Dear Editor,
Often, in the course of political campaigns, charges and counter-charges are made which create confusion about where a candidate really stands on an important issue. This is the case in Senator Tower's current campaign for re-election to the U.S.Senate from Texas, where attempts are being made to distort Senator Tower's position on the question of federal gun control laws.

At issue is the significance and meaning of Senator Tower's vote for the gun control Act of 1968. As you well remember, in 1968 the assassination of President John Kennedy was still fresh in the minds of many, and in the spring of that year, both Martin Luther King and and Senator Robert Kennedy had been murdered. The national news media was leading a hysterical campaign for "gun control" and the Johnson Administration had intorduced a bill calling for the registration of firearms and licensing of all gun owners. By comparsion, the Gun Control Act was mild, and many of out best friends in Congress voted for it, out of conviction that if it were not passed, an even worse bill would have been enacted. In vuting for the bill, Senator Tower joined with Senator Roman Hruska, who had for years led the fight against the Dodd bills and other repressive firearms laws.

I've known John Tower personally since his early years in the Senate, when I was a political reporter on his hometown newspaper, the Wichita Falls Record. And I know that he is not "anti-gun" by an stretch of the imagination.

From 1966 to 1968 I was editor of Gun Week, and I covered the series of Dodd bills that eventually became the Gun Control Act. One of the fights over the wording of that law--after it had passed the House and we knew that if was going to pass the Senate--was how "antique firearms" were to be defined. Senator John led that fight pushing for the definition written into the law. Because of his work, guns made before 1898 and modern replicas of those guns including all black powder models, are exepted from the law.

Three other amendments, which would have required firearms registration and licensing were offered during the Senate condideration of the bill. Senator Tower voted against each of those amendments, and each was dedeated. The fill was finally approved by an overwhelming 70-17. In 1972, the Senate again considered gun control leg islation, the Handgun Control Act. This measure would have prohibited the sale of any handgun except those specifically approved by the Federal Govern ment as suitable for sporting purposes. Although the bill was passed by the Senate by a vote of $68-25$, Senator Tower voted against it, arguing that it would be ineffective in controlling crime and that it would set a precedent for further Federal cintrols and registration.

While no further legislation relating to gun control has come before the Senate in the last six years, the Bureau of Alchol, Tobacco and Firearms of the Federal Treasury Department recently announced its intent to promulgate regulations computerizing all fireamrs sales. Senator Tower strongly opposed these regulations, and cosponsored a neasure introduced in the Senate calling upon BATF to withdraw the proposed regulations before they take effect. In addition, he supported a Treasury Department appropriations bill specifically prohibiting any experditure for those regulations and voted foran amendemnt deleting any expenditure for those regul
voted for an amendment deleting \$3.8 million which BATF had indicated it would use to implement the regulations.

It is unfortunate that a letter such as this one needs to be written, but I hope that theses comments will dispel any confusion which exists concerning Senator Tower's views on the firearms issue.

## Happy 99th

Mrs. Martha Petersen Bartberger was born in Denmark, October 25, 1879. She was the daughter of Niels Peter Petersen and Nettie Olson Petersen, natives of Denmark.

Martha came to the United States with her mother when she was ten years old. She saw her father for the first time when she was nine.

Martha's father bought an interest in the Roach Mercantile Company in 1896 and in 1904 he bought out all other interests thus becoming sole owner of the store. Petersen and Company became a landmark in Brackettville.

In 1906 Niels Petersen, his brother, Hans Petersen and othe citizens in Brackettville organized the first bank---The First State Bank of Brackettville.

Alfred E. Bartberger and Martha Petersen were married in St. Andrew's Episcopal Church on November 5, 1919.

During all of their active years the Bartbergers contributed time and financial aid to people throughout this section of Texas.

In 1950, Mrs. Bartberger became a director of the Brackettville Bank and still retains that position.

Martha now lives in the Memorial Medical Nursing Center, 315 East Lewis Street, San Antonio.

Each year her family, Mr. and Mrs. Martin Petersen of California and Mr. and Mrs. Preston Sights of Brackettville host a party for her birthday.

This year the family held their party at the St. Andrew's Parish House with approximately 75 people attending the 99th birthday celebration.

are considering the protection of lants through the winter. One big thing to remember is that wet plants in wet soil will withstand a great deal more cold than dry plants in a dry soil. If there is to be a freeze or frost water heavily any exposed plants the night before.

It is important many times to water heavily any plants that have been exposed just beofore the sun comes up. Watering plants heavily raises the temperature of the plants. It also can melt the frost with little damage to the plants if it is done before the sun hits the plants. Plants covered with ice are much less likely to be killed than plants exposed to the same temperature in a dry condition. plants can be covered with plastic to protect them but unless the plastic is removed during the day's heat with a bright sun the plants will "scald." Just because plants are in a building is no sign or guarantee they will not freeze and be killed. The temperature must be maintained at a safe level inside. Many plants will do better out side a the same temperature as inside especially if they are well watered.

IN 1921, Bill Fultz came to Fort Clark and assumed duty as a Communications Seargant for the 2 nd squad of the 5 th Troop. This interesting bit of information was unearthed by roving reporters Catrina (age 2) and myself (age 30 ) as we sat at the Burger \& Shake arguing over whether to have ice cream before, or after she finished her hamburger (needless to say I wanted to wait until after, and she disagreed). How, you ask, could we learn about Bill Fultz in the midst of an arguement? Ah, therein lies a pleasant tale; To a two year old, the world itself is a new toy, and each person one meets is a dear friend worth listening to and getting to know better. Isn't it sad that we "adults" lose our fascin ation with people as we grow older? Enough nostalgia, on with the tale.

Somewhere in the midst of the aforementioned arguement Catrina looked at the man next to us and hollered (literally) "Grandpa!", I turned of course, and saw an elderly man with alert eyes and a cheerful smile. He reached down to the table, picked up an odd looking device held it to his throat and through the wizardry of electronics,
"spoke" to us. Over the next half hour or so, the odc mechanical buzz of Bill's speech faded and a warm, friendly human being emerged. Here is the rest of his story....

In those days, wireless communication was still in it's infanthood. When Bill and his troops went into the field, they carried, via mule pack, a large cumbersome generator type device which was unloaded on site and hand cranked by two men. Setting up, what with antennas and ground wires to run, as well as unloading the mules, was rather time consuming. Once set up and operating, Bill's equipment had a maximum operating range of 27 miles. As well as being responsible for the transportation and operation of radio equipment, Bill and his men were also in charge of handling and use of explosives (TNT). Bill didn't seem to mind the explosives or luging around the heavy radio equipment though and he spent four years at it. Bill left Ft Clark, and the Army, in 1925 and for the next 30 years or so worked for RCA. Recently, in the last few years, Bill has traveled all over the United States, passing through or visiting in all of the continental states except oregon. In December, Bill is coming "home" to Ft. Clark (they should be finished building his home by then) and plans to settle down
