"NEW WORLD STUDY CLUB" Brackettville's Woman's Club SANDY HERMAN, Reporter

The Brackettville Women's Club had it's regular business meeting January 4,1981 at 4 pm in Clubhouse.

Among the business discussed was the fact that RoseMary Slubar is the medical consultant for Kinney County, servicing from the family clinic. The Kinney County CLinic is listed under Community Service, 563-2434. People with any kind of medical, dental or health problem can call her and she will refer them to the proper peoble.

Mrs. Slubar states that the clinic works according to a sliding pay scale. Your fee is adjusted according to what you earn. The clinic now has it's own lab so that it can do it's own lab work, can run EKG's, can do everything except X-ray. The clinic now has a small pharmacy with the most common prescribed drugs and are reasonably priced. The Clinic has money to help people on Medicare with transportation to Del Rio, to help get glasses for people who can't afford them and to take them for eye tests in Eagle Pass. Patients can be referred to specialists (cardiologist, gynocologists, etc.) in Eagle Pass on a sliding pay scale and money to assist in transportation if a patient must go to a specialist in San Antonio.

Volunteers are needed to go door to door to help collect information as to whether there is someone who needs help to get to a doctor or if there are special problems and to inform the people as to what's available.

More business discussed at the Women's Club meeting was what repairs and painting of the building was to be done and a spokesman from the WC to get with a spokesman of the friends of the Library as they wish to donate some funds for this.

The status of the New Library Building was questioned and members were requested to send letters to the judge to find out where it stands.

CONTINUED FROM PAGE 1, conservation practices that will be cost-shared from 50 to 80% based on need to solve conservation problems. A farm or ranch might need only one or two of th these practices, while others may need several to solve a problem. Each acre of farm or ranch will receive a conservation treatment of either a cost-share practices or simply management of the res source base of grass, crop or wildlifelands," explained Schermerhorn.

"A Landowner would sign a contract with the USDA, Secretary of Agriculture. The Soil Conservation District, will furnish through the West Nueces-Las Moras Thank You Soil and Water Conservation District, will furnish technical assistance to the landowner or operator to prepare a conservation many deeds of kindness, along plan to be combines with costshare into a cost-share contract. These contracts can run from three to ten years, ' concluded Schermerhorn.

#### ANNUAL RABIES VACCINATION NOW REQUIRED

An annual rabies vaccination for dogs and cats is now required by Texas law, according to Dr. Frank Mann, president of the Texas Veterinay Medical Association.

Dr. Mann stressed that the law

was enacted as a protection of pets and human life "During a time Association and the Texas Departwhen rabies has reached an epidemic stage in the state, vaccination vaccination of horses in Texas is the best--basically the only-method of protection we have for the public."said Mann.

Recent studies of the Texas Health Department have determind that a domestic animal such as a pet cat or dog, can be expected to expose 2.5 times the number of people that would be exposed by wildlife rabies. "The law requires that the owner of each dog and cat shall have AUSTIN--Even if Fido received the animal vaccinated against rabies by the time it is four months of age and then revaccinated at intervals of one year," said Dr. Mann. "Because of our simi-tropical climate in Texas Close proximity to Mexico, and frequent movement of animals in this state, the state legislative determind that annual vaccination were necessary to curtail rabies outbreaks in Texas," Mann said.

Dr. Mann urged all pet owners to consult their veterination for more information about animal vaccinations.

"The need for immunization for all dogs is imperative," stressed Emmett. The initial immunization jected to a series of shots because program consists of two properlyspaced immunizations, with booster vaccines as directed by a veterinarian. Puppies should st start immunizations from five to eight weeks of age. "Conditions of the animal and intensity of the disease in various areas determine when the dog should receive another vaccination," said Emmett.

