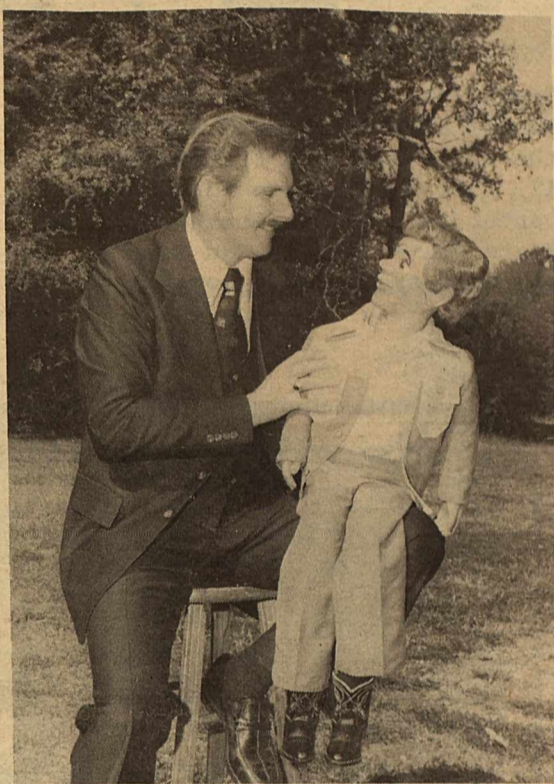

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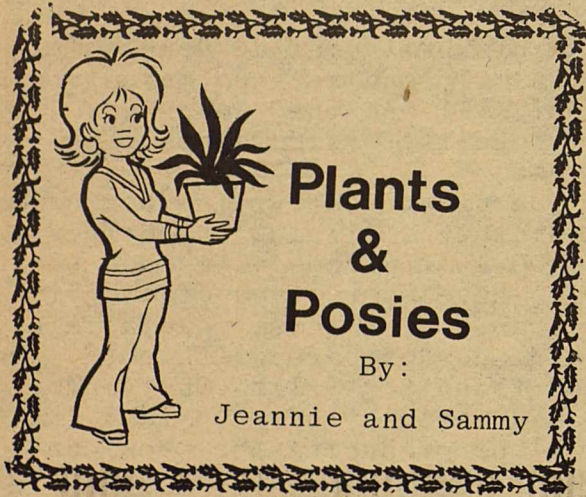

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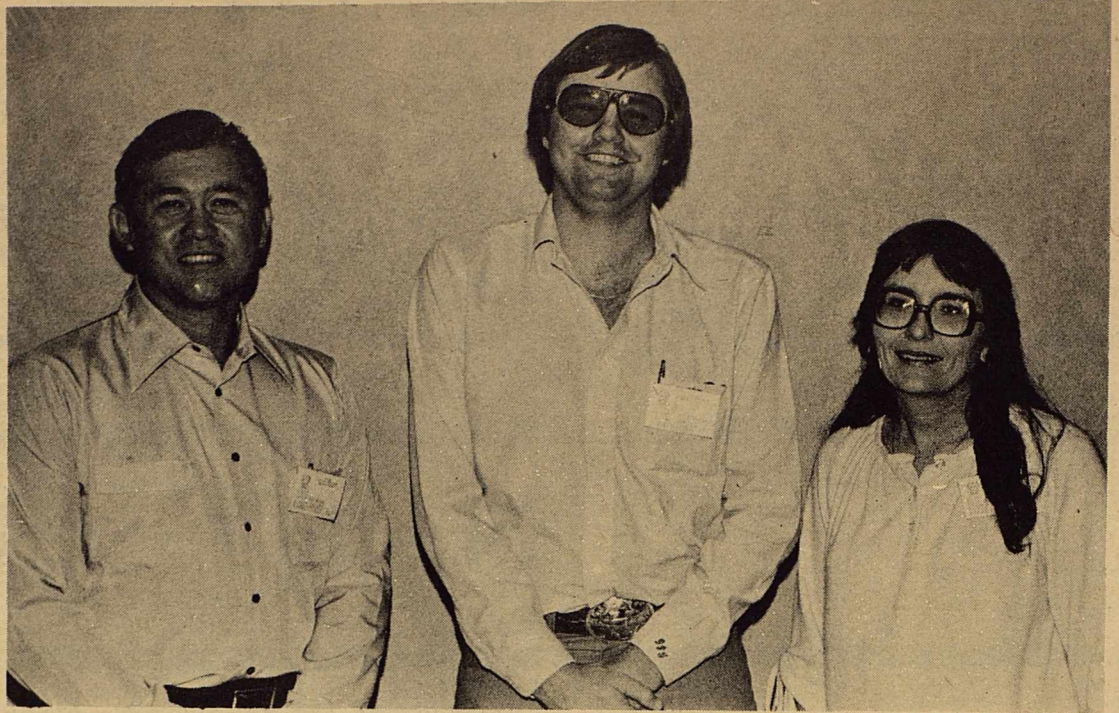

