

RESOLUTION OF KINNEY COUNTY COMMISSIONERS' COURT

WHEREAS, in December of 1977, Kinney County contracted with Bob Myers, dba Myers Construction Company, as a general contractor for the construction of a new kinney County Library/Community Service Center; and

WHEREAS, the contractor has breached his contract with Kinney County, by walking off the job in August of 1978; and

WHEREAS, the project was funded by the Economic Development Administration, and Kinney County is not financially able to complete the project by going through a contract; and

WHEREAS, is is necessary for Kinney County to request a Waiver from the contract provisions, for the purpose of allowing Kinney County to enclose and protect the EDA Library project;

Now, therefore, the Commissioners' Court of Kinney County, Texas, hereby certify the follow-

ing:

That Kinney County is financially unable to complete the project as per the original contract, and there is a need to protect the project by building a roof and enclosing the project so hat it will be usable facility and can be used in accordance with the general purposes of the EDA Grant, therefore, BE IT RE-SOLVED that Kinney County requests that the Economic Development Asministration to permit them to go force account to enclose and protect the library project by using the money alloted by EDA for materials and for the labor to be provided from funds other than EDA funds. All materials will be bought in accordance with the procedures provided under directives of EDA and the minority directives will also be followed in the purchases of mater-



ENERGY-SAVING FEATURES REDUCE ELECTRICITY COSTS FOR THE **DON SELLERS HOME**

on and Jackie Sellers already had started building their home in Uvalde when they heard about the Energy Efficiency Award program sponsored by Central Power and Light Company. BUCK HARVEST RESTRICTIONS DON'T SOLVE DEER PROBLEMS

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department has been conducting several studies during the past six years on buck harvest restrictions. Three separate special reports have been prepared on these studies during 1979. Following is a summary, prepared by the TP&WD, of the results of these studies with mention of new harvest regulations that were tried this last year to increase doe harvest.

An analysis of three whitetailed deer research programs shows that declines in body weights shortened at the request of land and antler development in some Texas deer ranges cannot be reversed by restricting or redistributing the buck harvest.

Instead, biologists in three separate studies point out that declines in deer quality in the Edwards Plateau and South Texas are the result of overpopulation of deer rather than excessive buck harvest.

In fact, an underharvest of antlerless deer probably is more to blame for the decline in buck antler and body condition than over harvest of bucks. When the

total number of deer in a region outstrips the carrying capacity of the range, a reduction in body and antler size, is inveitable, the reports indicate.

In 1974, the department began an experimental buck permit system for Webb County. This is a traditionally outstanding area for hunting trophy bucks, but one in which declines in deer quality already were being documented by 1974.

Through the use of deer check stations, intesnsive aerial

census studies and issuance of buck permit based on acreage, the department was able to deter mine the effects of tighter controls of the buck harvest.

In short, the program was able to more equitably redistribute the buck harvest among large and small acreages, but it failed to have any detectable effect on the downtrend in deer quality.

Similar conclusions have been reached by biologists obser ving the effects of a shortened hunting season in Dimmitt County, which is just north of Webb County

The Deer season was owners who believed that declines in buck quality in the county resulted from the overharvest of older, mature bucks. The season during 1976-78 was opened at the customary mind-November date, but was closed in mid-december in stead of Jan. 1 or Jan. 2.

The short season result ed in a 51 percent decline in the buck harvest in the county. However, the reduced harvest did not increase the number of bucks, as that segment of the population actually declined in 1976-78. Hunter numbers and days spent hunting both decled during the study period.

The hope that a shorter season would encourage greater harvest of anterless deer proved false. Although anterless deer comprised a greater proportion of the harvest than before, the total kill remained inadequate to control deer numbers.

Third investigation involved a change in the bag limit in Medina County from three deer, no more than two bucks, to three deer, no more than one buck. This change also resulted from a

proposal from the local county commissioners' court, which told the department its constituents were concerned about an apparent decline in the numbers of harvestable bucks.

As in the Dimmitt County regulation change, a decline was noted both in buck harvest and hunter number/days. But instead of the expected increase in anter less harvest, a 19 percent decline was documented.

Investigators noted also that while a rather drastic 43 percent reduction occurred in the county's buck harvest, similar re ductions were seen in surrounding counties where the buck limit was n ot reduced. "The trend in the buck harvest seems to be closely related to the deer population which is fluctuating independently of hunting pressure,"

the study said,
"This information shows that saving or stockpiling bucks without controlling total deer numbers is futile," the report concluded.

With this concept in mind, the department has taken steps to find a way to increase the harvest of anterless deer in areas where over-population is putting undue pressure on habitat.

During the 1979-80 hunting seasons, two special anterless deer seasons were held in select ed counties. In Bosque and Erath counties in Central Texas, and Tyler and Polk Counties in East Texas, hunters were allowed to havest anterless deer without a permit during the four-day Thanksgiving weekend.

