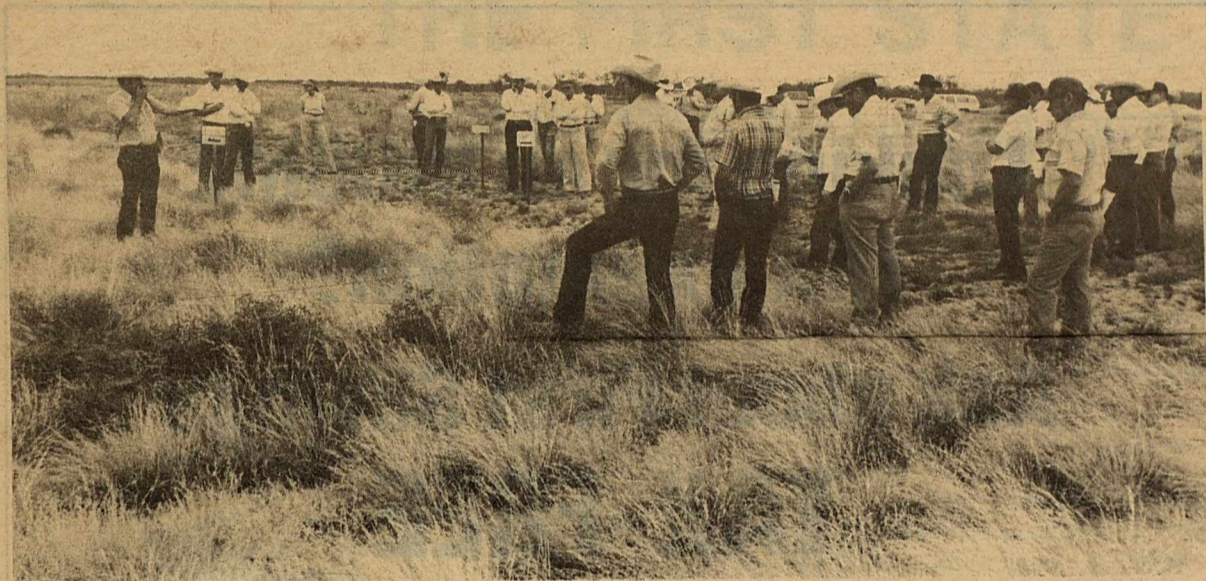

CITY RAISES WATER RATE

At a special meeting, Monday, October 26th, the City Council increased the minimum monthly water rates from the present \$4.50 per month to \$6.00 for the first 3,000 gallons and 60¢ per thousand gallons thereafter. Frank Sanchez presented the council with a list of seven (7) Cities of equal population of Brackettville, all of which had higher water rates. The increases will take effect November 1st. Voting for the increase were Alderman Davis,

Dimery, Sandoval; Alderman Garza voted against the increase.

It was learned this week from reliable sources that the City recently called in an outside consultant to survey the Brackettville utilities operation. Reportedly, the City has been losing considerable income due to: (1) improperly read meters (2) faulty meters; (3) incorrect information being supplied from the City to the computer.

The Council voted to re-zone Block 72, Brackettville Addition, Lots 1 thru 7 from Residential to Commercial.

Q. Is the metric system difficult to learn and use?



A. There are only seven basic units in the metric system, compared to over 50 units in our current system. It is a decimal system, so the quantities of each unit are powers of 10. Calculations then become a simple process of moving the decimal point to the right or the left. The metric system has no dual-use terms, such as our current use of ounces for both weight and fluid measurement.

1981 SUPER YEAR FOR PECANS

UVALDE--Pecan pies and other "goodies" prepared with the popular nut may once again be more visible on tables around the state.

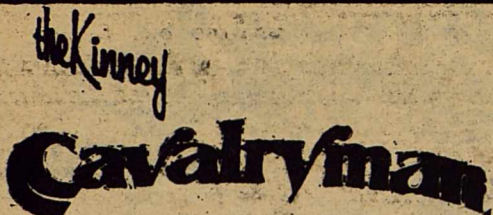
That comes as good news to thousand of pecan-loving Texans who missed out on their full share of pecan products last year when a devastating drought caused a drastic yield reduction.

But a new crop brings with it good tidings.

According to Texas Agricultural Extension Service management economist based here, pecan growers in South Texas have started harvesting a bumper crop of high quality pecans, possibly the state's second largest in recorded history. Growers in other portions of the Lone Star State will soon follow suit.

