Creek Power Station

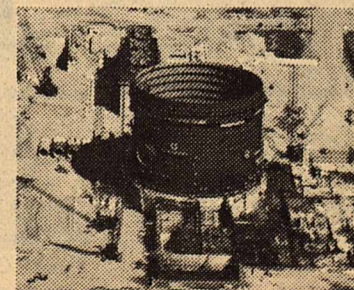
Texas has said it will not approve the construction of any new gas-fired plants for generating electricity.

Consequently, Central Power and Light customers increasingly will be served by electricity from coal-fired and nuclear plants. About 40% of CPL's production, in fact, will come from these two sources by the mid-1980's. Coledo Creek Power Station, our first coal-fired plant, will start operation late next year. CPL also is a participant in the South Texas Project, a nuclear plant scheduled to begin supplying power in 1980.

For the long-range future, CPL is studying—in collaboration with research agencies and other utility companies—three new areas as possible energy sources: coal gasification, nuclear fusion and geothermal steam. As an economy move, CPL is pursuing the possibility of interconnecting with the elec-

tric systems of companies outside of Texas.

Although power production undoubtedly will be more expensive in the future than in the past, construction of nuclear and coal-fired plants assures continued reliable service for CPL customers in South Texas.



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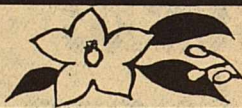
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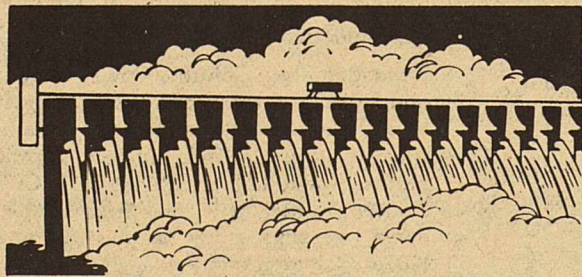

Three Kinney County youngster won ribbons at the District 13 4-H Food Show held Saturday March 4 on the campus of Southwest Texas Junior College.

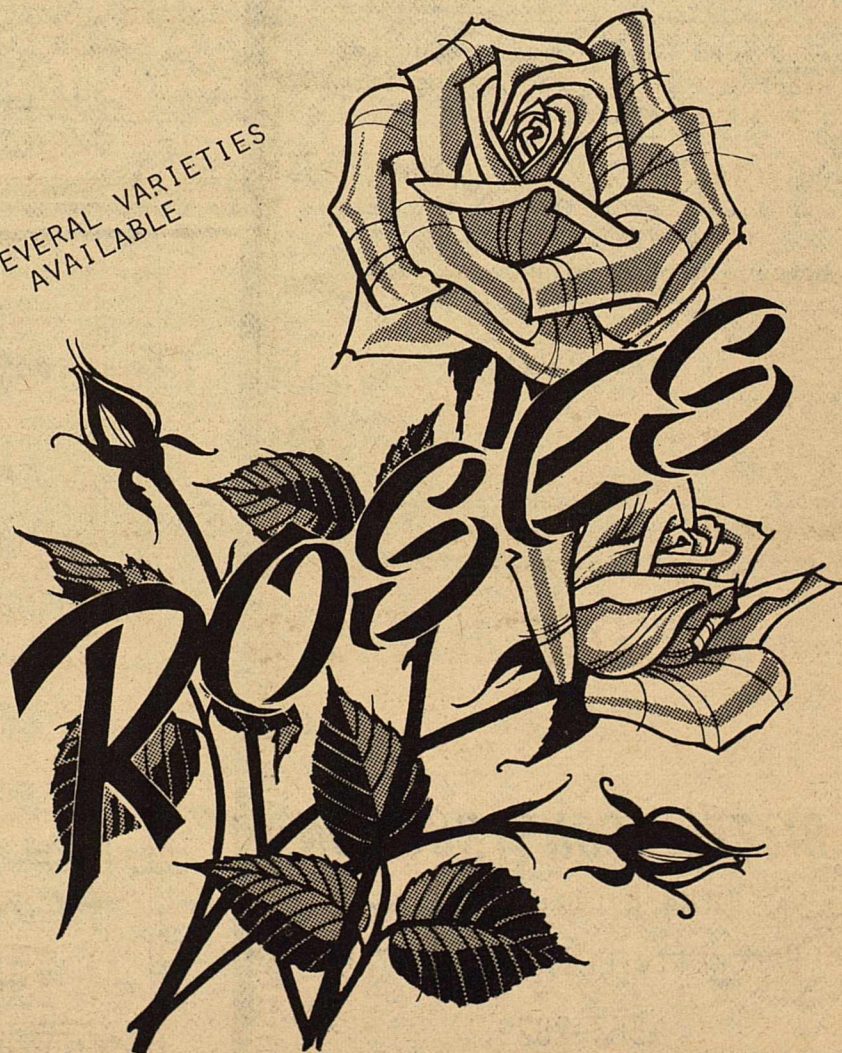
Virginia Garza, the only participant in the preteen division won a red ribbon.

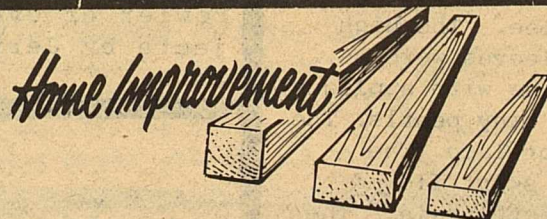
