SATURDAY FLYING SCHEDULES

LAUGHLIN AIR FORCE BASE, TEXAS---With the increase in Saturday flying, local civilian pilots should be aware of an increased potential for air traffic conflicts, according to Laughlin flight safety officials.

Flying on Saturdays has become necessary at Laughlin due to an increase in the number of students and poor flying weather in recent months, they said.

"Local pilots may expect a large volume of jet training within 50 nautical miles north, east, and south of Laughlin on Mondays through Saturdays from 7 a.m. to 9 p.m., said Capt. Robert W. Osborne of the slight safety office.

GARCIA TO ENTER AIR FORCE

On March 25th, Master Sergeant Wallace Morgan, 47th Air Base Group first sergeant, and Master Sergeant Russ Phelps, noncommissioned officer in charge, Central Base Personnel Office, Laughlin Air Force Base, recommended the enlistment of Ms. Helen Garcia in the Air Force.

Their recommendations were submitted under the provisions of the Air Force Recruiter Assistance Program.

Technical Sergeant Pedro Castillo, Air Force recruiter, subsequently contacted and interviewed Ms. Garcia, determining that she was eligible for enlistment.

On April 8th, she enlisted in the Air Force for a period of four years. She will report to Lackland Air Force Base, under the delayed enlistment program, on October 20th to begin active military service.

Ms Garcia will be assigned to duty as inventory management specialist following completion

of basic training and technical school.

Helen is the first Brackettville resident to join the Air Force under the Air Force Recruiter Assistance Program.

JUNE 30 DISCOUNT DEADLINE FOR RANCH MEETING PARTICIPANTS

June 30 has been set as the pre-registration deadline for the International Rancher's Roundup a broad-based educational conference scheduled August 10-14 in Del Rio.

Ranchers who return their tax-deductible registration fees for the Roundup by June 30 will receive a \$50 discount. Because of the approaching deadline, ranchers are urged to send promptly for their pre-registration packets to IRR, P.O. Drawer 1849, Uvalde, Texas 78801.

Headliners confirmed this far among the 110 speakers from five counties and six states are South Africa Foreign Minister P. Botha, Texas Agriculture Commissioner Reagan Brown and State Representative Susan McBee of Del Rio. Foreign Minister Botha has been in Washington conferring with State Department officials and appeared on NBC's Nightly News recently.

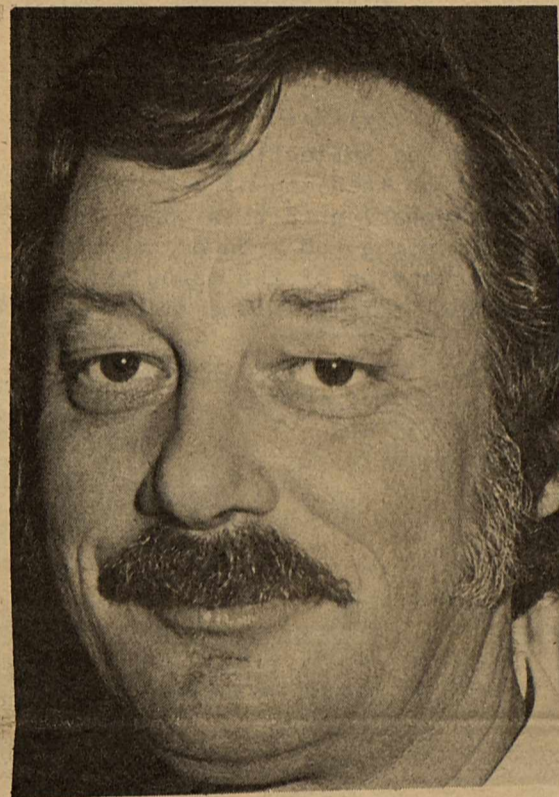
Over 20 prominent Texas ranching firms, six producers concerns and eight agricultural colleges in six states will be represented on the program.

