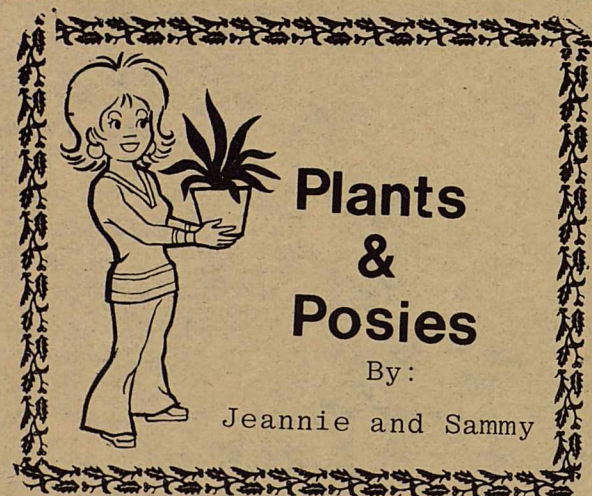

CALADIUMS

Caladiums are tuberous-rooted
plants with heart or arrow shaped
leaves rising on the long stalks
directly from the tubers (nick-
names are heart of Jesus, ele-
phant ears) There are dozens of
varieties and colors available.
All caladiums enjoy high humidity
to maintain healthy foliage.
When grown as an indoor plant,
mist frequently or set pot on a
bed of moist pebbles to provide
extra humidity.

Caladium leaves are paper thin
on a leaf stalk of 12-15 inches.
The life bright light, but must
not be in direct sunlight. If
kept indoors, do not expose to
drafts. As caladiums are tropical
plants, they do like water. Water
enough to keep the potting mix-
tures evenly moist. As the leaves
begin to die down, reduce water-
ing. Give the tubers a rest period
of at least 5 months from early

