

ALOE.....

The genus aloe has hundreds of plants with thick tapering leaves, normally arranged in Rosette form. Some Aloes have spikes or thorns, some have stems, other are stemless. One of the most commonly seen is Aloe Vera.

The Aloe Vera is extremely easy to grow, and produces numerous off-shoots from the parent that can quickly fill the pot.

These off-shoots can be potted separetly. When re-potting, be careful not to bury deeper than the preivous soil line to prevent rotting. Sprinkle sand or perlite around the plant will also help prevent rotting problems. These new plants make good specimans for small dish gardens or cactus gardens.


Aloes bloom during winter or early summer, with bloms appearing from leaf axiles forming 2--3 foot spikes of tubular yellow flowers about 1 1/2 inches long

Aloe Vera is also known as the medicine plant, as it's juices are good for burns. Aloe Vera cosmetic products, shampoos, and soaps are readily available.

Aloes like bright light, preferably not direct sunlight during active growth in the summer months, give enough water to keep water moist

During winter dormant months, water only enough to keep soil from drying out. Fertilize regularly during growth periods.

Kazen in Washington

One of the late actions of the 96th Congress was also one of the most important. The House voted, 334-45, to pass the Budget Reconciliation Act, an essential element in our planning for the fiscal year that began October 1. Budget cutting is never an easy task, but I supported the reconcilation that saves \$5.7 billion in proposed spending, provides \$4 billion in additional revenue, and cut the anticipated deficit by \$8 billion when revised economic statistics were calculated.

The Reconciliation Act includes items of great concern to our constituents. Some of these provisions included retention of twice-a-year calculation of cost-of-living adjustments for military and civilian retires, allowing royalty owners \$1,000 credit on their income tax under the provisions of the windfall profits tax, and tighter regulations of government programs where fraud and abuse has occurred.

MUST LOOK TO FUTURE

We sought to restrict federal assistance programs to persons actually in need, and we reduced duplication of programs. I am sure that in the next Congress we shall continue to seek maximum citizen return on tax dollars.

We must choose between leser government services and higher taxes. I am convinced that tax increases at this time would slow economic recovery, and that it is best that we allow citizens maximum discretion in using their money to help the nation fight recession.

VOTE DEFENSE BILL One of the appropriation bills last week approved. \$259, 7 billion for the Department of Defense. The figure is \$22 billion over the 1980 fiscal year and \$5.2 billion over what the Department of Defense had asked. Aware that: we must provide compensative adequate in order to attract and retain personnel in the armedl forces, we provided almost \$9.5 billion for personnel costs. We had to face the reality that fuel for military planes, ships and vehicles is increasing in cost, so we provided \$480 million more for fuel.

In research and development funding we earmarked \$300 million to begin work on a new strategic bomber aircraft, and another \$131 million for advance procurement of a new navy cruiser.

BEWARE OF EYE-THREATENING TOYS PREVENT BLINDNESS WARNS

If gifts for children are on your holiday shopping list, the Texas Society to Prevent Blindness urges that you select them with safety in mind.

Over 26,000 eye injuries have been caused by toys in the past five years," reports Clymer L. Wright, Society president. "Last Year alone some 6,000 children had toy related eye injuries. According to figures from the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission, the major causes were

toy guns and toy weapons with projectiles (116), sling shots and sling propelled toys (137) and gas, air, or spring operated guns (a whopping 1,335 injuries)."

"It's sad that the toys that caused these and other injuries were purchased, for the most part, by parents who had wanted their gifts to bring pleasure to their children, not the pain that they did. Some Children even suffered permanent vision loss from their injuries. But such unfortunate occurrences can be prevented this year if parents will select toys and games for their childfen's enjoyment from an eye-safety point of view."

Wright made these recommendation for toy selection:

* Avoid toys with projectiles or sharp edges; they have a built-in threat to the eyes.