Preharvest estimates show Texas starting the pecan harvesting season with about 80 million pounds of pecans available for harvest." says Jose G. Pena. "That represents the second largest crop since these records have been kept. The 1979 preharvest crop was the largest at 95 million pounds, but pricing problems arose that interfered with harvesting."

Pena says the 1981 national pecan crop preharvest estimate of 328 million pounds is also one of the largest on a national scale. The current estimate is 20 percent higher than the highest past record of 275 million pounds harvested

DRACAENA MASSANGIANA....Corn Plant.....

The corn plant is form the agave
family, and has a leaf like corn, thus
its common name is an easy one to re-
member. A native of tropical Africa,
it will grow into a small two foot
tree with brances up to two inches thick.

Varigated froms of the corn plant
are popular for their color. Some have
creamy white marginal stripes, others
have a wide central band of yellow bor-
dered by more narrow bands of yellow.
After these plants are a year or so old,
they willshed some of their lower leaves;
making a showy cluster of leaves on top
of the bare trunk.

These Dracaena's like bright light
but no direct sun(which will burn the
leaves). They will tolerate darker spots
for a few weeks, of rotated to brighter
areas. Wataer thoroughly during the
growing period to keep the soil moist,
and allow the top inch of the soil to
dry between waterings during the winter
rest period. Fertilize during the active
growing period.

This tropical plant enjoys warm
weather and will show unjury if subject-
ed to temperatures below 45 degrees.
They enjoy being misted, or provide hu-
midy by standing pot on a bed of moist
pebbles.

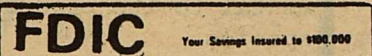

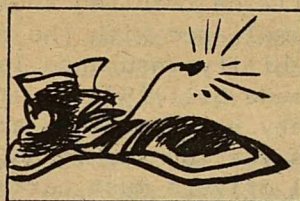

in 1973 and 60 percent higher than the national average of 206 million pounds.

In addition, this year's Texas before-harvest estimate is about 90 percent higher than an average crop of 42.4 million pounds and 627 percent higher than the 11 million pounds harvested last year.

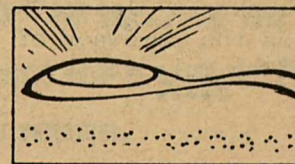
"A producer disagreement erupted in 1979 which caused problems with the price structure for native pecans," Pena continues. "Opening wholesale bid prices of 20-25 cents a pound for native pecans caused growers to abandon fields and leave the groves unharvested. However, prices recovered by mid-season and averaged 46 cents a pound a remainder of the 1979-80 years."

The Texas A&M University economist reports that 1981 opening price bids for inshell native pecans have been in the 45-55 cents per pound range and 80 cents to \$1.00 a pound for improved varieties.

"Thus far, in consideration of this year's large expected crop, these prices are much better than the season's opening prices during the last bumper crop in 1979," Pena notes. "We hope they continue as the bulk of pecans move toward harvest. At this time we see nothing on the horizon that will interfere with the current pricing structure."

He emphasizes that total pecan meats in storage was down by 10 percent from last August and in-shell pecans being stored was down 63 percent.

Texas is expected to rank second nationally following Georgia in total pounds of pecan production from improved varieties. Each figure is a substantial increase over the dismal output last year.

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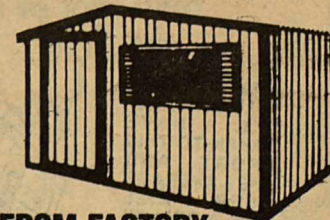

KINNEY COUNTY RANCH TOUR SHOWS BRUSH CONTROL RESULTS

BRACKETTVILLE--About 50 Kinney County and surrounding area ranchers got a first hand look at the effects of various brush control measures utilized on three Kinney County ranches during a Range-Wildlife Day and Ranch Tour here recently.

The program was organized by Kinney County Extension agent Carl Esser. Parallel and tandem roller chopping herbicide treatments and range-land reseeding were observed by participants on ranches operated by Joe Kerr Hadley Wardlaw and Clyde Earwood.

All three ranchers cooperated with Esser, area Extension range specialist Dr. Larry White and James Crumley, SCS District Conservationsit, in setting up demonstrations.

Speaking at Kerr's ranch, White said tandem and single roller chopping were employed side-by-side with each plot seeded in a different grass for ease of comparison. Tandem chopping utilized two drums pulled at 20 degrees offset cutting a seven-foot swath. Single chopping utilized three drums pulled in parallel cutting a 21-foot swath.

