

DIZYGOTHECA.... (False Aralia)

False Aralias are very delicate looking indaoor plants, with leaves divided into many leaflets arranged in circular form. These tropical plants grow only to about 6 feet, normally with a 20 inch spread.

False aralias enjoy bright light but not direct sunlight. They must have warm temperatures and high humidity. Mist often, or set pot on a bed of moist pebbles. Aralias do not like soggy soil . Allow the top part of the soil to dry out between waterings. Fertilize during the active growth periods.





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NEWS FROM THE TEXAS COMMISSION ON ALCOHOLISM

AUSTIN--State Rep. Wilhelmina Delco said today that "it doesn't make sense to lock sick people in jail."

H.B.1976, introduced by Delco last week, "gets Texas into the twentieth century by decriminalizing public intoxication," Delco said.

She noted that 36 states have similar statutes.

Public drunkenness is at present Texas largest single crime category, she noted, accounting for one-third of all arrest.

"People who are bing jailed for drunkenness every weekend are alcoholics," Delco said. Municipal judges are used to seeing the same faces. The american Medical Association said that alcoholism was a disease back in 1956. It's time we recognize this in our laws."

Her bill would repeal Statute 5561c, in which public drunkenness is a misdemeanor, and require law enforcement officers to take drunks to treatment centers rather than jails. Jails could be used as holding facilities until transportation to the nearest treatment center could be arranged.

The bill also provides a comprehensive network of alcoholism prevention, treatment and rehabilitation services, to be coordinated through the Texas Commission on Alcoholism.

Kazen in Washington

"Chick" Kazen, M.C.

I welcome with one minor reservation the President's new effort to eliminate waste and fraud from the federal government. My reservation is that the White House has said it is the major effort of the week. I would hope that the government and the citizens would maintain that effort through the months and years to come.

Investigations have shown that billions of dollars of taxpayer's money goes astray. The new President's Council on Integrity and Efficiency in Government can find work to do at once, and certainly we must welcome the White House plan to launch a major war on mismanagement and fraud. Not only are the intent and value of government programs undermind, but the character of cheaters hurts them as well as all of us. The new effort will put inspectors general in all government agencies, with instructions to begin criminal and civil actions to protect the government and all honest citizens.

GAO ESTIMATE ALARMING

The Genreal Accounting Office has said that the federal government can save up to \$4.3 billion by taking action against violators already identi-

fied. ONe congressional study found that \$95 billion has been lost since 1979 in uncollected debts due the federal government. I have referred before to one sample violation—the failure of many students to repay government education loans. There was a report on wasted welfare funds that was waste itself, because inadequate action was taken to check welfare frauds, so the money spent on the strudy brought no return.

I have no doubt that the CETA pro gram, designed for civilian employment training purposes, was an idea with merit, but administration has not been effective enough to prevent much of the job money actually being wasted.

SOME BUYING WASTEFUL

We have found examples of government departments multiplying their purchases toward the end of each fiscal year. In 1980, the House ordered that no more than 20 percent of a epartment's funds could be spent in the last two months of a fiscal year. That limitation was placed in four bills after we became convinced that some departments pushed late spending to use up funds and thus strengthen their claims for more money in ensuing years. However, the restriction was not included in the Senate bills, or in the confrerence so the provision was dropped.

Buying practices can stand close scrutiny, too. The general accounting office has said that the Department of Defense could save some billions of dollars by closer scrutiny of its purchasing methods, and certainly we have been concerned about the justification of many costs over-runs. These occur when a contractor bids on a job, only to come back later and say that he needs more money to finish orders for a ship, planes, or vehicles. Sometimes the Congress has little choice but to vote supplemental appropriations to finish a job, because the alternative is to write off large sums already spent that would be wasted if a project is not completed.

NEED CITIZEN SUPPORT

The whole program needs widespread citizen support. The person who gets food stamps he does not deserve, or fails to repay a loan from the federal government, actually imposes on all his fellow Americans. I find it a proper action of government to combat faults in our systems.

I welcome, as I said, a major effort by the government to clean up its own operations. Other Presidents have taken aim at the same target with few favorable results. I just hope that the new administration can correct abuses of the past.

I said at the outset that I do not believe we should settle for a "waste and fraud week." As someone has said, let's make it a year, a decade or a century. All of us can beneit if fwe follow the Golden Rule and do unto others as we would do unto us.

The appropriations process is going well and should be coming to the House floor soon after you read this. Although we are certainly not in any kind of financial bind in the State of Texas, we are going to have to trim our budget this year from the original proposals. Cut-backs on the federal level, inflation, and no desire for a state tax increase, all mean that we'll have to expect fewer new state programs, positions, and expenditures this season.

