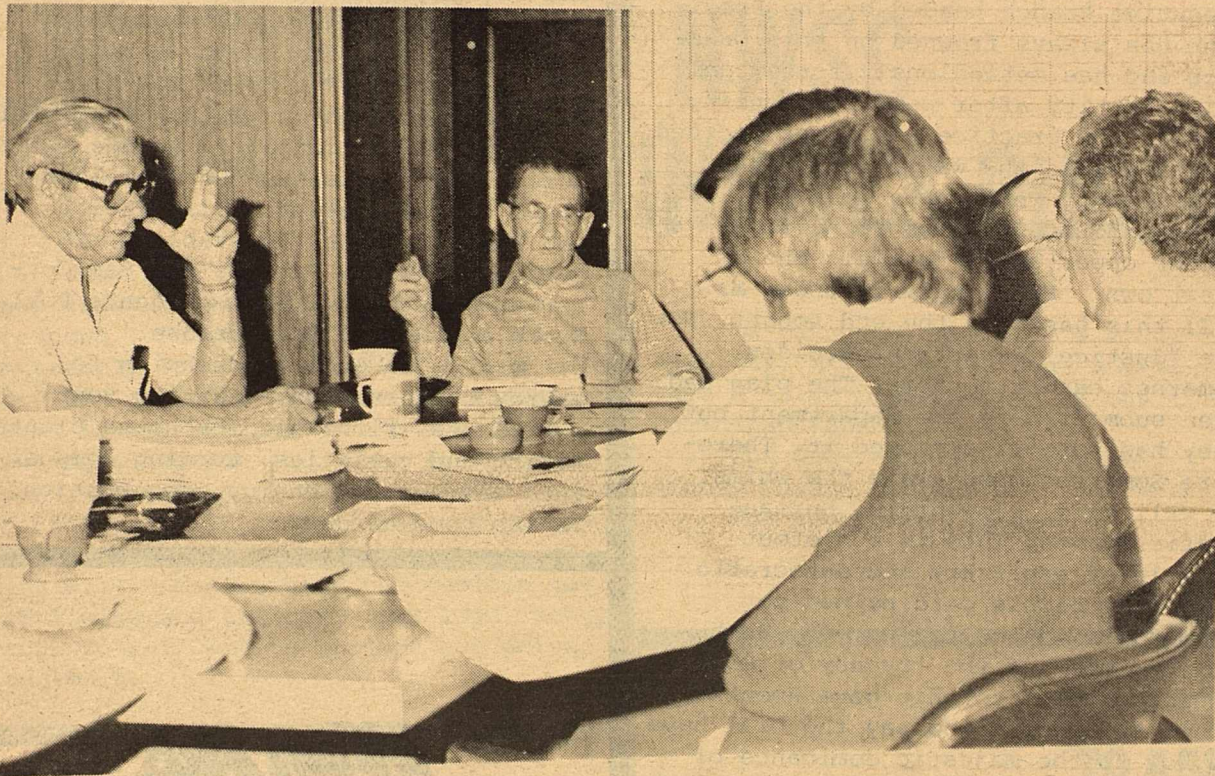

CLINIC DUE

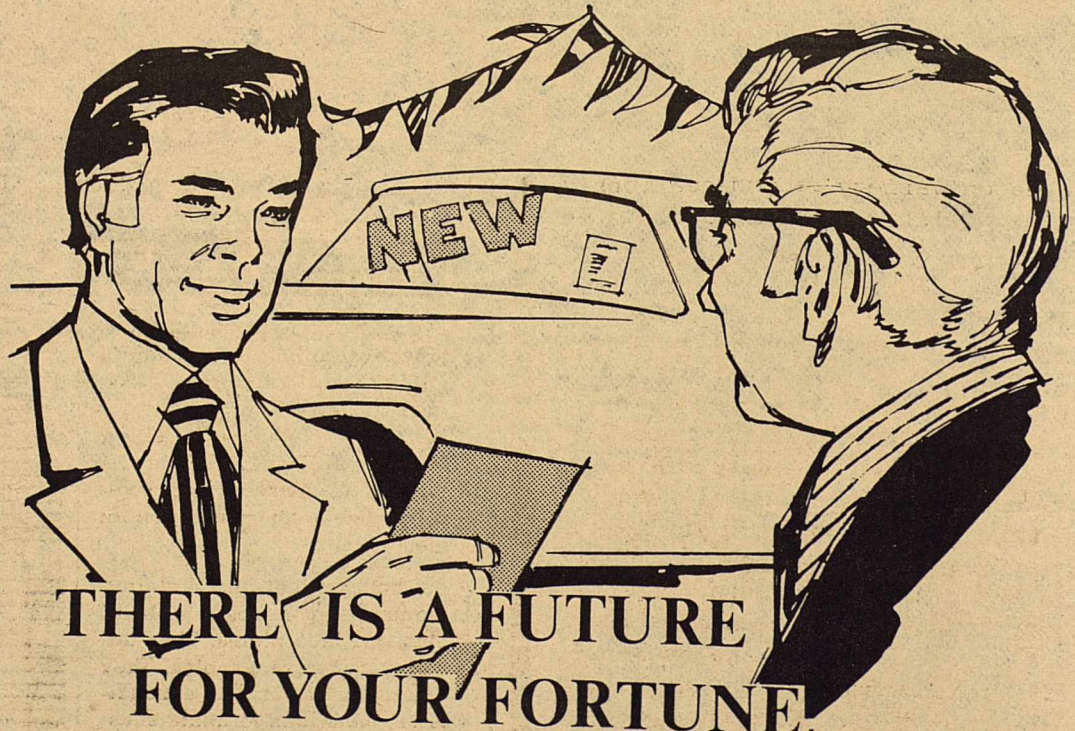
UVALDE--Experts in the fields of landscaping and gardening will place an emphasis on money saving ideas during the annual Landscape and Gardening Clinic here March 21.

