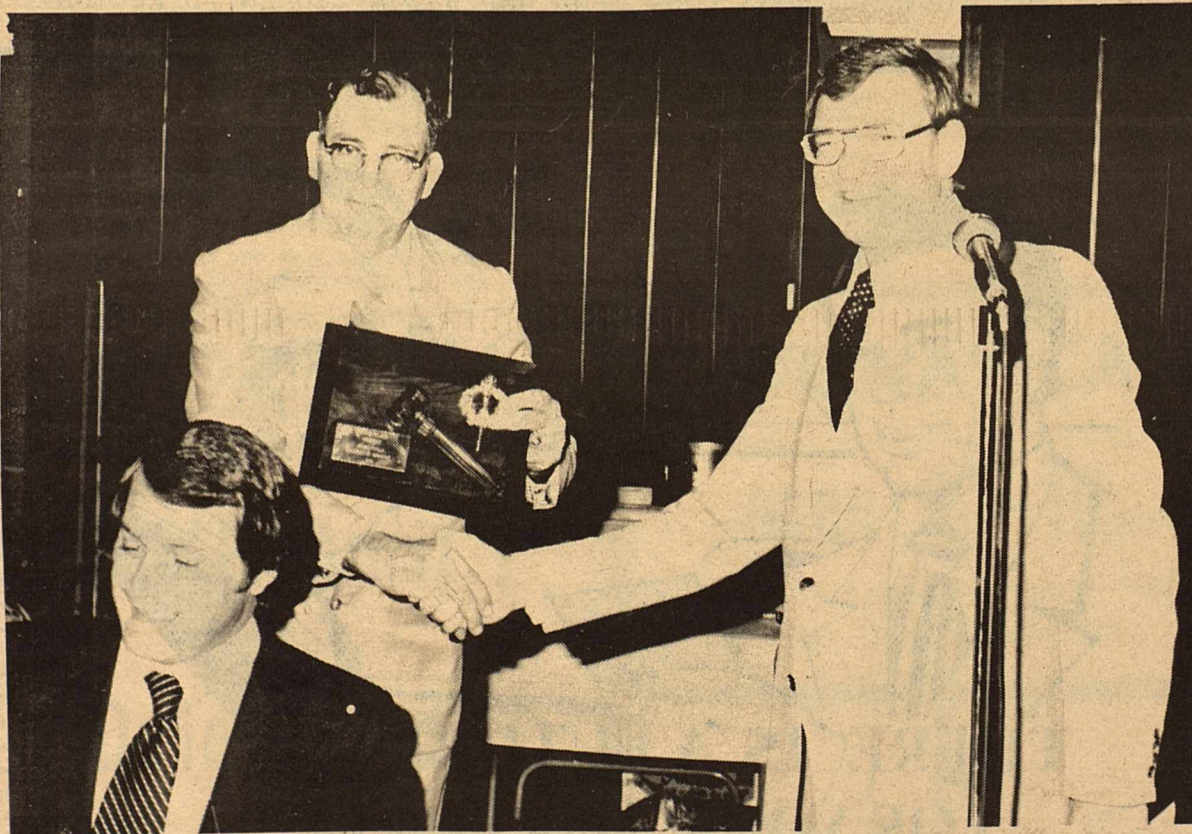

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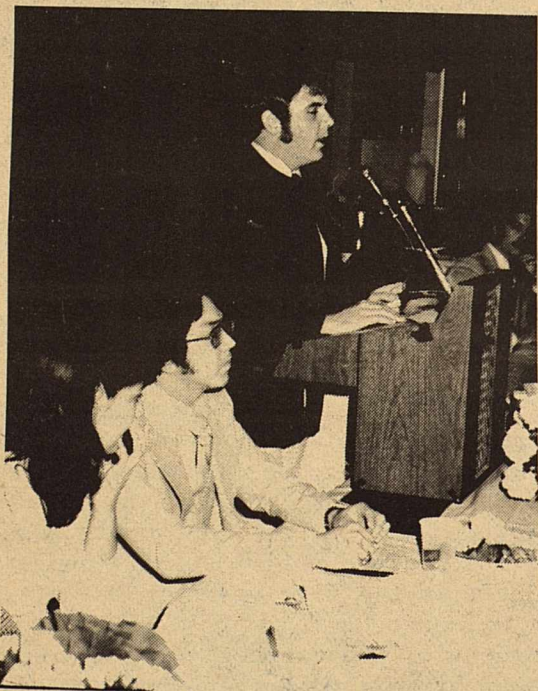

ten years.

