TEXAS GAINS NEARLY 3 MILLION; SOUTHWEST AREAS UP BY 22 PERCENT

UVALDE- Texans traditionally take a lot of pride proclaiming this state "the biggest and the best." However, the geographical proportions are no longer the only thing to be considered immense. Texas' population continues to grow by leaps and bounds, making it the third most populous state.

A preliminary count from the Bureau of Census shows the Lone Star State grew from a 1970 population of 11,196,730 to 14,150,575 last year, a gain of 2,953,845. This represents a 26 percent increase.

Only California (23.5 million) and New York (17.5 million) have more residents. During the last decade California recorded a 17 percent population increase while New York experienced a four percent drop.

Interestingly enough, southern and western states showed a collective population gain of 42.3 percent between 1970 and 1980 while the upper Midwest and northeastern states gained only 3.5 percent. Actually the northeast population declined.

The 19-county region of Southwest Texas contributed 1,261,685 to Texas totals, an increase of 224,251 over 1970 figures for a 21.6 percent jump. Bexar County accounted for 152,129 of the figure. Maverick County, however, led the way with the largest percentage increase, 73 percent. Edwards County was the only county in the region to record a population decrease since the 1970 count.

Kinney County showed an increase of 298 inhabitants, bringing its 1980 preliminary count to 2,304, a 14.8 percent increase over 1970 figures. Kinney County's 1970 census count stood at 2,006.

Here are other population facts of interest.

1--The county with the largest population is Harris County with 2,395,365. Dallas is the second largest with 1,551,032, followed by Bexar's 982,589 and Tarrant's 857,434.

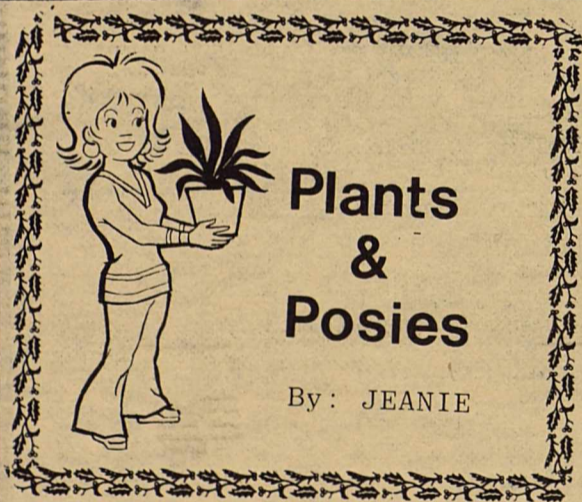

CARYOTA----Fish Tail Palm

Fish Tail palms differ from other palms in that their primary leaflet is divided into secondary leaflets. Their gray-green leaf stalks vary in height in different species, but all carry the wedge shaped leaflets, and secondary leaflets folded into a V-shape with edges like a tattered fish tail. Growth is slow on fish tail palms reaching heights of about 8 feet grown indoors.

Fish tail palms grow best in full sunlight filtered through a curtain or blind. They like warm temperatures and cannot tolerate temperatures below 55 degrees. When air is very warm increase humidity by misting or standing on a bed of moist pebbles or peat moss.

Water often enough to keep the soil moist, but never allow pot to sit in a saucer of water. If plant obviously slows growth

for a rest period in winter, let the top half inch of the soil dry between waterings. Fertilize regularly from early spring to late fall during active growth.

Fish tail palms enjoy having constricted roots, so only repot every 2-3 years and move up only one larger pot size. When repotting, pack soil firmly around roots but take care not to break any of the thick roots.

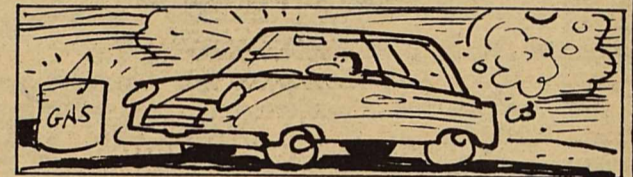

2. The county with the smallest population is Loving County with 91 persons.
3. Counties with the greatest percentage of growth from 1970 to 1980 were: Hood, 165; Montgomery, 158; Fort Bent, 149; Collin, 115; and Rockwall, 105.
4. Forty-eight counties lost population between 1970 and 1980. Forty-two of these counties lie west of a line from Wichita Falls to Laredo.
5. There are 50 counties of the 254 counties in Texas with less than 5,000 population in 1980.
6. Forty-two counties in the state have populations over 50,000.