HEDERA (Araleaceae)

The genus Hedera is small and contains only a few species, but many varieties of woody stemmed, climbing plants. A few have large leaves and can grow 20 feet or more, but are prized most for their dense, low growth and small leaves. The leaves of all types are leathery and they are often lobed. Most of these produce short aerial roots from the nodes of the stems. When the roots come in contact with a suitable damp surface they will attach themselves to it. There is about 10 species of Hedera: canariensis (carary or algerian ivy); Colchica (colchic, fragrant or Persian ivy); Helix (English Ivy); Chicago; Cristata (Parsley Ivy) Emerald Gem; Glacier; Jubilee; Little Diamond; Sagittifolia.
Growth Requirements: Light: Hedera need bright light; temperature: Ivies can tolerate a broad range of room

temperatures. Water: During the active growth period water moderately, allowing the top half-inch of mixture to dry out between waterings. In the rest period water sparingly. Feeding: apply standard liquid fertilizer

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STATEMENT OF INTENT TO CHANGE RATES

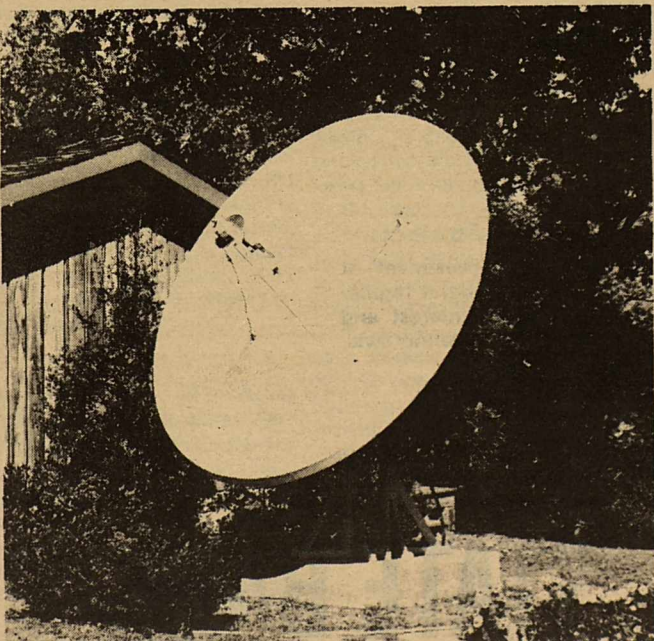
General Telephone Company of the Southwest, in accordance with the Rules of the Public Utility Commission of Texas, hereby gives notice of the Company's intent to implement a new schedule of rates in Texas effective October 1, 1981.

On April 28, 1981, the Public Utility Commission of Texas issued its order in Docket 3690, creating a separate Docket 3861 to consider the impact and effect of the accounting changes ordered by the Federal Communications Commission (CC Docket 79-105).

The Federal Communications Commission has changed the method of accounting for inside wiring costs associated with the one-time station connection, move, or change activity. The new rate schedule will increase the Company's gross annual revenue derived from local service by no more than three percent. The schedule of rates and charges is available for inspection at each Company business office in the State of Texas.

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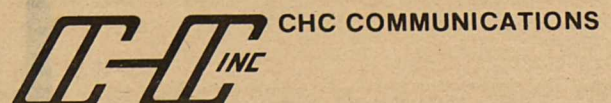

HEARTWORM DISEASE IN DOGS

Many Texas dogs will needlessly fall victim to canine heartworm disease especially this spring and summer, warns Dr. Ben Johnston, president of the Texas Veterinary Medical Association.

Heartworm disease now endangers more dogs than ever before as it continues its spread westward and northward. A few years ago, the disease was confined to southern and eastern regions of the U.S. and to the Mississippi River basin. In the past few years the disease has spread into the northern United States and even into Canada.

When the symptoms of heartworm disease are present, dogowners frequently think the dog's tiring, weakness, coughing, labored breathing, or fainting is caused by the hot weather or old age. "If any of these symptoms are present in any dog," Dr. Johnston says, "the dogowner should consult a veterinarian immediately."

"Fortunately, a simple program can prevent this disease," states Dr. Johnston. "The program consists of daily administration of a medication given to the dog after it has been tested and found free of heartworms."

"It is imperative to be sure the dog is free of heartworms before beginning the medication," stresses Johnston. "Dogs that have been off the preventive medication for an extended period of time should not return to the preventive without the owner consulting the veterinarian, since the medication can have serious-to-fatal side effects if given to a dog already harboring the disease. Very young puppies can be placed on the medication without prior testing."

Heartworm is a parasitic disease that is potentially fatal to dogs, and symptoms are not detected until the later, more serious or fatal stages of the disease.

Heartworm disease is transmitted by mosquitos. The heartworms live within the chambers of the

heart and blood vessels of the lungs. Heartworms increase the heart's workload and restrict blood flow to the lungs, kidneys, and liver. Infection produces an increased strain on these vital organs, which if left untreated, eventually will lead to death.