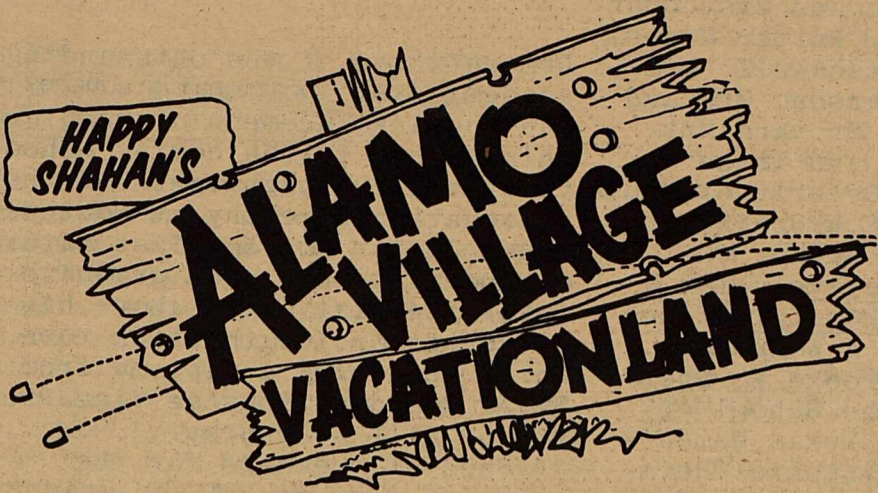

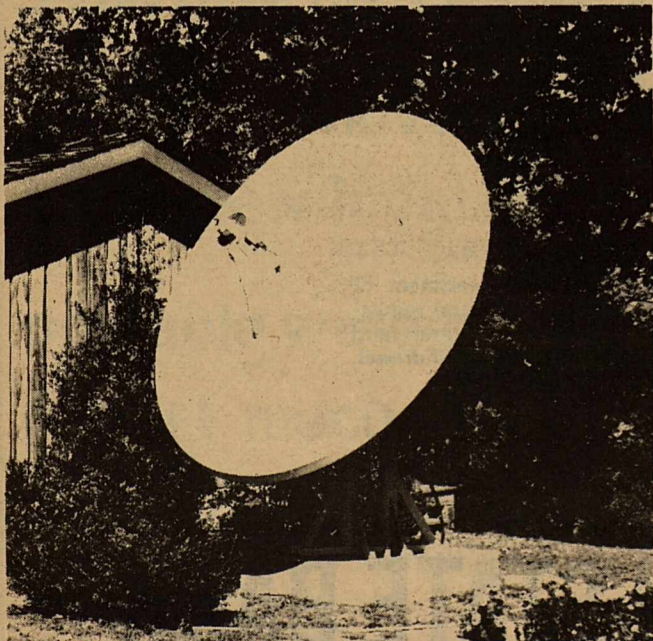
Benson, a 6', 180 lb. defensive linebacker, comes from Cypress Creek High School where he played for Coach John Baker.

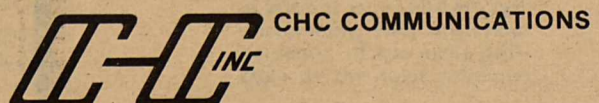


Special speakers for the occasion were two of the graduates who had won a speech contest for the honor of speaking at the graduation.

FIVE BRACKETTVILLE HIGHWAY DEPT MEMBERS ACCUMULATE 53 YEARS ACCIDENT FREE DRIVING

Some 53 years of accident-free driving were recognized when 5 members of the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation's Brackettville Maintenance Section were presented with special driving awards.

The employees were honored at a district-wide ceremony held in Del Rio May 6, with guest speaker H.O. Evans, Director of Training and Development Section in Austin. Other department representatives attending from Austin include Ray Brown, Assistant Engineer of Safety and Maintenance Operations, Jim Arceneaux, Insurance Division Field Representative and Quinner Williams, Director of Insurance Division. The program was followed by a barbeque luncheon.

James R. (Bobby) Evans, District Engineer presented individual awards to employees: Agapito Saenz, 23 years; Jose J. Cruz, 15 years; Antonio Cruz, 10 years; John R. McClure, 4 years, and Eduardo Garcia for 1 year.

In 1980, District 22 had 3 accident for 2,091,339 vehicle miles, which rated number two in the least number of accident in the 25 district. For the past four years District 22 has maintained a statewide enviable record for safe driving, being in the first and second place for having the least number of accidents.

The district conducts an on-going safety program that contributes to this fine record. Evans commended the employees "for countless savings of taxpayer dollars in possible equipment damages, and personal injuries."

KINNEY COUNTY MINERAL LEASE SEMINAR SET

Participants in an upcoming mineral royalty seminar will have the opportunity to gain insight into the legal nature of oil and gas lease arrangements, tax planning and the windfall profits tax.

The seminar will be held Thursday, May 28, at the Brackettville Civic Center, according to Carl Esser, Kinney County Extension Agent.

Esser says the program will begin at 7:30 p.m. with a discussion to "Oil and Gas Lease Arrangements from the Landowner's Viewpoint" by William J. Fambrough, oil and gas attorney from Texas A&M University. The popular lecturer has appeared on similar mineral lease programs across the State.

After a refreshment break, Fambrough will continue the topic before Charles Bondurant, tax attorney from San Antonio, begins an analysis of "Taxation of Oil and Gas Interests." Bondurant, another participant on the recent mineral royalty seminar circuit will address "Income, Estate Inheritance and Windfall Profit Tax".

Fambrough and Bondurant will close out the session with a question/answer session. They will also be available for individual consultation.

"Our county program building committee felt this type of program would assist county landowners making decisions concerning leasing their property for mineral exploration," explained Esser. "We believe this is a very important program which could have a sizable impact on the impact on the economic future should large amounts of petroleum reserves be discovered in Kinney County."

Esser said interested persons call his office at 563-2442 for more details.

