The Headline of an article in the newspaper tells the main thesis of the news story. This has long since become a myth. 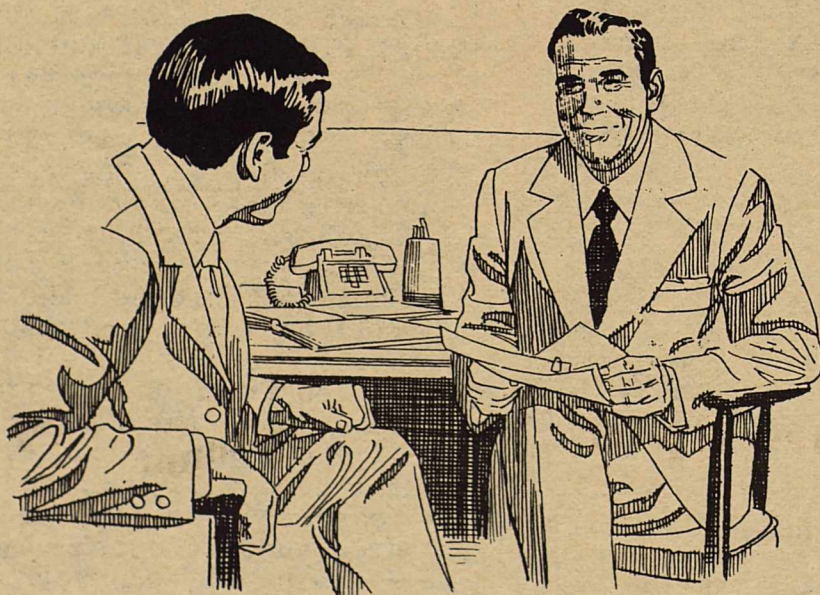

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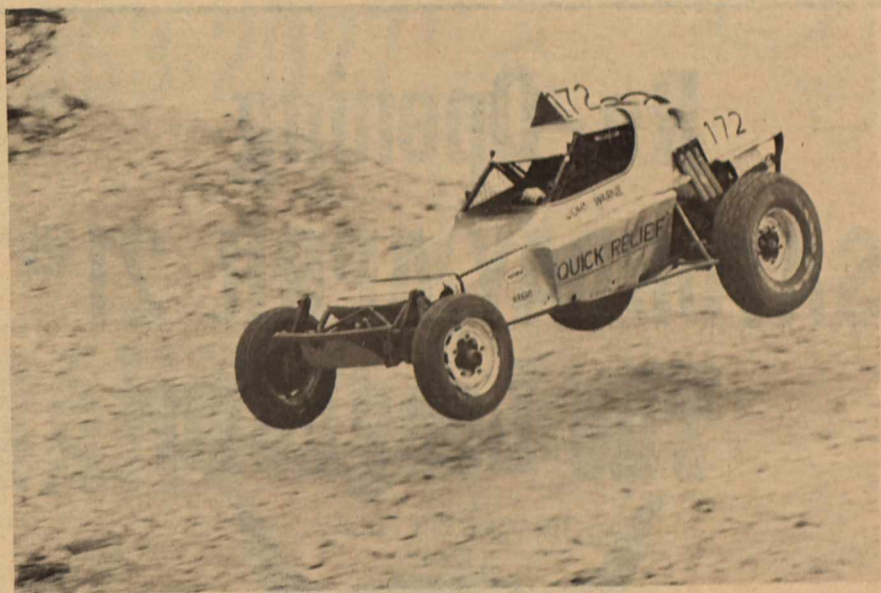

UVALDE FIRST BAPTIST CHURCH-- All-American quarterback Steve Davis will lead youth activities here Saturday and Sunday (April 21-22) during a special weekend of youth-led services at First Baptist Church.

The service led by youth will be at 7:30 p.m., Saturday, and highlight a message by the nationally famous Oklahoma University quarterback, who is the youngest college football television commentator ever hired by ABC Sports.

Davis will again meet with young people at 9:45 a.m. Sunday and will speak during the worship service at 11 a.m.

Although the services are youth oriented, all area residents are urged to hear the popular athlete.

