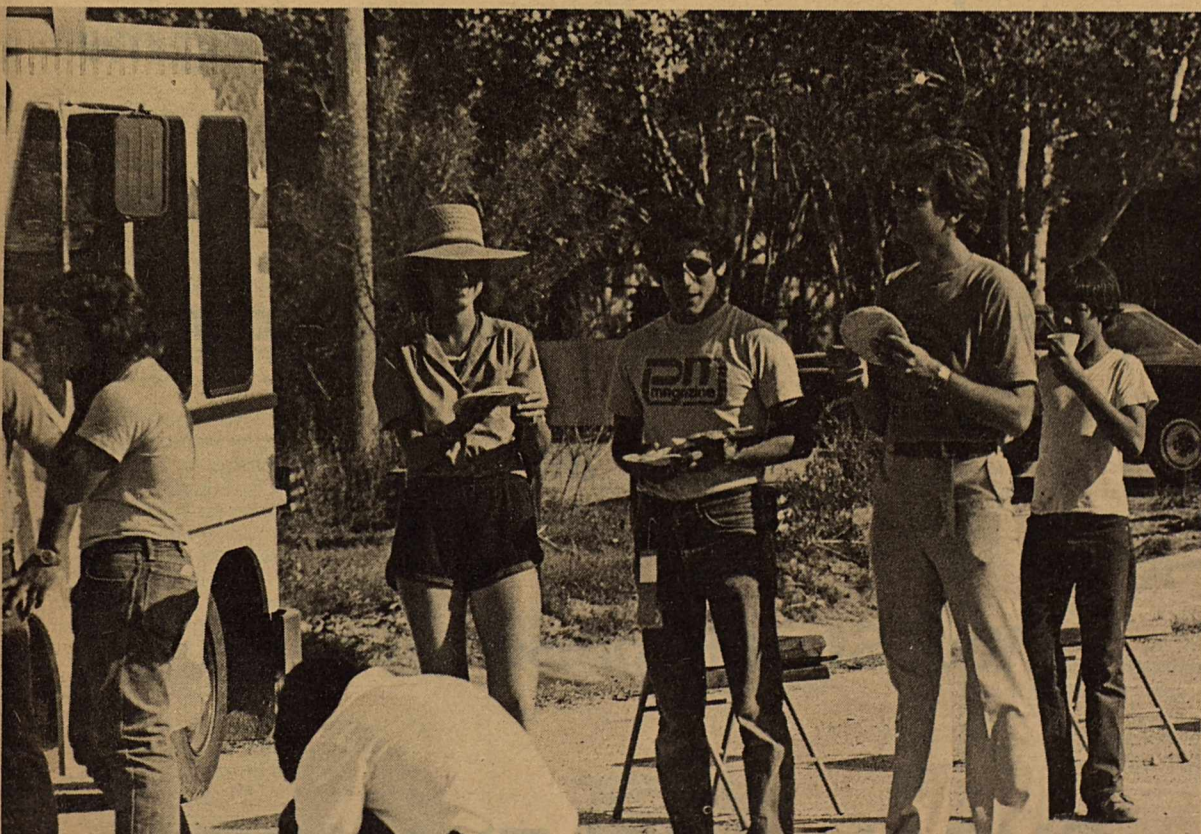

## I REMEMBER .....

I remember the great Iron Horse. It is fascinating to stand in a great airport and watch the giants of the airways take off and land. It does not equal in my mind the thrill of the Iron Horse. In every town where there was a railroad in years past there was a great deal of interest in the train coming in. In many places where the trains were not too frequent in coming many people drifted down to the Depot to watch the train come steaming in and leave. It was always fascinating to hear the train whistle in the distance and to stand and strain your eyes to get a glimpse of the coming train. It was a matter of anticipation as a boy to sneak out to the track and put your ear to the track to try to hear the train long before it came in sight. As the old Iron Horse puffed to a stop the smell of iron on iron as the brakes grabbed is a smell never to be forgotten. It was with almost breathless anticipation we watched the doors of the passenger cars open and the Conductor or brakeman or the Pullman Porter step to the ground with a stand in one hand which he placed at the foot of the steps to make the bottom step for those getting off the train. There was a stretching of necks and straining of eyes to see if anyone you knew would get off the train. It was always interesting to me to watch the baggage handlers wheel the highwheeled wagons to stop close where the train would be. They had done it so often then seldom had to move on when the train stopped. It would be sitting just at the door of the baggage car or the mail car. It was a frantic moment for those loading and unloading the mail and baggage. All too soon the Conductor would call "Board" look at his watch, frop in to his vest pocket pick up his stool, grab a hand bar and swing into the doorway as the train was already moving. As the engine rolled in to the station the engineer had