SPRING TURKEY HUNTING: A NEW EXPERIENCE--AMPLE GOBBLERS EXPECTED THIS FALL

UVALDE--If you're looking for an exhilarating outdoor spring sport, turkey hunting may be right up your alley. However, if you haven't already bagged your gobbler for the season, it's too late. But, this fall there should be plenty of the colorful bearded creatures to go round.

Conditions for fall gobbler hunting appear pretty good, provided a repeat of 1980 weather conditions doesn't occur, according to a Texas Agricultural Extension Service wildlife specialist headquartered in Uvalde.

"Spring rains have brought on an abundance of forbs for wild turkeys to feed on," says Dr. Dwight Guynn. "We're expecting good flocks from the positive conditions this spring. Our most immediate concern is the loss of nests from flooded area. Barring a repeat of 1980 we should have a productive turkey season this fall."

Spring turkey hunting is a relatively new sport in Texas, but one with a traditionally large following in portions of the Southeast and along the East Coast. In Texas, the spring hunting season last only about two weeks in counties that have established a legal hunting periods. Many counties don't have such seasons.

Wildlife biologists agree that spring hunting provides a superb recreational opportunity

for sportsmen while causing no detrimental effect to turkey production.

In addition, Guynn points out, a spring season for gobbler harvest represents a potential additional income source for land owners and provides recreational activity for hunters during the spring sports lull when few creatures besides varmints are available for hunting.

Guynn says one gobbler can mate to as many as a dozen hens during a normal breeding season, which is usually completed by the time spring hunting season opens. Hence, many gobblers have performed their mating functions and are then expendable.

Legally, one gobbler per hunter is the spring season limit. But why all the ruckus for just one bird?

"It's quite an accomplishment to call a gobbler," explains Guynn. "They are very wary, cunning birds and it requires considerable skill to overcome their natural wariness and instincts. To do this is very difficult. This sport matches the hunter's skill against a magnificent game bird."

To better understand what's involved in a spring "turkey shoot", a biological orientation to a turkey's mating habits is helpful.

"Gobblers roost in trees, making their traditional "gobbling" sounds in the early morning hours," continues Guynn. "The natural procedure is for the hens to go to the gobbler in response to his mating call. However, the spring turkey hunter must overcome this natural instinct and make hen calls seductive enough to entice the gobbler to search for the caller. This is very challenging because it pits man against the gobbler and involves convincing the old tim to seek out a reluctant hen--something he doesn't ordinarily have to do."

Spring hunting offers hunter a decided advantage--more gobblers over a larger area. During fall turkey seasons (which overlaps white-tailed deer season) the flocks winter in Southwest Texas on a relatively small number of ranches. Many hunters seldom see the birds unless they happen to be on their deer leases. Yet, flocks scatter during the spring spreading over a larger area, making themselves more available to hunters.

Despite the fact that Texans spend countless hours and dollars in pursuit of the elusive white-tailed deer, turkey hunting has yet to gain such popularity.

In fact, says Guynn, many Texans are basically unfamiliar with spring gobbler hunting and the specialized hunting techniques required. "You can't hunt turkeys in the spring like you do most animals," he stresses.

Besides the calling expertise required, hunting turkey hens is illegal. These females, Guynn emphasizes, are the breeding factory of the flock. This, plus the fact that only one gobbler can be taken per season, increase the challenges of the sport.

A convocation ceremony for high school students who were selected to participate in the Upward Bound Program at Southwest Texas Junior College during the 1980-81 academic year was held in the Matthews Student Center Saturday May 9, immediately following the college's regular graduation ceremony.

The Upward Bound program was designed for students who exhibit college potential but might, for a variety of reasons, be discouraged from attending college. The students were selected from eleven Southwest Texas high schools on the basis of family income criteria and, primarily, on their potential for academic success in institutions of higher learning.

Highlights of the graduation program were the presentation of various special awards.

Certificates of progress were awarded to students who showed the most improvement in reading skills, English skills, and mathematics skills. Pre- and post-test scores in these academic areas on the "Sanford Test of Academic Skills" were used to determine the winners. The pre-test was given on May 1, 1980; and the post-test on May 2, 1981.