Topics include landscaping for energy conservation, starting your own plants, first aid for house plants timing and varieties, turning compost into savings and energy conservation in the home garden.

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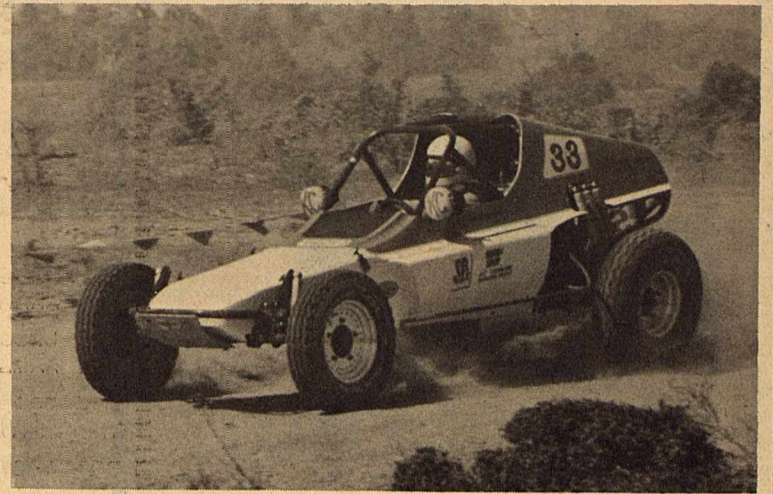
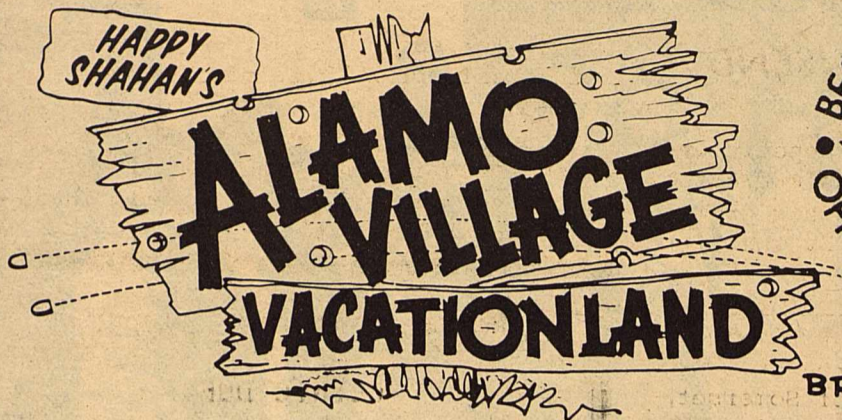

