EXCERPTS OF COMMISSIONERS' COURT REGULAR MEETING
NOVEMBER 15, 1978

RADAR UNIT

Judge Tommy Seargeant recommended the purchase of a new two barrel Decatur radar unit for use by the Highway Patrolmen in Kinney County.

Commissioner Manuel Fuentes moved that Kinney County purchase a new Decatur radar unit at a cost of approximately \$2,500.00 with trade of old radar unit.

Commissioner L.S.Johnson duly seconded the motion which passed with the following votes:
Ayes: David G. Luna, Manuel Fuentes, L.S.Johnson
Nays: G.C.Talamantez

AURELIA CRUZ, PRESENT

Miss Arelia Cruz, working with the Del Rio Mental Health Unit, met with the Court and reported that she was encountered problems traveling into Kinney County since there are no house numbers or street numbers. Her supervisor insists on having house numbers and street names on travel vouchers and isn't aware of the conditions in Kinney County which prevent using house numbers and street names. Mr. Chris Gomez, Mayor of the City of Brackettville was present and informed the Court that the City has just finished putting street signs all over town and has a project underway whereby each lot in town will be issued a number. The owner of the house or lot will be responsible for placing the assigned number on the premises, and there will be a master plat of the city at the City Hall for the information of any interested party.

Miss Cruz asked the Court to please send a note to her supervisor, Mr. Porfirio Esparza, if the Court though her services to the people of Kinney County should be continue and inform him of the City's project underway in numbering houses and street names.