According to a Texas Agricultural Extension Service economist, population shifts and prosperity usually go hand-

in-hand. "The Growth of business and the moving pattern of people normally set the trend," explains Jose G. Pena. "Business climates in the South and West over the past 10 years and especially in the last five years have been very ripe. Hence, there's been a large movement to those areas. As a result, Texas is one of the few states to show continuous economic prosperity."

The Texas A&M University economist point out that counties immediately surrounding San Antonio have seen their populations increase substantially, a direct result of "urban sprawl" He stresses that Southwest Texas remains primarily agricultural. But when jobs for skilled persons in outlying areas are not available, many flock to metropolitan areas. Often their places in the smaller towns are taken by persons who formerly lived in a major city.

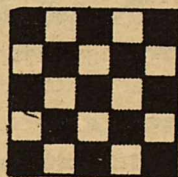

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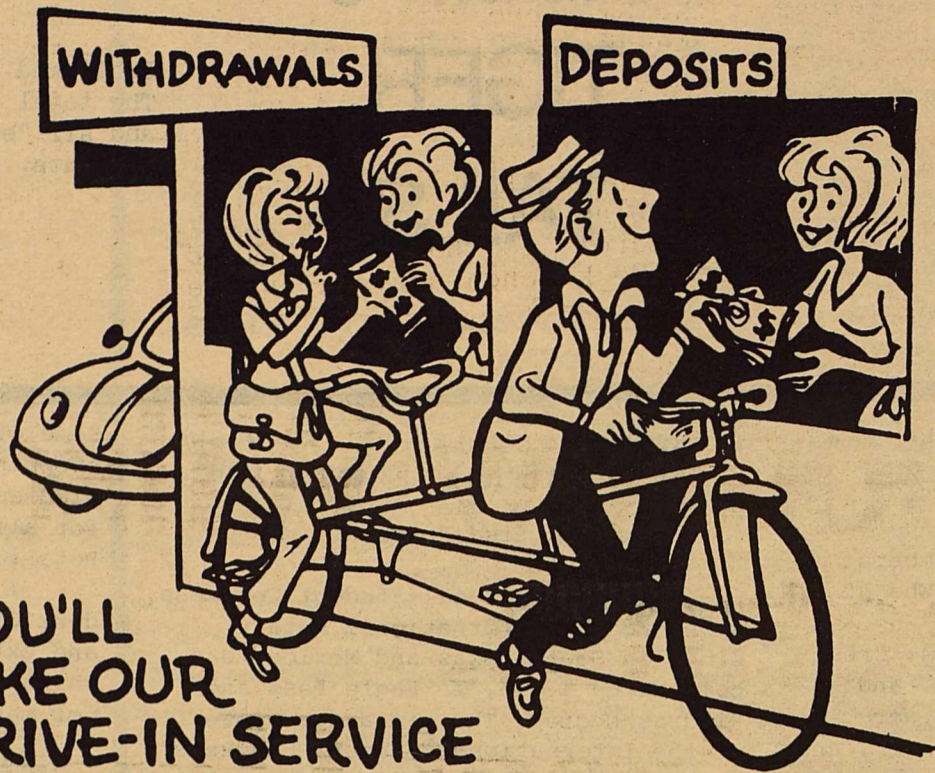

Monday night at the Kinney County Library, Mrs. Judy Janek, representative of Human Resources Chapter of San Antonio presented a film about sexually abused children. It was a discussion film (actual cases) of three women who had been sexually abused as children and how they were emotionally harmed from the incidents, withdraw into shells and have to go to therapy to be able to relate to themselves, men and children.

