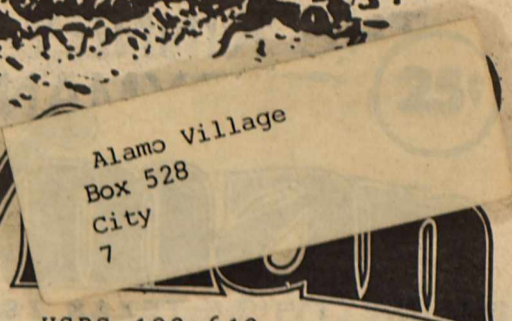

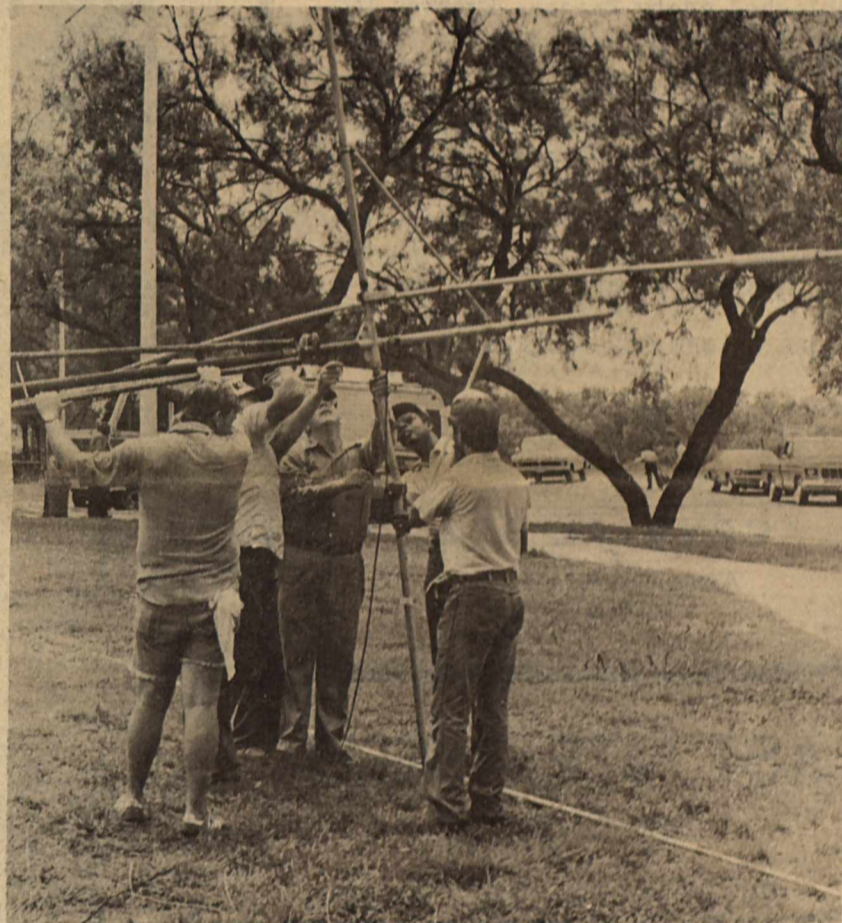
LOCAL RADIO HAMS TO TEST EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS

On the weekend of June 26 & 27 members of the Border Amateur Radio Society will participate in the 46th Annual American Radio Relay League Field Day Emergency Preparedness test.

On this weekend, thousands of Amateur Radio operators (hams) in the U.S. and Canada set up

their stations in the open using only emergency power and portable antennas. They contact as many operators as possible in the 24-hour period. These tests are designed to help hams refine operating skills so necessary during disasters and times of emergency when normal channels of communication are disrupted or unavailable.

In recognition of this event, Mayor Jerry Tremblay has pro-

Sgt. 4 Jose L. Garcia, USA, (Ret) age 77, passed away Saturday, June 12, 1982. A resident of El Paso for 41 years and a member of St. Joseph Catholic Church.

Mr. Garcia was one of the few remaining old soldiers of the U.S. 5th Cavalry Regiment and a veteran of World War II. He served under Gen. Jonathan Wainwright and Gen. George Patton at Ft. Clark and Ft. Bliss.

after retiring from the military service after 23 years of service, Mr. Garcia served an additional 23 years with the U.S. Civil Service at Ft. Bliss Texas. He was a member of the El Paso Symphony Orchestra for 12 years, playing the violin.