Certificates of outstanding service were then presented to Mariano Hernandez of Brackettville and Laura Jones of Uvalde.

Sixty-one students completed the Upward Bound program. The following are the students who received Certificates of Participation from Brackettville: Mario Martinez, Mariano Hernandez Terri Sandoval, Sonia Lincon and Manuel Garcia.

Instruction will be offered in composition/research; creative writing; chemistry; biology; algebra; trigonometry/calculus; beginning spanish; government; academic/career individual and group counseling; psychology; interpersonal relationship; journalism; dancing and swimming.

Approximately sixty-five students will participate in the summer component.

RANCHER'S ROUNDUP LURES TOP SPEAKERS LARGE TURNOUT EXPECTED

DEL RIO--Texas Agriculture Commissioner Reagan Brown heads the list of 110 speakers from seven prominent ranching states set to address hundreds of ranchers and landowners during the International Rancher's Roundup set for August 10-14 in this border city.

The event is being organized by Texas Agricultural Extension Service personnel in Uvalde. Co-chairmen A.L. Hoermann and Larry White, Extension livestock and range specialists, respectfully,

said other dignitaries including U.S. Agriculture Secretary John Block, Texas Governor Bill Clements and U.S. Congressman "Kika" de la Garza are not yet confirmed because of pending legislative action in Washington and Austin.

Representatives from about two dozen of this state's leading ranches will have active parts on the program. These include Alta Verde Industries, Chaparral Ranch, Dolan Creek Ranch, Johnston Ranch, King Ranch, Maltzberger Ranch, Shahan Ranches, Shelton Enterprises, Jimmy Powell Ranch and Welge Ranch.

Experts from Angeb State, Kansas State, Nebraska, New Mexico State, Oklahoma State, Texas Tech and Texas A&M Universities will have prominent roles in the broad-based forum. Six producer groups, two international concerns and eight state-federal agencies will be represented.

The chairmen said ranching delegations from Mexico; Australia; New Zealand; and South Africa will visit during the week to discuss their respective nation's ranching situations and how American producers can help them. During daily general sessions the development and maintenance of

foreign markets will be highlighted along with the long-term outlook for the ranching industry as affected by government policy and world-wide economic changes.

Daily concurrent sessions will be geared to improved management of beef cattle, sheep and goats, working ranch horses, range resource conservation, wild-life, ranch business and mineral lease agreements, they noted.

Two day-long tours of progressively managed ranches in South west Texas and Northeast Mexico are being coordinated. Nightly entertainment after educational sessions has also been planned.

The chairman stresses that the deadline for pre-registration has been set for June 30. Individuals who register before that date will be assessed a tax-deductible fee of \$125 and a couple, \$150. After the June 30 deadline respective fees will increase by \$50.

These registration fees, the specialists point out, are much less than those charged for similar conferences having less educational opportunities.

"We are very excited over the quality and number of Roundup speakers," the chairmen said. "This could become the largest, most comprehensive conference for ranchers ever held in the Southwest."

Neither the House Committee Budget, which I supported, nor the Reagan Administration--Office of Management and Budget proposal, better known as the Gramm-Latta budget, carried guarantees to cure the economy but it appeared to many of us that the shortest path to a balanced budget was a straight line to the smaller deficit of the Committee budget.

Although spending levels were almost even, this proposal presented by Chairman Jim Jones of the House Budget Committee was based on a more realistic tax structure designed to balance the budget in 1983. It included major spending reduction, a \$30 billion tax cut and a reduced deficit.

The American people have consistently placed the highest priority on balancing the budget and our experts believe this proposal would have attained it in 1983, while reducing interest rates which are stifling small businesses and consumers alike.

The Gramm-Latta proposal would lead to a balanced budget in 1984--one year later--at least in theory. It also anticipates a budget deficit six or seven billion dollars more than the Budget Committee plan and assumes passage of the controversial Kemp-Roth version of tax reductions.