continued

his orders. The telegraph operator with a shade over his eyes had been standing near the train when it pulled in. He would be holding a poll with a large loop in it and tied securely in the "V" of the loop would be the orders. As the engineer flashed by he simply leaned out the window and stuck his arm through the loop. With "Board" by the conductor and a wave of air from the brakeman, the engineer gave two quick toots of the whistle meaning it was time to "high ball" and the engine belched forth smoke as the train picked up speed. The engineer had to be an expert because if he tried to start too rapidly the big "drivers" of the engine just sat on the track and spun. Almost before you knew it however, the train was gone. To this day there is still a measure of joy just to recall another chapter of American lore that has past into history and boys and girls as well, men and women will never again be able to thrill at the sight of the "Iron Horse"

Place on rack in 15x10-inch baking pan. Sprinkle any remaining mix evenly over chops. Bake at 350° for about 45 minutes. *Always cook pork thoroughly.* Place chops on serving platter. Add orange sections with syrup and grapefruit sections to drippings in pan. Stir over direct heat to blend and heat thoroughly. Serve with chops. Makes 6 to 8 servings.

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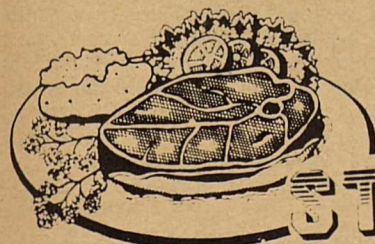
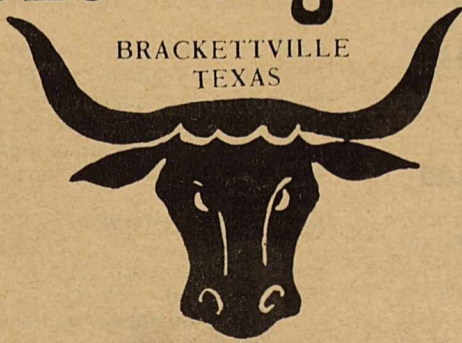
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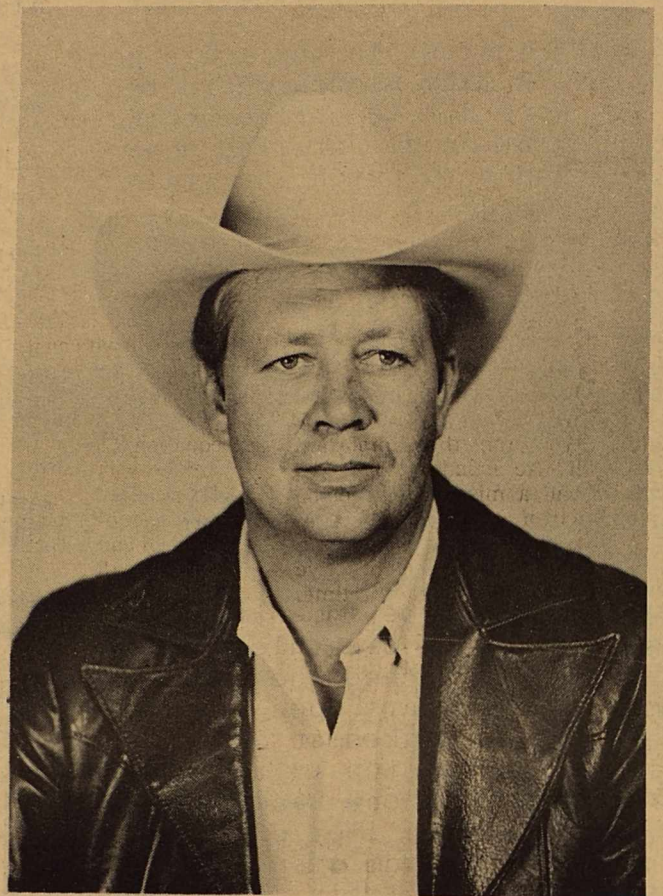

