KALANCHOE . . .Crassulaceae.
Kalanchoes are all succulent plants of varying form and size. Some are grown primarily for their decorative foliage, other for their cluster of long lasting flowers. All can tolerate dry air and short periods of drought. The foliage types can be kept for years. The most popular flowering species is usually discarded after flowering because it produces unattractive growth and does not readily flower agin indoors. Kalanchoes should be grown in a bright and shiney window. All species grow well in normal room temperatures. During the active growth period water sparingly just enough to keep the potting mixture moist allwoing the top half of the mixture to dry out between waterings. During the rest period water only enough to keep the potting mixture from drying out.

SWTJC will offer a summer journalism course which will enable students to profit monetarily. The course, Journalism 130-1, will not only discipline magazine and newspaper writing, but also emphasizes the market value of freelance writing material.

Merrill Adams, instructor for the course, will provide "tips on how to market freelance articles successfully. Adams plans to use the 1981 Writer's Market, a complete guide to makor U.S. publications and the textbook Freelance and staff Writer in teaching the course

Both books feature many opportuni. ties for freelance writers such as the names of magazines, editors, the type of material preferred, services, photographic supplies, writer's clubs and organizations.

Students will experiment with all types of articles including working with photographs made possible through journalism students enrolled in a summer photography course. Students will actually submit their articles to news paper or magazine publications.

Registration for the summer course is scheduled fro June 1, from 8 to 10 am at the Matthews Student Center. ## DANGEROUS MONTHS APPROACH

Almost 30 percent, or 1,266 , of last year's 4,424 motor vehicle fatalities ini Texas occurred during the months of June, July and August, reports the Texas Safety Association.

The non-profit safety organization also says that in severe crashes with big cars, occupants of small cars are eight times more likely to be killed than passengers of big cars.

This doesn't condemn small cars as unsafe, nor does it mean that motorists shouldn't drive during June, July or August, said Ray Halverson, TSA's vice president for traffic.

Instead, thses figures warn motorists, especially small car drivers to be alert, and drive defensively this summer.

Halverson said the automobile industry estimates that by 1986 at least 50 percent of all new cars purchased will be small cars
"There is not disputing the fuel savings possible indriving small cars, the safety official said. "But drivers of small cars must be retrained in how to drive those vehicles since big cars and trucks travel side by side with the small car.

Texas Safety Association, which has declared May 24-30 Texas Defensive Driving Week, offers defensive driving courses throughout tExas. The eighthour course, designed by the National Safety Cuouncil, helps reduce needless losses due to human error by improving driver's knowledge and skill.

## Kazen in Washington

We now have it in writing from the Veterans Administration that South Texas veterans will continue to benefit from VA services.

Rufus $H$. wilson, the acting administrator of the VA, said in a recent letter to me that "no further action will be taken" on plans to transfer veterans services from San Antonio to Houston, a move which surely would have eliminated access to benefits for many veterans in the 60 -county area served by San Antonio.

I had reported earlier that after I went to the floor of the House of Representatives to fight this proposal, I was immediately joined by Representatives G.V. "Sonny" Montgomery, the chairman of the House veterans Affairs

 later that he had been assured by the Office of Management and Budget that no immediate action would be taken, but the recent letter from the VA was our first official action notlification that the plan had been dropped.I said when the matter came up that it was nothing less than adisgrace that the VA would even consider diminishing veteran's services at a time when an ever-increasing number of veterans are in need of aid and assistance. I hope this is the last we ever hear of this proposal.

## SOCIAL SECURITY UPDATE

As I said last week, the new administration plans for changes in Social Security are the subject of great controversy and are for from becoming the law of the land. Since then, Democrats in the House of Representatives and the majority of the Republican-controlled Senate have gone on record in opposition to provisions in the administration proposal. Most of the critism has been directed at plans to unfairly penalized early retirees. There must be changes in the system to keep it from going bankrupt by as early as next year, but I can assure you that Congress will carefully consider the working people of the mation in making these changes. My guess is that the administration will be bwilling to compromise in order to rach an acceptable solution.