TIPS FOR GREEN THUMBS

Don't be discouraged if your carpet grass looks dead and is slow to respond. It is still too early. The extremely late spring after a long cold dry winter is keeping the grass dormant. Some is now beginning to break dormancy but most has not yet. Keep it watered good, fertilize it (be sure to use fertilizer with iron added) and be patient. It will eventually wake up and you will too soon have the dubious joy of mowing and trimming your lawn. Long, cool to cold nights are not conducive too much.

VEGETABLE ADVISORY FOR MARCH

Every homeowner who plants a vegetable garden is concerned with how, when, and where to buy the seed needed for a quality vegetable garden.

There is help with these and many other gardening decisions through your local office of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The County Extension Agent can supply you with an up-to-date list of seed and plant varieties recommended for our county. These lists are based on variety recommendations tested by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Stations. Seed and plants resistant to disease and insects also are listed.

Like other merchandise, seed may vary in quality at different stores. You as the gardening consumer must make sure the kind, variety, percentage germination and the date of testing are marked on each package of seed you buy.

When you buy transplants, it is best to buy certified plants. Home gardeners should always examine the roots of transplants for the presence of small knots or galls. The galls are an indication of root-knot nematodes, and all infected plants should be discarded.

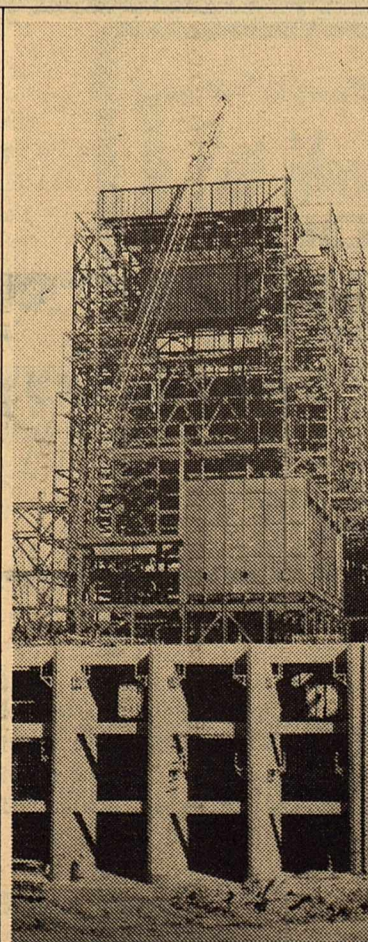
Reputable dealers of seed or transplants provide their product based on demand, so it is your role as consumer to demand adapted, high quality varieties that will ensure your satisfaction at harvest time.

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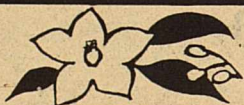
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WOODMEN OF THE WORLD LIFE INSURANCE SOCIETY

Teachers care about kids. Help them. Get involved in your school.



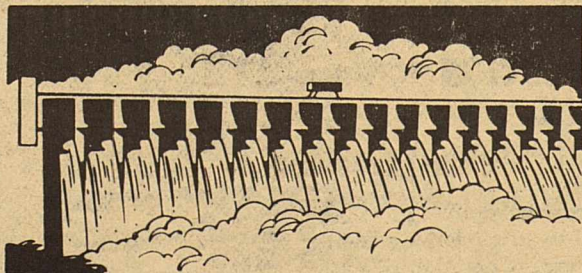
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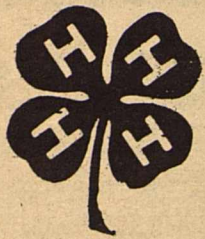
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4-H REPORT

4-H LEADER TRAINING WORKSHOP IN UVALDE

4-H leaders, adult and youth, from Kinney County are invited to join others from throughout District 13 at the Texas A&M Research and Extension Center in Uvalde on Saturday, March 18, for workshop training on method demonstrations and record books.