Most dogs found to have heartworms can be successfully treated. The treatment requires intravenous injections by a veterinarian. Dr. Johnston stresses that rest following treatment is extremely important, because with exertion too soon, the animal's lungs could become severely affected and the result could be death.

"Prevention is the best medicine," says Dr. Johnston. "Don't wait until you see the dog is ill," says Dr. Johnston recommends testing the dogs for heartworms immediately, so they can begin the preventive program before the

mosquito season reaches its warm-weather peak.

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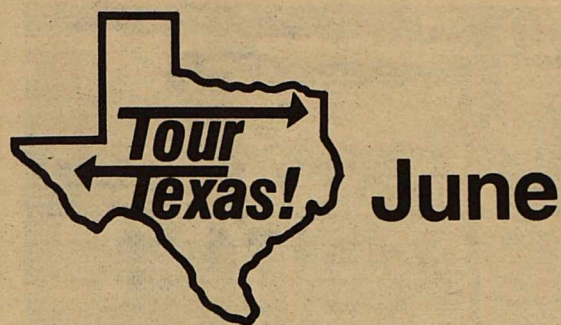

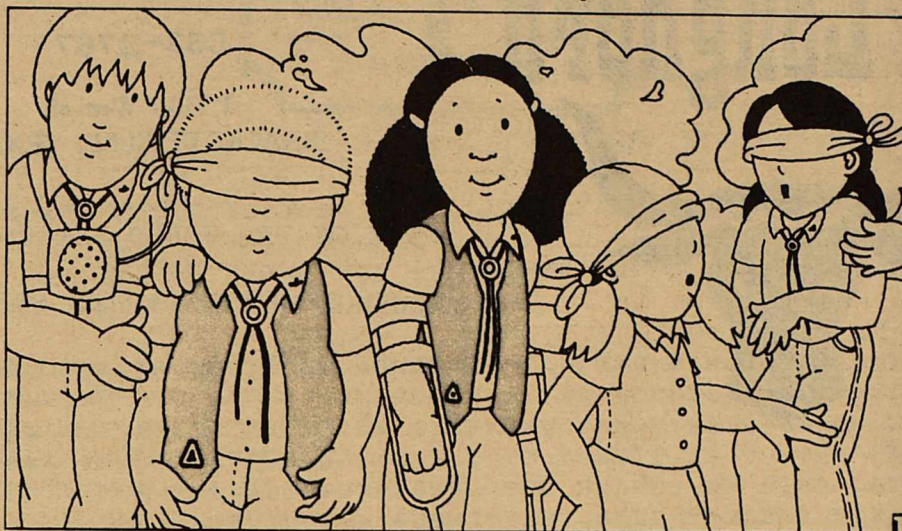
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Learning About Handicaps Helps Children Grow



According to Camp Fire, the national youth agency, a "trust walk" with a friend is one activity that can help girls and boys understand disabilities.

The United Nations has declared 1981 the International Year of Disabled Persons, and according to Camp Fire, the national youth agency, it's the perfect time for children to learn about handicaps. Camp Fire suggests these activities for girls and boys.

—Help children get to know someone who has a disability. Concentrate on the person's abilities, rather than disabilities. Refer to a disabled child as "Sue" or "George" or "the one in the red sweater," not as "the one in the wheelchair" or "the blind child."

—With the children, identify barriers at home, at school and in public places. Discuss how barriers might affect the disabled.

—Have children eat a snack with a blindfold on, play a game with their ears plugged, take their shoes off and put them back on with one hand in their pocket, or take a walk with a scarf tied just above their knees. Then have them discuss how they felt.

—Divide children into pairs for "trust walks." One child is blindfolded, while the other acts as a guide. Tell each guide, "Hold your

friend's hand or elbow. As you walk, ask if your friend can tell where the two of you are going. Are you going uphill or downhill? Are you in the sun or the shade? Ask your friend to think of something, such as a tree, and describe it."

Camp Fire, which has 500,000 members across the country, believes in "mainstreaming" children with handicapping conditions, and urges that whenever possible, handicapped girls and boys belong to Camp Fire clubs with the non-handicapped, rather than to separate clubs.

