MEETING NOTICE

City Manager Tim Ward stated this week that he would like to remind the people of the Brackettville area of a public hearing regarding the Cable TV Service that will be held TUESDAY, APRIL 3, 7:30 pm, at the Brackettville Civic Center. Citizens are asked to attend and discuss the present service and the possibility of implimenting the addition of Channel 9, Public Broadcast Channel.

FRUIT AND PECAN FIELD DAY

There will be a fruit and pecan field day held on Friday, April 6 at the Clyde Bradley Ranch on Mud Creek. This ranch is approximately 17 miles west of Brackettville off Mud Creek Road. This field day is open to the public and for anyone interested in learning more about fruit and nut tree production.

The program will begin at 10:30 am with registration and coffee drinking. Beginning at 11:00 am Dub Stewart Extension Entomologist will discuss spraying of fruit and nut trees for insects and diseases, times of the year to spray, different pesticides and pesticide certification. A noon meal will be provided for all field day participants.

Beginning at 1:00 pm there will be a grafting demonstration presented by Loy Shreve, Extension Horticulturist. Loy will demonstrate the correct procedures for in-lay type grafting that can be used on all types of fruit and nut trees.

Also everyone will have an opportunity to practice their grafting techniques on graft wood, and trees to graft will be furnished. For further information about the field day contact the county agent's office in Brackettville.

READING SPECIALIST CERTIFICATE OFFERED AT SUL ROSS

Consistent with the recommendation of the federal government, that the basic skills in education be upgraded, Sul Ross is now offering courses leading to the reading specialist certificate. Satisfactory completion of work leading to the reading specialist certificate will help to insure that appropriate reading will be met through use of a variety of reading methods and materials. Classes are offered in Eagle Pass, Del Rio and Uvalde. At least four graduate courses in reading are required for the certificate, as well as course work in human growth and development, linguistics, children's literature, and other support areas.

According to Dr. Janet Fair, Asst. Professor of Education at the Sul Ross-Uvalde Study Center, several professional organizations have been actively involved in seeking to raise standards in the teaching of reading in Texas. During the past year, the Texas Association for the Improvement of Reading, the Texas Association of Professors of Reading, and the Texas Association of School Personnel Administrators recommended to the Texas Education Agency that all teachers of English should have courses in methods of teaching reading. The associations further recommended that all secondary Teachers should have at least one course in reading methods and that all elementary teachers should have at least two reading methods course.

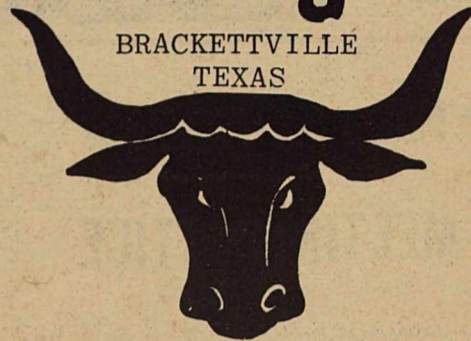

GREEN THUMBS

There are lots of problems this year with Augustine (carpet) grass. The heat and dry of last summer when combined with the cold and dry of this winter, has played havoc with much of the grass. It took time for the grass to be damaged and it will take time for it to come back. Because we have had a few days of beautiful sunshine is no reason to expect the grass to be growing fast enough to need mowing. Augustine is a warm weather grass and given water food, warmth and time your grass will become lush. If you haven't fertilized your grass be sure to do it now. Be sure to use fertilizer with iron added or the equivalent. When fertilizer is added water it in good. Then just be patient. Unless you have insects or disease your grass will be having you mow it sooner and more often than you like.

COOKING WITH WINE.....

A few delicious secrets from the Winemakers themselves.

(With gravy so good, you'll forget it's not polite to sop it up with bread.)

- 1 (3-4 lb) piece of beef chuck or boneless sirloin
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 clove garlic, finely chopped
- 1 large carrot, cut in thin strips
- 1 large onion, sliced
- 3/4 cup dry red wine (California Burgundy, Cabernet Sauvignon, Pinot Noir, or Zinfandel)
- 3/4 cup dairy sour cream, at room temp.
- 1/2 cup water
- 2 to 3 tablespoon flour
- 1 tablespoon lemon juice

Rub meat with salt and pepper, brown meat on all sides over high heat add garlic, carrot and onion; cook until onion is golden brown, about 3 minutes, lower heat; stir in wine and sour cream. Cover tightly and cook over low heat (liquid barely simmering) for 2 to 2 1/2 hours, or until meat is tender. Remove meat and set aside. Skim off fat from pan juices, discard fat, mix water and flour to a smooth paste, add to pan juices, stirring until thickened. (Add a little more boiling water, if gravy is too thick) Stir in lemon juice. Serve 4 to 6

