



"Probably the largest drug related raid in Kinney County history," was how Sheriff Morgan Bailey described the Monday morning raid on a Kinney County ranch that netted over a truck load of marijuana plants and trees.

Sheriff Morgan Bailey, Chief Deputy Dennis Slubar and Department of Public Safety Officer "Buddy" Burgess, armed with a search warrant, entered the property located adjacent to Farm Road 2804 and Pinto Creek. They arrested James K. Dennis and his wife for alledge possession of marijuana and marijuana processing equipment. Dennis, who was described as in his middle fifties and approximately 5 foot eight inches tall listed his address as Alice, Texas. Dennis reportedly part owner of the property that the marijuana was found growing on.

Approximately 100 yards from Pinto Creek two irrigated fields, with sprinklers, cultivation tools were located with marijuana plants in excess of 15 foot tall were found growing, according to Bailey. The two fields were apparently enclosed in deer proof fencing.

Dennis and his wife were released from Kinney County jail after they posted bonds of \$15,000 each.

One truck load of the plants that were brought in weighed in excess of 280 pounds.

ACUBA---Japanese Laurel......

The genus Acuba includes the species--A Japonica, grown indoors as a popular house plant. As an outdoor shrub, an acuba can reach height of 15 ft., but as an indoor plant it would likely grow no more than 3 feet tall. The Japanese Laurels have oval leaves, arranged in pairs and are from 4 to 7 inches long. Insignificant purple flowers are produced in the summer. Many of the leaves are varigated, with gold-colored markings. Acubas need bright light or filtered sunlight when grown indoors. They can withstand a frost, and so they are a good plant for the cold drafty spot. Throughout the year, water thoroughly to keep soil moist, but do not allow plant to stand in water. Apply fertilizer regularly. Cutting brachhes back in the spring keeps any larger specimans "Houseplant" size.







The combined capabilities of Soviet air, ground and naval forces are keyed to spreading political, economic and military influence around the world, according to a new Defense Department evaluation of Soviet military power.

The sobering study of Soviet strength is a reminder to all of us that the Soviets have continued a tremendous military buildup during the past 10 years -- a time in which our own defense system has been allowed to slip.

by Defense Secretary Caspar Weinberger is strong evidence that the current emphasis on our mili tary forces is long overdue. Most with some important assistance people in our part of the country support a strong defense because we realize that we must be strong in a tiny, one-street town on a to deter aggression and that we cannot negotiate from a position of weakness. Let us hope that this new information will help convince the doubters.

Here is a sampling of the data in the 99-page report from the

Defense Department:

--- Over the past quarter-century the Soviet Union has increased military expenditures and devotes an average of 12 to 14 per cent of its Gross National Product each year to the military. The estimated dollar costs of Soviet military investment exceed ed comparable U.S. spending by 70 percent in 1979.

--- The Soviet Ground Forces have grown to 180 divisons stationed from Eastern Europe to Afghanistan. They are equipped with 50,000 tanks and 20,000 artillery pieces. In 1980 alone, 2,500 fast heavily-armored T-72 tanks were manufactured. The U.S. manufactured 467 tanks for our own use and 143 for foreign sales in the one-year period which ended last

August. --- The Soviet intercontinental strategic arsenal includes 7,000 nuclear warheads, with 1,398 ICBM launchers and 156 bombers, not including the new, multipurpose BACKFIRE bomber. They also have a larger number of general purpose submarines, surface warships and combat naval aircraft than any other nation. Of the 377 submarines in operation, 62 carry an estimated total of 2,000 nuclear warhead reentry vehicles. The Soviet Navy includes 180 nuclear-powered submarines, compared to some 115 in theU.S. Navy. --- The Soviet Union has deployed about 150 twin-engine, swing-wing BACKFIRE aircraft and is turning out more at therate of 30 each year. These aircraft are capable of performing nuclear attack, conventional attack and reconnaissance missions and can fly some 8,900 kilometers with a bomb load before inflight refueling. ---Over the past ten years, the Soviet Union is believed to have taken the lead in the development of directed energy weapons, although the U.S. still leads by two-to-seven years in microelectronics, computers and jet engine critical to fevelopment of advanced weapons systems. In 1980, how ever, the USSR was believed to have had the world's largest number of scientists and engineers engaged in research development

This new information does not mean that Americans should automatically approve all specific defense recommendations -- whether from Congress, the Administration or the Pentagon--but it does indicate that we must pull together to strengthen our overall defense posture. It is painfully clear from these latest findings that to remain free, we must build and maintain our own military strength.

