OPEN LETTER

In last weeks May 15th issue of the Kinney CALVARYMAN the editor took exception with the Brackettville City Council for giving Chief of Police Norman H. Hooten a \$100.00 "raise". He futher implied that the other City employees were unhappy because they did not receive a raise also. Mr. Loos failed to mention the fact that the so-called "raise" only brought the salary of Chief of Police back up to the figure that had been budgeted for and paid to the previous Chief. He futher failed to mention that at the time that budget was approved that all City employees received a raise.

The Chief of Police is paid on a monthly salary rate and receives no overtime compensation. The other City employees are hourly paid and receive overtime com-

pensation for those hours worked over forty hours per week.

Chief of Police Norman H. Hooten has averaged 75 to 80 hours per week since taking that position

in December 1980. He is on call 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. He has had to get up at 3 or 4:00 o'clock in the morning many times to make police calls which include drunks, accidents, and family disturbances. He makes no complaints of this fact as he realizes that, as a peace officer, that is part of his job. But, even Editor's Reply: at \$750.00 per month, the salary of Chief of Police of Brackettville is still \$200.00 per month less than the starting salary of green rookie patrolmen of the Del Rio or Uvalde Police Departments and \$500.00 per month less of Police of Sabinal, Texas, a city equal in population to that of Brackettville.

Mr. Loos writes with authority on the actions of the City Council but never attends the meetings. This fact make one wonder where he receives the information used to print in his editorials. It is disappointing to realize that the editor of our only local paper chooses to print editorials on subjects without gathering all the facts on a matter and printing same

without bias. It appears that only that news which could be controversial is worthy of print in Mr. Loos' paper, and that all the facts are seldom printed. Signed: Chris Gomez /s/ Brackettville, Texas Mayor


FACT: Many of the raises you speak of were forced upon you by the Federal Minimium Wage Act.

IMPATIENS---Balsaminaceae


Plants of this genus (patience plant, impatiens) are succulent stemmed, bushy, and almost perpetual-flowering. Most impatiens grown today are hybrids, and are noted for their low growing habit large flowers, wide range of flower colors, and their profuse flowering.

Impatiens perterpiana grows 2-3 feet tall, has bronze red leaves and branches freely.


Impatiens repens is a creeper with heart shaped waxy leaves. Wallerana, or sultanii is a taller plant, and its variegata form is often grown indoors.


Do not subject impatiens to hot direct sunlight, but they do need bright light when grown indoors. Let the top half inch of the soil dry between waterings. Fertilizer every two weeks with liquid fertilizer.

These are easy care plants, and tteir avundant flowers are sure to brighten any room.





KINNEY COUNTY MINERAL LEASE SEMINAR SET

Participants in an upcoming mineral royalty seminar will have the opportunity to gain insight into the legal nature of oil and gas lease arrangements, tax planning and the windfall profits tax.

The seminar will be held Thursday, May 28, at the Brackett-ville Civic Center, according to Carl Esser, Kinney County Extension Agent.

Esser says the program will begin at 7:30 p.m. with a discussion to "Oil and Gas Lease Arrangements from the Landowner's Viewpoint" by William J. Fambrough, oil and gas attorney from Texas A&M University. The popular lecturer has appeared on similar mineral lease programs across the State.

After a refreshment break,
Fambrough will continue the topic
before Charles Bondurant, tax
attorney from San Antonio, begins
an analysis of "Taxation of Oil
and Gas Interests." Bondurant,
another participant on the recent
mineral royalty seminar circuit
will address "Income, Estate Inheritance and Windfall Profit
Tax".

Fambrough and Bondurant will close out the session with a question/answer session. They will also be available for individual consultation.

"Our county program building committee felt this type of program would assist county landowners making decisions concerning leasing their property for mineral exploration," explained Esser. "We believe this is a very important program which could have a sizable impact on the impact on the economic future should large amounts of petroleum reserves be discovered in Kinney County."

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

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



Kinney County LIBRARY

Dear K.C.,

The Friends of the Library met Tuesday, 7 p.m., May 19th, in the Kinney County Courtroom with standing room only when the meeting got under way.