Survived by his wife, Mrs. Guadalupe C. Garcia, son Richard C. Garcia; daughters Mrs. Mary Lugo, Mrs. Laura G.

COMPTROLLER'S OFFICERS VISITS FLEA MARKETS ACROSS STATE

AUSTIN--State Comptroller Bob Bullock said today Comptroller enforcement officers are visiting flea markets across the state to amke sure all Texas retailers are treated equally.

"We have received complaints from taxpayers about competitor who don't charge or don't pay sales taxes. The business people who have made these complaints are only asking for what they deserve--to be treated just exactly like their neighbors and their competitors," Bullock said.

Bullock explained the enforcement officers now visiting flea markets aren't looking for the once-a-year garage sale a family might hold to clean out the overflow from their attic.

"we're looking for people who continually sell merchandise. When you start setting up shop week in and week out, you're not a garage sale anymore, you are a retailer. And the Legislature says retailers must have a permit from the Comptroller, post the necessary bond, report and pay their taxes."

Bullock pointed out that businesses who do not pay sales tax gain an unfair advantage over the conscientious taxpayer.

"These operators are also short-changing their neighbors by not paying their local sales taxes," Bullock added.

The statewide canvass of flea markets--due to be finished later this summer--will yield an accurate picture of the number and location of such markets across the state. Using this information, the Comptroller's Office will tailor a program to insure voluntary compliance with the sales tax law in the future.

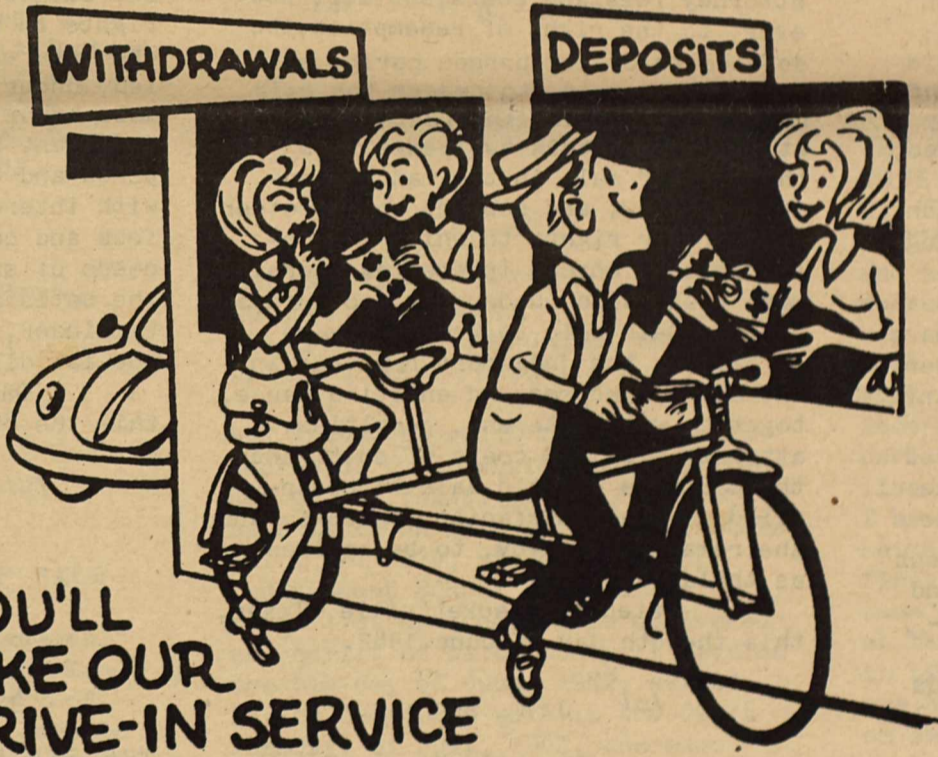

DEL RIO--More than 100 of the ranching industry's best noted experts and policy makers will present their expertise at the second annual International Ranchers Roundup (IRR) here August 10-12.

The program is designed to present updated technology from a variety of international sources and make ranching more profitable, while providing an opportunity for idea exchange among participating ranchers from throughout the country.

In addition, tours of progressive Southwest Texas ranches are scheduled August 9 and Mexico ranch tours, August 13.

"Effective Ranch Management" is the theme of IRR '82.

Headline keynote speakers include Raymond F. Lett, executive assistant to Agriculture Secretary John Block; Charles G. Scruggs, vice president and editor of Progressive Farmer magazine; Susan McBee, Texas State Representative; Stan Parsons, Savory Grazing System consultant; Bob Bliss; Friona Industries; and Terry Mitchell, with the Australian Department of Agriculture.