Davis first captured the eyes of the nation when he led the nation in scoring with 180 points during his first season as a varsity player at Oklahoma in 1973.

In high school Davis has been an All-State quarterback as well as All-Conference in track and basketball. He was the state number one high school scorer in 1969 as a runningback and in 1970 won the Jim Thorpe Award for track and football.

At Oklahoma University he became the winningest quarterback in the history of the college with a record of 32-1-1. He was named to the All-Conference Big 8 team for three consecutive years and was the Big 8 Sophomore of the Year in 1973.

IN 1976 he was named the Most Valuable Player in the Orange Bowl and played in the Hula Bowl in Honolulu and the Japan Bowl in Tokyo.

In 1975-76 the national body of the Fellowship of Christian Athletes named Davis Christian Athlete of the Year.

Licensed to preach at the age of 15, Davis has appeared with Billy Graham, Oral Roberts, and James Robinson. He regularly leads youth conferences, retreats, Bible studies and revivals while speaking at high school and college campuses throughout the nation.

A native of Sallisaw, Okla., the 26-year-old athlete is studying for a masters degree in business administration from Tulsa University and is married to Judy Lynn Teel, a former Oklahoma Baptist University Cheerleader.

**COLOR VISION**

Dear Dr. Pettey: My brother lost his job in a fabrics store because he couldn't see small differences in color in materials. Could his color blindness be treated?

You infer your brother is color blind, and he may very well be. However, it's possible he has a color deficiency instead. There is a difference. A deficiency in color perception can sometimes be improved to some degree, depending on the cause of the problem. Lighting is absolutely necessary for proper color seeing in many cases. Example: Fluorescent lamps are not as good for some people as incandescent in color vision. Sometimes, color vision is hampered by such a problem as infected teeth or sinuses, elimination of which improves one's color discrimination. Other examples could be cited.

Unfortunately, true color blindness will, so far, not respond to treatment of any kind. It has been observed, however, that a few people seem to learn a degree of color discrimination by sheer practice, effort, and comparison—developing something akin to improved color vision. It may be worth the effort, because color vision is required in many pursuits. Send your brother to a doctor who can give him a color vision test. He'll then know for sure.