The specific intent of those meeting was to present and discuss ways of furthering the campaign to "SAVE OUR LIBRARY."

Pres. Nancy Frerich opened the meeting and turned it over to Librarian Corey who reported on progress already made. Walter Moore, Treasurer, reported that the "Friends" account reflected over \$1,800. The goal for labor funds had been \$3,500. to pay the salary of the site foreman when the building on the new library building resumed.

Mr. Alton Pagel, Supervisor of construction of Eagle Lumber Co. out of Eagle Pass was low bidder. He had agreed to supervise the construction free of fee (leaving only the site foreman's salary to be paid.) Mr. Pagel, who has been involved in Civic, Fraternal and religious affairs of the community for many years in South Texas spoke breifly to those present. He asvised the "Friends" to set their goal higher as there will be other expenses over and above the available monies. A new goal of \$35,000, he said, would be a more realistic goal.

Many ideas were discussed from all level types of contributions from children helping through car washes, etc., all the way up the scale to contacting investors in Kinney County who may be intersted in tax benefits through generous contributions, suggested by Chas. Ward.

The community will be hearing more about specific plans to further this cause and we hope every one will see the potential of the Library in our community and envision the services it can render everyone in the years to come and that everyone will want to contribute something on whatever level you are able.

Preliminary hearings have been held and depositions given by plainiff and defendent in the Library case; however, the trial date has been postpined again. You will be kept informed as to the progress of the case as it unfolds.

Kazen in Washington

After several months of probing and parrying, Congress and the White House are rapidly reac- across the country. hing the point of making decisions that will affect all Americans. If the process is slow, consider the magnitude of the problems.

Although most of us can trace the negative effects of deficit spending and understand the ramifications of a dependence on foriegn oil, the full force of any decision is more quickly felt and understood when it strikes closer to home and family.

This came sharply into focus last week when the new Administrations announced details of a

proposal for the first significant reduction in Socila Security benefits since the system was adopted 46 years ago.

I must emphasize that the President's plan is far from becomin law--and judging from the intitial the LS Invitional Texas Longhorn reaction around the country there will be significant changes in it before it is. But make no mistake about it, the Social Secuirty system--as our economy itself-may well undergo unprecedented changes this year and through the remainder of this century. The Presidnet and Congress have the responsibilitie

responsibility to protect the sytem and see that it does not go bankrupt, pulling 36 million recipients down with it. We may differ over the best ways to handle the problem, but while we are debating it we must not forget that people--in this case, t he legency of our nation--are at the core of our deliberations.

My first reading of the President's plan indicates it contains at least one element long sought by many elderly persons: It would phase out the earnings test which has kept older Americans from productive work and earnings.

But there are other areas, including the reduction of benefits of persons who draw federal or state retirements, the proposed delay in cost-of-living allowance By: Abraham (Chick) Kazen, Jr., M.C. and the reduction of benefits of persons who retire before they are sixty-five, which are already the subject of controversy

> The Chairman of the House Social Security Subcommittee, Representative J.J. (Jake) Pickle of Austin, has indicated the House will consider the Presidents proposals and "Come to some bipartisan approach." Rest assured that his means that no changes will be made in the Social Security Program until all the aspects sires, cows, bred heifers and are carefully examined and the people are heard. This is a matter of great magnitude and, yes, it will take time.

STOCKMAN ROLE CHANGES

I could not help but smile last week when David A. Stockman, the Director of the Office of Management and Budget, appeared before a House Subcommittee. Stockman and the OMB, of course, are the moving forces behind demands for cutbacks in government spending--sometimes in the most critical areas. Well, the Nation's number-one penny-pincher appeared before the Committee to ask for an extra \$4.1 million for the OMB, raising that office's budget to \$38.1 million.

A group of 5-3/4 Longhorn roping steers weighing 450 pounds and 150 Fl. Longhorn heifers with their first calves will be offered to steer ropers roping clubs, and commercial ranchers. 