YOUR HEALTH

Ninety-seven percent of all individuals over age 60 show signs of arthritis. For many, fortunately, the symptoms are very slight. There are, however, more than 30 million people of all ages with arthritis severe enough to require medical care.

According to the Arthritis Foundation, the warning signs of arthritis include:

1. Persistent pain and stiffness on arising.
2. Pain, tenderness or swelling in one or more joints.
3. Recurrence of these symptoms, especially when they involve more than one joint.
4. Recurrent or persistent pain and stiffness in the neck, lower back, knees and other joints.

If you suspect you have arthritis, you should see your doctor. Treatment for arthritis helps most when started early. If you do have arthritis, your doctor may recommend any one of a number of medications to help reduce the pain and inflammation or otherwise slow down and control the symptoms.

Because arthritis is so widespread and a wide choice of agents is crucial to

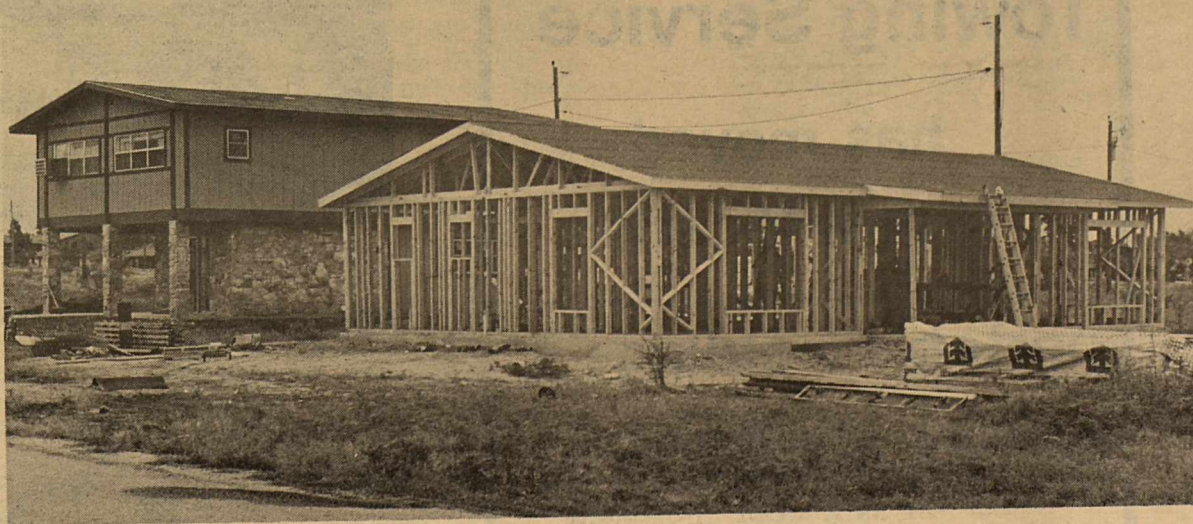
treatment, researchers are continually developing new and different compounds for treating the disease. Also, because most arthritis sufferers require long-term treatment, it helps to have therapy with a simple dosage schedule for patients to follow. One such medication is a prescription drug called piroxicam that provides 24-hour relief with just one daily dose.

A new drug application for piroxicam has been on file with the U.S. Food and Drug Administration since March 1978. Following approval, the drug will be marketed under the name Feldene.

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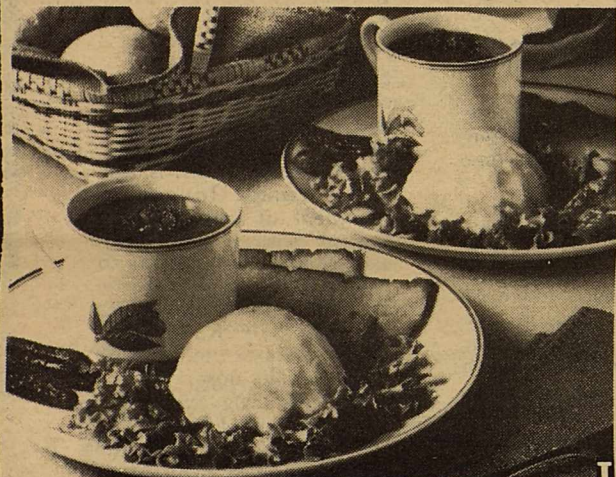

Crunchy grated carrot and tangy pineapple combine to create mealtime excitement, and the individual molds add extra appeal.