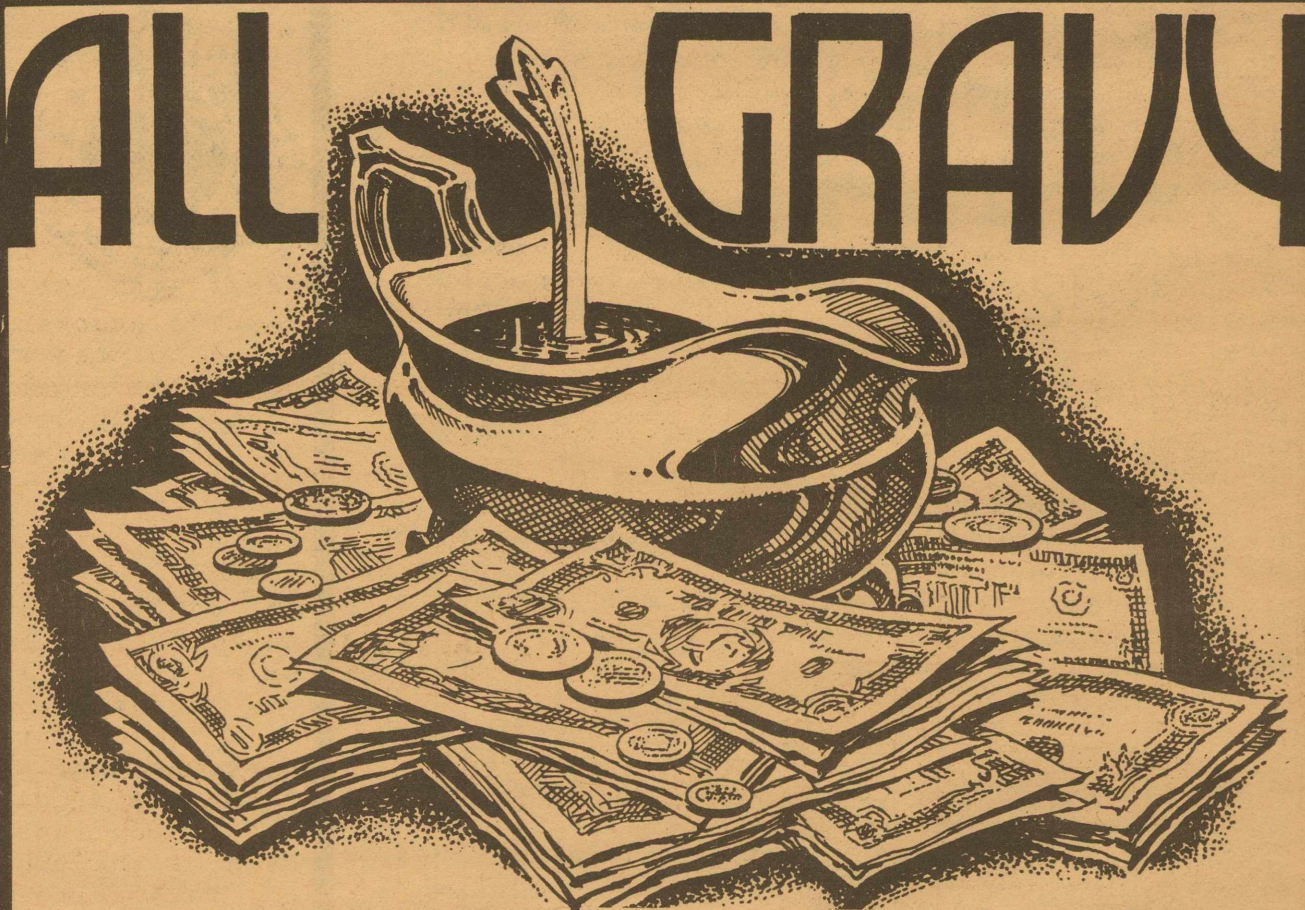

Commissioner Manuel Fuentes moved that the Court advertise the following lots for sale with bids to be opened December 20, 1978 at 2:00 p.m.

Lots 7,8,9,,10,11,& 12, Block Number 7, City of Brackettville, Kinney County, Texas, less a 26 foot easement off the South end of each lot to the City of Brackettville for a street.

Commissioner L.S.Johnson duly seconded the motion which passed with the following vote: Ayes manuel Fuentes, L.S.Johnson and Tommy Seargeant Nays: David G. Luna and G.C.Talamantez

KINNEY COUNTY LIBRARY

Judge Seargeant introduced Mr. Quinton Etzel, attorney representing Kinney County to the Court. Mr. Etzel reported that he had checked into the building of the Kinney County Library project and was informed by John S. Graves, architect of the Library Building, the Myers Construction Company has not follwoed through on their contract with Kinney County commissioners' Court and that all construction had ceased. Mr. Etzel suggested that the Kinney County Commissioners' Court give notice to Mr. Bob Myers Construction Company to show cause why he should not be terminated and then terminate him and hire a new contractor to complete library. Mrs. Elia Santos, planner with Middle Rio Grande Development Counsel, told the Court that once the contractor was terminated then the Court should notify the E.D.A. before

going any further on the porject since the Library Grant came from E.D.A. Mr. Etzel informed the Court that Myers Construction has received 42% of the funds for construction of the library and that the COunty could not get the money back since the purported bond given by Myers was not a valid bond. He has contacted Allied Fidelity Insurance Company of Dallas, Texas, and their attorney, Mr. Emory White, said that his company did not have a bond in effect for Myers Construc-tion Company.

Commissioner Manuel Fuentes moved that the Court authorize Mr. Etzel to write Mr. Bob Myers of Myers Construction Company, a letter terminat-ing his cintract with Kinney County with approval of the E.D.A. Commissoner L.S.Johnson duly second ed the motion whichpassed with the following vote: Ayes: Manuel Fuentes, L.S.Johnson, and Tommy Seargeant Nayes: G.C.Talamantez; and David G. Luna abstaining

ROBERTO GARCIA, ZAVALA COUNTY ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT CORPORATION

Chris Gomez introduced Mr. Roberto Garcia, execu-tive director of the Zavala County Economic Deve-lopment Corporation, of Crystal City, Texas, to the Commissioners' Court. Mr. Garcia told the Court that the purpose of his visit was to re-quest Kinney County Commissioners' Court endors-ment in submitting an application to the Depart-ment of Labor for a \$750,000.00 grant for man-power education and training for migrants in a five county area consisting of Zavala, Dimmitt, LaSalle, Maverick & Kinney Counties. Mr. Garcia said the approximately 15% of the funds would be administrative costs with the balance going for services in pro rate portions to the five coun-ties.

Commissioner David G. Luna moved that Kinney County Commissioners' Court endorse Zavala County Economic Development Corporation's application for funds from the Department of Labor for \$750,000.00 grant for manpower educa-tion and services for migrants. Comissioner G.C. Talamantez duly seconded the motion which failed with the following vote: Ayes:David Luna and G.C.Talamantez; Abstaining: Tommy Seargeant, Manuel Fuentes and L.S.Johnson

Mrs. Elia Santos said that the Middle Rio Grande Development Council covering nine counties in this area was also applying for the \$750,000.00 grant and they were mandated to run all migrant programs with only a 3-5% of the funds for administrative costs since the Middle Rio Grande Council is already set up handle programs.