## G.I. EDUCATION BILL

am pleased to report that I have recently co-sponsored legislation which I hope will lead to the continued recruitment of outstanding young men and women for our military services and help retain our experienced military personnel. "The Veterans Educational Assitance Act of 1981" calls for a new G.I. Bill of education assistance for service members and veterans.

In 1979, the Army came up short by 17,800 recruits, the equivalent of one division. The Army, Navy, Air Force and Marines are lacking 104,000 qualified non-commissioned officers and pe ty officers because of attrition and competition from the civilian labor market. In addition, the current Post Vietnam Era contributory education program simply has not been effective.

The new bill would provide a $\$ 300$ benefit for 36 months following three years of active duty and $\$ 600$ each mon th after six years active duty. The legislation also calls for similar benefits for a combinaion of active duty and reserve service. Of even greater $i$ nterst to many members of our Armed Services, the eduational entitlement could be transferred to a spouse or child after ten years acrive duty.

This legislation would not solve all of our problems, but I believe it goes a long way toward our goal of maintaining seasoned, experienced, highly-trained personnel needed to operate our advanced weapons systems.


We are moving forward full speed with a plan to relieve the problem of over-crowding in the Texas prison system.
Through a new conditional parole program utilizing existing halfway houses and a temporary tent encampment within the perimeter of prison security areas, we will be able to get 3,000 inmates who now sleep on Department of Corrections floors into more-comfortable facilities by July 1.
Our plan is responsive to the order of Federal District Judge William Wayne Justice to eliminate triplecelling of inmates by August
Attorney General August.
Atorney General Mark White is seeking a stay of Judge Justice's far-reaching decision with regard to the Texas prison system, many aspects of which we strongly disagree with. We do agree, how
ing must be eliminated promptly.
Hopefully, 750 inmates will be paroled to halfway Hopses by June 1 and another 750 before July 1 . Meay houses by June 1 and another 750 before July 1 . Mean ated for intensively-supervised halfway houses during the next biennium.
Board of Pardons and Paroles contracts with halfway houses and individual parole contracts will be draw houses and individual parole contracts will be draw tightly to insure protection of law-abiding citizens, restitution to victims of crimes and minimum cost to tax payers.
A supplemental grant of $\$ 1.25$ million from the Governor's Office of General Counsel and Criminal Justice to the Board of Pardons and Paroles permits immediate placement of conditional parolees in halfway houses. Inmates will receive the highest degree of super vision to assure protection of the public. Initial condtional parolees have been identified and are being pro cessed to halfway houses with advice of local judges, prosecutors and sheriff

Meanwhile, we are obtaining military tents from the Texas National Guard to house another 1500 low risk inmates temporarily within prison unit security areas. July 1 is our goal for this relocation. The tents, which have been used by our loyal servicemen in the fild, will certainly be a preferred alternative to triple-celing of inmates during a brief, five-months period.
The Legislature already has approved my emergency request for a $\$ 35$ million appropriation to construct additional permanent housing for inmate. When this construction is completed Nover 1 , inmates who have spent the summer and early fall in the tent
campments will be transerred to the new quarters.
Texas Department of Corrections is studying possible purchase of the Harris County Rehabilitation Center or building new facilities on state land to expand work furlough programs under my $\$ 18$ million appropriations request. We have also increased funding for adult probation programs.
The TDC construction program for the 1982-83 biennium will provide 10,800 additional permanent bed spaces by August 31, 1983.
I am encouraged, based on my meeting with U.S. Attorney General William French Smith, that the Reagan Administration is re-examining its position in the lawsuit involving the Texas prison system. I am increasingly hopeful of a stay on appeal of the Ruiz $v$ Estelle suit.
We are, indeed, in a crisis situation, however-one which could cost the state billions of dollars.
I am confident the programs I have set out will eliminate the problem of inmates sleeping on floors by July 1, without need for wholesale release to homes via an inadequately-supervised work furlough arrangement.
All of this has been undertaken in good faith and with integrity to alleviate the situation in our prisons. I believe that Judge Justice will be pleased with our efforts.