Parvovirus is a new disease-a viral enteristis that was unknown before 1978. The disease reached epidemic proportions in 1980. Symptoms are depression and loss of appetite, followed by vomitting and diarrhea. Dehydration is the main concern. Death can sometimes come in a day because of the loss of body

Texas leads the nation in comfirmed rabies cases. The incidence cates that immunity to the virus of rabies in wild and domestic animals in Texas has risen dramatically in recent years, bringing a greater chance that humans may be infected.

his two-dose parvovirus vaccine earlier this spring or summer. dogowners should consult their veterinarian about a booster, according to Dr. Robert A. Emmett president of the Texas Veterinary Medical Foundation.

Parvovirus sent dogowners scurrying for a newly-developed vaccine to protect their dogs earlier this year. While vaccines are credited with curbing the Texas epidemic, field experience indimay be shorter than researhcers had hoped. "Recent reports from veterinarians throughout the state indicate that the new viral disease is still endemic

(consistently present in a given called for," said Dr. Emmett of Houston. "Parvovirua continues to be a deadly problem."

"Prompt treatment at the very first sign of any of the symptoms means many dogs can be treated successfully," said Emmett. "Waiting to see if the dog sets better may mean the dog won't receive the treatment in time to survive."

Treatment involves intravenous fluids to combat dehydration, intestinal relaxants to reduce the vomiting, and administration of electrolytes and antibiotics.

VAccine was in short supply eatlier this year, but Dr. Emmett said the supply now appears to be adequate. Research is underway to develop a vaccine to provide a longer lasting immunity.

Dr. Emmett urged dogowners to consult their veterinairian immediately for more information about parvovirus vaccinations and boosters.

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Not many Texas wildflowers dare to bloom during mid-winter, but nearly two dozen of them blossom

all year long around the border of a giant poster calendar which is both educatinal and colorful

Titled "Beautiful, Beautiful Texas," the big calendar--nearly 2 by 3 feet individual portraits of 22 different wildflowers. The centerpiece is apeaceful landscape riotous with pasture flower a country cabin, oak trees and a windmill.

The originator--Carroll Abbott of Kerrville, the state's mly full-time wildflower seed and plant collector--says the calendar has a much longer life than the year for which it was printed.

"After the year is over,"Abbott explains,"lots of folks frame the ndidividual portraits or use them in craft projects shuch as note cards and decoupage. Some people even laminate the center piece as an unusual place mat."

The calendar is is \$3.90, which includes sales tax and mailing costs, fom Green Horizons, 500 Thompson Drive, Kerrville,Tx 78028.

Abbott has been in the business of helping save the wildflowers of Texas for more than 10 years. He has been in debt for the same number of years. Sales of the calendars help keep him going during the long, slow winters.

Abbot's unique idea of conservation is to make seeds available so that Texans can plant wildflowers in their homescapes and at their country places, schools and parks.

"I don't think you can save wildflowers just by passing laws," says Abbott.


His mail-order seed comapny--Green Horizons--lists seeds from more than 200 different wildflowers, plus dozens of tree, shrub andcacti seed. He has just published a 24-page, colorful catalog, which costs \$1. "But that's a bargain," Abbott

"But that's a bargain," Abbott says,"because each catalog has a \$1 seed coupon in it." \*\*\*\*\*\*\*

That's the headline on the editor. ial by Cliff Berry, the new editor of Air Force Magazine, in that fine October issue. Following the Cuban refugee exodus the federal government estimated it would cost about \$35 per person per day, "Or about \$57,600 daily" to feed the 1,600 troublemakers who had to be held in detention centers. "Feeding the rest of the Cubans awaiting resettlement cost ... about \$9 per person per day." The Air Force, Army, Navy, Marines and Coast Guard people assigned to cope with the refugee tide, Berry points out, "are granted a Basic Allowance for Subsistence (EAS) of \$3.21 per day...Something is skewed here, and it is not the troops."





#### TEXAS HIGHWAYS AND PUBLIC TRANS-PORTATION NEWS

AUSTIN--Did you know there are two and-a-half times more miles of oil and gas pipelines in Texas than road miles on the state highway system? Or that Texas coal mining mushroomed 12-fold in nine years, but none of it was sold?
