The spirited bidding on livestock by enthusiastic buyers, and the smiling faces of livestock exhibitors climaxed the 24th Annual Kinney County 4-H and FFA Livestock Show. After two days of weighing, tagging, penning, sifting, and judging of over 150 head of livestock, the Southwest Livestock Exchange personnel of Uvalde conducted a most successful sale on the afternoon of January 20.

James Bevel, Vo. Ag. teacher from La Pryor slapped the rump of an 1175 pound Hereford Cross Steer exhibited by Brenda Foust, for the Grand Champion Market Steer. It was bought by the First State Bank of Brackettville for \$1.10 a lb. Immediately following the Reserve Champion Steer was selected and shown by Arnulfo Pinales. It weighed 1100 lbs. and was bought Saturday afternoon by the Uvalde Bank for \$.80 a lb.

In the market swine judging also judged by James Bevel, Raine Hobbs exhibited the Champion Swine honor. The Grand Champion Market Swine was bought by Warren Farms and Associates for \$3.00 a lb. The Reserve Champion Market Swine was exhibited by Maria Robledo and bought by Malone Trucking for \$1.40 a lb.

The Market Lamb judging Saturday morning, was conducted by John Kearney, Vo. Ag. teacher from Sterling City. The Grand Champion Finewool Market Lamb was exhibited by Lashawn Wardlaw and bought by W.H. Wardlaw for \$8.25 a lb. The Reserve Champion Finewool lamb was shown by Rex McCarty and bought by Del Rio Bank & Trust for \$5.50 a pound. Clinton Hobbs exhibited the Grand Champion Crossbred Market Lamb. It was bought by the Del Rio National Bank for \$.5.50 a lb. The Reserve Champion Crossbred Market Lamb was exhibited by Lashawn Wardlaw and bought by Producers Wool & Mohair for \$5.75 a lb.

Breakfast was served for all exhibitors Saturday morning. The food was prepared by the Brackettville FFA girls and their instructor, Miss Sharon Anderson.

Coaching Staff.

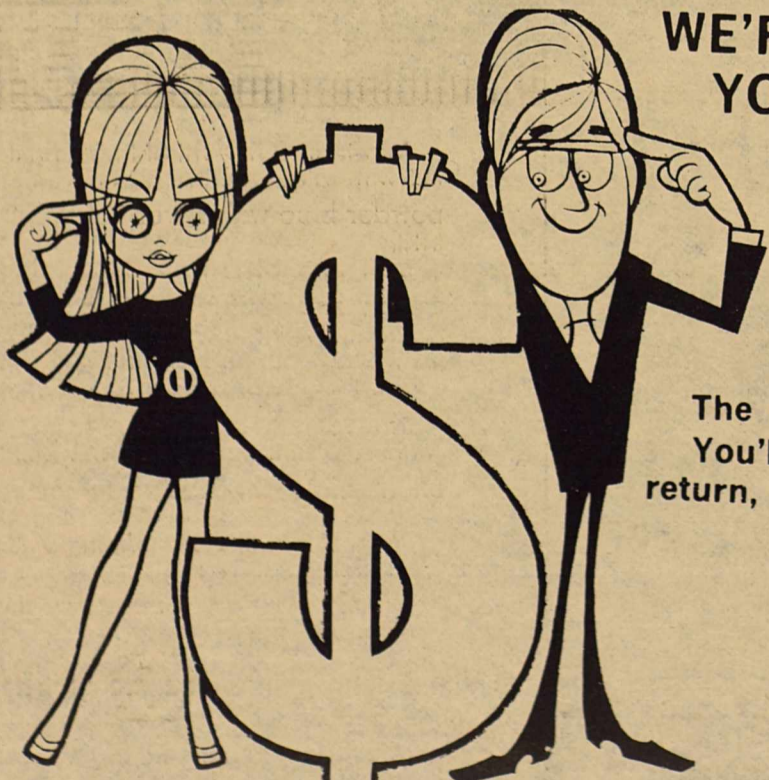
The noon ranch style barbeque was under the direction of Lynn

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Soil Conservation

PRODUCE MORE QUAIL

There is a lot of concern each year about the size of the quail crop. It is affected by many factors. Some cannot be controlled and some can.