# Tossing tortilla turns flour for Bob Rodriguez

Last week the editor got all the staff writers "May I have your attention," he said, "we need a volunteer to represent our newspaper at the Frontier Fair Saturday in Brackettville. Whoever volunteers will also participate in the first World Championship Tortilla Tossing Tournament. You'll be competing only against the other people from the news media in a special event."

I quickly raised my hand. A piece of cake, I thought.

The editor stared at me, "What qualifies you for this important assignment? He sounded like I was going to lead a mission to free the hostages in Iran.

"Well, no one else has raised their hand," I said, "and secondly, I've eaten 64,080 tortillas in my lifetime. Well actually, it's 61,280 flour tortillas and 2800 slices of bread." I had forgotten the two years I spent in the army.

The editor looked around and still none of the other writers made any effort to raise their hands. They were all staring at the ceiling or looking out the front window at the passing traffic.

"OK, Bob, you got it," he said and then added, "We don't like losers, it gives the paper a bad image."

Well, that's how it all started.

I tried to analyze the competition. I wasn't worried about the writers from the Houston Post. They probably have never seen a tortilla. The main competition will come from the San Antonio writers and television people. They've downed a lot of tortillas in that town.

I had to plan my strategy well and formulate a battle plan. I decided on practice tossing the flour disks and doing research in aerodynamics.

I didn't tell my wife about the coming contest. I thought I'd just surprise her when they crowned me, "King of the News Media Tortilla Tossers."

For three days I practiced tossing tortillas in the air. I quickly found out that on a hot day you can only toss a frozen tortilla one time. The second time, part of the tortilla leaves and the other stays in your hand.

I also found out that different makes of tortillas fly different. However, most will fly horizontal and then turn vertical. As soon as they go vertical they hit the ground. The idea is to keep them in a horizontal position as long as possible.

I also experimented tossing them with various throwing styles. I tried tossing them like Bruce Jenner throwing the discus. That threw my back out for a couple of days. I then tried tossing them like a baseball and boy, does that give you tortilla elbow fast!

The frisbee way worked best but I needed to work on my distance. I was in bad need of some expert advice in tortilla aerodynamics.

It came to me all of a sudden. The engineering graduate school at Texas A&M.

I quickly reached for the phone and got the dean.

"Sir," I said, "Do you have anyone doing a master's thesis on the aerodynamics of a tortilla?"

He was very polite and told me, "Funny you should call. We had a situation recently where this lady in Eagle Pass killed her husband with a tortilla. Hit him right in the forehead. One of our students is doing research on that. I'll have him call you back right away."

I gushed with excitement and waited for the call. It came a few minutes later.

I picked up the phone and said, "Hello."

"Mr. Rodriguez," the voice said, "I'm Robert Raymond "Bobby Ray" King calling from Texas A&M. May I help you?"

"Oh, thank you for returning my call. You see, I am going to enter this

contest Saturday, you know, throwing flour tortillas up in the air to see who can toss them farther. I understand you've done research on tortilla aerodynamics."

