
## **Present Day** Myths



The changes are applicable to all areas in which the Utility provides electric service. All five classes of customers are affected by the proposed changes. The proposed rates will effect an \$8,508.00 increase in the operating revenues of the Utility based upon the calendar year 1978.

The proposed changes include but are not limited to the following:

- (1) Changing the line extension policy to provide a method for the refund of prepayments made for line construction to subdivisions;
- (2) Increasing the charge for connecting or namechanging to \$10.00 minimum or \$20.00 with field trip;
- (3) Increasing the charge to collect a bill or reconnect electrical service after discontinuance for non-payment to \$20;
- (4) Providing a uniform means to charge for temporary service and