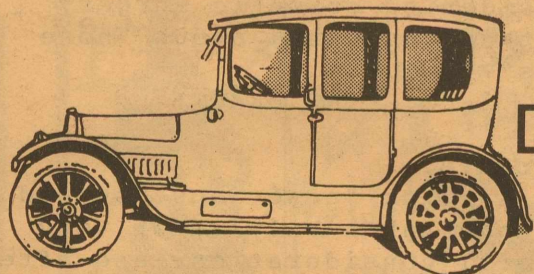

NO BEAUTY

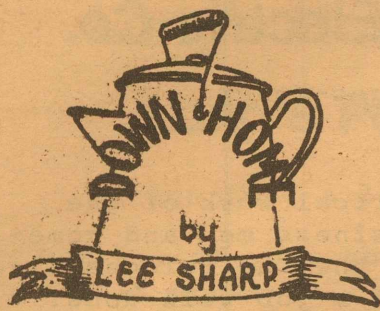
Dear N.B.

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HOLIDAY BILLY GOATS

- 1 cup butter or margarine
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 1 teaspoon baking soda
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1/4 teaspoon ground cloves
- 1/8 teaspoon salt
- 1 1/2 cups sugar
- 3 eggs yolks
- 2 1/2 cups flour
- 4 cups chopped nuts
- 2 tablespoon buttermilk
- 1 pound chopped dates.

Cream together the butter/margarine and sugar until fluffy. Add the egg yolks and vanilla and beat well for about 2 minutes.

Sift together the flour, baking soda, salt, cinnamon, and cloves and add to the mixture, add milk and stir well.

Now fold in the nuts and dates, drop by the teaspoons onto a cookie sheet, bake at 325 degrees for about 20 minutes. (makes about 7 dozen)

CHEESE BALL

- 2-3 oz. packages cream cheese
- 1-5 oz. jar sharp cheddar cheese spread
- 1-5 oz. jar roqueford cheese spread
- 1-5 oz. Smoky cheese spread
- 1/2 cup parsley
- 1/2 teaspoon grated onion
- 1/2 teaspoon worchestershire sauce
- 1/4 cup undiluted evaporated milk or whole milk
- 1 cup finely chopped walnuts or pecans

Let the cheeses stand at room temperatures for an hour or until soft. put in mixing bowl with the onion and worchestershire sauce, mix until smooth and well blended, stir in milk 1/2 nuts and 1/2 parsley, Chill until firm-about 4 hours- shape cheese into ball roll-in remaining nuts and parsley, serve with crackers, I make my cheese balls 1-3 days ahead.

I also use other types of cheese with the cream cheese.

Present Day Myths

Parents are responsible for their children. This is taught in the Bible. It has always been basic in legal statutes.

It has now however become a myth. The total concept of "bilingual education" stems from the failure of parents to accept the responsibilities for their children and from the failure to society to demand it. The rash of "bilingual" laws and bureacratic legislature relates not to truly bilingual needs or concepts; but to the failure of one ethnic group to assume responsibility for teaching the children the language of their country. It's a sick line of reasoning that blames the educational system or the nation for the failure of parents to do what they should do when they assume responsibility of bringing children into the world. It's an open admission of second class ability and accomplishment to demand that society assume parental responsibility.