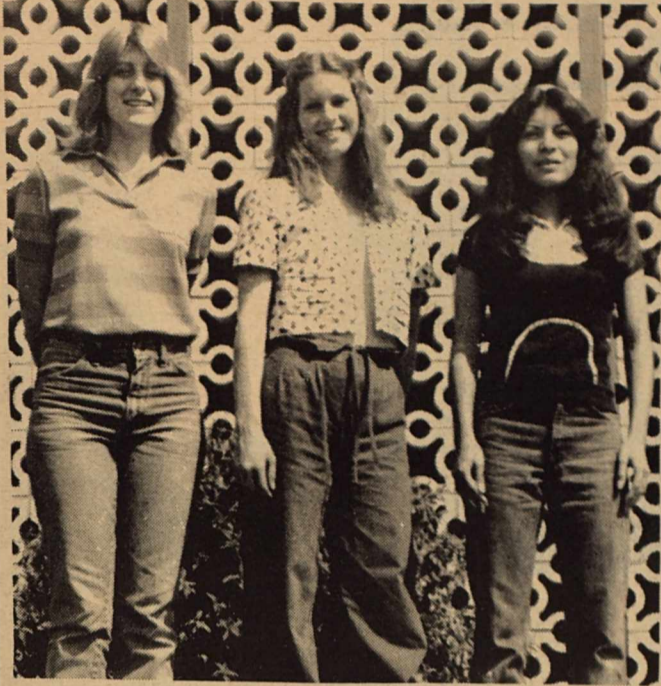

EMPANADAS

- 2lbs ground beef
- 2 hot peppers or 4 tsp. tabasco
- 2 tsp. chili powder
- 2 tablespoon tomato paste
- 6 small green peppers
- 6 onions
- 5 stalks celery
- 2 tablespoon chili powder

Put all ingredients through meat grinder. Then cook in small amount of fat until meat is tender, salt

to taste.

DOUGH

- 4 1/2 cups flour
- 1 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1 1/2 coups cold water
- 3 tsp. baking powder
- 1 1/2 cups lard or shortening

Sift dry ingredients and add shortening and water to form dough. Roll thin and cut in 3 1/2 inch circles fill and fold over and seal around edges. Bake in slow oven 300 degrees until lightly browned and serve hot, with or without enchilada sauce Makes 7 to 8 dozen.

YOUR REPRESENTATIVE REPORTS

The Legislature session has reached the halfway mark now, and more and more time is being spent on the House floor. As of the deadline, approximately 3,478 bills have been introduced. This is almost the same volume of legislature as was introduced last session. Thank goodness there wasn't any more!

Issues that are generating the most mail and telephone calls from citizens in District 70 include the blue laws and their possible repeal, the potential cut-off of funds of the State Library System, and collective bargaining rights for farm laborers. Legis-

lation allowing generic drug substitution is also attracting interest, as is the constitutional amendment giving Washington, D.C. two senators. I'm also hearing from constituents on the proposal to raise the mortgage interest rates charged by savings and loans.

The proposed reduction in state funds to the State Library System is a perfect example of how individual citizens can affect and influence decisions in the legislature. The Legislative Budget Board, made up of some House and Senate members, voted earlier in the year to reduce the amount of money the state puts into the library system, thus making Texas ineligible for about 3 million dollars in federal funds. This would absolutely destroy many facets of library service, particularly those that have

become so important to rural Southwest Texas, such as the inter-library loan program which allows our isolated communities to enjoy the resources of the large metropolitan libraries by a loan system. Telephone calls and letters started pouring into legislators' offices from distressed library patrons; and, at this point in the legislative process, the funds have been recommended for restoration. Thus, individuals can and do exert influence successfully in their elected officials.

My trip to Washington to represent the State of Texas on the Rural Development Committee of the National Conference of State Legislatures went well. 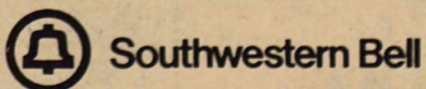

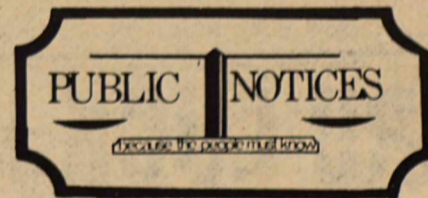