FICUS.. Moraceahe

There are about 800 species of
the genus Ficus (Latin for "Fig")
Most of these are natives of the
warmer parts of the world. Several
of them make good house plants,
but not the edible Fig. The Ficus
most often used indoors are prized
for their evergreen foliage. One
such species of the Ficus is the
Benjamina or Weeping Fig. It is
a small, graceful tree, useful
when young to mix with other plan-
tings. It will eventually grow
to about 6 feet in height with
its weeping, treelike appearance.
Weeping Figs need medium light
and does best in warm room temper-
atures. It needs moderately
watering, allowing only the top
1/2 inch of the potting mixture
to dryout between waterings.
Apply standard liquid fertilizer
every two weeks during the active
growing season.

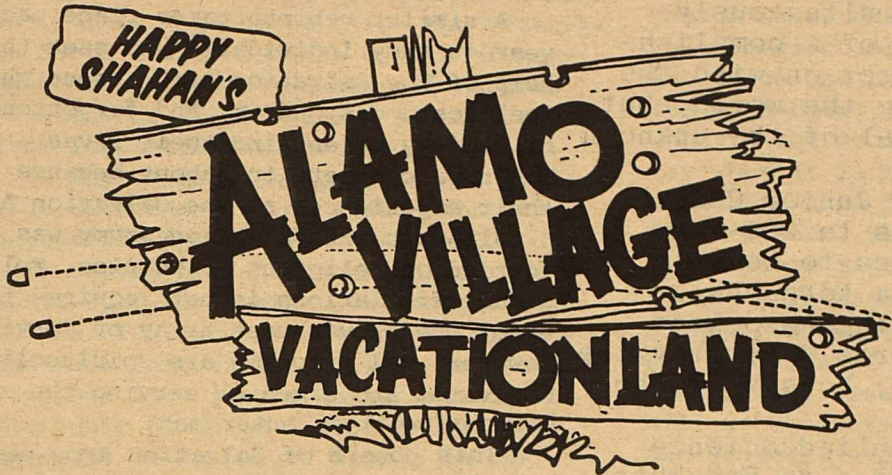

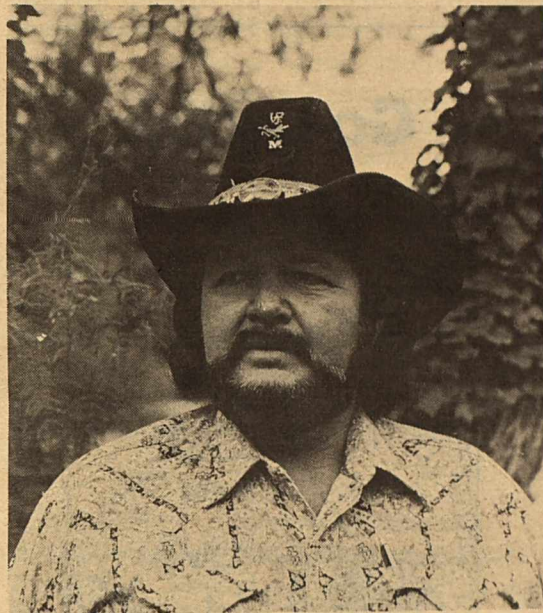
NURSE AID SHORT COURSE TO BEGIN

Kazen in Washington

Every now and then the people win a big one. This was the case for the veterans in South Texas when the Office of Management and Budget backed off threats to transfer vital veteran's services from San Antonio to Houston.

I may be that the OMB was not familiar with the size of Texas when it suggested that veterans in the 60 counties served by San Antonio simply shift over to Houston. I thought this was particularly remarkable in view of the fact that only San Diego and Norfolk Virginia have larger concentrations of seriously disabled veterans than San Antonio. It has never been a secret that the 23rd District has a great number of veterans who have paid their dues to the nation.

When I went to the floor of the House of Representatives to fight this proposal, I was immediately joined by Representatives G.V. "Sonny" Montgomery, the able and powerful Chairman of the House Veterans Affairs Committee.

"I certainly will look into this matter," he assured me during our conversation.

The next day I was informed by the Chairman that he had indeed contacted the OMB and that OMB Director David Stockman had directed the Veterans Administration not to move the services until Congress decides what it wants to do. He said if the Appropriations Committee includes funding for the service offices, the VA and the OMB will not object.

