



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
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ALAMO VILLAGE STARS

NAKAI BREEN HONORED IN HAWAII

Having been a member of Beta Sigma Phi only 2 years, she has paid our sorority many complements, along with many pleasures. In her own words she stated "THE MOST HONOR I HAVE RECEIVED IN MY LIFE, WAS BEING PLEDGED TO BETA SIGMA PHI". Endlessly she has worked with our local chapter, chapters in the towns in our area. Never Having to be asked to do anything BUT, volunteering her service to all causes of BETA SIGMA PHI, and others in need. She was educated in Oklahoma and South Texas. She speaks several languages. She has

a newspaper atricle called "INDIAN SMOKE FROM NAKAI". She is the author of "Lodges in the Sky". a poem about the American Indian, which was filmed by Texas motion picture Corporation, and narrated in English and Comanche. She designed a buckskin dress with the Swiss flag done in beadwork, with her doing all of the beading herself. She was to present this article herself but was unable to. One of her sons presented the dress to the head of state of Swizerland in her place. She has lectured in Schools, Lions, Rotary and Study Clubs, Chamber of Commerce and military bases on the Indians with great ease throughout Texas and Oklahma and other states. She has made herself vailable to Radio shows and T.V.

Nakai is listed as a Cherokee Craftsman in the Cherokee nations, also in the News Edition of Personalities of the South. Although she is Cherokee she has been officially adopted by the KIOWA Indians.

She married her husband, BUD BREEN, in 1949, who is a Western Artist. They have seven children, and two grand children.

Nakai help her husband with his paintings, so that the American Indians can be better understood.

Nakai is very active with Indian groups, such as Dallas Inter-Tribell Tree, Indian Clinic, Cherokee Orphans-Dallas-Fort Worth. Inter Tribe spokesman for the Texas Kickapoo Indians and head Chairwoman to organize the five civilized tribes of Texas, to maintain their cultures. The Breens have lived in Brackettville since 1960. HANDICAPPED HOTLINE TO ANSWER STATE NEEDS

A toll free state wide number is available now for all handicapped in the State: 1-800-792-1139.

Called Handicapped Hotline, the new service is part of the 1978-1979 Governor's Conference on Handicapped Individuals.

From now through summer it will be in service 8 a.m.>4:30 p.m., Monday

thru Friday. Plans are undeway to expand its availability in the early fall.

The GCHI as established by Governor Dolph Briscoe is pat of an Executive Order to examine and identify problems facing individuals with physical and mental handicaps.

Through the HOTLINE, planning and orientation sessions throughout the State, 6 Forums in five regions all during September, and State Conference in October, it will be possible to assess the problems and formulate solutions.

Another important activity of the Conference will be to interpret much of the new federal and state legislation concerning employment of the handicapped and transportation accessibility.

It is further planned that during the October conference some out of state individuals will participate in exhibit and entertainment presentations

Walter W. Stueck, coordinator of the Traffic Safety Coordination Program located at Southwest Texasy Junior College, will resign May 15 in order to accept a similar position at Texas Tech University in Lubbock.

The Regional Traffic Safety Office at the Junior College is responsible to political subdivisions concerning all traffic projects. within the following nine counties: Uvalde, Real, Val Verde, Sutton, Kinney, Dimmit, Maverick, Zavala and Edwards.

Stueck indicated that his position will hopefully be filled within the near future since there are numerous traffic safety projects that have been initiated since the inception of the program last August.

"All future traffic safety projects will continue to be coordinated through the Traffic Safety Office at the Junior College," he said. "Being based at Southwest Texas Junior College has definitely been an asset in pursuing the goals and abjectives of the Texas Office of Traffic Safety, which is developing programs to reduce fatalities and injures due to vehicular crashes."

HAIL, RAIN ALL IN SOUTHWEST TEXAS

UVALDE--Some areas of Southwest Texas last week received welcome moisture while other areas got an unwelcome dose of hail to damage and destroy some crops.


Southermost areas of 19-county region received rain up to two inches, and moisture fellin parts of drought-ravaged LaSalle and Maverick Counties. Neighboring Dimmit County, however, continues to report no precipitation.

Parts of Vel Verde and Northern Uvalde counties experienced a late afternoon hail storm early in the week. more than 2,000 acres of corn, cotton wheat, sorghum, pickles, and onions were damaged by the hail.

Hill country counties are in the best shape as far as moisture is concerned, but rain would still be welcome in most of those areas. Where moisture has fallen, hay and cattle prospects have improved.

IN the Wintergarden, yellow onions are being plowed out for lack of a market. White onions continue to move vairly welll and the carrot harvet is continuing in full swing.

GOVERNOR BRISCOE DESIGNATES NURSING HOME WEEK TO BEGIN ON MOTHER'S DAY

Residents in more than 1,000 nursing homes across Texas will be honored during a special week to begin Sunday, Mother's Day, May 14th.

Nursing homes in this area and elsewhere in the state and nation will hold Open House and a variety of other activities to mark the occasion which is sponsored annually by Texas Nursing Home Association.

Sidney D. Rich, president of the Texas professional association which is

the nation's largest, said: "The observance of Nursing Home Week in Texas has taken on great significance from several standpoints. First, of course, is the relationship of communities to residents of nursing homes. That is most important. But, there is another great potential involved. Our 'week' provides a wonderful opportunity for the general public to go into homes in their own neighborhoods and learn first hand what modern,

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licensed nursing homes are really like."

Rich went on to say that a great many people "too many, in fact, have never actually been inside a nursing home and therefore have mistaken and often negative ideas about them. Today's nursing homes are much nicer than many people think they are. They can prove this to themselves simply by visiting, and Nursing Home Week is a good time to do it."

Roy Rogers and Dale Evans are celebrity "Hosts" for Texas Nursing Home Week, proclaimed by Governor Dolph Briscoe and scores of mayors of local communities to continue throughout the week beginning on Mother's Day. The celebrated entertainers are donating their influence to urge visits to nursing

"Residents will be expecting you," said Dale Evans in her official invitation, "don't disappoint them. And when you go, carry greetings from Roy and me with you...will you?"

Nursing homes are filling an important role in the health-care delivery system. In Texas there are several thousand more nursing home beds than hospital beds, emphasizing the growing importance of long-term care in a society with lengthening life expectancy.

Governor Briscoe, in his proclamation, termed the role of nursing homes as "vital" and encouraged all who can to visit with residents and to become personally informed on the quality of care being delivered in licensed Texas facilities






