With registration for the fall semester of 1981 repaidly approaching, Southwest Texas Junior College dean of admission/ yar. Marilyn Davis, councselor registrar John Allen Davis is urging all new and returning students to complete entrance requirements to simplify the registration process.

Day class registration at SWTJC is slated for Monday,

Tuesday and Wednesday August 24,24 and 26. Evening School registration times and places are as follows: Uvalde-Tuesday, August 25, SWTJC Matthews Student Center, 6 to 8 p.m.; Asherton, Carrizo Springs and Crystal city--Wednesday, August 26, Crrizo Springs High School 6 to 8 p.m.; Eagle Pass--Monday, August 24, 6 p.m., Eagle Pass Center; Del Rio--Thursday, August 20, 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. at Laughlin Air Force Base Education Office and 6:30 to 8 p.m. at Del Rio High School; and Dilley Thursday, August 27, 6 to 7:30 p.m., Dilley High School.

Day Students must have four items into the Admissions Offic in order to register," Davis said. "They include an application to enter SWTJC, a completed health form, a high school tran-script and ACT scores.

"Returning students need only an application to re-enter," he continued. "When all necessary forms have been received, students will be sent an acceptance letter and registration time.'

August 24 is reserved for returning students, while the 25th and 26th are for all stu-

Those who have not taken the ACT test may arrange to do so by paying the \$8.50 fee at the SWTJC Business Office in advance and then returning to take the test at 8 a.m. on Saturday, August 22. Students who have a paid receipt to take the test can be considered as having completed the registration require ments. After taking the test. Pheir scores will be available at theregistration desk on Monday.

"Evening students, including those taking day classes in Del Rio, need only an application to enter SWTJC, a transcript from the last school attended and an immunization record, which they sign themselves," Davis stated.

"To complete these procedures in advance is to the students' advantage since it simplifies ans shortens the registration process.

SWTJC officials are making a special effort to offer courses that the community needs this at the Del Rio Center, for example, is particularly proud that Anatomy and Physiology and

Chemistry will be offered for the first time in Del Rio in response to community need.

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

Because this genus is so large it is generally divided into groups based on the differing storage organs or root structures of these plants. These are just a few recommended Begonias: Alleryi, Coccina, compta, luxurians, Maculata, Metallica,

Most Begonias need bright light without direct sunlight, with normal room temperture are suitable for actively gorwing plants. All Begonias suffer in dry air.

Water active gowing plants moderately, allowing the top inch of the potting mixture to dry out between waterings.





HOME ENERGY ASSISTANCE PROGRAM

To help relieve the harsh effects of the Texas summer heat on elderly persons, low-income families with members age 65 or older may apply for financial aid to help pay their summer cooling costs.

Under the Home Energy Assistance (HEAP), housholds eligible by reason of low income and containing at least one person 65 or older may qualify for one-time serving the elederly to inquire payments that will range from \$91 to \$114. The colling assistance announcement was made by Marlin W. Johnson, commissioner of the Texas Department of Human Resources (TDHR) which is administering the program.

Some elderly Texans will re ceive the cooling assistance automaticly. These are people already receiving benefits from Aid to Families With Dependent Children, food stamps, or Supplemental Security Income.

Other low-income households which do not receive the automatic payment will be required to apply for HEAP benefits during an application period from August 3 to August 31. A face-to-face interview is required for certificaion, asis verification of household income.

Johnston said the following guidelines can be used in determining if an elderly member of a houshold is eligible for the federally funded cooling assitance:

A household's resources can not exceed \$1,800 for one person or \$3,000 for more than one per son. The value of the homestead, cars, personal and household belongings will not be considered as resources. Household gross monthly income cannot be more than the following figures for eligiblity:

Numbers of people in house hold, in parenthesis, preceded income limits:

(1) person: \$296.49 (2) person: \$446.49 (3) person: \$613.49

(4) person: \$756.49

(5)person: \$893.49 (6)person: \$1,044.49 (7)person: \$1,195.49

Each County in Texas will have a designated location for house holds to apply for energy assis tance. These locations may be determined by calling the local office of the TExas Department of Human Resources. If there is not a local TDHR office in a particular county, an applicant should contact the nearest TDHR office or any local organization about the arrangements for that particular county. If certified as eleigible for the assistance applicants should receive their payments within 20 to 30 days.

the Texas ans Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association have solved a major horse theft case involving at least 33 horses stolen in the Houston, Texas, areas in the last two months. Twenty-seven of the horse have been recovered for their rightful owners. As the investigation continues, more horses may be located, says Don C. King TSCRA secretary-general manager.