"Matter of fact, I have. We had this case in Eagle Pass where this lady hit her husband in the forehead with a tortilla and killed him outright. I've got all the data on it." "Can you give me any info on wind factors, rate of spin, velocities and stuff like that?"

"Be glad to. In fact, I'll give you the equation."

"The equation?"

"Yes, its T over G equals D."

"What does that mean?"

"It means Tortilla over Griddle equals Death."

"How do you figure that?"

She looked at me supportively. "I am sure you can, Honey. It's a pity it's not a tortilla catching contest. Are they going to let you throw flour tortillas or corn tortillas? I would think they would fly differently."

"Oh, no," I moaned.

"You know, Honey," she said, "maybe you should call Texas A&M. I read somewhere that a young man there has done a lot of research on flying tortillas on account of this lady that killed her husband with a tortilla in Eagle Pass. Maybe they can be of help."

Cincinnati pitcher Joe Nuxhall was the youngest player ever on a major league roster. He joined the Reds in 1944 when he was 15 years old.

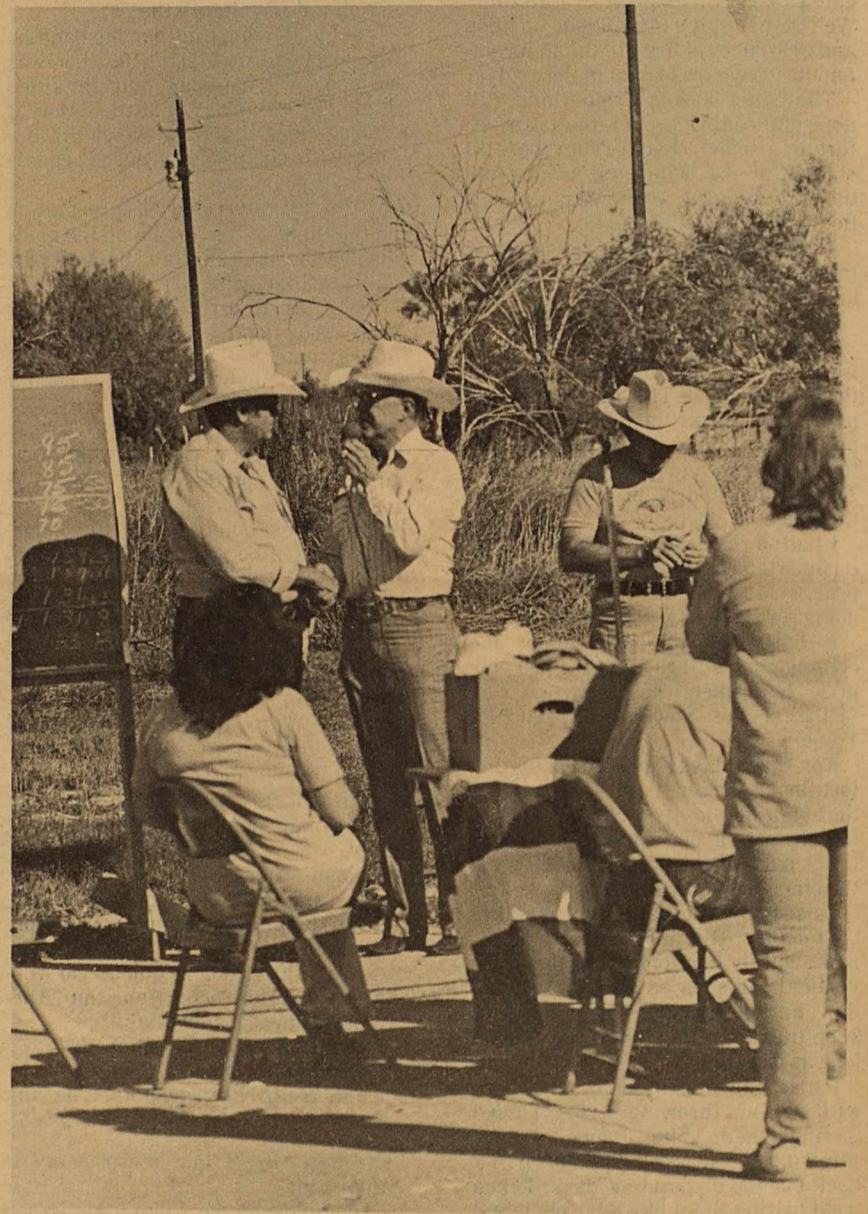
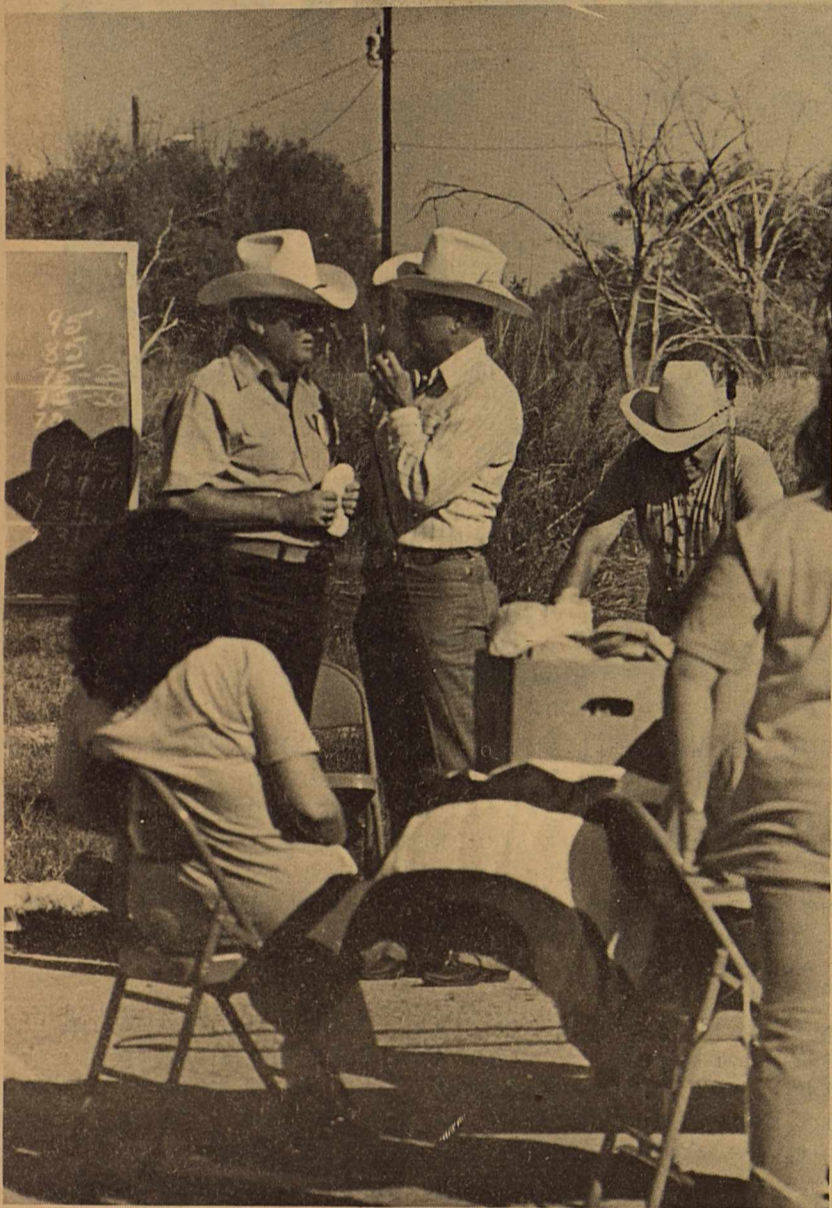

Don Larsen pitched the only perfect game in World Series history when the New York Yankees beat the Brooklyn Dodgers 2-0, October 8, 1956.



