SOCIAL SECURITY NEWS

A Texas woman who tried to get social security benefits for a non-existent child received a federal prison sentence Monday, according to Miss Elvia F. Fuentes Manager of the Eagle Pass Social Security Office. Miss Fuentes said Dixie Lurlene Holland Johnson of LaPorte was sentenced in U.S. DIstrict Court in Corpus Christi to serve six months of a threeyear prison senctence, ans was ordered to serve five years of supervised probation.

The woman pled guilty to a charge that she fraudulently claimed the benefits in an application filed in Victoria, Texas August, 1977, Miss Fuentes said.

Miss Fuentes said U.S. attorneys in the five-state Dallas region are aggressive in their support of the social security fraud deterrence effort. In recent months, 11 convictions have been obtained in the region. Twenty cases are pending prosecution

decisions and five other individuals have been indicted or arraigned.

KAZEN IN WASHINGTON

A major revision in Federal tax laws, proposed by Chairman Al Ullman of the House Ways and Means Committee, deserves the attention of all citizens. It would cut existing taxes by \$130 billion, but regain the money to the Federal Treasury by adding 5 percent to the cost of food and 10 percent to most other retail prices.

Chairman Ullman has ordered hearings on his bill early next month, but has already expalined his proposal in sufficient detail to permit study. For my part, the plan he called a "Value Added

Tax" (or VAT) now appears to be an all-encompassing sales tax which would be especially burdensome on middle and lower-income people, but I shall give it further study.

SOME CUTS
As I understand it, the Ull
man plan would cut income tax
rates from the present range of
14 to 70 percent to a new range
of 10 to 50 percent, effective in
1981. The present tax structure
levies a top rate of 50 percent
on all earned icome and 70 percent
on income from investments. Mr.
Ullman's bill would set a ceiling of 50 percent on all income,



Nature has for centuries used fire to control vegation and to rejuvenate brush, grass and forest lands. Fire, however, has always brought with it elements of risk. and would trim the top rate on captial gains to 20 percent.

It would increase the zero pracket amount, formerly the standard deduction, form \$2,300 to 2,600 for single persons and from 3,400 to 4,000 for couples filing joint returns. The Ullman plan would allow an earned income credit or work bonus to 15 percent of the first \$5,000 in wages, for a maxium credit of \$750, copared to the present credit of 10 percent with a maximum allowance of \$500.

REFUNDS FROM TREASURY
If any taxpayer's credit exceeded the tax owed, he would get money from the Treasury. Similarly, refunds would be made to elderly persons who owe little or no tax.

Corporate taxes would be reduced from the present 46 per cent on earnings over \$100,000 to 36 percent on profits exceeding \$36,000. Rates on earnings over \$160 would rage from 15 to 30 percent, a reduction of present rates of 17 to 40 percent on the first \$100,000.

The plan would also reduce the corporate tax on capital gains and allow increased deductions to businesses for depreciation of equipment.


CONSUMERS WOULD PAY
Obviously, all these tax deduc-

tions would mean major cuts in Federal tax revenues unless alternatives were devised. Mr. Ullan proposes the VAT tax on sales of property and services at each stage of the production and distribution process. Each would pay 10 percent of the value added and pass this tax along in its prices, so the tax to consumers would generally be 10 percent of the retail value of the product.

However, the rate would be 5 percent on food and non-alcoholic beverages for human consumption and on the sale or rental of a taxpayers' residence, and on medical care and prescription drugs. No tax would be charged to charitable organizations, educational activities, mass transportation, exports and interst.

I do not see the current session of Congress acting on the bill, and I foresee many changes before—or if at all—it emerges from the Ways and Means Committee. I shall be following the Ullman proposal as it progesses through the legislative process.