Working with Texas Rangers and the Harris County Sheriff's Office, TSCRA field inspectors, all special Texas rangers, developed evidence that led to the oral confession of Milton Ray Oliver 19, of Houston. The 182nd District Court in Houston has issued a two-count indictment for felony theft against Oliver, who remains in the Harris County jail without bond.

The suspect was in a Houston jail on charges of felony theft of a horse trailer when the case broke. He was also on 10-probation in Polk County and Montgomery County at the time of his arrest. He was released from the Texas Department of Corrections Jan. 18,1981, after three months of shock probation for felony theft involving 26 horses stolen in the Gulf Coast area in 1980.

TSCRA, a non-profit livestock producer organization with a 32man enforcement arm, became involved in the major horse theft case in mid-July shen a victim reported his loss to TSCRA Field Inspector Charles "Lucky" Thompson, Jr. of Huntsville. The inspector developed information that led him to the recovery of a registered Paint horse gelding at a horse killing plant near Kaufman, Tex, and a bay gelding at Canton, Tx.

Further investigation by Inspectors Thompson, James Gregory of Fairfield, Tx, and Elzie Ware of Jewett, Tx, produced the suspect's name and linked him to the sale of at least 33 horses at an auction market in the Buffalo, Texas area.

The inspectors, along with TSCRA Field Inspector Walter Wetzel of Dickinson, Tx, coordinated their information with an ongoing investigation conducted by Texas Ranger Charles Cook and Harris County Sheriff's Office Dtective Richard Tywater.

The suspect had been handled by Cook and Tywater during the investigation of 26 horses stolen in the Gulf Coast area in 1980.

A warrant for revocation of probation was obtained in Polk County by Texas Ranger Wesley Styles for Oliver, but he was already in jail on the trailer theft charge.

Among the horses recovered by TSCRA field inspectors thus far is a stallion owned by a Houston Policeman. The estimated value of the horse by its owner is \$7,000.

TSCRA's King encouraged horse owners in the area to check their horses more frequently and to consider branding them as a positive means of identification. He noted that many hosemen pasture their horses on leased property in remote areas and that makes them vulnerable to horse theft when



The Texas Consumer Association's Report from Austin

Back in the 1930s, America was a country that worried about the fate of old people. Our concern even found its way into the popular songs of the time—songs like this one:

ne—songs like this one:
"I wonder how the old folks
are at home.

I wonder if they miss me while I roam. I wonder if they pray, For the boy who went away,

And left his dear old parents all alone?"

But we did more than sing out it. During the Depression, der the leadership of Presi-

about it. During the Depression, under the leadership of President Franklin Roosevelt, Americans also approved legislation to alleviate some of the economic burden of being old and unemployed. We passed the Social Security Act, which was a public promise that our old parents would not be left alone and in poverty. It worked.

But now there are plans in Washington to break that promise. President Ronald Reagan says that the social security trust fund is in danger of taking in less than it is paying out, so he wants to cut back on the pay outs. He is proposing \$82 billion in budget cuts during the next four years, limiting the number of retirees who are eligible and reducing the level of their benefits. The Reagan crew in Washington says this is the only way to "save" the program.

Hold it right there, say those who think Reagan really is out to eliminate the social security system altogether. This old-age program never was a pay-your-own-way proposition — it is a public commitment, a promise that we will pool some of the income we earn to provide at least a thin cushion for Aunt Josie and Daddy John and all the others who have worked a lifetime, paid their taxes and are now moving out of the workforce to make room for

younger workers.

These proponents say that the public wants a full-fledged social security system and is willing to pay for it, because it is a good deal all around. They compare it to military security, which is another governmental commitment made to the people and supported by them. When the Pentagon runs short of money, there is no alarmist cry of "bankruptcy!" or calls to shut down the defense program. Indeed, President Reagan is putting an extra \$26 billion into the military budget this year.

So, they argue, it is not a question of bankruptcy, but of how we want to spend our taxes. After all, we have bailed out Chrysler Corporation, are about to give life-saving tax breaks to savings & loan companies and regularly pay direct subsidies to utilities and oil corporations. If we want to do a fraction of that to see that older Americans have a minimum of \$122 a month to make ends meet, we certainly have the means to do it, and it doesn't seem excessively generous.

The battle to protect the integrity of the social security system is being led by senior citizen groups, but each of us should be involved. For one thing, if we younger folks are lucky, we'll get to be old some day, too, so this is a political fight that affects every one of us.

Express yourself. Should America go back on its promise to old folks, or should we find the additional financing necessary to keep our word and meet this public need? A Texas congressman, U.S. Rep. Effective Self-Medication

Availability Update

It is not unusual for a product to enter the market as a prescription medicine and then be shifted by government regulation to the nonprescription category when it becomes clear that consumers do understand how to use it safely and properly on their own, noted Nathan J. Stark, Under Secretary of Health and Human Services.