Significantly, the financial markets, where President Reagan maintains great personal support were among the first to sound the alarm over the Reagan economic assumptions that the administration budget would solve inflation and unemployment and reduce interest rates. Fear of continued economic distress had the markets in turmoil last week. Even Treasury Secretary Donald Regan, a Reagan Administration recruit from Wall Street, said he expects continued high interest rates and a slow-down in business over the next few months.

Regan said it appears that the federal deficit in the current fiscal year will probably be about \$60 billion--despite the goal of the Office of Management and Budget to hold the deficit to less than \$55 billion.

The Jones Bill, I believe would have cut out the waste and fat in federal spending, provided a tax cut for middle-income Americans and response to the public demand for spending, provided a tax cut for middle income Americans and responded to the public demand for spending cutbacks and a balanced budget. The future under the Administration budget is clearly in question. What we do know is that we have a binding order to make severe cuts which will no doubt pit critical pro-

grams against each other. The effects on school children, agricultural, veterans, and senior citizens will be discussed in the coming weeks.

Now that the deed has been done, we can only hope and pray this experiment will be successful. We must work together in an attempt to balance the budget under the program we have and do our best to make economic recovery a reality.

LIBYA ORDERED OUT

Now that the first major action has been concluded on the budget Congress and the nation must turn their attention back to other pressing problems. Grave energy concerns, which are also controlling factors over our economy, our defense and our way of life, have not gone away. As Congress debated the budget, the U.S. ordered Libya to remove its diplomats from this country.

This was the result of Libya's continued support of international terrorism. Libya, closely allied with Moscow, is the third largest foreign supplier of oil to the U.S. Although oil market supplies are sufficient at present to reduce our vulnerability

to a cutoff, we realize this is a temporary condition and we must produce more domestic oil and continue to search for alternative sources of energy.

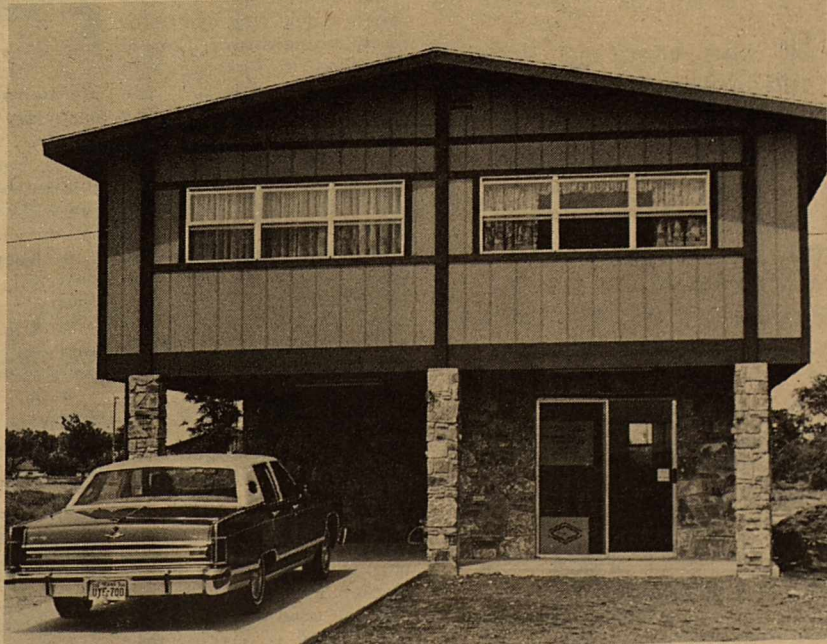
JAPAN AFFECTS ECONOMY

Prime Minister Suzuki of Japan arrived in Washington for talks last week that may have far-reaching effects on the U.S. economy. The immediate concern, of course, is trade. Our own industry has been thrown into turmoil by Japanese imports. We are hoping for an agreement that is fair to both sides or, at the least, an improvement in the trade practices that place restrictions on U.S. goods while allowing Japanese automobiles to flood the markets.