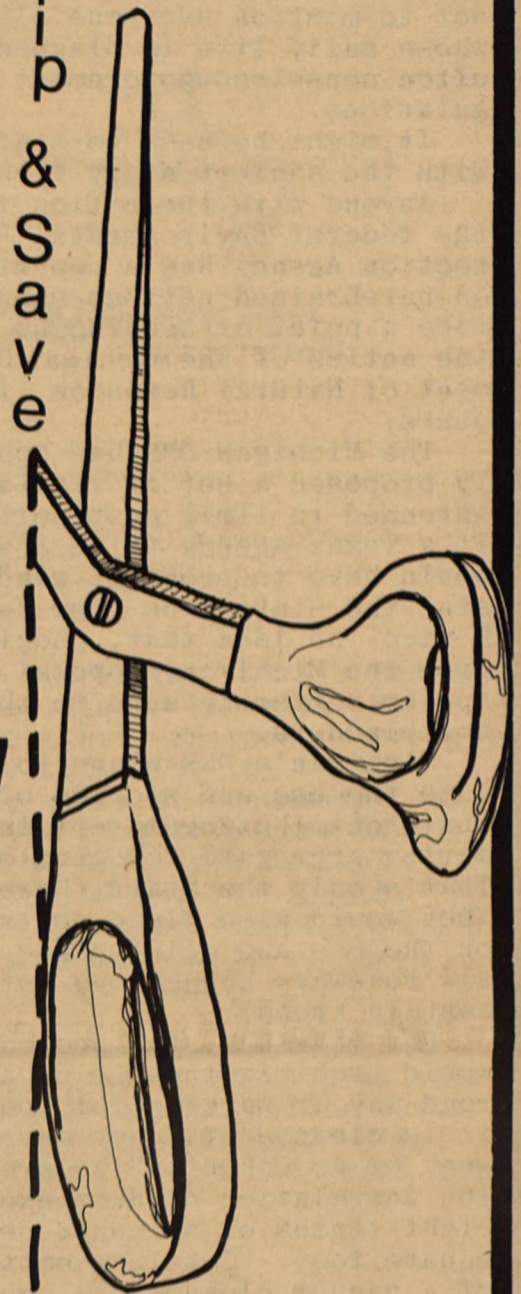

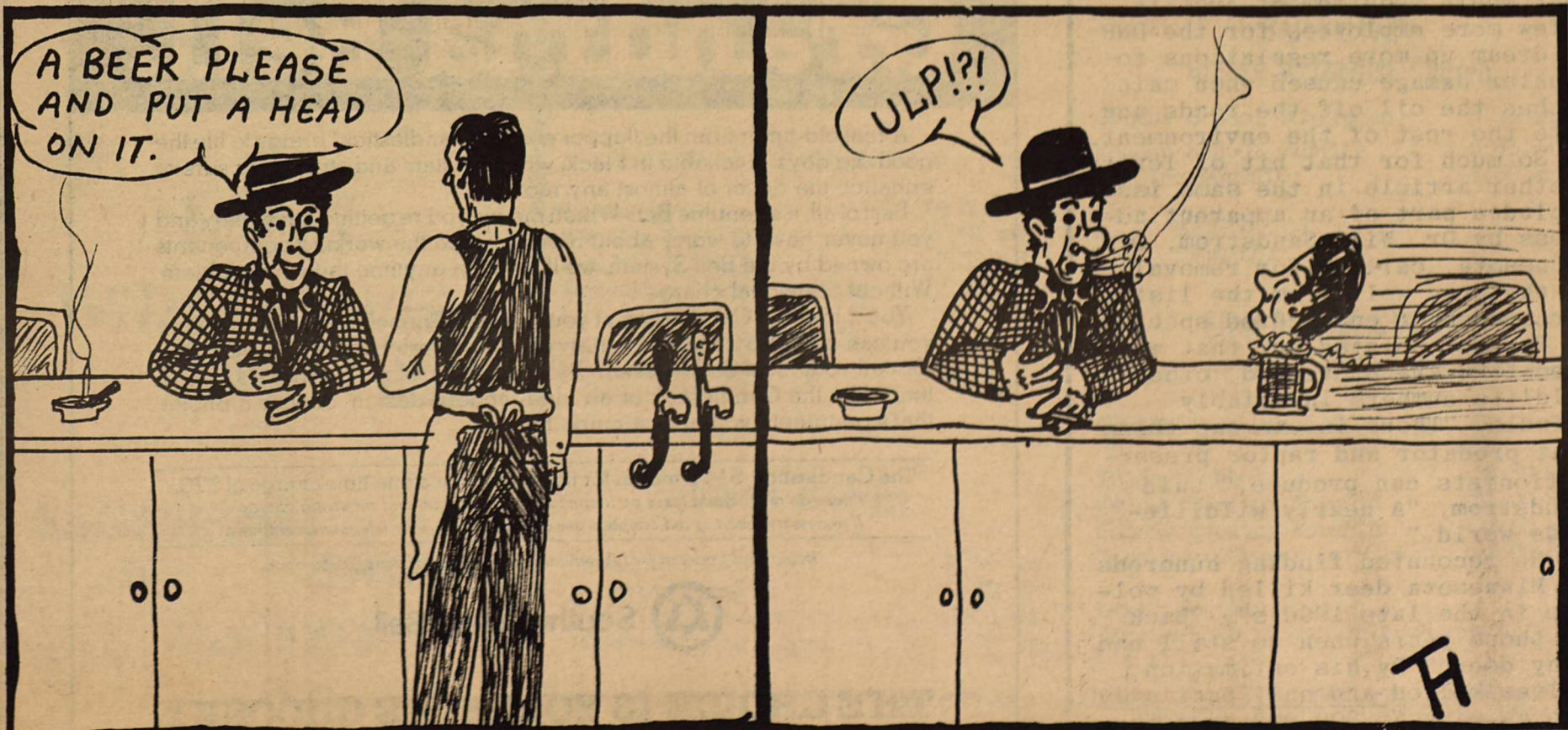

## SHEEP & GOAT RAISERS NEWS

The March issue of a Michigan hunting newspaper featured some items of interest to sportsmen and livestock producers alike, not to mention everyone else whose daily life is plagued by often senseless government regulations.