Among a number of formerly prescription-only medicines now available without a prescription are shampoos to control dandruff and hydrocortisone ointments for skin irritations, observed E. William Rosenberg at a symposium sponsored by The Proprietary Association, the trade association representing manufacturers of nonprescription medicines.

An FDA panel on nonprescription medicines recommended adoption of a system developed by industry to help consumers use sunscreen products safely and effectively. Many sunscreens now carry the rating—ranging from two to 15. A rating of six, for example, indicates that using the product, a person may stay in the sun six times as long as he could without the sunscreen.

Bountiful Summer Fruits Top Dessert Pizza



Seasonal fresh fruit is one of the best warm weather desserts. When a special occasion calls for an attractive dessert, dress up fresh fruit in the easy but elegant Fanciful Fruit Pizza. The do-ahead crust is made with refrigerated sugar ready-to-slice cookie dough and topped with a cream cheese mixture and fruit. An orange marmalade glaze adds the finishing touch.

FANCIFUL FRUIT PIZZA

17-oz. roll refrigerated sugar ready-to-slice cookie dough

8-oz. pkg. cream cheese, softened

1/3 cup sugar 1/2 teaspoon vanilla Fresh or canned peach halves

Strawberries, whole and cut in half Fresh or frozen blueberries 1/4 cup orange marmalade

1 tablespoon water

Heat oven to $375^{\circ}\mathrm{F}$. Cover a 14-inch pizza pan or 15×10 -inch jelly roll pan with aluminum foil. Slice cookie dough into 1/8-inch slices. Arrange slices, slightly overlapping, in bottom of covered pan. Bake at $375^{\circ}\mathrm{F}$. for 9 to 11 minutes or until golden brown. Cool completely. Remove from foil. Combine softened cream cheese, sugar and vanilla. Spread mixture over cookie crust. Arrange fruit over cream cheese. Combine orange marmalade and water; spoon over fruit. Chill. Cut into wedges to serve. Refrigerate leftovers. 10 to 12 servings.

TIP: To easily remove foil from crust, place wire rack or cookie sheet over crust. Hold rack in place and invert pan. Peel off foil. Replace baking pan or serving dish and turn crust right side up.

A number of important issues will face Congress and the Administration when we get back next month after the annual August recess from Washington heat and humidity.

By next month, we should have a better idea of how the economy is responding to all the legisative changes, and later in thefall we will know how various cutbacks affect programs at the local level.

As a member of the House Armed Service Committee, I am interested in t he upcoming debates over the develop ment of the MX missile system and the B-1 bomber. Our defense needs--including the problem of retaining experienced personnel to operate our complicated new weapons systems--remain high on the Congressional work list.

WE have yet to agree on a solution to the Social Security question. We simply connot afford to postpone this matter is the Social Security system is to survive. The House recenlty went on record in a non-binding resolution in support of saving the minimum benefits for current benefaciaties, but this issue and the matter of future funding of Social Security remain unresolved in Congress.

OTHER CONCERNS

The energy problems, although perhaps out of sight for the summer, is still with us, despite the recent tax incentatives initatied by the House Ways and Means Committee. All of us, including members of Congress, must recognize that domestic exploration, conservation and alternative energy must receive continued support if we are to end our dangerous dependeence on foreign oil.

I expect emphasis on more program cuts for the foreseeable future. Although over \$35 billion will be saved under theOmnibus Reconciliation Act, there are indications that the planned spending reductions for 1983 and 1984 may not be sufficient to bring about a balanced budget unless thereis a remarkable recovery of the economy. When Congress gets vack, we will continue work on a series of Appropriations Bills to fund the federal government in the fiscal year beginning Octoberl.

Foreign affairs, which have taken a back seat to domestic issues to this point, will be important in many Congressional debates. Unfortunately, none of the international problems went away while we were working on taxes and domestic programs.

NUMBER ONE PROBLEM

The issue of top priority will continue to be economy. All of our critical progams, including defense, depend on a helathy economy for support There is no escape from inflation and high interst rates, whether you are a housewife or a homebuilder. WE recognize the problem and most of us are willing to do our part to solve it, but differences of opinion over how best to procreed are expected to occupy our time in the weeks ahead. Maybe we can come up with a few fresh ideas when we return next month.

As South Texans accustomed to drier heat and an occasional breeze, my wife and I look forward to an opportunity to head out of Washington for visits with family and friends.

We will take a two-week vacation, but following that I will be back on the road in the district and plant to visit as many cities and individuals as possible before the House re-convenes September 9.





Passed and Approved at Regular Session of the City Council of The City of Brackettville, Kinney County, Texas this 10 day of August, 1981.