While nothing is ever certain in Congress, the House has traditionally been the champion of services to veterans and I would expect that every consideration will be given this matter. In the meantime, I am delighted to announce that these services will continue to be available much closer to home.

NEW LEGISLATION

I am pleased to report that I have co-sponsored a bill to extend the Older Americans Act for a three-year period. This legislation provides many services

for this nation's elderly which, taken together, enable them to remain self-sufficient and valued contributors to our society. It proposes modest spending for home-delivered meals to those most in need and would establish a new national toll-free information hotline for senior citizens. I hope our nation never reaches the point that we would neglect older persons, whose knowledge and experience are vital to the well-being of us all and who have contributed so much to making our country what it is today.

I have also joined with Congressman Charles Rose, Chairman of the House Agriculture Subcommittee on Tobacco Peanuts, in sponsoring a bill to assure adequate supplies of peanuts and peanut products to meet the food needs of consumers at reasonable prices. The bill is sponsored by the National Peanut Growers, and many South Texans have contacted my office in favor of it. The bill was referred to the House Agriculture Committee and I will report later on its progress.

CUTS IN EDUCATION

Look for a major battle when the Administration's proposal for a major shift in national education policy comes up for debate in the House Education and Labor committee. Under the legislation, a single block grant to the states would replace 44 separate programs and the funding amount would be reduced to \$1 billion next year. Some educators are already warning that the new, wider latitude given the states may result in even greater reductions particularly to big-city districts with large numbers of poor children. The other side of the argument is that the reduction in overhead now involved in federal supervision of the program may help make up the difference.

PRESIDENT REAGAN

I think we were all relieved that the President looked so well during the appearance before the House of Representatives. We had all read that he was in good health after the tragic shooting incident, but it was good to know that he had recovered so rapidly. He did a good job in outlining the economic difficulties facing our nation. Debate over the budget began last week, but there were no votes. I will discuss the budget at length next week.

Spotlight on HEALTH

Summer Vacations and Fall Epidemics

Children returning from summer camp sometimes bring home more than the pot holders they made in arts and crafts.

In recent years there have been increasing numbers of epidemics of head lice among children at camps. The director of the Parasitic Diseases Division of the Center for Disease Control (CDC), has observed, "there is ample opportunity for transmission during the summer when children may become infested while at summer camp, or while vacationing in another state or another country."

Writing in a professional journal for nurses, one camp nurse describes her bout with the problem and how the camp staff helped to solve it, working with the local health department.

The nurse writes that "pediculosis is easily transferred from person to person in camps and schools," so that when she noticed a six year old girl scratching her head, she checked—carefully. Close inspection revealed head lice and their nits (eggs). Checking the heads of other children and counselors she found that they, too, had been infested. Plans to handle the problem were mapped out at a staff meeting. Everyone was assigned a role.

Each camper was given a clean, dry towel and all heads were vigorously shampooed for four minutes with Kwell Shampoo. Combs,



barrettes, afro picks and bobby pins were soaked in solutions of the shampoo. Fine tooth combs were used to remove any remaining nits from the children's heads.

Clothing, washable head gear and bed linen were put into plastic bags, labeled and sent to the local laundry. A special spray which kills lice and their nits on furniture and bedding (R&C Spray) was used for anything that could not be washed or dry cleaned.

Children with a history of allergies, especially eczema, were watched for any adverse reactions to the shampoo or the spray.

A note to parents explained what had been done and they were asked to check for nits once the campers were at home. Camp visitors were also notified.

Although head lice outbreaks are often associated with the opening of school, the CDC specialist has suggested that there is greater recognition of the problem when school nurses examine children's heads looking for lice. Therefore, he advises, routine examinations in camps and schools can halt the problem before it really starts.

DAYLIGHT SAVINGS TIME IS BARBECUE TIME

Turkey, the all-American bird, is becoming a VIP at that all-American banquet, the barbecue.

And May, National Barbecue Month, is a great time to take a turkey to your table. Thanks to frozen foods, turkey is available all year round in a wide selection of sizes. An all-white meat Butterball turkey breast and Swift's new Li'l Butterball turkeys (four-to-ten pounders) can provide a cornucopia for cook-out creativity.



Place a thawed and rinsed unstuffed turkey on the grill over hot coals. Place an aluminum foil drip pan under it to catch the juices. To help keep the bird moist and add to the taste, add half a can of Pabst Blue Ribbon beer to the drip pan. Cover and cook till meat thermometer inserted in thigh reads 185°. Sun Facts and Fancies

Too much sun can do more than give you a suntan. Years of overexposure may be harmful to your skin.

