#### STATE HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT NEWS

Del Rio---The State Department of Highways and Public Transportation conducted a pre-construction conference at Del Rio on April 1, according to Nino Gutierrez, Del Rio District Engineer. Traffic control, project safety, construction schedule operations were among the topics discussed on the District wide Seal Coat project.

The proposed work consists of re-surfacing approximately 180 miles of highways in the eight counties of District 22.

Work in Kinney County consists of surfacing 10 miles of RM 334, from RM 3199 to the Uvalde County line; 13 miles of RM 3008, from US 90, North to RM 2523; and 7 miles of FM 3199, from RM 334 North.

Construction barricades were placed and construction began on April 8th. Traffic will be routed through construction.

Attending the meeting were William H. Glenn, Supervising Resident Engineer and Joe Antu, Engineer Technician III of the Highway Department, E.C. Schwope, Jr. representing the contractor, Schwope, Inc. of San Antonio.

Sources and Repositories, by Ronald A. Bremer, a summary of little known but highly important genealogical sources that will be new to even the most experienced researcher; and Federal Forms, by Ronald A. Bremer, the most important Federal Forms to the American geneologist. Includes Applications for Search of Census Records, Order for Copies--Census Records, Order for Copies--Passenger Lists (back to 1828, some of early as 1787), Request for Pension and Bounty--Land Warrant Application Files, etc. Also newly received are Ray Miller's Eyes of Texas Guides for the Gulf Coast, for Dallas/East Texas, and for the San Antonio/Border Tradition.

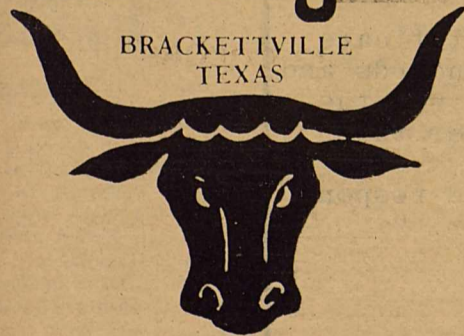
## I REMEMBER.....

I remember when the Circus came to town. I lived in a town of about 15,000 people so we did not have a circus every year but it was truly a high light experience when one came. There were a number of them at that time. Ringling Brothers & Barnum & Bailey was the BIG one. It had five "rings" Others had three and four. The circus always rolled into town on a special train. It came late in the night. The train hardly pulled into the siding near the Fairgrounds until the elephants were unloaded from their cages. They immediately were put to work pulling the many rolling cages of animals off the flat. When this was done the elephants were taken to the location of the "Big Top". They were well trained and as daft animals soon pulled the tent up into place. The rolling cages of the other animals were then placed near the entrance of the Big Top where the "Menagerie" would be located. The activity was hectic! In an unbelievably short time the stands of seats were in place in the big tent where several thousand people would watch the two performances. There was usually a carnival. By daylight hucksters were all up and down the main street of the City selling balloons and pennants and other souvenirs of the circus. By ten o'clock almost every person for many miles around would be crowding the curbs of the business district. There would always be a Circus Parade. To see these ornate cages with the animals, to hear the kalliopo as it rolled down the street escorting the parade and to see the clowns already in full regalia entertaining the children was a sight never to be forgotten. Almost as soon as the parade reached the fairgrounds down the secondary street of the business district the afternoon "Matinee" began. It was scarcely over and

the tent cleared before the crowd began to gather for the evening performance. Everyone came eagerly because to see the "Menagerie" was included in the price of the ticket. People milled around looking at the many, many animals until the trumpets began to blare in the Big Tent and a big rush was made to the "reserved" seat. The performance was about three hours long and with the action in each of the five rings simultaneously. Clowns performed acts the indelibly mark the mind of the viewer. Hucksters sold their wares (never beer) and there was a truly festive atmosphere. When the final act was over and the spot lights on the rings were off the crowd left. It was amazing to walk through where the "menagerie" had been and to find even the tent gone. The animals had already been loaded on the flat cars of the railroad train. Before the crowd was out of the tent most of the seats had been dis-assembled and before many of the people had cleared the grounds the Big Top came crashing down. Some of the hangers on were still lazily strolling about the grounds when the sound of the locomotive giving its' two toots signalled that the train was moving out. A few hours ride and the same routine in another city. It was truly a spectacular thing and it is a tragedy that people today do not have the opportunity to enjoy this most fascinating experience. After I was ten years old I never had to pay for a ticket to the circus. Some of the boys would watch the guards and sneak in under the tent when the guards were not watching. There was another way that was more thrilling and more honorable. They always gave tickets to the boys who watered the elephants. We simply had to carry a bucket of water to each elephant and let him drink. This was a thrill within itself and I rewarded by a free pass to the Circus. Another great era has passed--the time "When The Circus Came To Town".

There will be games and a flea market, and barbeque and cold drinks will be sold.

Admission will be free, and everyone is invited to attend. Parking will be provided at the west gate on Highway 90. The Rendezous will be hosted by the Fort Clark Historical Society of Kinney County, INC.