There is some simple things that can be done to improve the habitat. A better habitat means more stable production. It also helps to offset some of the adverse uncontrollable factors such as weather conditions.

Thickets of low growing shrubs should be maintained about 500 feet apart. These thickets should be left untouched when carrying out brush management practices. Planting can be made on open rangeland

Quail depend heavily on seed for food during long dry periods and during the winter and early spring months. To help provide these seed a narrow strip can be disced around each thicket. This will induce the growth of such weeds as sunflowers, ragweeds, and croton which are preferred foods. It also helps to disc a narrow strip connecting some of the thickets.

Additional food can be provided by plantings of kleingrass or blue panic. IF these planting are done on a small scale for quail food only, use about a one half acre block per 50 acres. A fence will be necessary to protect these small areas from livestock grazing. Livestock will quickly seek out and keep these areas heavily overgrazed preventing seed production.

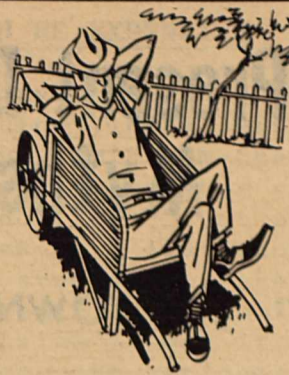
Allow the fencelines around cropland fields to develop cover. Do not keep them clean or burned out. After harvesting of grain, do not turn the residues under. Allow the waste seeds to stay on the surface. If also helps to leave the outside 2 to 4 rows of grain unharvested.

There is a rapid trend toward "deer only" and "quail only" leasing. This results in more intensive use of the land. It also requires more intensive management.

A little extra work will greatly enhance the quail habitat It will also give a more attractive product to offer.

