BRACKETTVILLE ISD SCHOOLS RECEIVE FEDERAL GRANT

Grants totaling \$399,454 have been awarded to 28 recipients in Texas under the U.S. Department of Energy's "Grant Program for Schools and Hospital" it was announced today by G. Dan Rambo of Dallas, Regional Representative for DOE. Previous awards under this program which were announced on February 15, 1980, totaled \$1,086,574 to recipients in Texas.

Under the program authorized by Title III of the National Energy Conservation Policy Act of 1977, DOE is making grants to eligible institutions that have applied in accordance with a state-wide plan developed by the Texas Energy and Natural Resources Advisory Council.

The grants are awarded for Technical assistance in identifying and analyzing the effectiveness and pay-back periods of various measures to reduce energy consumption or for installation of energy conservation measures in grantees' facilities.

Normally, funds granted under the program must be matched 50/50 with non-federal funds. However, where severe financial hardship can be demonstrated the federal share may be increased to a maximum of 90%

The most dangerous person is the one who wants to force his will on others at any cost. Such a person, when he is in a position of authority becomes all the more dangerous. Send a boy to do a man's job and he has to somehow gain the spotlight to prove how big he is. The orders from the Director of the Department of Public Safety is a classic example.

The fact that after these years of enforcement, publicity and rationalization regarding the 55 mph speed limit 62% of the drives in Texas disrespect the law shows the unpopularity of the law. I have not great flag to wave for a higher speed limit. I drive in accordance with it. I do it not out of fear of being cited nor even respect for the law but simply because I have more time than money and it saves dollars for me to drive 55 mph. I do remember that the 55 mph was set by bureaucrats not responsible to the electorate. I do know that the States were blackmailed into passing legislation to make it legal. I do know too that if every person given a ticket were to challenge it in court the courts would be so bogged down the cases would have to be dismissed. Now comes a slick operator who is not responsible to the electorate searching for loop holes to further enforce the speed law. Blackmail is again the motivation. Unless Texas brings it conformity to 40% the blackmail "may"

withold tax money taken from Texas taxpayers ostensibly to use on highways in Texas. Apparently it is okay for 60% of the drivers to violate the law but wrong for 62%. Who's to say this same tyrant may not come back next month and demand 50 percent or 60 percent of 80 percent or 100 percent compliance with the same blackmail threat. So to cater to the burceaucrcy the Texas underling decides to spend vast sums of tax dollars in unauthorized ways to polish the Washington apple.

New unmarked cars must be bought have you checked the price tag of these autos lately? New personnel must be hired--have checked the cost to taxpayers for these additional personnel? New radar units must be bought- the counties be conned into the illegal act of purchasing equipment for another tax supported agency? Civilian clothing will be worn--will the taxpayer have to furnish a clothing allowance? More gasoline will be used--will that amount be less than the questionable meager amount saved by slowing down 2% of the drivers? Fifteen Kinney County 4-H members participated in the annual San Angelo Livestock Show & Rodeo held March 5--10 at the San Angelo Fairgrounds.

These members exhibited 59 head of market lambs. Brenda Foust, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Foust, exhibited the first place medium weight finewool lamb. The lamb was bred by Double R Ranch of Brackettville.

Lashawn Wardlaw showed the Third place heavyweight finewool lamb, Doug McCarty exhibited the fourth place lightweight finewool lamb, seventh place lightweight crossbred lamb and eighth place mediumweight finewool lamb.

Other 4-H members exhibiting and placing lambs in the top twenty of each class included Kevin Kaplan, Seth Kaplan, Joel Voss, Warren Voss, Dutch Wardlaw, Leisha Wardlaw, John L. Coates, David Hensley, Michelle Hensley, Debbie Latham, Clinton Hobbs,

and Rex McCarty.

Also, Kinney County 4-H Club exhibited the second place pen of 15 finewool lambs and second place pen of 15 crossbred lambs.

Doug McCarty, son of Missy McCarty was the recipient of the overall top showmanship award in the market lamb division. Doug a nine year 4-H Club member was selected as doing the best job of exhibiting his lambs in the San Angelo Livestock Show.