YORKTOWN ANNIVERSARY

After the excitment of the 1976 Bicentennial we have tended to overlook other Revoluntionary War milestones. After the Declar-The declassified report released ation of Independence, the most important event occurred exactly 200 years ago this month. That was when General George Washington from the French, cornered the British under General Cornwallis bluff overlooking the south fank

of the York River.

The Siege of Yorktown ended October 19,1781, when the British surrendered. There will be a grand celebration in Yorktown this month to honor the end of the Revoluntary War. WE all have resaon to celebrate -- and to reflect on what that single victory meant to this nation and the

Freezing Vegetables

Home vegetable growing is growing. In fact, the U.S. Department of Agriculture estimates that three-fourths of all American families now grow at least some of the vegetables they use. In



addition, more and more families are canning, freezing, or otherwise preserving the food crops they are growing. A recent survey revealed that the reasons more families are turning to home vegetable gardening include saving on food costs; many believe home-grown vegetables taste better; and families enjoy the healthful exercise of gardening.

Not a violation of new law

Grocers and others can still sell cigarette papers, officials say

legally sell cigarette patrade group officials.

"Grocers and other retailers in the state have been confused by false reports that the new drug paraphernalia law prohibits them from selling cigarette paper after September 1," Charles Knapp, executive director of the Texas Retail Grocers Association, said

Knapp said he has advised his members that they can legally continue selling the papers, as well as several other items questioned as being under the new law.

Joe Ratcliff, executive vice president of the Texas Association of Tobacco and Candy Distributors, said he has been flooded with calls from wholesalers and retailers who are concerned about the effects of the law. He said much of the confusion has resulted from misleading reports on the law by the news media.

"Many of the news stories have not explained the law well, and some have said that cigarette papers will be banned after September 1, which is not easy to grow and require true," Ratcliff stated. He said the new law does not mention the papers, and is not aimed at grocery, convenience and other such retail stores.

The state's new drug paraphernalia law is directed at banning so-called "head shops," and was a part of Gov. Bill Clements' crime package considered by the last legislature. It was written and promoted by the Texans' War on Drugs Committee headed by Dallas computer magnate H. Ross Perot.

"The situation has been made worse because a local retail grocers organization

Grocers in Texas can still was misinformed about the law, and warned its mempapers will violate the new law," Knapp said.

Both Ratcliff and Knapp said they had followed the bill during the recent legislative session, and know from the effects of the law. that it covers only items sold with the "intent" to be used with narcotics. Ratcliff said he discussed the new law with its legislative sponsors recently because of questions being raised about what is covered under it. He said he also consulted with prosecutors and law enforcement officials about their interpretation of the law.

"Everyone agrees on the meaning of the law. It applies only to products sold with the intent to be used with illegal drugs," Ratcliff stated. He said police in several cities have stated that cigarette papers would be illegal only if they were being advertised specifically for use with marijuana.

Ratcliff said that one European company which exports papers to the U.S. has been making them since the 1700's, and that many other firms have been manufacturing and selling them for over 100 years. He said that tobacco wholesalers and retailers have been selling cigarette papers during all those years.

The bill does not specifically mention cigarette papers. However, it does list as "drug paraphernalia" many commonly sold items if they are "used or intended for use" with narcotics. Included are such products as blenders and mixing devices, bowls, spoons, capsules, balloons, envelopes and other containers, scales or balances, hypodermic syringes and

a person sells those and pers, according to industry bers that selling cigarette other items knowing or intending that they are to be used illegally with drugs. Law enforcement officials say this removes grocers and most other retailers

Under the law "intent" would have to be proved in court, which would involve the circumstances surrounding a sale, such as instructions or descriptive materials accompanying the object, the manner in which it was displayed for sale, the design and scope of uses for it, and other relevant factors.

A group of "head shop" owners has challenged the new law in federal court, U.S. District Judge David Belew has issued a temporary restraining order on enforcement of the law until later this month when he will hold a hearing to determine whether the law is constitutional. Similar laws have been struck down by the courts in other states.

The organization of "head shop" owners has adopted a name similar to that of the long-established trade association represented by Ratcliff. He stressed, "We are disturbed that they are attempting to confuse the public about their identity. They have no connection with us; and they are not involved with the tobacco industry in any way."

Ratcliff said his industry vigorously supports enforcement of laws to control the illegal use of