WATER RESOURCES

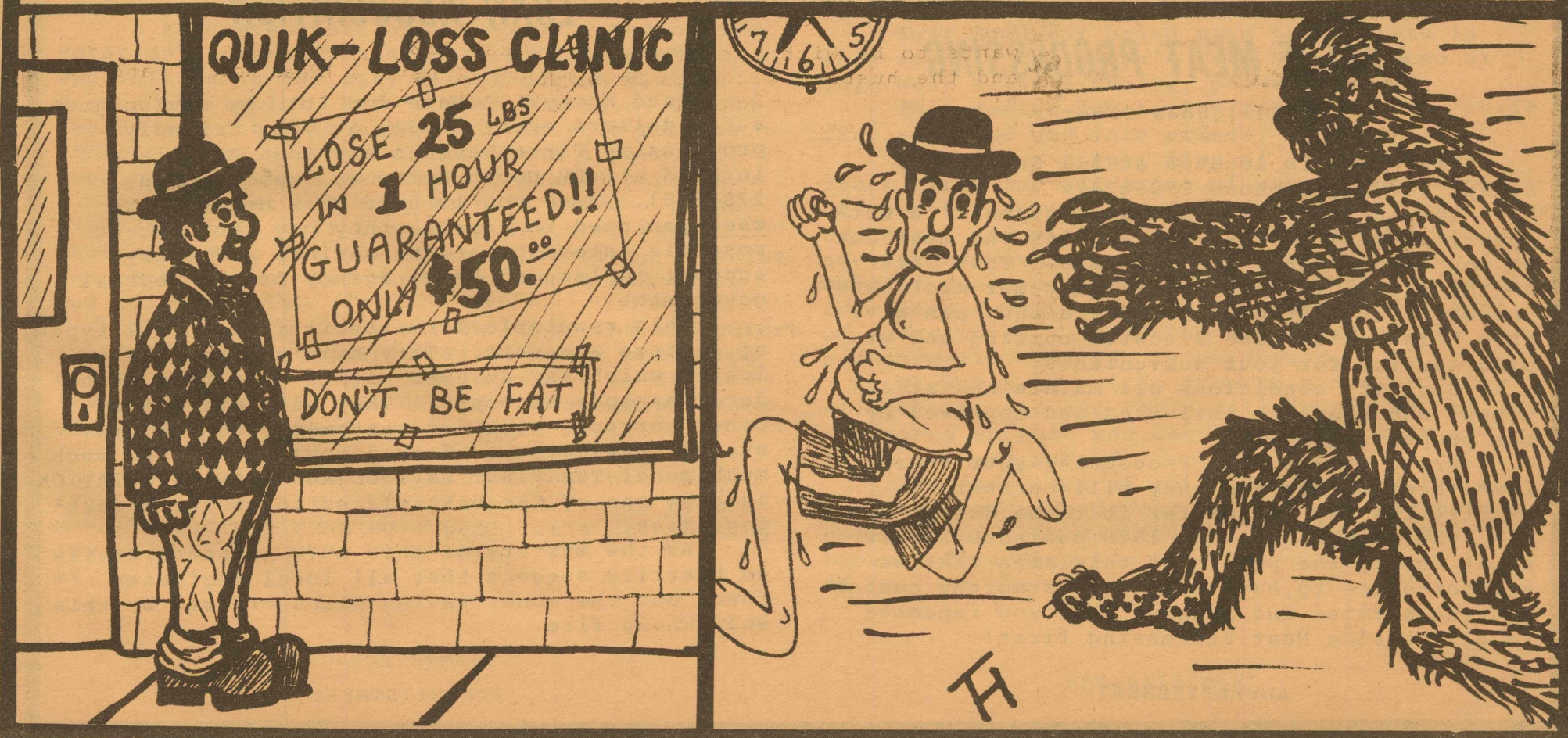

Section 26.046 of the Texas Water Code requires that hearing be held annually to receive evidence from the public on actions the commission should take to protect the aquifer from pollution.

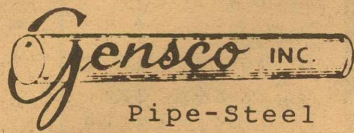
The public is encouraged to attend and to make statements from the record if they wish to do so, according to John P. Sutton, hearing examiner for the commission.

states that these same techniques "have not been effective for reducing eagle depredations to an acceptable level," which is obviously why they will be allowed.

What then do they propose? More study. Oh, yes, they also presume to tell stockmen how their land should be used and their livestock managed. On page 10 of the report, the bureaucrats have the audacity to tell producers that they must 'plan lambing dates to avoid eagle migrations!'

Undoubtedly the most infuriating thing about the "plan" is its obviously antagonistic attitude toward producers. On page five the planners state that depredation control assistance "will be commensurate with the number of requests" for that assistance. In plain English this means that no assistance, not even the next-to-nothing kind they propose to give, will be offered without a whale of a demand for it.

The first item under "law enforcement" however, requires Animal Damage Control personnel to notify law enforcers "of all requests for assistance." In other words, the only way a producer can get any help at all is to hound ADC about this problem, thereby setting himself up to be watched like a hawk (pardon) by the law enforcement people.

considering the type of assistance he can expect to receive, the producer will still have the same problem after he receives it. If he then becomes frustrated enough to break down and help himself, the law enforcers will be forewarned and waiting to cart him away.