Working or playing long hours in the sun may cause premature aging, wrinkling, leathery texture and precancerous skin conditions. This is especially true of blondes, redheads, fair-skinned people and sunbelt dwellers.

Solar keratoses, a condition which in some cases may become malignant, may result from too much exposure over a long period of time. Its symptoms include irregular, red, usually painless patches, usually on the hands and face. People who have such symptoms should see their doctors. If not treated in time, solar keratoses may lead to skin cancer, the most common form of cancer among people.

A prescription drug from Hoffmann-La Roche is often prescribed with good results. It is available in solution and in cream forms.



If you spend long hours in the sun, beware of skin damage.

Only a physician can diagnose solar keratoses and prescribe proper treatment.

For most people with light skin, first exposure to the sun early in the season should not exceed ten to 15 minutes for each side, back and face. If you begin tanning later in the summer, first exposure should be shorter, particularly if you start in a climate sunnier than the one in which you live.

Increase exposure time by about a third each day. The time of day is also important. The sun's burning rays are most intense between 11 a.m. and 3 p.m.

SCREWORM WATCH

Continued success of the screwworm eradication program depends on individual livestock producer cooperation, Dr. John Holcombe, executive director, Texas Animal Health Commission, Austin, said recently.

"This is the time of the year we would normally expect to see an increase in screwworms throughout this area. Except for two cases reported this year, there is no major problem. But we don't want to become complacent. Those two cases, one in El Paso, the other in Sonora, remind us we can get in trouble again if we don't continue our area surveillance efforts," Dr. Holcombe said.

Texas Animal Health Commission personnel are continuing their efforts to monitor fly traps and to inform individual livestock producers in regard to the situation. "But it all comes down to the individual livestock producer. He is the one who must continue to check his livestock regularly, and submit suspected screw worm samples to the fly laboratory at Mission," Dr. Holcombe said.

Jack Schwartz of Leakey and Joe Bloodworth of Del Rio are two TAHC personnel working with livestock producers. Schwartz is in charge of the TAHC screwworm eradication program and Bloodworth is inspector and field man for the TAHC.

"We have seen an increase in recent weeks in the number of suspected screwworm samples submitted to the Mission fly lab. This is good news, and we want to emphasize this should continue. We are getting good cooperation from producers, especially in the affected areas, but we also need help from other cattlemen, too in sending samples," Schwarz said.

Kits for submitting samples are available from TAHC area offices and other outlets. They can be mailed postage-free.

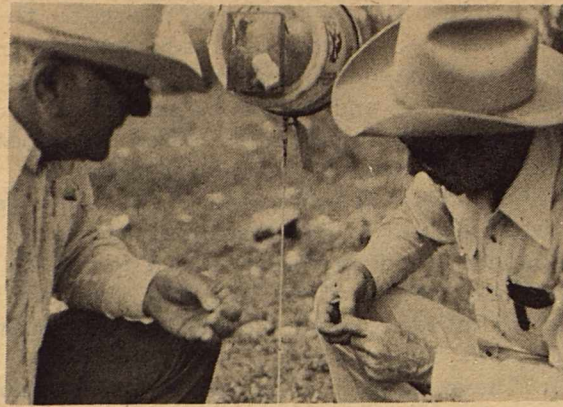

Search For A Lonely Legend

The search is on for a lonely legend roaming the South African bush. The effort to find and capture one of the world's most extraordinary animals, a King cheetah, is taking place mainly in the Kruger National Park, where three verified sightings have been reported in the past four years.

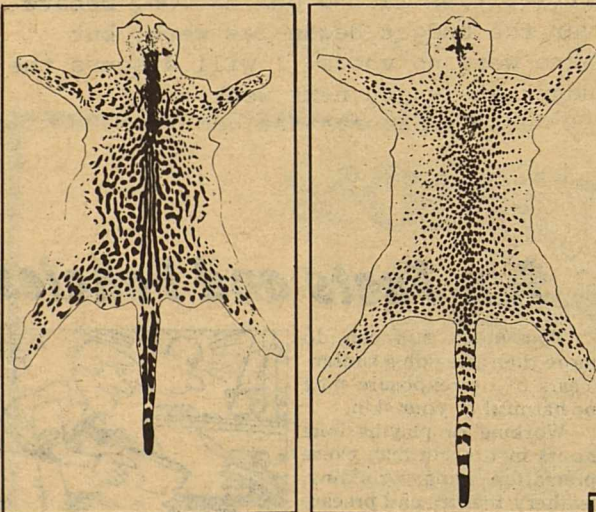
With the sleek racing lines of the cheetah, body markings more like a leopard's, and broad tiger-like stripes along its back, the big cat is a scientific puzzle. Not a single King cheetah has ever been captured alive for detailed study: indeed, since 1927 no more than 26 pelts and one skull are known to have been preserved. Reported sightings were spaced years apart.

