in tor Home and Leisure Activiti 98 persons died in Texas boating accidents last year. On Texas lakes and waterways there were 178 persons who required a visit to the hospital due to a boating accident and 379 boats were involved in accidents.

Mueller explains the role of the Texas Safety Association in helping prevent boating accidents: "Safe boating is largely a matter of education. Through the more than 1200 members of the association we are helping people learn more about water safety.

"We've asked each of our members to conduct special boating safety classes in their companies, towns or schools. Our members are personnel directors, safety managers, traffic safety officials, and public school administrators who are able to reach large numbers of Texas.

"The Texas Safety Association is also cooperating with the Texas Parks and Wildlife Water Safety Enforcement division and the auxiliaries of the United States Coast Guard in this effort."





NEW ALL-RISK OR MULTI-PERIL CROP INSURANCE LOSS REPORTING REQUIREMENTS IN 1982

"The dramatic increase in participation in All-Risk or Multi-Peril Crop Insurance mandates a change in notice of damage procedure," according to R.W.Crouch, Jr, Field Operation Director of the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation. "New regulations in effect in 1982 will give rapid, responsive, accurate service to the producer, and increase the efficiency of the loss adjustment process," Crouch added.

Current requirements for prompt written notice of damage during the growing season will remain in effect. In addition, the producer is asked to provide written notice of probable damage at least 15 days prior to the beginning ofharvest. If damage is not discovered until harvest, the grower is required to file a notice of damage report immediately, and to reserve a representative sample of the unharvested crop at least 10 feet wide and extending the full length of the field. The crop residue must be left undisturbed for 15 days from the date of the notice, or until written authority is given by the Corporation to do otherwise.

Notices of damage are to include policy and unit number, estimated yield per acre, and estimated amount of indeminity.

"The increased volume of business and farmer reliance upon the All-Risk Crop Insurance progam make it imperative that loss adjustment procedures reflect the realities of the added work load," Crouch stated.

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THE RENEWABLE CHALLENGE

As our economy has been tiptoeing through a downhill minefield of high interest rates, inflation, unemployment, high energy costs and foreign competition, one industry has experienced an annual sales increase of nearly 40% in each of the last five years.

That industry?

Solar energy.

And while the products and services of this industry have been demonstrating sustained market strength in both the residential and the commercial sectors of the American economy, these same technologies have been simply booming in many foreign markets.

This June, in Houston, the industry will "strut its stuff" at an international renewable energy trade fair expected to attract thousands of buyers, sellers and lookers. The Exposition, sponsored by the U.S. Department of Commerce and the American Section of the International Solar Energy Society (AS/ISES), will run concurrently with the AMerican Section's annual meeting and Techinal Conference.

The Department of Commerce is promoting the Exhibition, called THE RENEWABLE CHALLENGE, as part of its Foreign Buyers Program through all Consulates and Embassies, thus insuring the international flavor of the event. Already some 100 nations have responded and over 1,000 foreign buyers are expected.

The Conference and Exhibition is called a "renewable challenge" partly because of what Lee Salmon calls the "benign neglect" of the federal government. Salmon is the Executive Director of AS/IESE, the nation's largest association of solar professionals of the art technology and mar-He points out that although the industry's "health is good and its future exceeding bright" the elimination of most of theU.S. Government's solar programs has deprived the industry of needed research and market stimulation.

The "challenge" is to continue market growth without the kinds of subsidies afforded other energy industries. Most solar practitioners are confident this challenge will be met. And a few actually regard the withering of government participation as a pesition sign. As one Texas manufacturer put it, "Too much federal money was going to reinvent the wheel. We know what works andhow to build it. The problems is high interest rates."

However, renewable energy technologies, including solar, wind, and weatherization are are proving to be growth industries in teh residential sector in spite of those inflated in-

terest rates; the use of alcohol fuels for agricultural purposes is reducing the farmer's energy cost, as well as enhancing America's over-all energy picture; privately-financed photovoltaic (solar electric cell) homes are beginning to appear on the market; and small hydropower projects are popping up around the nation like bluebonnets on a Texas hillside.

Some of these technologies, such as Passive solar architecture, have been in continous use throughout the world for over 2,000 years, and solar hot water systems have been used in this country for nearly a hundred years. (Other technologies are being developed and market tested today.)

All will be on display at the Albert Thomas Convention and Exhibit Center in Houston this June 1 -- 5. Long time solar experts say it will be the most extensive array of renewable technolgies in the history of the United Sates.

The nearly 300 exhibitors will feature displays of low and moderate cost solar and wind devices; solar thermal systems for oil recovery, food processing power generation and desalination; photovtacis for telecommunications, water-pumping and rural electrification; and and almost endless selection of solar hot water systems.

There willalso be exhibits on solatr refrigeration; thermal walls; greenhouses; computerized controls; screens, shades, shutters, and awnings; and a bazaar of pumps, collectors, meters, panels, valves, and the other wares of the solar industry.

With an emphasis on Agriculture Solar Cooling, and trade within the Americas, the Exhibition, and the Conference, are designed to be the latest in the state ket development.

The Conference sessions and workshops will address solar design for industry; wind for the home and farm; oil from plants; small scale alcohol production; profit from exporting; solar utilities; marketing, mortgages and sales; the economics and politics of energy; and a variety of other topics.

THE RENEWABLE CHALLENGE is not only a look at the current solar market, but is also a door wide open to the future. As the Solar Society's Salmon boasts, "the long-run economics are with us." ********

SMOKING--AN EQUAL OPPORTUNITY TRAGEDY

More women then men now suffer from chronic bronchitis, according to the American Lung Association of Texas, the "Christmas Seal" People.

The signs of an epidemic of smoking related diseases are appearing among women.Rates of smoking cessation have dropped faster for men than women, and cigarette smoking is the major cause of long-term lung diseases such as chronic bronchitis. There are now 4.1 million women--compared to 3.4 million American men--who have chronic bronchitis.

Another cigarette-related disease emphysema, is more prevalent in men than women. But this severe lung disease takes decades to develop. Women as a group started smoking about 25 years later than men in this country, says the Lung Association, and this difference may explain the current discr

While chronic bronchitis can be treated, the destruction involved in emphusema cannot be reversed. One of the chief symptoms of chronic bronchitis is a cough that lasts. If untreated, the disease can develop into emphysema, which means that the delicate tissues of the air sacs are damaged. People with advanced emphysema often feel as if they are drowning in a sea of air.

The American Lung Association of Texas is making a special effort to convince women of all ages to stop smoking as fast as possible. In its tests to evealuate the effectiveness of its new self-help manuals, Freedom From Smoking, the Lung Association has found that women were as successful in quitting as men. Not all previous studies showed such results.

According to the Lung Association, other research has shown that babies whose parents smoke at home have more bronchitis and pneumonis than babies with non-smoking parents. Acute respiratory problems are also more common in young children if their parents smoke in the home.