Kinney County 4-H also exhibited their qualities in the livestock judging contest as they were the overall high point team in this event. Thirty-nine other teams competed in the livestock judging contest, however, Kinney County 4-H was first with a total of 1623 points. Team members included Warren Voss, who was sixth high individual, Doug McCarty, Seth Kaplan and Joel Voss.

On Sunday March 9, at the afternoon rodeo performance Kevin Kaplan was third in the calf

MOHAIR MARKET DEVELOPMENT TEAM TO VISIT FAR EAST

The Mohair Council of America is sending a market survey team to the Far East, March 16. Countries to be visited are Japan, Taiwan and Korea.

The Council will be represented by Sid Hawkins of Sander-son, immediate past President, and Fred Campbell of Paint Rock, executive Director. Accompanying them will be George Taylor of San Angelo, immediate past president of the Texas Wool and Mohair Warehouse Association, and John E. Hutchinson of the Texas Department of Agriculture.

The purpose of this mission is to investigate the current and future use of mohair in these countries. The Japanese have used approximately 10-15% of the world mohair clip in the past, but have purchased only limited amounts from Texas during 1979 due to the blending of mohair in the top making process. Because they did not receive the quality top they preferred, the Japanese switched most of their purchases to South Africa. The team will try to recapture some of this business and assess the potential for mohair in Japan, as well as Korea and Taiwan.

The trade mission is being made possible through the Foreign Agricultural Service Cooperator program and the Texas Department of Agriculture, both of whom assist commodity groups in the development of agricultural markets overseas.

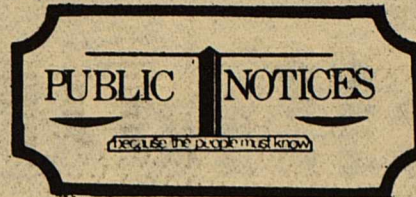

Praise God!! Success at last! We want to thank all those patrons and friends of the library who attended las Monday's County Commissioner's meeting and give a special heart-felt "thank you" to Judge Postell, who we were pleased to see up and about, Commissioners Sheedy, McClure, Luna, and Talamantez for voting in favor of budgeting a yearly \$6,000. county tax money retroactive to March 1, 1980, for Kinney County Public Library to be dispersed by the Library Board of Trustees and, also, a continued yearly budget of \$2,500 from the Federal Revenue Sharing Funds to be used for running expenses. This money will help our library meet two requirements for State Library Membership (1) a yearly budget of at least \$5,000 half of which must be tax dollars and a paid library staff member. This will also help assure the continued receipt of federal funds through membership in the San ANtonio Public Library/ District 10 Libraries System.

We also want to thank all those who signed our petitions requesting the commissioners' court assistance and all those who attended the meeting until there was standing-room only. Mr. Allen Kreiger, Jr., Presidnet of the "Friends", presented these petitions with over 300 signatures and introduced Mr. Charles Ward, President of the Library Board of Directors, who give an outstanding presentation outlining the growth of the library, it's services and future goals. Also, Mr. Ward respectfully asked that the commissioners vote to approve a larger budget of \$12,000 yearly as a token of gratitude by the county for all the decades

of hard work devoted by Miss Else Sauer and Mrs. Golemon which would allow them to see a secure future for what they have played such a major part in establishing.

Mr. Plunker Sheedy suggested that the Court amend the amount to \$6,000 and continue the \$2,500 Federal Revenue Sharing Funds. The motion was placed by Mr. Alvin McClure and carried by the court.

We also wish to thank Mrs. Mary Santos, who wrote the original grant request for the new library building as she has committed herself to "search out" more grants to help our community complete the new building when the legal litemations are settled and a concise accounting of funds remainning and required are presented to her.

Again, we want to express our deepest gratitude to all of you who took your time to become involved in this commendable project and hope all of you will feel gratification by the outstanding results of all our labors. Keep up the good work!!! and God Bless you All!
