Mr. Gulley is a partner in the law firm of Doran-Gulley-Etzel and is a graduate of Trinity University in San Antonio and the U.T. Law School in Austin.

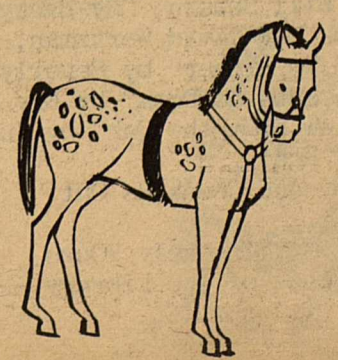

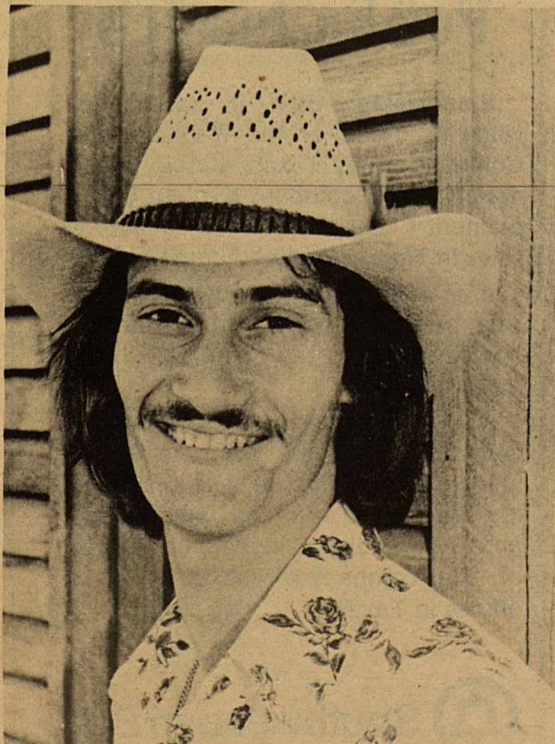
**ALAMO VILLAGE STARS**

## OUR TOWN

One of the least appreciated assets of our town and County is the Clinic. This is a very usable facility and should hold a very important place in the thoughts of the people. As is true of any building, especially one used by the public, there are costs of maintenance. These, however, are relatively minor. At present the facility is serving as office two days a week for doctors. It is serving as a family planning and well baby clinic one day a week. With proper support by the people of Brackettville even greater use could be made of it. If the people of the county would support a local doctor it is more than possible a resident physician would be induced to live and serve in Brackettville.

The need of the moment, however, is a program sustained financial support for the Clinic. The actual financial needs are not large. When there is not financial support however, it presents a problem.

The greatest need of the Clinic is a well functioning Clinic Committee. Every organization in the county is supposed to have a representative on the committee. When the committee meets it is usually the same few people that have been there for years. There should be input from every organization and there cannot be when the organization is not represented. Also, when the organization is not represented it means there can be expected very little support from the organization.

I doubt there is a person in the county who would want the clinic to be closed down and the building sold. If it had no more support than is given by many people and organizations' this is what would happen.

## FACTS

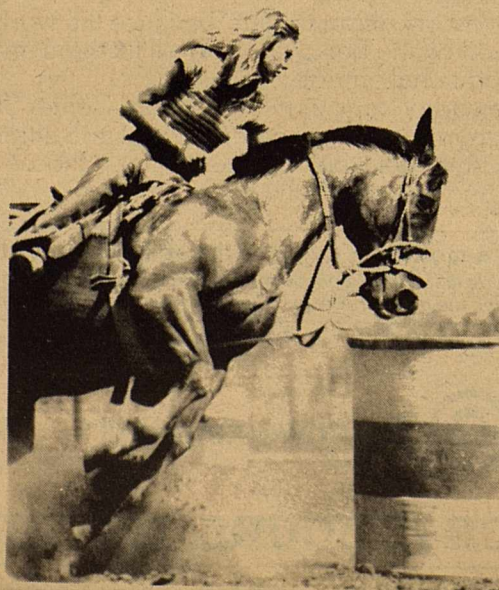

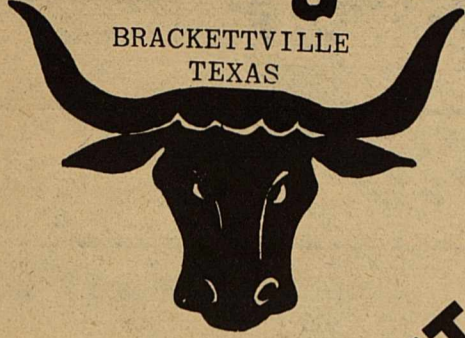
Making an excellent turn on the second barrel is Jerilee Leonard from Gunnison, Colorado.