British-born explorer Paul Bottriell and his Australian wife Lena have spent more than three years researching the King cheetah. But they still have more questions than answers. Is the animal a more nocturnal sub-species of the ordinary cheetah, living in more densely wooded habitat? Is it an aberrant form in which the markings of individuals found over thousands of square miles are strikingly similar?

Or is it the unthinkable—the progeny of a leopard and a cheetah? Leopards are known to kill cheetahs. However, Paul Bottriell says laboratory analysis of a King cheetah's hair shows it to be closer to a leopard's. And he claims that most of the King cheetah skins he has studied are bigger than the finely-spotted pelts of normal adult cheetahs.

Yet on two of the three occasions King cheetahs have been photographed, they have been in the company of cheetahs with standard markings, supporting the view that the King is a rarely but regularly occurring mutation.

If they can capture one, Paul and Lena Bottriell say they have been offered the use of properties, stocked with antelopes and other prey animals, suitable for studying the habits of the legendary King. Their dream is to capture a pair of King cheetahs—breeding them so that the mystery can finally be solved.



These line drawings of two cheetah skins, the King (left) and the common cheetah, were made by Paul Bosman, a leading South African wild life artist. He describes the King cheetah skins as very beautiful, the background not as dark as that of the common cheetah so that the bold black markings show up vividly, with the hair longer and darker than the normal cheetah's. Only four mounted skins of King cheetahs are on display in museums: Two in the British Museum of Natural History in London, one in the Natal Museum, Pietermaritzburg, and another in Cape Town's South African Museum.

TEXAS SHEEP & GOAT RAISERS ASSOCIATION

In what one association spokesman calls a "last resort" effort to overcome unfair marketing practices, the National Wool Growers Assn. recently filed a countervailing duties petition against New Zealand and Australian lamb meat imports.

NWGA has tried unsuccessfully for years to get a handle on unrestrained lamb imports, primarily from New Zealand. The latest action is an outgrowth of revelations by the USDA's Foreign Agriculture Service and NWGA's own investigators that the exporting nations pay outright subsidies on lamb meat shipped to the U.S.

In practical terms, the subsidy allows imported lamb to sell in the U.S. at an artificially low price and gives the imported product an unfair competitive advantage over domestic lamb.

U.S. law provides for a "countervailing duty" or compensation tax on such subsidized imports. The tax, equal to the amount of subsidy, simply takes up the slack between the subsidized price and what the imported product would sell for unaided on an open market.

NWGA spokesman Dan Murphy says the association's investigation indicates that the New Zealand subsidy runs about 15-20 percent of dollar value, Australia's about 10-15 percent. In other words, our American producers are having to compete with an imported product that sells for an average of 15 cents on the dollar cheaper than it should.

The decision of whether or not to impose countervailing duties rests with the federal government and will follow a government investigation into NWGA's charges. Murphy says that the investigation itself could prove valuable to the domestic lamb industry even if the feds rule against correcting the imbalance. Government investigators, he explains, will have access to records and information denied NWGA, "and may come up with a good deal more than we found." That information would be of considerable benefit in any future attempts to legislate a limit on lamb imports.

A 1979 bill to establish a lamb import quota died under pressure from the Carter Administration, but Murphy says another such measure may be introduced by late this year or early next year.

Meanwhile, the U.S. sheep industry continues to suffer the multiple indignities of subsidized competition from abroad compounded by longstanding government policies which aggravate the critical labor shortage, favor predators over their hapless prey and threaten to take millions of acres of rangeland out of productive use on the whim of environmental radicals. The Texas Sheep and Goat Raiser's Assn/ feels it's high time Washington removed some of the artificial impediments preventing the U.S. sheep industry from realizing its productive potential.

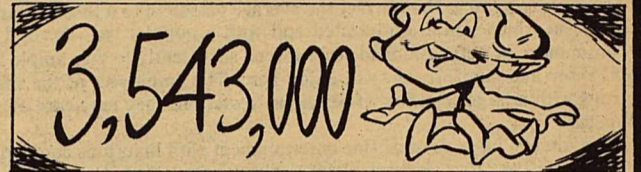

"The Social Security Administration is committed to uncovering fraud and prosecuting those who falsify records or conceal pertinent information in order to get benefits," Miss Fuentes said.