A recent note of interest to me was to learn that Japanese investors have a controlling interest in at least 213 U.S. manufacturing companies as of the end of 1980. One reason the Japanese have been successful in business is that little of their own money is spent for defense. I was pleased to learn recently that Japanese defense spending, while still low, is on the increase. Ironically, the Japanese have depended on the United States in that critical area of the world. I think the time has come for them to become full partners in their own defense.

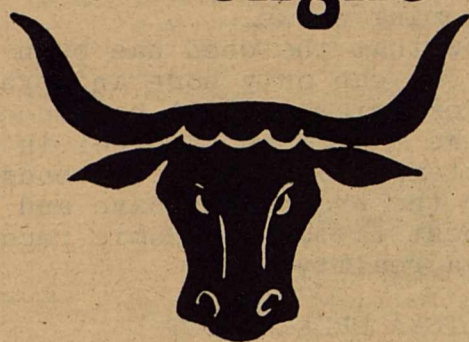

Carl Esser--County Extension Agent PROPER EQUIPMENT FOR DEFENSE

It's safe to say that if insects and diseases are not a problem in your garden right now, chances are they will be before long.

You may or may not want to use chemicals for pest control. This is one of the real advantages of growing your own vegetables. You can do it any way you want to! Plant by the moon, sprinkle irrigate, choose your own varieties, or garden without pesticides. It's your garden and you make the decisions.

For the sake of today's column, let's assume that you're one of the large number of local gardeners who will choose to control garden pests using cleared and recommended chemicals. Proper use of chemicals poses no threat to you or the people who enjoy eating vegetables from your home garden. However, if the label on the chemical product you use says one teaspoon per gallon of water, that what it means. If the label says to wait three days after spraying before harvesting, it doesn't mean you have to wait a week or more. Follow directions on the container to the letter. If you do this, you won't have any problems with possibly dangerous chemical residues.

Using chemicals for pest control generally means "spraying" to most gardeners. Therefore, you are going to need a sprayer of some type depending on garden size location, layout and intended use.

Sprayers used most often in local gardens are compressed air and hose-on sprayers. Compressed air sprayers are mobile, self-contained units that are pressurized by periodic pumping. They come in various sizes and are made of either plastic, galvanized steel or longer-lasting stainless steel. An obvious advantage of compressed air sprayers is that they are completed portable. However, this portability is directly propor-

tional to your strength. In other words, a 5 gallon compressed air sprayer is heavy and unless you're physically able to lift and tote it around, don't try it. If your garden is small, a 2 gallon sprayer is probably all you'll need.

a hose-on sprayer is attached to the end of a hose, from which it receives its pressure. It's popular because it's light and doesn't need repressurizing by periodic pumping.

The main disadvantage of a hose on sprayer is that it can only reach the length of of your garden hose. Another problem arises in mixing ingredients. These sprayers operate on the principle of siphoning a concentrated amount of material and mixing it with a stream of hose water. To be easily siphoned, the mix must be liquid yet many insecticides and fungicides are in the wettable powder form. Although these materials are meant to be suspended in water, thorough mixing is difficult sometimes. To avoid some of the problems of plugging up the sprayer, it's a good idea to pre-mix wettable powder pesticide in a small bowl. This helps assure that large particles are broken up and will not clog the siphoning hose.

Regardless of the type of spray you use, it's important that you keep it in good condition.

Rinse it thoroughly after each use to avoid future problems. If you use a compressed air sprayer, store it bottom side up with the hose drained.