Also, a 16-day anterlessonly hunting season was authoriz ed for Dimmitt, Webb, and Maverick counties in South Texas prior to the opening of the regular deer season.

Final results have not been tabulated from these experimental anterless deer seasons, but Wildlife Division officials feel that if public acceptance and the harvest rates prove to be acceptable, such seasons may be offered in more counties in the

Department biologists also feel the harvest of spike bucks (mature bucks which have only single antlers without prongs or forks) goes hand-in-hand with an adequate antlerless deer harvest as a prime need for improv ing deer qualify.

Studies at the Kerr Wildlife Management Area during the past decade have illustrated that spikes are inferior animals--a condition related to genetics as well as nutrition.

IN spite of this evidence, several Texas counties continue to protect spike bucks from harvest, reasoning that they are simply young deer which need protection.

The Kerr studies show that spike bucks never attain body or antler size equal to bucks which have forked antlers at maturity (approximately one and a half years of age.)

Your Host:

IN a number of talks in the Distirct, I have dicussed the painful problems attendant to balancing the national budget. Some have interpeted my analyses as suggesting hat I felt the task was impossible. I want to make it very clear that I am not ac--epting that view. In fact, I have introduced legislation calling for holding expenditures to the levels of revenues. If that is not a call for a balanced bud get, I as--what is?

Further-more, I am no Johnny -come-lately to this attitude. My leggislation, offered more than a year ago, also called for a carefully constructed plan to beginpaying off our national debt. That effort would have budget-balancing benefits by reducing the heavy burden of interest, which in itself requires that our government pay about \$175 million every day, just for interest alone.

TERRIBLE DIFFICULTY

I have explained how terribly difficult it is to cut the budget, for every proposed expenditure has some reason or justification. However, just as a parent must sometimes say to

his children "We simply cannot aford what you want," or a business executive must say to his board of directors "Where are we going to ge the costs of the project you propose," so we face hard decisions in seeking to balance the budget.

I face some arguments with myself. I have always supported education, certain aid to the elderly, better sewer and water sytems for our urban areas, protection of the promises made to our military retired--the list could go on to fill this page. Yet I Iso believe that if our nation is to survive strong and free, we must have military stre ngth second to no other world power. As I vote on budget questions, I have to re-examine priorities and preferences.

PROGRESS IS SLOW

Other Members of the Congress tell me they have the same problem. Those who supported the social programs of the Kennedy-Johnson years must face the ques tion of whether we can afford to take care of the young and old, the unemployed and sick, and certainly the average tax-paying citizen. We may have to seem hard-hearted to some, even though others will see that we are being realisitic in the decisions we

Let me make it very clear however, that I want a balanced budget. In fact, I think it more accurate to say that "we must balance the budget," and I say "we because I think citizen support for the effort is essential. It is not a political question but rather one of economic sur-

BENEFITS FROM STRUGGLE

The simplest way, some say, is to raise taxes to the level that would provide revenues to pay for everything we want the federal government to do. There are few people who say that, how ever, because most of us think taxes are already a major factor in the problem we all are having of saving for our later years. I am disturbed that statistics show the Average American saves only three percent of his income. One reason is that may Americans have come to doubt that they can buy a dollar's worth of goods in a few years with the dollar they save this year.

But if we can all work to gether, cut federal spending and rebuce the national debt, we can encourage expansion of the free enterprise system, increase the number of eaxpaying Americans and thereby reduce the taxes per person, and create a sounder economy that most of our citizens can enjoy.

WASHINGTON, D.C, -April 1,1980, COngressman Abraham Kazen, Jr., concerned over recent cases of rabies in South Texas, was told today by the Food and Drug Administration that it was expediting tests of an improved vaccine.

The FDA confirmed information which was previously given to Congressman Kazen by the Disease Control Center in Atlanta that if no unexpected problems developed in the tests, it was expected that the new vaccine would be license for manufacture within a matter of weeks. The vaccine has been approved for sale in England and France. Two South Texas youths, after being bitten recently by rabid cats, went to England for treatment with the

"I am told that the new medication, prepared from human diploid cell structures, is far more potent than another widely used vaccine produced in duck embryos," Kazen said. "As a result, sic innoculations are used in the treatment, compared to the severity of side reactions. IN simple terms, the new vaccine is far easier on the patient."

Kazen said he had urged the Disease Control Center and the Food and Drug Administration to speed up testing of the new medicaiton in order that it become available in this country. He siad he recognized the need for determination that it was safe and effective, but wanted prompt decisions to protect animal-infected persons who might not be able to affoed overseas trips for treatment.

He said he would continue to maintain his interest until the new vaccine or equivalent treatment was readily available for our our people.