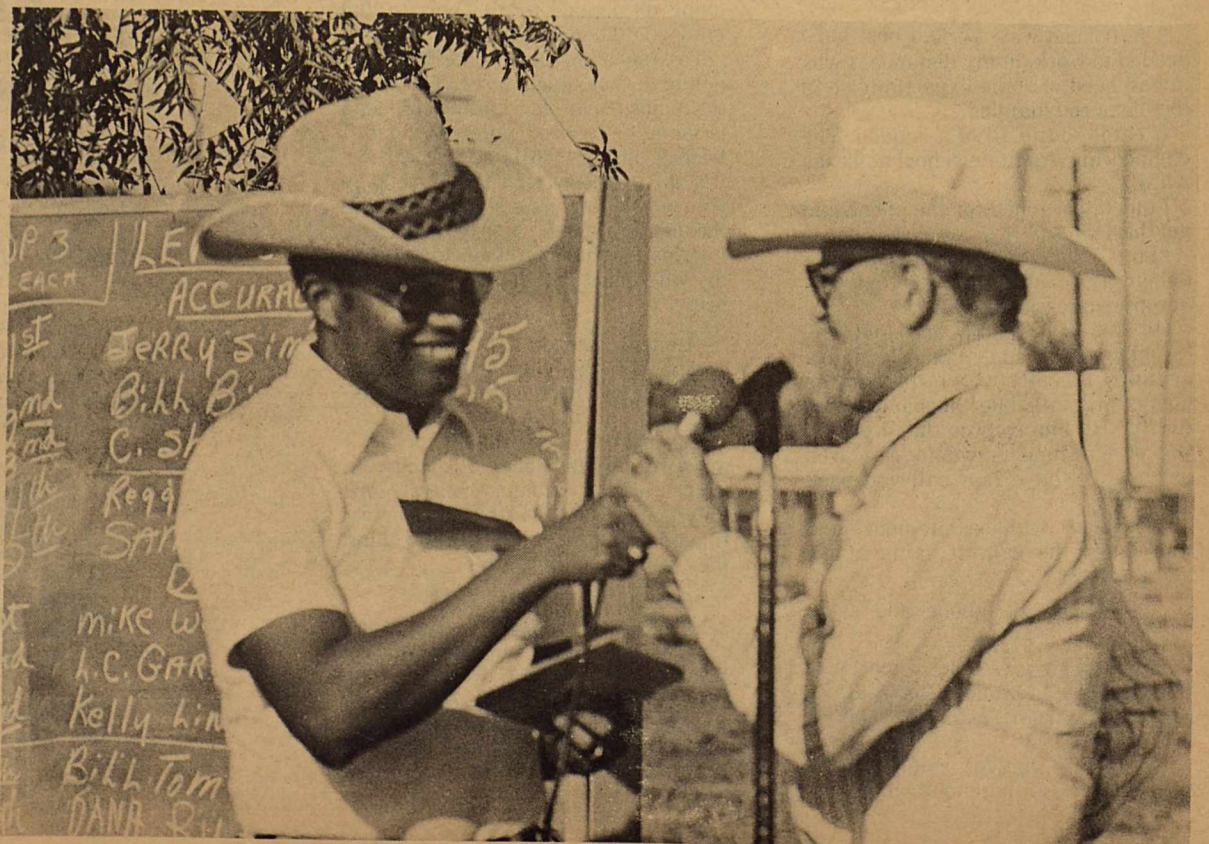
(Left) The Accuracy toss belongs over here.... as the Judges checks the scores.

Below: Happy Shahan gives some tossing hints to a member of the "Eyes of Texas" TV men.

