


## Sheedy, McClure And Slubar Win

Tax Sale




Tuesday, June 6th, Sheriff John Sheedy auctioned off 42 lots in the City of Spofford for a total of \$6,425.00. Acting as auctioneer was the County's Attorney Chester Young, from Austin. Approximately 25 attended the sale, held on the Courthouse steps.

The Kinney County Democratic run-off election was held last Saturday, June 3, with 523 votes being cast, with 319 votes for John Poerner to 204 for Jerry Sadler.

The local race for County Commissioner, Precinct 2, Plunker Sheedy received 144 votes to Manuel Fuentes' 129 votes.

In the County Commissioner Precinct 4, race L.S. Johnson's 135 votes was defeated by Alvin S. McClure, who received 190 votes.

The Justice of the Peace, Precinct 4 run-off was won by Rose Mary Slubar with 175 votes over Marcus Tidwell's total of 147 votes.







## Soil Conservation

"Public views on the future of the conservation, protection and enhancement of Texas' soil, water and related natural resources will be sought at a meeting to be held in the Court house in Brackettville at 8:00 p.m. on June 15,1978" Charlie Ward, chairman of the West Nueces Las Moras Soil and Water Conservation District said.

The meeting is in response to President's Carters' signing of the Resources Conservation Act last November which requires an appraisal and evaluation of the state and nation's soil and water conservation program.

"The RCA act authorizes and directs the Secretary of Agrialture to develop a national soil and water conservation program in cooperation with the pulbic, or local soil and water conservation districts, the Texas State Soil and Water Con servation Board, and the Soil Conservation Service," said Ward.

"This program will establish new direction for future soil and water conservation efforts in Texas based on current soil water, and related resorce appraisals," Ward continued. "One point I want to make clear that districts in their 40-year history have always assisted landowners with voluntary conservation programs on their farms and ranches. We do not advocate any other approach since farm and ranch land is privately owned and that the interests and welfare of the owners must be served and that programs must be acceptable to them," Ward added.

Actions required by the RCA act include gathering data to appraise the condition and quality of Texas and the nations' soil and water resources by

The act also outlines a 5year plan for the U.S. Department of Agriculture's conservation assistance to districts and requires an evaluation of the effectiveness and progress of ongoing programs. Reports will be made to the public and Con gress.

"Our first meeting will primarily deal with discussions on soil and water resources in the discussions on soil and water resources in the district and how to conserve them," Ward said. "The public will also h have the opportunity to learn

more about the RCA act and the mission, relationship and responsibility of the district and Soil Conservation Service.

"I want to emphasize that a grass roots, bottom-up approach is the key to this act. Out district and Soil Conservation Service will need to identify specific resources concerns and associated problems, if any, in addition to determining the extent and severity of these problems. We urge anyone with an interest in natual resources cor servation to attend and air their views," Ward concluded.



#### CAN YOU IMAGINE 51 STADUIMS OF PAPER

The Commission of Federal Paperwork---which deals with the fed, not the states--reports that government agencies today produce about 10 billion sheets of paper a year to be filled out and returned by American businesses. That amounts to 50 forms for every man, woman and child in the U.S.---or enough paper to fill Yankee Stadium from the playing field to the top of the stands 51 times!

In addition to keeping more than 100,000 federal workers busy writing, reviewing, and enforcing regulations at the direct cost of three billion dollars, it costs, the economy at least \$40 billion

a year just to respond to the government's requests for information. The total cost of complying with all regulations comes to about \$130 billion a year.Cut that back to zero for about five years running, and we could wipe out the national debt and maybe even balance the budget. #### SLUBAR ROSEMARY

With the coming of the rain and high humidity we can anticipate a slackening of the menace of grasshoppers. We can however, anticipate a resurgence of web worms or tent caterpillars. A careful watch should be maintained of trees, especially box elder ash, mulberry and pecan. At the first sign of any web the trees should be sprayed. Even a few days delay can be devastating. There is no practical and effective way to control this pest other thanspraying. In controlling these caterpillars you not only preserve the looks of your trees but their health likewise and prevent the infestation of neighboring trees.



## SHEEP &GOAT RAISERS NEWS

Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association president Bill Schneemann told federal officials at the recent San Angelo predator control hearing that there is "no uch thing as a tolerable loss to predators for the Texas sheep and goat industry."

Schneemann was responding to environmentalists' contentions that sheep and goat producers should simply swallow a certain measure of loss as a "natural" cost of doing business, meanwhile leaving stock killers alone.

Schneemann aslo had a few choice words about the conduct of control efforts in recent years. He reminded the hearing panel that the U.S. Congress mandated the predator control policy in 1931 and has never moved to change or limit its original legislation. How ever, he added, in the early 1960's then-Interior Secretary Udall "did willfully dissolve the mandate of Congress by initiating a program that deemphasized predator control."

Private producer efforts were still fairly effective, Schneemann said, so an Interior underling further crippled the program by commissioning the "Cain Seven" to produce an unfavorable report on predator control.

Asking seven known predator protectionists to make a decision on predator control, Schneemann stated, "is like asking a moonshiner.....whether or not he should be allowed to make moonshine whiskey."

Schneemann then reminded the panel that the Interior Department to further comply with protectionist complaints, negotiated a "secret settlement" banning the use of toxic chemicals.

The Cain and Leopold reports, two "scientific studies" used to justify Interior's dismemberment of the predator control program, were quoted in the current predator policy analysis report on which Schneemann was replying he added that the new report would carry considerably more water if the two previous documents were properly disregarded as scientific studies and considered "only as in-house manipulation of information."

As for specific options outlined in the new report, Schneemann offered these suggestions:

- L. Increase the predator control budget to the amount required to control predation as per the Predator Control Act of 1931.
- 2. Transfer predator programs from Interior to USDA, "Which is more in tune with the needs of those who have been given the responsibility of providing food and fiber and for this nation."
- 3. Expand, not limit, predator control on public grazing lands.
- 4. Increase operational use of toxicants. Schneemann calls the toxiant bans "totally irresponsible deed", based on nothing more than the previously discredited Cain Report.
- 5. Do nothing to funding sources except for an increase in the federal share.
- 6. Consider "self-help" Extension programs as aids to existing control efforts, but not as alternatives.
- 7. He calls the notion of monetary compensation for predator losses "an assinine suggestion," adding, "we raise sheep, goats, and cattle to sell

for food and fiber, NOT to feed predators."

- 8. Rightfully view research as providing only long-term solutions at pest--and then only useful, not useless research.
- 9. Steer absolutely clear of the coersive scheme to force producers to accept government-ordered livestock management practices instead of predator control. He calls the outlined practices a total impossibility" and leaves no doubt that he considers them grossly unacceptable encroachments into ranchers' private business affairs.

In summatin, Schneemann called upon Interior to rededicate it self to compliance with the law, adding that "all we are asking is that the Department does not practice deceit."

SURVEY SAYS NEWSPAPERS INFLUENCE SHOPPERS MORE THAN TELEVISION ADS