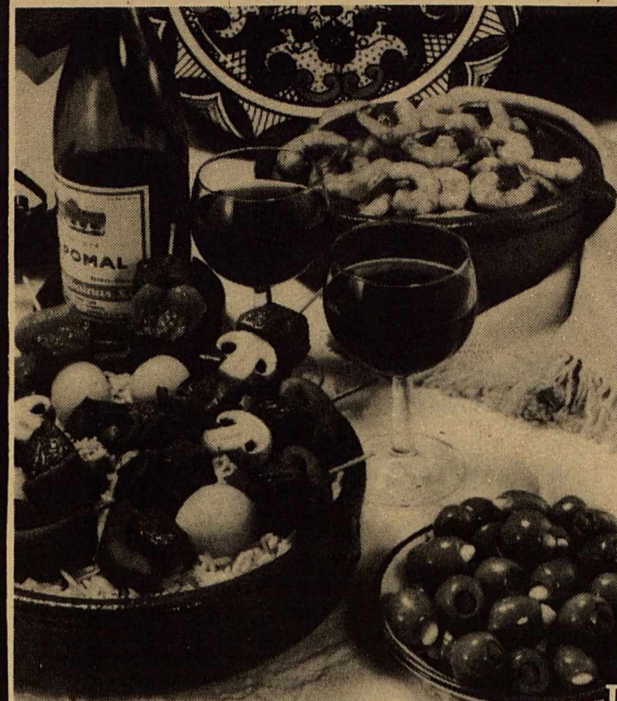
Safe and proper use of garden chemicals can help most of you have a more productive garden. However, you must always use only recommended chemicals, treat only when necessary, follow label directions, and remember to take care of your equipment.

PINCHOS RIOJA

- 3/4 Vina Pomal, red Rioja wine
- 1/4 cup olive oil
- 4 cloves garlic, finely chopped
- 1 bay leaf
- 2 teaspoons sugar (optional)
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon grated lemon or orange peel
- 1/8 teaspoon pepper
- 1 pound beef cubes, cut into 1-inch pieces
- Pinchos Vegetables*

In shallow baking dish, combine first 8 ingredients. Add beef and marinate at room temperature 1 hour (or cover and refrigerate several hours), stirring occasionally.

Drain marinade into saucepan. Cook, over moderate heat until liquid is reduced to about half.

Meanwhile on 6-inch skewers, alternately thread beef and Pinchos Vegetables. Grill or broil to desired doneness, turning and basting occasionally with marinade. Yields about 10 skewers.

*Pinchos Vegetables—Select any combination of the following, allowing about 3 pieces per skewer: cherry tomatoes, mushroom caps, small onions (par-cooked), green or red pepper chunks.

SAFETY DO'S AND DON'T'S

America today is a nation of do-it-yourselfers when it comes to fixing up "the old homestead", both to stretch the home improvement budget and for personal satisfaction. Because this is a new way of life for many homeowners, Cooper The Toolmaker suggests these guides to sensible precaution against the unexpected:

- Wear goggles whenever there's danger of flying wood or metal; add a mask in dusty conditions.

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STATE FIRE MARSHALL OPENS NEW OFFICE

AUSTIN--The State Fire Marshall's office, State Board of Insurance will open two new regional office in Lubbock and Corpus Christi in May. The first two regional office were opened last year in Huntsville and Duncanville.

William P. Davies, Jr., Chairman of the State Board of Insurance (the agency under which the State Fire Marshall's Office operates), said the opening of the two new offices is part of a continuing effort to regionalize the operations of the State Fire Marshal.

"We want our people spending more of their time helping local fire and law enforcement official and less of their time on the road," Daves said. The move toward regionalization is in line with recommendations for reorganization of the State Fire Marshal office presnted to the 1979 Texas Legislation, he siad.

State Fire Marshal Ernest A. Emerson said staffing and training procedures for the teo new offices will be similar to those developed for the Huntsville and Duncanville offices.

New personnel will be cross-trained to serve as both arson investigators and as fire inspectors," he siad.

The two offices will increase our capability to respond quickly when asked by local officials to assist in arson investigations," Emerson said. "Not only will local operations increase our efficiency but we hope these new offices will improve our communication with local officials and citizens."