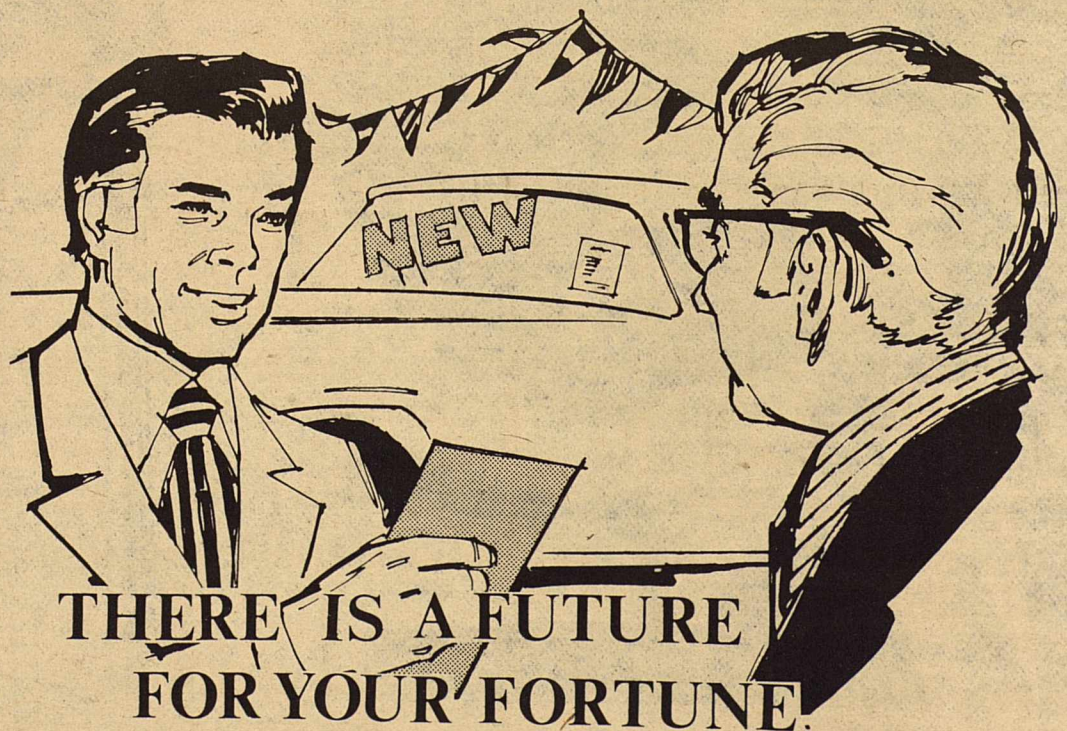

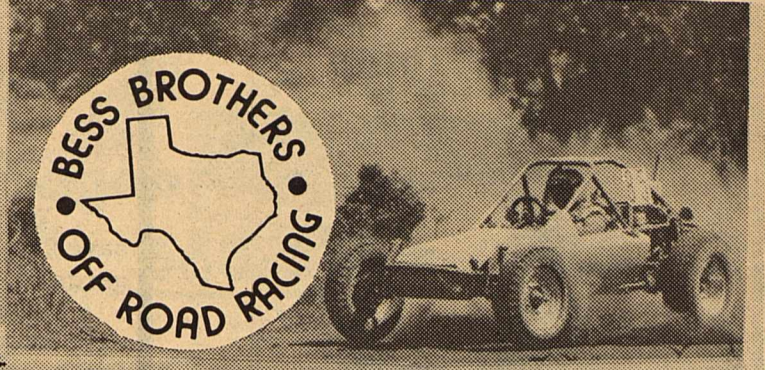

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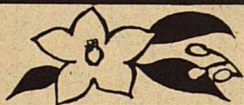
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**VEGETABLE ADVISORY FOR MARCH**

Homework helps children learn. It lets your child go over today's lessons--and get ready for tomorrow's. At home, your child can concentrate on the things that need to be studied.

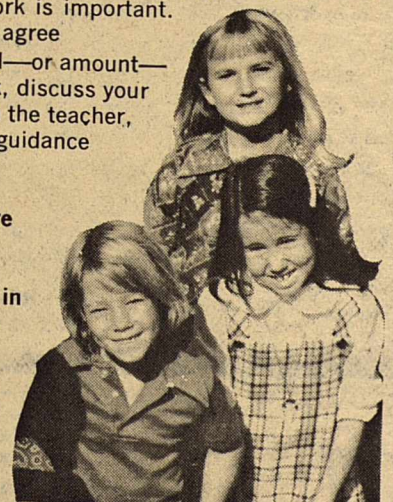
Most teachers agree that you--the parent--should do little of the actual work because the way you learned to do things may be different from the way your child is being taught.

Teachers care about kids. Help them. Get involved in your school.