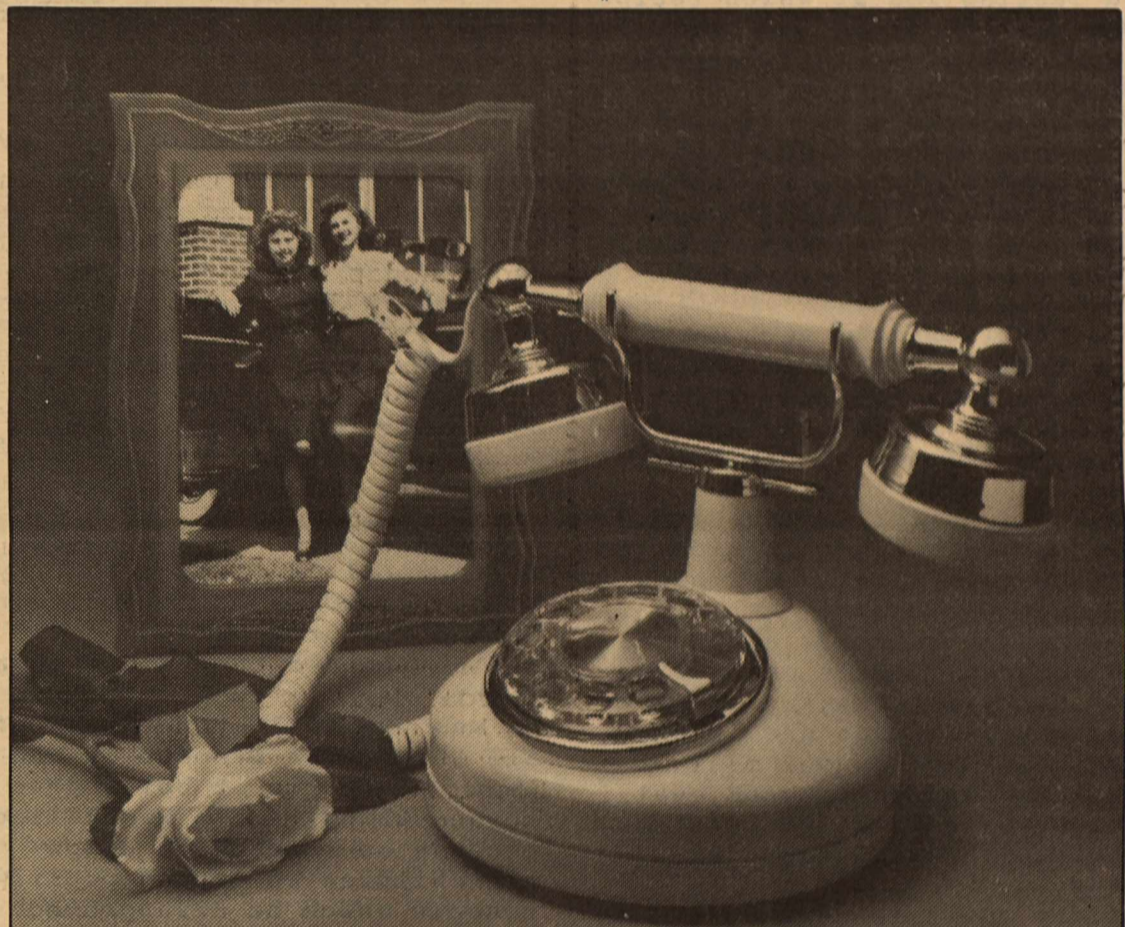
GREEN THUMBS

It is time to trim all outside growth. Trees should be trimmed. Roses should be pruned.

Shrubs should be trimmed. All dead limbs should be cut away. Palms particularly have suffered heavily and should be cut back

almost all shrubbery and trees will do much better if they are properly trimmed. It looks as though we may have an early spring. If so it would put our last freeze about Feb. 15th. This would mean many trees and shrubs will break dormancy by then and should be trimmed well in advance of that date. The way your trees and shrubs are trimmed now will largely determine how well they do in the coming summer. Early trimming will allow all the wounds to heal before the sap starts to rise and this is good.

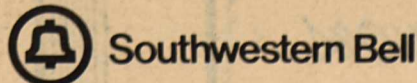

COUNTY 4-H FOOD SHOW

4-H'ers will match foods and nutrition expertise against each other in the Kinney County 4-H Food Show, February 3, at the Kinney County Civic Center in Brackettville,.

About 20 youth will compete in senior, junior, and preteen divisions, according to Miss Becky Rogers, County Extension Agent-at-large.

The public is invited to attend the Awards Program which will be at 2:00 p.m. followed by a Tasting Tea at which recipe books will be sold.

Senior Division entrants are ages 14-19, junior division youth are 11-13, while preteen division youth are 9-10 years old.

This year's theme is "Cooking Good--Looking Great," with emphasis on weight control by preparing a food for a sensible well-balanced diet.

For the contest, each 4-H entrant will compete in one of four classes, including main dish, side dish, breads and desserts, or snacks and beverages.

Special prizes will be awarded to the top winner in each of the four entry classes in each age group.

"Because the foods and nutrition program focuses on nutrition, each contestant will have to demonstrate what she or he knows about nutrition, meal planning, food buying and meal service, as well as preparation techniques," Miss Rogers explains.

Eight adult leaders have been teaching youth in five different project groups. The leaders who have been working so hard to teach these project groups in a meaningful way include: Linda Rech, Jane Young, Patty Messer, Joyce Hooten, Sylvia Meyer, Rachel Munoz, Lois Forbes, and Dora Javens.

HERB-STUFFED PORK BIRDS

- 8 very thin end Pork Chops
- 1 onion, chopped
- few sprigs parsley, chopped
- 2 Tbs. chopped celery & leaves
- 2 Tbs. margarine
- Dash salt
- Dash peper
- 1/2 Teaspoon poultry seasoning
- 2 cups soft bread crumbs
- 2 Tbs. flour
- 2 Tbs. fat
- 1/3 cup broth or water

Cut bones out of chops and pound meat slightly. Saute next 3 ingredients in the margarine a few minutes, then add 1/2 teaspoon salt, pepper and poultry seasoning. mix with crumbs, adding a little water to moisten. Put some stuffing on each chop Roll and tie with string, coat with flour, then brown in the fat in heavy skillet. Add broth, cover and simmer about 1 1/4 hours. Serves four.