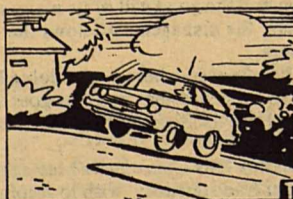

BETTER MILEAGE

Clothing Care ALERT!

FRESHEN YOUR FABRICS

When it is time to shine up your home, remember to give some attention to the household fabrics that add so much color and warmth to your rooms.

The following hints will help give you a home with fabrics as fresh as your crystal-clear windows and shining table-tops.

DRAPERIES: If available, follow cleaning and laundering instructions carefully. If in doubt, bring to your drycleaner who can check the fabric for drycleanability, a preferred cleaning method since curtains and draperies will last longer and look better when drycleaned.

A once-a-year cleaning is recommended by the International Fabricare Institute (IFI), the world-wide association of launders and drycleaners--specialists in maintaining fabrics.

COMFORTERS: Before you clean a comforter, repair all splits and broken seams and make sure the comforter is closely quilted, tied or tacked so the batting will not pull apart.

Hand clean heavily soiled areas before washing, or point out the soiled areas to your cleaner.

Soak the comforter in a detergent and water solution for 15 minutes to an hour with moderate agitation every five minutes.

Tumble comforters filled with down or other fine fibers.

Dry those containing



cotton batting in a cool tumbler.

Hang those filled with wool batting over a line to dry. Then fluff them in a cool tumbler.

CUSHION COVERS: Do not remove sofa and chair cushion covers for drycleaning. If the entire piece needs cleaning, bring in an upholstery cleaner.

Zippered cushions are designed to make it easy for the manufacturer to assemble the parts of the upholstered piece at the manufacturing plant--not for ease in cleaning by the consumer.

Unless a care label states that the cover can be separately drycleaned, leave the job to a professional or clean the cushion yourself with a wet surface shampoo process while the cover is on the foam cushion.

Cushion covers drycleaned separately sometimes will fray at the seams, shrink and become limp. After separate cleaning, the covers may not match the original color of the piece.

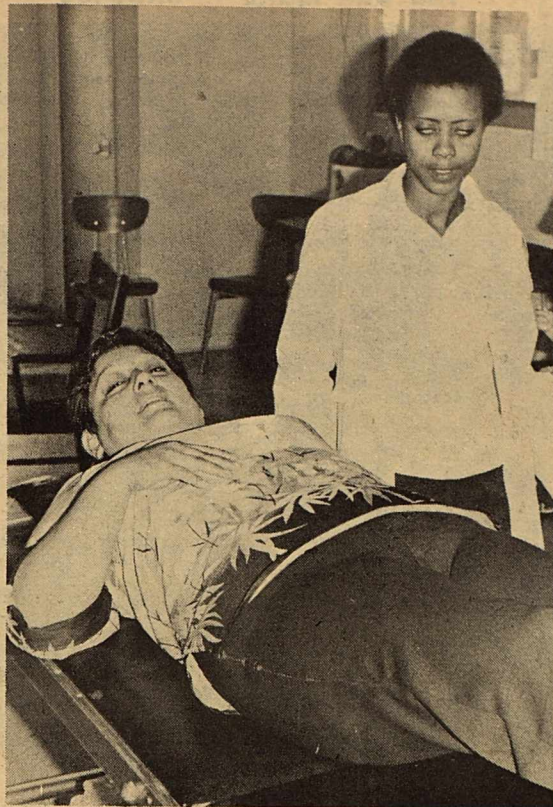

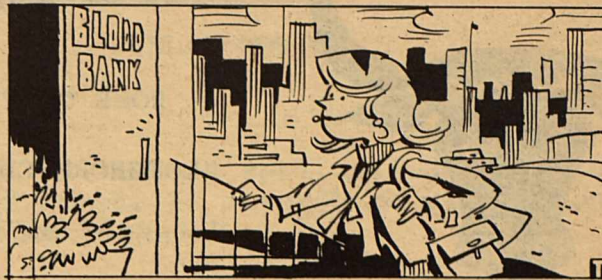


Little-Known Facts About Blood BANK ON BLOOD TO SAVE LIVES

There's a 95 percent chance that by the time you're 72 you'll have had a blood transfusion, or at least have had need for one of the products derived from this vital fluid. Transfusions were once used only to replace blood lost by the patient. Today advanced technology permits utilizing parts of the blood, as well as whole blood, for many different purposes. Thus, one pint can be used to treat one patient or many.

Almost anyone can be a blood donor, according to the American Blood Commission (ABC), a consortium of 40 national organizations. There are exceptions, based on health and medical conditions, but most reasons for turning away a donor are temporary. When you volunteer to become a donor, a medical history will determine any circumstances or conditions that might affect your eligibility.