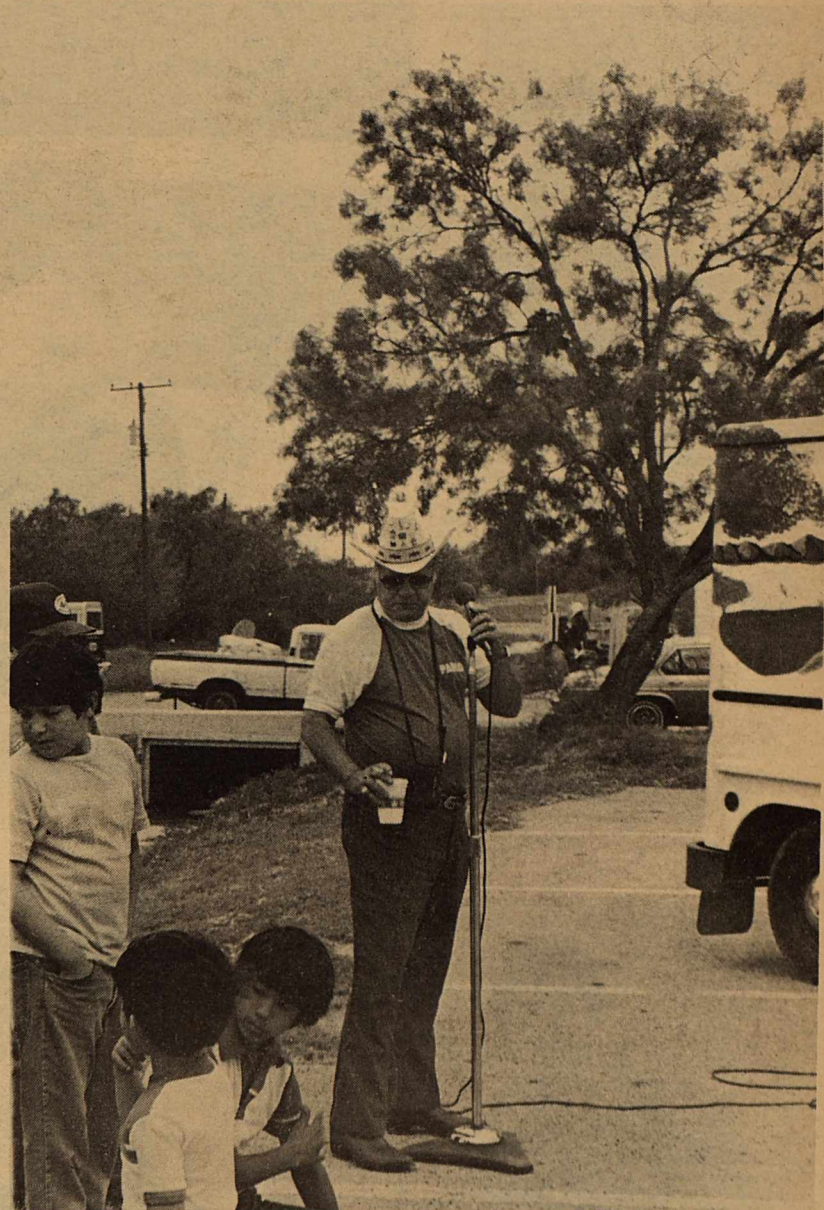

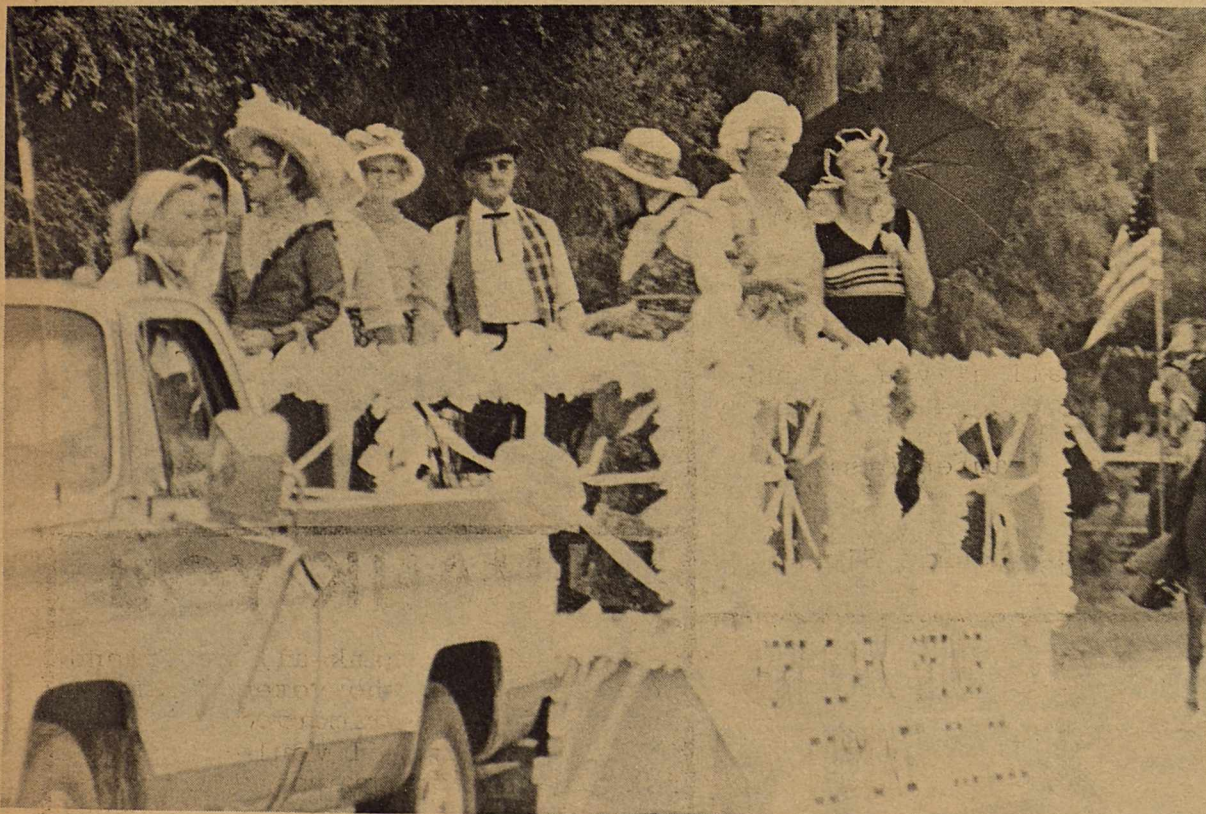

A DELIGHTFUL DANISH TRADITION



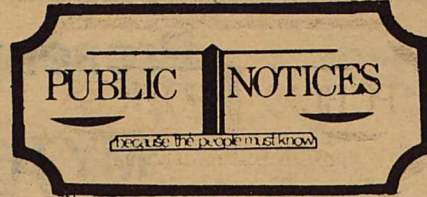

Appealing to women of all ages, as handsome with tweeds as with silks, the pastel porcelains have become a popular gift for graduations, birthdays and other sentimental occasions. **LAST WEEK'S THUNDERSTORMS A  
WELCOME RELIEF SIGH OF RELIEF**

Uvalde--May 13, 1980---  
Last wee's 2.5" of rain brought more moisture to most of the area northeast of Uvalde than had been received during the first four months of the year. The area southwest of Uvalde, on the other hand, only received light scattered showers and remains under severe drouth stress. Thursday morning's thunderstorms deposited an average of over 1.2" of rain in the northeast. The high winds uprooted some trees, blew down corn, wheat and milo crops, but by week's end, the crops were back up and the environment was greening up, reaping the beneficial effects of the much needed rain. By tuesday, however, farmers were again cranking up their irrigation pumps.

Counties in the area southwest of Uvlade continue in serious drouth stress with cattle losing condition in spite of heavy supplemental feeding. The shortage of surface water is becoming critical and ranchers are continuing to selectively liquidate their herds.