There have been, and will be, some fascinating and exciting events recently in our far flung, nine-county district. Eagle Pass enjoyed a ground breaking ceremony for a new elementary school in the Seco Mines area. Brackettville is preparing for a gala Fort Clark Days Celebration on April 4. The Independent Cattlemen of Sutton County hosted a community banquet, and Val Verde County honored the one-millionth visitor at the Judge Roy Bean Center with a ceremony and a barbeque as only those Langtry folks can put on! I mention these particular events because they were all ones to which I was invited and would have loved to attend, had not my legislative duties in Austin prevented it. Please know that I would certainly be at each and every event if I could, but I feel that you would rather have me tending to the legislative beusiness at hand as you elected me to do, (even if I would much rather be enjoying a gala event with you!)



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HOW AND WHY OF TRANSPLANTING

While it's best to seed some vegetables directly in the home garden, others do best if transplanted.

In this area of Texas tomatoes, peppers and eggplant should always be set out in the garden as transplants. The resaon for this is the weather. These vegetables are somewhat fickle when it comes to ideal environmental conditions for setting fruit. Bloom and fruit set must occur before temperatures get too high. Setting out transplants after danger of all frost allows these plants to bloom during ideal conditions and to set a bountiful harvest during optimum weather.

You can also transplant such socalled "cool season" crops such as cabbage, cauliflower, broccoli, lettuce and onions. This allows them to mature under ideal conditions and also saves growing time in the garden. Using transplants can lessen the gar-

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den growing time by several months or more. However, setting out transplants of crops such as okra, squash, cucumbers and melons offers no real advantage and is usually not a recommended practice.

What about the "How" of transplanting? Handle transplants like eggs! Make every effort to avoid undue stress to young plants. Be sure plants do not suffer firm lack of moisture, wind damage or excessive heat prior to and immediately after transplanting.

Most plants that are available locally will be growing in plantable containers such as peat pots or peat cubes. If possible, plan to transplant during late afternoon or at least on a cloudy day. I personally think it's a good idea to set your transplants in a bucket or pan of water for several minutes prior to planting so the root system is thoroughly wet.

Determine the proper spacing for the crop and dig a hole 4 inches wide and 4 to 6 inches deep. Put about a cupful of water directly in the hole and allow it to soak in. Set the transplant in the center of the hole and fill in with soil. Make certain the peat container is completely beneath the soil level as it may act like a wick and rapidly dry out the rootball, thus killing the plant.

Depth of planting is important and often beginners make the mistake of setting plants too deep in the soil. Set most transplants only slightly deeper than they were originally growing. If tomato plants are tall and "leggy", plant them as shown in the accompanying drawing. If plant roots a re set too deep below the soil level, especially in heavy soils, they will be slow to grow and the plant will have to produce roots along the stem near the surface. The original roots may, or may not, grow eventually. Either way, the advantages of transplanting are lost and harvest may be delayed greatly.

When filling the hole with soil at planting, leave a slight depression around the plant to hold additional water from spot watering or from rainfall. Also protect young plants for a week or so from high wind and excessive heat. This can be done easily by placing a shingle, board, milk carton or some similar protection

on the windy and sunny side of the plant. A can placed around the transplant when it is set in the garden will also prevent damage from pesky cutworms.

So much for the are of transplanting. Next I'll go into greater detail on how to grow tomatoes like you've never grown them before.

KINNEY COUNTY HAS UNIQUE RECORD

Kinney County is one of 41 coundy ties inWest Texas with a unique rear cord: it has no herd under quarantine for brucellosis, records from the Texas Animal Health Commission re-

Brucellosis is a highly contagious disease of livestock. It centers in the reproductive organs and causes abortions, weakened calves, sterility and partial loss of milk production. A cooperative federal-state program is in effect to control and eventually eradicate this disease.

Texas is divided into two areas in its brucellosis program: A Class A Control Area and a Class B Control Area. There are 133 counties in the Class A Control Area, of which this county is a part. The Class A control area has less incidence of the disease than the Class B Control Area. Class A Control Area is in the western half.

"Producers in this county are to be commended for their efforts in controlling brucellosis. We are making progress throughout the state in our program, but cowmen in this county have already achieved the goal of no herds under brucellosis quaran-

"we would encourage producers to redouble their decication so that this county can continue with no this county can continue with nor herds under quarantine," Dr. John Holcombe, executive director, TAHC, Austin, said.

Other features of the Texas plan for brucellosis control include increased surveillance, improved laboratory system, certified free herd, and producer participation.