The two co-workers with Mrs. Janek, (Barbara Jacoby and Esther Diaz) told of alarmingly increasing rates, of sexual abuse among children, not necessarily more cases, but people more ready to find help and willing to talk about it to counselors. One small program is to teach young children not to get in cars or accept candy from strangers, but to tell the children what can happen if they do. Another is to let older children realize that no one has the right to touch them without their permission and if anyone takes liberties they, (the children), should tell their parents or teachers or someone. They also stated that if anyone knows of physical or sexual abuse of a child, they must by State Law of Human Resources Code report it to the Child Welfare Office. Brackettville people should report such cases to the Del Rio Human Resources Dept. Contact: Ms. Sarah Webster, 774-3661.

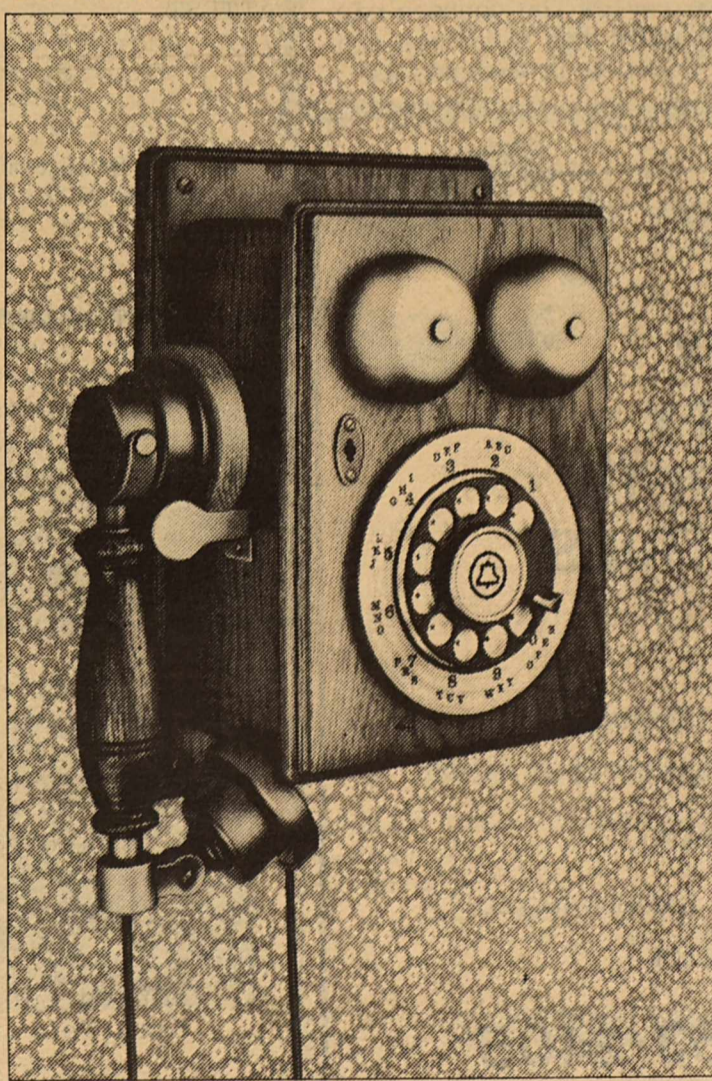

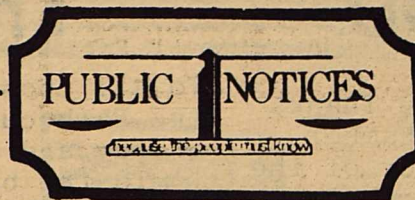

AN ORDINANCE

PROHIBITING THE BURNING OF BRUSH AND TRASH WITHIN THE CITY AND PRESCRIBING A PENALTY OF A FINE OR NOT LESS THAN \$1.00 NOR MORE THAN \$200.00

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BRACKETTVILLE, TEXAS:

Section 1. TRASH BURNING PROHIBITED. It shall be unlawful to burn brush, tree limbs, grass, trees, leaves, boards, planks or lumber in the City Limits.

Section 2. PENALTY. Any person convicted of violating this ordinance shall be punished by a fine of not less than \$1.00 nor more than \$200.00.