There have been 7 to sign up but they will not be able to begin classes with out the enrollment of at least 15.

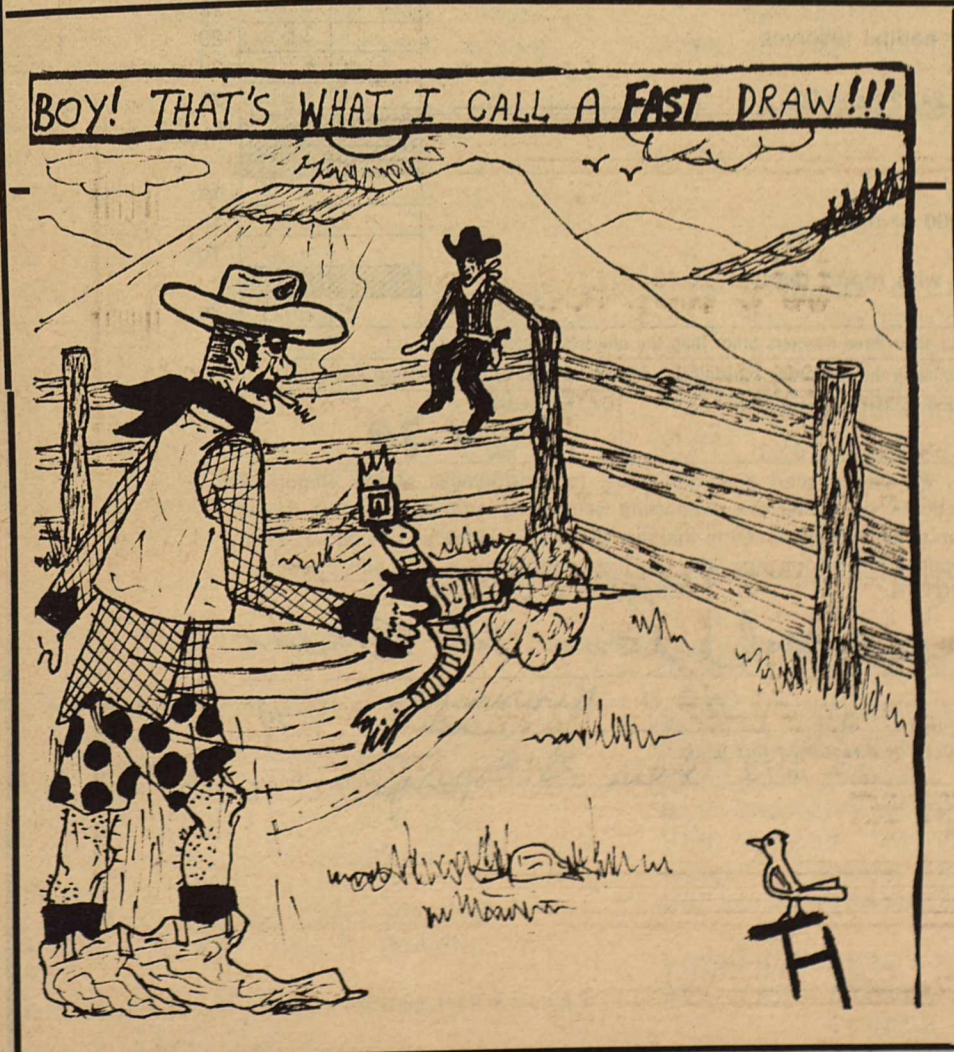

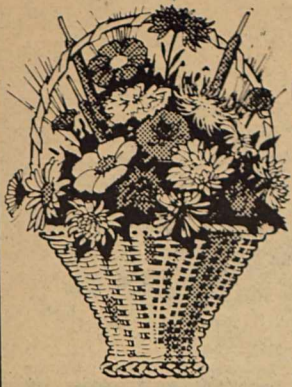