Your body won't miss the blood for long. Within 24 hours, the normal volume of blood is restored. However, it takes about five weeks for all the red blood cells to be replaced. That's why you can donate blood

only every eight weeks.

Donor blood is kept in a blood bank. But even when stored under ideal conditions (refrigerated at just the right temperature and stored with the proper preservative), it has a legal use limit of 35 days. Becoming a donor pays dividends. By giving blood you assure adequate blood supplies for you, your family and your community. And not all transfusions or other uses for blood by-products are based on emergency situations. In fact, most medical and surgical needs are scheduled in advance.

Every minute of every day, five persons in the U.S. each need an estimated three pints of blood. Multi-

ply those 15 pints by the minutes in a day, and the total daily consumption becomes enormous.

The ABC is working to improve the efficiency and performance of the nation's blood-service system—a complex of individuals, institutions and organizations such as business, labor, consumers, the medical profession, scientific researchers, veterans and voluntary health associations.

Want to know where to give blood? Call your community blood center or hospital blood bank, or ask your doctor.

Don't underestimate the value of your donation. All types of blood are needed . . . all the time!

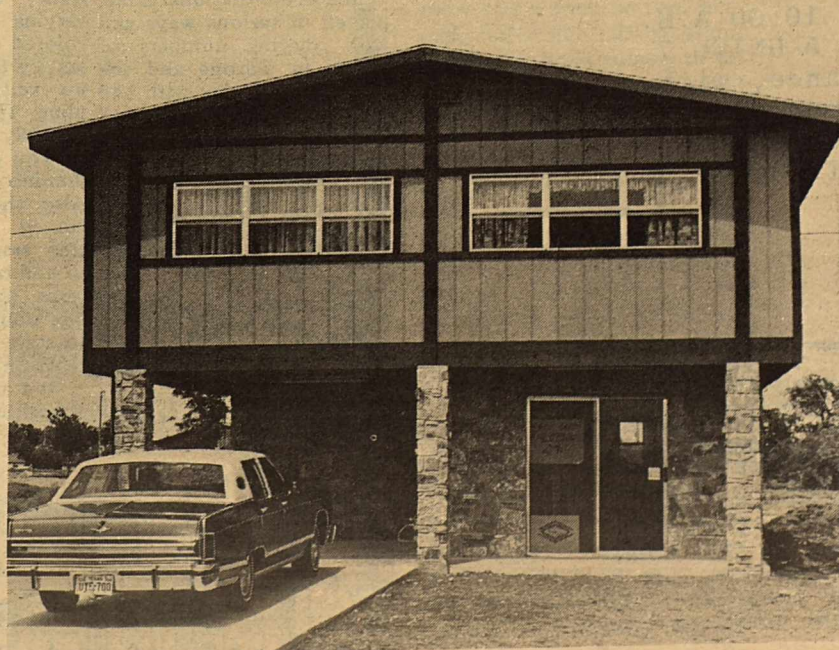

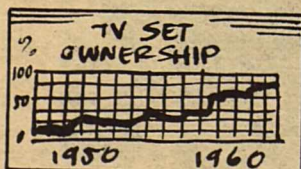

YOU'LL TUMBLE FOR THIS DOMINO GAME

Dominoes is probably one of the oldest games in town. The National Museum in Baghdad, Iraq, contains artifacts from Ur called "dominoes," dating back to 2450 B.C.

It's an international game, played in various ways and with varying numbers of pieces in Europe and the U.S. Eskimos play with 148 pieces, Europeans and Americans with only 28.

Dominoes are used not only as a game depending on proper arrangements of pieces with dots and blanks. Tumbling Dominoes is a popular test of skill. The greatest number of dominoes tumbled in a row—169,713—was achieved by 23-year-old Michael Cainery of London on June 9, 1979, at a tournament in Poughkeepsie, N.Y.

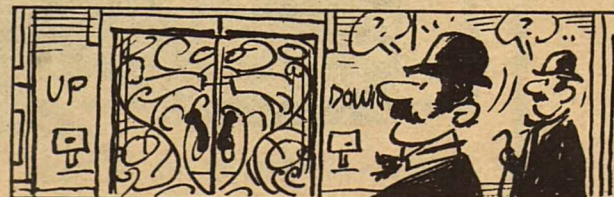
Now comes a new game that adds challenge and sophistication to domino tumbling: The Incredible Domino Rally by Mego. The game, which comes with varying numbers of multi-colored dominoes, lets players try their hand at setting up exciting patterns for toppling. There are four different rally sets.