Under authority of both the Texas Insurance Code and Vernon's Annotated Texas Statutes, the State Fire Marshal's Office is charged with the job of investigating and determining the cause and orgin of a fire whenever local officials ask assistance.

In addition to fire inviestigations, the State Fire Marshal's office conducts building inspections to assure that places of public assembly meet basic fire and life safety standards.

The Licensing Section is responsible for the licensing and regulation of companies that install, service or maintain portable or fixed fire extinguisher systems. This section also licenses and regulates companies that sell, install or maintain fire alarms. Under Vernon's Annotated Texas Statutes, the Licensing Section licenses the possession and sale of fireworks.

Other statutes of the State Fire Marshal's office include the regulation of storage, handling and use of flammable liquid at retail service stations as well as the safe movement and operation of mobile service units and the Texas Fire Escape Law.

Married Couples Don't Grow Alike They Tend To Start Out That Way

People who have been married for years tend to be similar in certain ways. Research has established that. But do spouses grow alike over time or did they start married life that way?



In a recently published study, a University of Pennsylvania researcher has found that likes attract likes in education and mental abilities.

Dr. Maria Pennock Watkins, assistant professor of education at Penn, studied 215 newlywed couples from the San Francisco Bay area and compared the results to studies of longer married couples that had previously been done in Hawaii and Colorado.

She found that the similarities and differences between spouses existed at marriage and did not develop over time.

Watkins administered a variety of tests.

In ability tests newlywed couples were very much alike in vocabulary, somewhat alike in reasoning abilities and to a smaller degree similar in perceptual speed and spatial abilities.

The similarity in education was also strong.

Religion was important. Of those in Watkins' sample who listed a religious preference, 75 percent married within the religion. About

half the sample listed no religion, and they tend to marry other people without religious preference.

Race also continued to be a factor, with the number of inter-racial marriages nationally still below one percent of the total.

Watkins is planning a follow-up study to determine if the divorce rate is higher among those newlyweds who were initially more dissimilar.

Other studies at the University of Pennsylvania aim at finding facts that may improve parent-child relationships and the quality of life for senior citizens.

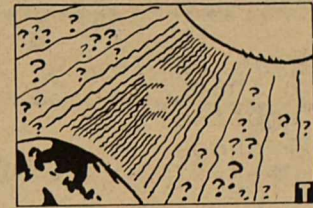

Despite what many believe, the sun's health benefits are almost nil. The only real benefit of tanning, besides a psychological feeling of well-being, is absorption of vitamin D. And most Americans get all the vitamin D they need from their diet.



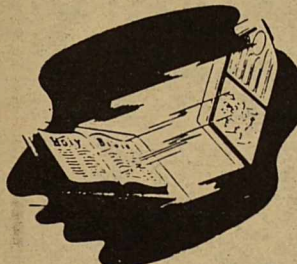
Two groups most likely to be harmed by the sun are light-complexioned people and those whose professions require them to spend many hours out of doors—fishermen, construction workers, farmers, for example.

Residents of "sunbelt" states are more vulnerable to the sun's damaging rays than are those who live farther north.

Years of overexposure may lead to a condition called solar keratoses, which in some cases can become malignant. Symptoms are irregular red, scaly patches on exposed areas of the body, usually the hands and face. Although painless, they may lead to skin cancer. If you have such symptoms, see a doctor. Only a doctor can properly diagnose and treat solar keratoses.

Doctors sometimes use a prescription drug cream or solution, developed by Hoffmann-LaRoche Inc., that is often prescribed with good results for people who have solar keratoses.

Solar keratoses is a problem that you may be able to prevent by taking the sun in moderation. Too much sun now may spell trouble in the years ahead.

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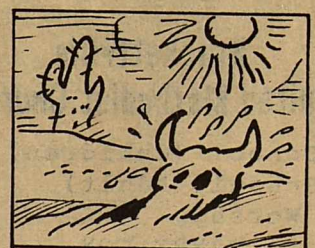
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