County Extension Agent-at-Large, Becky Rogers, notes that 4-H leaders interested in strengthening these areas of the local 4-H Club or project group members with whom they work may wish to attend one of these training sessions which will begin at 11:00 a.m. and follow through noon until 1:00 p.m. Instruction for the method demonstration training will be conducted by Bonnie Kyle, Bexar County Extension Agent, and Clara Henze, Bexar County Extension Program Assistant. The record book training will be given by George MacArthur, 4-H and Youth Specialist.

These two training sessions will follow business meetings of both the District 4-H Council and Adult Leader's Association set for 9:30 a.m. District 4-H Council delegates from Kinney County are Kimberly Baxter and Joel Voss. Representatives to the Adult Association are Mr. and Mrs. Jim Voss. Interested leaders are also invited to attend either of these two business sessions.

Dr. Krehbiel is a native of Oklahoma. As a farm boy and FFA member, he had shown livestock and won many awards, including championships at the Southwestern Livestock Exposition in Ft. Worth and at the American Royal Livestock Show in Kansas City.

He has a strong background in animal production and genetics. He received a B.S. degree from Oklahoma State University in 1950, an M.S. degree from the University of Arkansas in 1959, and a Ph.D degree from Virginia Polytechnic Institute in 1966.

His graduate studies were based on selection for type and reproduction performance of cow herds.

Between periods of formal training, Dr. Krehbiel worked with the beef cattle industry as artificial insemination technician, beef cattle herdsman and ranch manager in Oklahoma. He also served as beef cattle research assistant in Arkansas, and animal geneticist for the USDA at Miles City, Montana. For the past two years prior to the joining the Agricultural Education Specialist Program, he served as Area Livestock Extension Agent in Ohio.

The short course at Brackett High School is scheduled to begin March 20, 1978, at 7:30 p.m. in the Vocational Agriculture Building. Other meetings in the series of 4 will be held March 21, 22, 23. During the dates the short course is in progress, Dr. Krehbiel will be available to assist cattlemen with individual problems and to provide on-the-farm instruction, according to Charles Foust.

Cattlemen interested in attending the short course should write or call the superintendent of schools, Mr. M.H. Wills, or the teacher of the vocational agriculture, Mr. Charles Foust. An entry fee of \$5 will be charged.

Beef production Short Course certificates will be presented to each cattleman who attends all the training sessions.

Dr. Krehbiel states that the field of beef cattle production must take a close look at efficiency of production in the future. With land prices, feed, and taxes rising, the producer is meeting more and more competition for the consumer's dollar at the meat counter. From the economic view of the beef cattle business, there is every indication that in comparing the producer of yesteryear and the producer of tomorrow, beef

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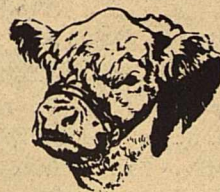
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must be produced more efficiently in order to the profit-making business. Dr. Krehbiel indicates that the beef production short course will deal with methods of producing beef at lower cost and the ways of producing the kind of beef that the homemaker wants to buy. He also states that the course will include such important topics as cattle reproduction and pregnancy diagnosis, selecting bulls and replacement heifers, Calf crop percentages, and supplemental winter feeding. The course can be changed to meet with the wishes and interests of the farmers and ranchers enrolled.

"Short courses in beef production, as well as in other areas, are now available to farmers throughout the state under the cooperative program between Texas Education Agency and Texas A&M University," states Bob Jaska, associate professor, Department of Agricultural Education at Texas A&M University, who coordinates the program for Texas A&M.

"This cooperative program," states Jaska, "is designed to make the services

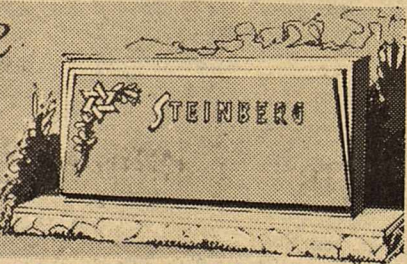
