## TEXAS GAS SUPPLIES SAFE IF DRIVERS DON'T PANIC

As long as Texas motorist don't start panic buying gasoline, they can avoid the miseries affecting the west Coast, fuel suppliers and retailers.

Service stations operators agree supplies intexas are as tight as they have been since the 1973-74 oil embargo, but so far the state has avoided long ines at the pumps that California motorists have suffered.

The only problems in Texas have generally been shorter station operating hours, some lines, and some limiting of sales in Associated Press survey shows.

## SHORT LINES

The survey also showed:
*The fuel situation is slightly tighter in the big cities than it is in rural areas, but generally the problem is not concentrated in any one area of the state.
*Most reports of lines at the pumps are less than five cars deep, but one station in Houston experienced a line of about 20 cars.
*Service stations are receiving only 60 to 80 percent of the amount of gasoline they sold in May of last year.
*Up to 90 percent of the filling stations in Texas cities are closed on Sundays.
*Motorists are more likely to find stations open along inerstate high ways than inside the cities.
*There is no relief in sight, and it will be especially hard to buy gasoline during the Memorial Day holiday because many stations will have run out of their May allocations by then.

Many Texas fuel merchants feel Californians are to blame for their own shortages.
"They created their own problems out there by panic buying and because of the publicity," said Bill Ligon, director of the 1,300 member Texas Service Station Association.

centage of the stations have long lines. You know how suggestive the American people are. First thing you now you're going to have panic buying in Texas," he said.
"Let's don't create a problem that we don't have."

SALES LIMITED
Most service stations are stretching their reduced monthly allotments in Texas by limiting their daily sales and then closing for the day, according to O.W. Brauss, who distributes Shell gasoline to stations in North, West and Central Texas.
"Most try to stay open at least
part of the day Saturday, and then close
on Sudnay. Monday morning lines are be-
ginning to form because people used gasoline during the weekend. During the middle of the week it goes pretty smooth," said Brauss.

He siad the situation will probably get worse toward the end of the month as retailers use up thier allocations. We could have more lines. We're talking about four to five cars-not long lines," he said."Also supplies are tighter in the metropolitan areas than in rural areas."

Glenn Nilsson, executive director of the Houston-based Lone Star Service Station Association, said rural supplies may be higher because city dwellers are afraid to journey into the counryside.
"We're probably going to have a tight supply toward the end of the month, especially in the metropolitan centers more than in the rural areas," Nilsson said.

"More students were involved in UIL activities this past year than ever before and this participation by students on a fair and equal basis has been and remains our ultimate goal: This is the reason the UIL exists," he added.

Across the board, participation by schools remained stable, with the exception of girls' basketball, which increased by 55 schools. Football, girls'volleyball boys' basketball, swimming and track anc field remained on a per-school participation basis near their 1977-78 marks.

Individual participation, however,
continued its upward surge, with more than 42,000 playing football, 3:0,000 and 23,000 in boys' and girls' track respectively, -and 23,000 and 19,000 in boys' and girls' basketball respectively.

Elsewhere, particiqpation in boys' baseball neared the 16,000 mark, while more than 20,000 took part in boys' anc girls' tennis. Approximately 8,000 part icipated in boys golf and 4,000 in girls' golf. Swimming figures reached 3,500 for the boys' and 2,500 for the girls', while cross country boys' and $g$ giirls' totals sped near the 600 plus mark

In the UIL music program, some 71,000 took part in choral competition while 40,000 participated in the solo anc ensemble contest, and a who pping 215,00 joined bands and orchestras in UIL contests.

Participation in the UIL literary and academic contests was equally as impressive: Speech-Debate-5,000 Informative speaking 17,500, Persuasiv speaking 15,000 , Poetry interpretation
17,500, Prose reading 15,000 , Oral reading 18,000