In the end there are likely to be precious few requests for assistance/ surveillance and the Interior boys can chirp, "See, there've been no requests so there must be no problem."

Lest anyone entertain the notion that is surveillance idea is more paranoia than probability, a paragraph

SHEEP & GOAT RAISERS NEWS

The federal government spends millions of dollars warning people of the hazards of high blood pressure, then turns right around and spends more of our dollars printing such garbage as the recently-released "Golden Eagle Management Plan", guaranteed to raise the blood pressure at least 50 points.

Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association president Norman Roussetol described the plan as "totally inadequate". Roussetol says it's "absurd that the Department of the Interior expects sheep and goat producers of Texas to try to protect their livestock in the manner described."

Just what manner is described? Essentially nothing. The "plan" concentrates almost entirely on increasing eagle numbers. Most of the balance of the paper is given over to outlining ways of increasing the enforcement in eagle country, and only as an afterthought do the Interior staffers address the real problem--that of golden eagle depredation on livestock.

The paper lists six alternatives: first, do nothing about anything; second: issue kill permits for depredating eagles; third, provide federal compensation for stock losses; fourth, provide insurance for stock losses; fifth: continue the current (non) program; and sixth, develop and implement a golden eagle management plan. This last item is more than a little strange because the publication it's printed in is supposed to be just such a plan. But never mind.

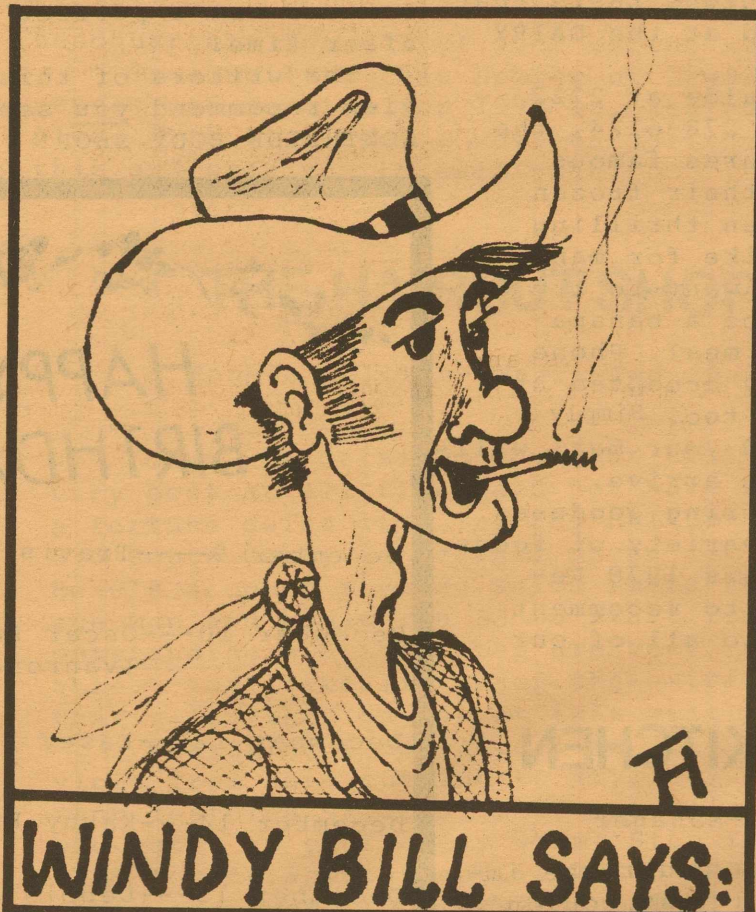
Only the last two options are actually recommended. The option of issuing kill permits is soundly denounced and was apparently included only as an excuse to do so. Permits, were, by the way, recommended by Interior's filed staff (the only ones who know anything about eagles) but

vetoed by the brass.

TS&GRA's executive secretary Bill Sims, says Interior Secretary Cecil Andrus "just ignored his field people and did what was politically attractive to him."

As for continuing the existing program, page 11 of the "plan" says this will include "hazing techniques such as aircraft, rockets, exploders recorded distress calls, distress chemicals and other sight and sound repellants." Live trapping and relocation "may" be included.