It might be best to start out with the saniest story first.

Anyone with the notion that the federal Environmental Protection Agency has a copyright on harebrained notions should make a point of keeping up with the antics of the Michigan Department of Natural Resources, it appears.

The Michigan DNR has apparently proposed a set of regulations intended to limit dust pollution. It a Texas agency tried that, it would have to prohibit wind crossing the state line from New Mexico, an idea that, judging from the Michigan proposal, might appear perfectly sane to the northlanders.

Michigan's DNR plans to regulate the use and storage of such dust-contributing materials as paving aggregate for starters. That's only the start, however. They would also place controls on the use and maintenance of all roadways and parking lots in certain areas.

For instance, the proposal would prohibit the use of any road way or parking lot "unless it is cleaned at least once a week or as directed" to prevent the accumulation of dust exceeding eight-tenths of an ounce per square foot. Careless emptying of a vacuum cleaner bag could strand every motorist in the Southern half of the state.

Speaking of vacuum cleaners that's how road dust would have to be controlled---with vacuum cleaners! The rules lean toward a ban on road sweeping, believe it or not.

Then, to add contradiction to consernation, the rules would call for oiling of roads to further reduce the dust. Presumably, that would requirement justify a few more employees for the DNR to dream up more regulations to counter damage caused when rain washes the oil off the roads and into the rest of the environment.

So much for that bit of levity. Another article in the same issue includes part of an apparent address by Dr. Will Sandstrom, Orr, Minnesota, calling for removal of the gray wolf from the list of threatened or endangered species.

Santrom pointed out that where predators are protected, other wildlife numbers invariably dwindle. "There is one one thing that predator and raptor preservationists can produce," said Sandstrom, "A nearly wildlife-less world."

He recounted finding hundreds of Minnesota deer killed by wolves in the late 1960's", "Back in those years when we still had many deer." By his estimation, wolves killed and only partially ate as many as 800,000 deer in one winter, out of a total of

only about one and one-half million deer in the state.

Sandstrom said vast fortunes could be spent on deer habitat without measureable benefit, "but a few dollars spent on effective wolf control will again produce millions of deer."

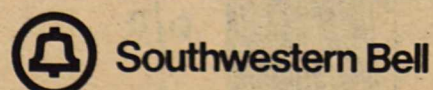

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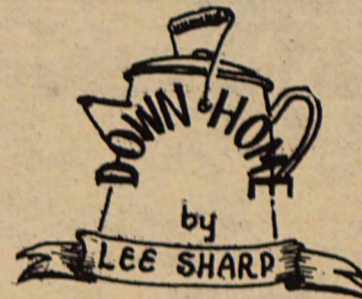

well covered with the insecticide IF not controlled these worms will get into the grass and even on vegetable plants and and ornamentals. They will even get in the house. The best time to control them is before they start or as soon after as possible.



**ONION DUMPLINGS**

- 2 cups biscuit mix

**GREEN THUMBS**

Web worms or tent caterpillars as they are more properly identified have begun their devastation. Usually these are first noticed when a web is spotted in the tree. They spread rapidly. The worst infestations at present are in box elder and mulberry trees. There is some infestation in pecan trees also. As soon as the first web is seen it is high time to begin control.

It is probably even better to treat the tree with a systemic insecticide before the worms hatch this will kill the young hatch when they first begin to eat. Most of the time such a treatment will last for six weeks to two months. It has the advantage of keeping the webs from forming and making the tree so unsightly. If the tree is sprayed there are a number of good insecticides that can be effective. These will leave a residual on the leaf and will last till the next heavy shower then all protection is gone. These worms hatch on about a three week cycle so be prepared to re-spray at the first resurgence of worms. When spraying the tree be sure that the limbs and trunk are also

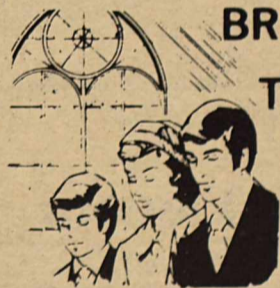