## HISTORY OF PECANS

**PART I** (due to the length of this article it will be in two parts with the second part appearing in next weeks issue.)

Pecan historians place the origin of the pecan tree in more northern latitudes than where they are found today, probably near what is now Canada and the Great Lakes. The movement south was probably brought about by glaciers of modern geological times.

Extensive movement of the pecan seed apparently began during the geological period known as the Ice Age, which began about 500,000 years ago. During this period the plant habitat moved southward when the climate cooled and northward during warmer interglacial periods. There were four major advances of icesheets when pecan moved south, followed by four ice retreats when the pecan moved back north.

Except for one species all the hickories including pecans are native to North America. Economically, this is the most important tree nut group native to the United States; all others—the walnut, filbert and almond, come from the Middle or Far East.

During the thousands of years that the characteristics of the pecan nut were affected by the evolutionary process, it became a prized food for many animals such as the fox, wolf, opossum, bear, raccoon, squirrel, deer, turkey crow, and others. In recent geological time the American Indian was the first man to taste and select the nut. Based on our present knowledge of human and animal behavior, there probably was a tendency to man and animal to choose nuts from certain trees because of size, flavor and ease of shelling and other factors.

The old black crow is given great credit for its role in favorable pecan selection and propagation of superior nuts. The crow is the most intelligent of birds. He enjoys a life span of from 65-70 years and was one of the first birds released from Noah's Ark. This

bird is expert at finding the best flavored, thinnest-shelled nuts and carrying them long distances. He selects the trees which have the best nuts before the nuts have dropped from the shucks and before other animals can select them on the ground. His habit of hiding food for the winters months led to many of these nuts never being found and then being free to germinate in the spring. By comparison, the Indian was here a relatively short time and probably never contributed to the expansion of pecan growing areas to the extent the crow did.

The word "pecan" was reportedly used by the American Indian at the time the United States was discovered. Early Europeans found pecan trees growing along the Mississippi River and its tributaries. The first written reports of pecans is that of a Spanish Explorer CABEZA de VACA in 1541.

In 1846, a Louisiana slave, named ANTONIO, was the first man to be successful in grafting superior tree scions to new root stocks. These trees were named "Centennial" and they originated on the bank of the Mississippi River in St. James Parish, La.

Many breeding programs have been carried on by individuals and institutions. Between 1880 and 1910 sixteen varieties were developed in Jackson County, Mississippi. Some of those varieties are widely used today: "Dependable; Desirable; Success; Stuart; Shley; and Mahan". One USDA breeding station was opened in 1915 in Mississippi but was closed during WWI. The most continuous and productive breeding program began with pollination studies by the USDA in Brownwood, Tx, in 1931. These studies were gradually expanded and selections from other locations there. From this developed the extensive breeding program now being conducted at the U.S. Pecan Field Station in Brownwood. Dr. L. D. Romberg, who was at Brownwood from 1936-1968, utilized the germ plasm located at the station and acquired other sources in later years to make several thousand controlled crosses (about 33,000). Pecan

varieties released from this station included: Barton-1953; Comanche-1955; Chactaw and Wichita-1959; Apache and Sioux-1962; Mohawk-1965; Shawnee-1968; Cheyenne-1970; Cherokee-1971; Chickasaw and Shoshoni-1972; and Tejas-1973; Kiowa 1976.

Research continues with efforts being directed toward finding varieties of pecans to give heavy yields and which do not have alternate years of productivity. Efforts are being directed to find varieties with improved kernel-nut ratio, improved color and flavor, and increased resistance to diseases, insects and drought.

At Fort Clark Springs all of the estimated 6,000 pecan trees are native. There are many varieties. Project Pecan Park has under its management 528 of these trees or about 25 acres of the estimated 140-160 acres. When these trees were placed under management some areas were very overcrowded resulting in low productivity and little growth. This low vigor in the trees would lead to eventual death to those that were more shaded than others. (As a rule of thumb—ON an August day at high noon one half of the tree should be in sunshine while the other half is in shade. Trees should also have sufficient space between them to grow in all directions approximately 12 inches each year.) By careful thinning of the trees will result in healthier, more beautiful groves that contribute oxygen to the environment, protection and food to the other plant and animal species, erosion control, beauty to the landscape, and nut production which will provide the income required to make it all possible. To this effort more than 1,170 manhours have been contributed. Financing of this project has been possible through individual loans, donation and contributions. Individuals have made their personal equipment available. No money has been provided by the Association. When this project is completed all money will be given to the Association along with any equipment. It is believed this procedure should be fair to all people owning memberships.