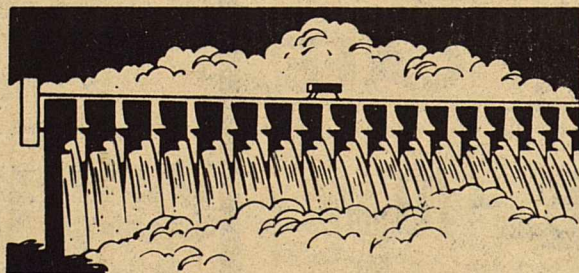

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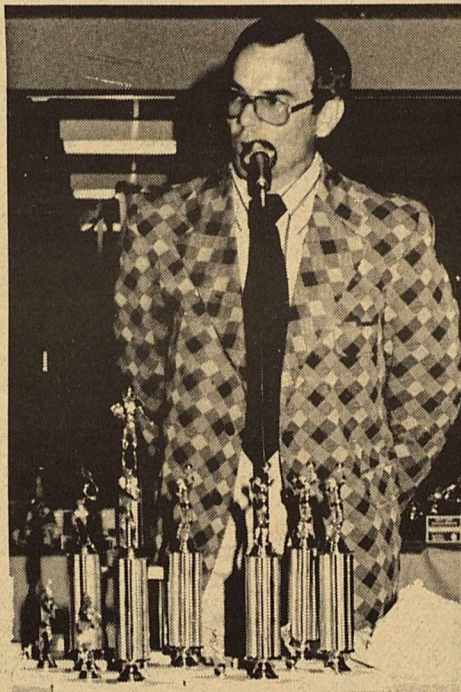

There is much concern about planting grass. For one to desire a nice lawn is indeed commendable. Some nurseries are now selling carpet grass and urging the planting of it. In reality it is a little to early to do this. If you take a look at the grass now for sale you don't have to have a great deal of intelligence to see the grass is not really to much growing quality.

Most carpet grass has not broken dormance or has just barely done so. Grass that is green and growing will will certainly give better and quicker results than sleepy-half dead grass. You will be far ahead by mid summer if you wait two or three weeks before sprigging or otherwise putting in carpet grass.

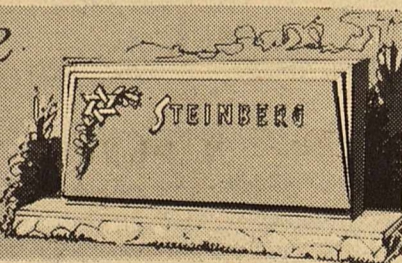

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### NEW GRAZING TECHNIQUES USED IN TEXAS

More net profit per acre, rapid grassland improvement, and reduced labor needs are some of the benefits of a new method of rangeland management being used in Texas. The technique, called Short Duration Grazing, is now being used successfully by more than 400 livestock producers.

Short duration grazing is producing some excellent results. The major benefit is rapid grassland improvement, which leads to more net profit per acre.

Livestock that are normally run in several pastures are put into one herd in a single pasture. The other pastures are left vacant. When the forage is grazed to the desired degree livestock are moved to the next pasture in the rotation. That way, all pastures are deferred from grazing for several months before being grazed for a few weeks.

Under continuous grazing, livestock repeatedly use those plants they like best. As a result, the preferred plants are often over-used, become weakened, and may not reproduce. At the same time, other plants are used to a lesser degree, maintaining more vigor than preferred plants.

Short duration grazing breaks this competitive edge gained by unpalatable plants. After a pasture is grazed briefly, it receives a rest five to ten times as long as the grazing period. If soil moisture and growing conditions are favorable, choice forage plants make rapid regrowth due to the high vigor developed during the rest periods. This improved vigor allows the better plants to reproduce and gradually crowd out the less palatable ones.

But short duration grazing systems require careful planting and close supervision. Livestock must be moved when the desired degree of forage has been used. Some systems require more cross-fencing and a few producers have found they need more livestock watering facilities.

Most range scientists are convinced that short duration grazing is the system of the future. The problem is to plan each system carefully so it can be made to work.

### NOTICE OF FILING OF SOLID WASTE APPLICATION

The City of Brackettville, Texas, has filed Application No. 1199 with the Texas Department of Health for a permit to operate a proposed Type II municipal solid waste disposal site to be located 1.5 miles south of Brackettville on the east side of State Highway 131 in Kinney County, Texas.

The application covers approximately 7.2 acres of land and seeks a permit to receive solid wastes under the regulatory jurisdiction of the Texas Department of Health for disposal or otherwise processing in accordance with the said Department's Municipal Solid Waste Management Regulations. A preliminary study of the application will be made by the Department and supplementary material may be required of the applicant.

Before the issuance or denial of a permit, a public hearing on the application will be held pursuant to the Texas Solid Waste Disposal Act (article 4477-7, Vernon's Texas Civil Statutes) and the Administrative Procedure and Texas Register Act (Article 6252-13a, V.T.C.S.). Notice of such hearing will be published in a newspaper of general circulation in the area where the site is located at least twenty (20) days prior to the date of such hearing.