White pointed out that the average pounds per acre (oven dry weight) of forage was substantially greater from seede plots tandem chopped than single chopped. Plots were reseeded with Alamo Switchgrass, Kleingrass 75, Pelleted common Buffelgrass, sorghum alumum, El Reno sideoats grama, PMT 470 sideoats grama and Nueces Buffelgrass.

"Roller chopping provides moderate brush control through the crushing and cutting action of the drum and blades," White explained. "The cutting action of the blades into the soil often increase water infiltration and provides a better seedbed than shredding. In addition the soil disturbance plus temporary removal of competing brush allows potential for seeding. Greater soil disturbance and cutting action can be achieved by pulling two drums in tandem.

Esser said that drums averaged 30,000 pounds each when three-quarters filled with water allowing for better shoving action which triggers more effective chopper blade action.

AT Wardlaw's Ranch the touring

ranchers saw wider strips that had been roller chopped and a separate area where the herbicide Graslan had been applied.

There Dr. Dwight Guynn, Extension Service wildlife specialist, discussed the interrelationship between wildlife, brush control and livestock production.

"Although extension brush clearing can affect deer populations adversely, strip clearing can have a postive effect, Guynn said. "This way cover and food remains for the deer and livestock can thrive on growth generated by the range improvement process."

Guynn noted that forb production is important for deer and quail food and heavy applications for certain herbicides, such as Graslan, can be detrimental to the production of those plant species.

Joe Pena, Extension management economist, briefly addressed the economic potential of brush control leading ranchers through a step-by-step process to determine their return on investment.

Ranchers got a close look at the results of Graslan herbicide applications on two plots at Clyde Earwood's Ranch, the final tour stop. For one demonstation, Graslan had been applied to whitebrush at one pound active ingredient per arce, resulting in a good kill of the undersirable plants. Abundant forage was also observed at another site where the herbicide had been applied.

In all cases White emphasized that sufficient fuel has accumulated for excellent controlled burns with prescribed fire this winter.

The filed day and tour ended with a barbeque at Earwood's hunting lodge.

AUTO INSURANCE A MUST AFTER JANUARY 1

AUSTIN--Beginning January 1, 1982, Texas drivers contacted by Department of Public Safety officers during traffic stops and vehicle accident investigation will be required to furnish proof of compliance with the new compulsory liability insurance law.

Under House Bill 197, an amendment to the safety responsibility act approved this year by the Texas Legislature, all drivers must carry minimum liability coverage for medical expenses of \$10,000 per person (\$20,000 for two or more persons) and property damages of \$5,000.

Colonel Jim Adams, DPS Director, said Troopers will accept as evidence of insurance coverage the policy for the vehicle being operated or a docu-

ment issued by the insurance company.

"Such a document must contain a statement that the liability coverage for the motor vehicle is the minimum prescribed by the law," Adams said. "The Document must also include the name of the insurance company, name of the insured person, policy period and policy number. This document may take the form of a letter or a card, depending upon the preference of the insuring company."

Adams pointed out that DPS Troopers will be enforcing the provisions of this law along highways and rural roads.

"Local police officers and Sheriff deputies also have the authority to request this information from drivers. The DPS Director said. "I'm sure most law enforcement agencies in our state will also be enforcing this statute in their respective jurisdictions."

Drivers who do not maintain the specified coverage risk being fined at least \$75 for the first offense and a minimum \$200 for subsequent violations. In addition, a conviction under this new law will result in the suspension of the violator's driver license and motor vehicle registration unless the violator establishes and maintains proof of financial respon-

sibility for five years from the conviction date.

Adams also said vehicles which are to be used in the driving test by new driver license applicants must be covered by the minimum liability insurance specified by the law. Applicants will have to certify on the license application that the minimum coverage is in effect for the vehicle before they will be permitted to take the driving test.

The DPS Director predicted that more Texans will obtain the required liability coverage when the new law goes into effect.

"Current figures show that approximately 74 percent of the drivers involved in accidents carry liability insurance," Adams said. This indicates that a substantial number of people must secure the required coverage or face the possibility of heavy fines and loss of driving privileges."

Out-Of-State, Governmentally-owned and self-insured vehicles are exempt from the insurance requirements of the new law. However, drivers of self-insured vehicles will be asked by DPS officers to produce evidence of self-insurance at accident scenes and traffic.