* Avoid toys with detachable or removeable parts that can fly into the eyes; this waring also includes mobles for infant cribs.

* Look for sturdy construction using shatterproof and non-flammable materials; be sure gears and springs are completely enclosed. It is better to pay more for one quality-constructed toy than a couple of cheap ones that are dangerous because they break so easily.

* Make sure the child is old enough to handle the toy safely; three quarters of all toy-caused eye accidents occur to children under 15 years of age. Last year 1,913 youngsters in this age group suffered eye injuries from BB guns, darts, and bows and arrows.

* Thoroughly explain the safety risks and dangers of chemistry sets to older children and be sure the child understands them.

*Also, after you purchase the toys watch what your children do with them; most accidents occur when youngsters are not supervised. Find out-are the children rough housing too much when using less eye-hazardous items as toy cars and trucks, even skateboards, all of which caused eye accidents last year? Are the children taking a "safe" toy and making it unsafe--for example, by pulling rubber tops off darts? Are older children keeping their more complex toys and games out of the reach of younger family members?



Pick eye-safe toys this Christmas and show your children how to use them properly," Wright concluded. "In that way the gift you buy wi th hope of seeing your child's eyes light up on Christmas morning will never be the cause of dimming that light."

A MUTUAL SUPPORT GROUP FOR PER-SONS WITH SERIOUS ILLNIESS TO ORGANIZE IN EAGLE PASS

In the struggle of living with terminal illness there is a terrible loneliness, a feeling of isolation, a need for someone who understands, someone in similar situation who can offer support of a kind no one else is capalble of giving.

In January 1974, in Burlington, Iowa, a man named Orville Kelly, himself a cancer patient with lympocytic lymphoma brought together a group of persons in similar life-threatening situations, so they could offer support and understanding to one another. That organization was called Make Today Count.

Soon other chapters were formed so that today there are over 136 chapters in the United States, Canada, and Europe.

In July 1980, I first read the story of Make Today Count. while I was taking treatments at the Cancer Therapy and Research

Center in San Antonio, Tx. I saw a need for a place where others like myself could gather for informal meetings to try to discover that life can continue to be rewarding and meaningful despite disease. I decided to organize a group there.

The local chapter will aford members an opportunity to share their experiences, and hopes and to discuss their feelings and gain the strength and courage to live each day more meaningfully.

Make Today Count isnot a religious organization, although a person may share personal spiritual experiences with the others member. Make Today Count is not a therapy group, although the sharing of concerns and strength does promote growth of trust and caring among members. which in itself is therapeutic in nature. Make Today Count is not a source of financial assistance nor a place to compare physicians, medical treatments or hospital.

The purpose of the chapter is to bring together patients, families, and other interested persons for mutual support and understanidng.

The Philosophy of Make Today Count is:

1. To help the patient and his family cope with a lifethreatening illness.

2. To improve the quality of life for all persons with a serious illness.

3. To promote openness and honesty in discussing and dealing with a serious illness.

4. To identify emotional problems of life-threating illness and help people cope with them.

5. To assist the professionals and the community in better comwith and meeting the needs of the patient who is faced with life-threatining probelems.

Intersted persons are invited to attend and a special invitatioan is extended to anyone with a desire to help organize this group. Patients families, friends, students in psychology or any medical field, professionals in

medicine, spiritual leaders, any one with something to share is welcome.

ITALY DISASTER AID

Even as we worked on our own budget problems, we in the House voted \$50 million to aid Italy's worst earthquake in many decades. Indeed, this was one of Europe's worst tradgies, with perhaps 5,000 persons killed, thousands injured and homeless, and nearly 10 percent of the country damaged. Italy, the ancestral home of many Americans citizens, has been our nation's friend and our people showed their concern and sympathy with many contributions to private organizations.

We know that Italy will have to rebuild life-support systems and erect shock-proof hospitals, schools and other public buildings. I knew that everyone would agree our nation should help in this time of human tragedy.