You can make your own domino patterns, of course. Also there are straight or curved tracks, bridges, a stair stand and an elevator to add truly spectacular patterns to the action. Then one domino is flipped over to start the chain tumbling reaction.

The Texas Consumer Association Education Fund's Report from Austin

Call her Patricia Allison, though that's not her real name. She's been a Registered Nurse for 12 years, practicing her profession with the only doctor there is in this West Texas county.

Patricia says that people in her county need at least one more physician to handle the load, but none will come. It's the old problem — most doctors want to go where the money is and the lights are brightest. How are you going to lure them back to the country, after they've seen the River Oaks country club?

Texas has plenty of medical talent. Our need is to spread it more evenly around the state, to people living in poor neighborhoods and out to people living in the small towns and rural coun-

ties. Right now, more than 70% of Texas counties have been found to be "medically underserved," meaning they have a flat-out shortage of doctors, or they have a lot of elderly people and poor people with no medical facilities to cope with their chronic health problems. A few counties still have no doctor at all, much less a hospital or clinic.

What to do? One sensible solution is to make better use of the talents of Patricia Allison. She is one of more than 500 specially-trained, veteran nurses who have gone back to school to become "Advanced Nurse Practitioners." As a result of these education programs, nurses like Patricia are qualified to perform many of the routine medical

services that doctors now have to do — they can diagnose the minor illnesses, administer preventive care, counsel with patients and handle minor office surgery.

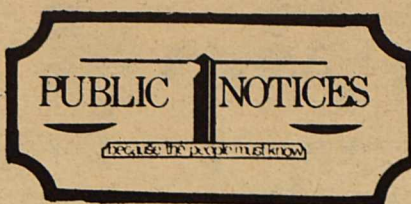
These super-skilled nurses can take up some of the slack in areas of doctor shortages, serving as sort of "surrogate doctors" in strict collaboration with a supervising physician. And the communities can afford them, since an Advanced Nurse Practitioner's average salary is under \$20,000, rather than the \$80,000 average yearly income of doctors.

Thirty-six states have adopted such a plan, and now Rep. Craig Washington and Sen. Chet Brooks have proposed HB 1059 and SB 575, which would allow Advanced Nurse Practitioners to get to work for us in Texas.

But the bill is stuck in committee, because the doctor's lobby, the Texas Medical Association, is out to kill it. "Only doctors can do what doctors do," they assert, claiming that nurses can handle bedpans but are not qualified to "play doctor." TMA lobbyists say that nurses will make mistakes and destroy the public's trust in the medical profession.

Hold on, say the nurses. First of all, we're being trained by some of the very professors who train you, and we might even show you a trick or two. Second, we're not talking about performing brain surgery or diagnosing rare cancers; we would handle things like flu cases, cuts and bruises, physical exams, initial patient screenings and some consultations. Third, even this work would be supervised by a physician. According to the nurses, various studies show that 60% or more of the cases that walk in a doctor's office can easily be handled by a nurse practitioner, and at about half the cost a doctor would charge.

What's your opinion? Is HB 1059 a good prescription for some of our health needs in Texas? The ANP bill has passed the Senate, but it is locked in the Government Organization Committee of the House right now, and you can tell them what you think about it by writing to the committee chairman at this address: Rep. FAMOUS COOKBOOK CELEBRATES ITS 50TH

***Brownies Cockaigne**
Preheat oven to 350 degrees
Melt in a double boiler:
½ cup butter
4 oz. unsweetened chocolate
Cool this mixture. If you don't, your brownies will be heavy and dry. Beat until

light in color and foamy in texture:

4 eggs at 70 degrees
¼ teaspoon salt
Add gradually and continue beating until well creamed:

2 cups sugar
1 teaspoon vanilla

With a few swift strokes, combine the cooled chocolate mixture and the eggs and sugar. Even if you normally use an electric mixer, do this manually. Before the mixture becomes uniformly colored, fold in, again by hand:

1 cup sifted all-purpose flour

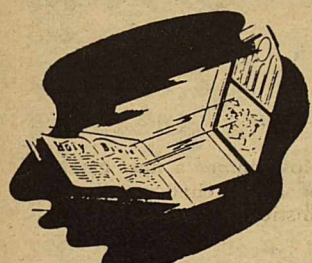
And before the flour is uniformly colored, stir in gently:

1 cup pecan meats

Bake in a greased 9x13-inch pan about 25 minutes. Cut when cool, as interiors are still moist when fresh from the oven. Garnish with whipped cream, ice cream or an icing.

Irma Rombauer felt one of the finest testaments to JOY came in a telegram from an eloping bride to her family: "Am married—order announcements—send me a Rombauer cookbook at once."