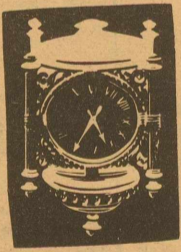

from page 13 of the report should clear up any doubts. Says the report, "Undercover efforts to detect illegal eagle shooting and/or poisoning would be undertaken in suspected problem areas."

Simply stated, the "Golden Eagle Management Plan" is a spiteful slap in the face to livestock producers and definitive proof that federal Interior brass don't give a flying squat about the losses "thier" predatory birds inflict on someone else's property and livelihood.

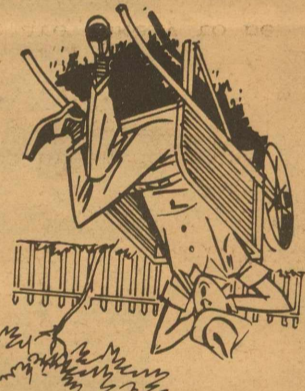

GREEN THUMBS

It's poinsettia time, this showy plant very highly advertises the Christmas season. You are always after to buy your poinsettias from a flower shop or nursery. Supermarket plants too often have been mistreated, largely not properly watered, they are bought to sell cheaply and hence are seldom the quality plant to be found in nurseries and flower shops. This means they will seldom hold up as only or be as pretty. When you get a poinsettia there are two major things to remember: Keep it cool and give it sunlight. With being cool and plenty of light - it properly water and the plant should hold the red bracks and leaves for several months. In fact they should remain showy until after the last frost when they can be planted outside. Because the red bracks are part of the foliage and not the bloom there is no good reason for it to fade and die if properly cared for.

Department of Human Resources

Persons wanting information about the state's new food stamp program will have a toll-free hotline to respond to their questions. This according to E.R. Crum, Regional Administrator of the Department of Human Resources, Texas' food stamp agency.

The new service, effective December 1, will enable persons direct telephone access to information regarding the new food stamp program. The statewide hotline telephone number is 800-252-9330. The bi-lingual hotline can respond to questions about the program, receive complaints or initiate application procedure.

"We have established a regional procedure. The calls may be regarding problems in the new program's administration, persons needing food stamp assistance complaints or a variety of subject matter requiring personal attention. The hotline operators will provide general information and such calls would not be forwarded to the local offices." The Food Stamp Act of 1977 is to be implemented in Texas in two stages. On December 1 the program eliminated the purchase requirement associated with the acquisition of food stamps. Food stamp recipients will no longer required to exchange cash for a portion of their food stamp entitlement. While the actual subsidy remains, the same, the change in procedure will make it easier for those on limited and/or fixed incomes to participate in the program.

Crum cites the example of an aged person living on a supplemental security income check. "This elderly person would normally pay about \$40 to receive about \$55 in food stamp coupons. Under the new program that person would receive a card entitling him to \$15 in food stamp coupons at no cost. The actual \$15 subsidy remains the same." The elimination of purchase requirement is only one of several program revisions being implemented in the two stages. The second implementation date, March 1, 1979, will deal with, among others, student participation in the food stamp program work requirements, standardization deductions and will tie eligibility for the program to the federal poverty line.

"The Food Stamp Act of 1977 has four main objectives," continues the San Antonio-based Administrator. "First, it will simplify and tighten program administration. Second it will facilitate access for the truly needy. The new program will also eliminate households with high gross incomes and will reduce potential error, fraud and abuse of the program."

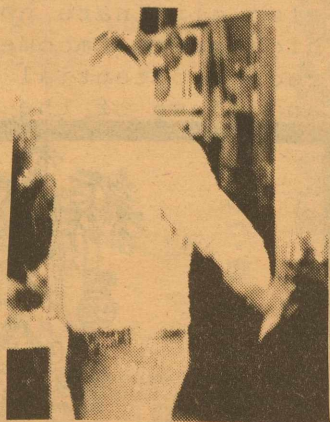

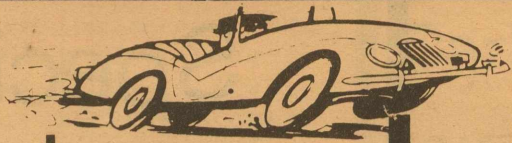

On July 7, 1978, the District Court of the District of Columbia

entered a stipulated order providing that the definition of family

effect of this determination is that certain families who lived