Section 3. EFFECTIVE DATE. This ordinance shall become effective immediately upon its passage, approval and publication as provided by law.

MAKING IT UNLAWFUL TO AVOID TRAFFIC CONTROL DEVICES: PROHIBITING "U" TURNS: ADOPTING ELECTRIC TRAFFIC CONTROL SIGNALS: MAKING IT UNLAWFUL TO DRIVE A VEHICLE UPON CERTAIN STREETS DESIGNATED AS STOP SIGN STREETS WITHOUT FIRST BRINGING SUCH VEHICLE TO A STOP: ADOPTING EXISTING STOP SIGNS AS LAWFUL TRAFFIC CONTROL DEVICES: MAKING IT UNLAWFUL TO DRIVE A VEHICLE UPON CERTAIN STREETS DESIGNATED AS YIELD SIGN STREETS WITHOUT YIELDING RIGHT-OF-WAY: PROHIBITING DRIVING ACROSS PUBLIC OR PRIVATE PROPERTY: PROHIBITING PARKING OF JUNKED OR WRECKED CARS: ESTABLISHING NO PARKING ZONES: AND PRESCRIBING A PENALTY OF A FINE OF NOT LESS THAN \$1.00 NOR MORE THAN \$200.00.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BRACKETTVILLE, TEXAS:

This ordinance shall take effect immediately upon its passage, approval, and publication, as provided by law.

SITE NEEDED FOR NEW MAIN POST OFFICE AT BRACKETTVILLE, TEXAS 77832

The U.S. Postal Service is seeking a suitable site for a new main post office at Brackettville, Postmaster Elidia G. Hinds said here.

The "Preferred area" for site consideration is bounded on the north by El Paso Street, on the east by Beaumont Street, on the south by Spring Street, and on the west by Fort Street.

Minimum site size needed is 20,000 square feet, or a lot with dimensions of 125 feet by 160 feet.

Property owners are asked to submit their site offerings not later than April 13, 1981 to: Ray F. Barnes, realty management and acquisition specialist, Field Real Estate and Buildings Office, U.S. Postal Service, P.O. Drawer 239, Dallas, Texas, 75221.

After a suitable site has been located, the Postal Service will call for construction bids for a building that will be built with private funds and leased to the Postal Service for a basic period of 10 years with renewal options for an additional 20 years.

The proposed post office will have 2,784 square feet of interior floor space.

PUBLIC NOTICE OF TAX EXEMPTIONS AVAILABLE TO HOMEOWNERS

The Brackett Independent School District tax office is currently accepting applications for residence homestead exemptions. The deadline for filing is April 1, 1981. Applications should be filed as early as possible to avoid inconvenience to the homeowner.

Two types of homestead exemptions from school taxes are available to taxpayers who owned their residence homesteads in this school district on January 1 of this year. First, the general homestead exemption is available to all homeowners and exempts \$5,000 from the market value of the homestead.

Second, any person who is 65 years of age or older or who is disabled can be exempted an additional \$10,000 from the market value of the homestead. Proof of age or disability may be necessary.

"DISABLED," in this case, refers to the definition found in the Federal Old-Age, Survivors, and Disability Insurance Act under the Social Security Administration. Disability is defined as inability to engage in any substantial gainful employment which exists in the national economy, or, in the case of someone who is 55 and blind, inability by reason of such blindness to engage in the employment in which he was previously engaged. The person claiming disability does not necessarily have to drawing benefits from Social Security.

Homeowners age 65 or older who apply for their exemption will be granted a tax freeze. If application is not made, the tax freeze will be lost for this year.

Application forms were mailed earlier to all who qualified for a homestead exemption in 1980. If you did receive an application or if you have questions about qualifying for exemptions or filing application forms, contact the school tax office at 563-2323.

Application forms may also be picked up at the tax office at Ann Street--opposite corner south of the Post Office.

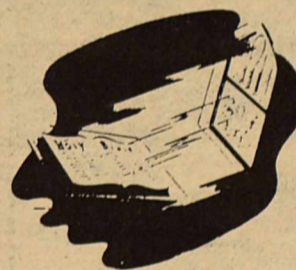