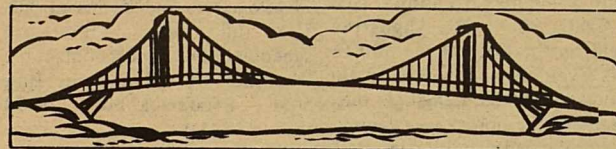
SUNSET SALAD

- 1 can (8 oz.) crushed pineapple in juice
- 1 package (3 oz.) Jell-O lemon flavor gelatin
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1-1/2 cups crushed ice
- 1 tablespoon lemon juice or vinegar
- 1 cup grated carrots

Drain pineapple, reserving juice. Add water to juice to make 3/4 cup and bring to a boil. Combine measured liquid, gelatin and salt in blender container. Cover and blend at low speed until gelatin is dissolved, about 1 minute. Add ice and lemon juice; cover and blend at high speed until ice is melted. Add pineapple and carrots and pour into 4-cup mold or individual molds. Chill until firm, about 2 hours. Unmold. Garnish with crisp salad greens, if desired. Makes 4 cups or 8 servings.

to survive as the focal point of freedom in the world.

Our experts say that the so-called strategic Triad, composed of land-based and sea-based ballistic missile and manned bombers, serves as the best deterrent because it would be difficult to strike all three simultaneously. Over the past decade, the Soviet Union has devoted sufficient resources to pose a serious threat to our landbased ICBM force and its associated command, control and communications network.

We believe that deployment of the M-X in a survivable basing mode is the most effective way to increase the total retaliatory capability of the ICBM force--and if the world knows we can retaliate we are not likely to be threatened.

The original idea was simple enough--we hide out missiles in scattered underground structures and move them around so that no enemy could locate and destroy them all before they are fired in retaliation. As you probably know, however, self-defense is both costly and controversial. In apparent response to these two factors, the Administration is studying possible changes in the M-X and its basing mode.

As I see it, we have no choice but to remain the strongest nation on earth if we are to maintain our cherished

freedom. In that regard, the House Armed services Committee approved both funds for the system and the multiple protection structures basing mode, unless the President submits an alternative basing mode and it is endorsed by Congress within 90 days.

What I told the people in South Texas recently is that I do not expect to object to any basing mode as long as the final decision is made by the military professionals and not by the Office of Management and Budget.

RECONCILIATION

Reconciliation is a fifty-cent word that, for Congress, means problems. It is the dimly-understood process under which the individual committees of Congress struggle with reconciling their spending proposals to match up with the budget.

While the individuals cuts suggested by the Administration budget are considered guidelines, the overall spending figures under the budget are

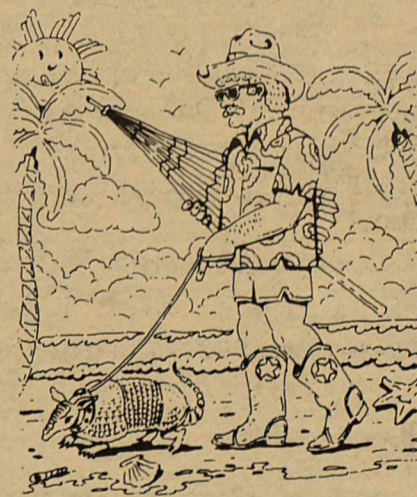
binding on the Committees, This means that while committees may have some

room to maneuver in deciding where to slice, there is no way to escape the cutting itself. There is no doubt that reconciliation will mean life or death to many programs.

To give you some idea of what to expect, the recently-approved Administration budget instructs 14 Senate committees and 15 House committees to look at items in their jurisdictions and achieve spending cuts of about \$36 billion in fiscal year 1982. Committees have until June 12 to report conciliation packages to the Budget Committee, which will combine all the proposals and bring them to the House and Senate floors. After that, the two Houses of Congress must reach compromise over where, what, and how much to cut. The whole process must be repeated this fall when Congress actually appropriates the funds for budget items.

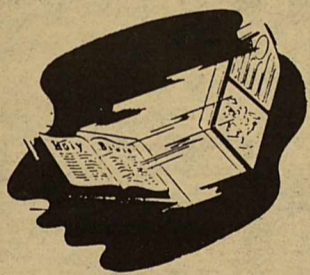
When you consider that each and every budget proposal has a least one champion in Congress and many more in the hallways, you may understand why reducing expenditures by \$36 billion takes most of the year.