Since the deadline for tour registration and the \$50 registration fee discount is July 15, prospective participants are urged to send promptly for registration materials. 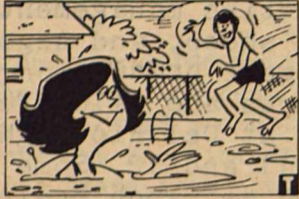

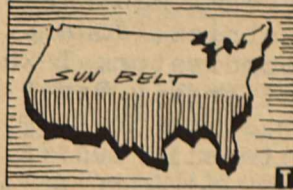

HEALTH HINT save your skin

More and more Americans are moving toward the sun-belt.

Those who are careful can avoid the problems caused by too much exposure to the bright and sometimes intense sun. Too much of that sunshine can cause a skin condition called solar keratosis, which in

some cases can become malignant if untreated.



You can help prevent skin damage by avoiding prolonged exposure to the intense rays of the sun.

The symptoms of solar keratosis include red, scaly patches, usually on the back

of the hands or on the neck or face and other frequently exposed areas of the body. Anyone with such symptoms should see a doctor. You are more susceptible if you're light-skinned, a blonde or redhead. Anyone whose job requires working many sunlit hours out of doors may also develop this condition. Farmers, fishermen and construction workers are among those most affected by the sun's power.

Doctors sometimes use a prescription medication

made by Hoffmann-La Roche Inc. that is often applied to the skin with good results for people with solar keratosis.

Only a doctor can diagnose and treat you properly. If you suspect that you may be developing this or any other skin condition, it's a good idea to see your doctor.

FETAL ALCOHOL SYNDROME

No child needs to have it. It's the third most common form of mental retardation.

It's totally preventable. Fetal alcohol syndrome (FAS) is a pattern of birth defects associated with drinking during pregnancy. It includes retardation and physical deformities. Other problems include facial abnormalities, growth deficiencies and malformations of the skeleton, heart and urogenital system.

Many drugs have been found to cross the placenta and affect unborn babies. Alcohol is one.

Some drugs cause babies to be born addicts and suffer withdrawal, after which they recover from their addiction. This is not the case with alcohol. The pattern of birth defects associated with heavy alcohol use is irreversible and permanent. The

child with FAS will never recover.

Drinking during pregnancy is risky. The safest decision is not to drink during pregnancy. No one really knows at what level of drinking harm to the fetus occurs. What is known is that the more a woman drinks during pregnancy the greater the risk to her baby.

Children born to women who drink may suffer fetal alcohol effect (FAE). These children may not suffer from the full syndrome, but may have one or more symptoms associated with maternal alcohol consumption.

Dr. Geraldine Wilson, associate professor of pediatrics and Baylor Medical College in Houston and director of Jefferson Davis Hospital's follow-up clinic, notes that while "a textbook case of FAS is pretty recognizable" it can be more difficult for a physician to spot a child with one or two features of the syndrome.

She notes that FAS children may range from intellectual ability from a dull normal IQ (who may be able to function in regular classrooms with special help) to severely retarded (who can learn some self-care skills.)

A study published in the Journal of Pediatrics found the average IQ of 20 FAS patients to be 65, with a range from 16 to 105. Average intelligence is considered to range from 90 to 110 points. Some researchers have found brain malformations in infants with the syndrome.

Microcephaly, a condition of abnormal smallness of the head reflecting deficient brain growth, is often a feature of FAS, according to an article in the New England Journal of Medicine. The same article states

that FAS children are frequently hyperactive.

FAS is caused by prenatal exposure to alcohol--it doesn't matter whether it is beer, hard liquor or wine. Not every woman who drinks during pregnancy has an FAS baby.

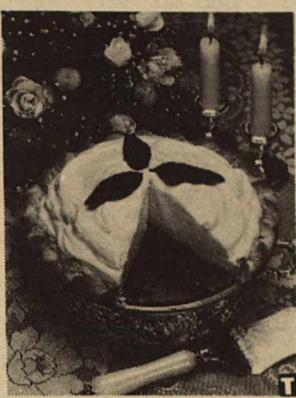
No woman who abstains from alcohol during pregnancy has an FAS baby.

The Texas Commission on Alcoholism, in cooperation with the National Institute on Alcohol Abuse and Alcoholism, is conducting a public awareness campaign on the subject of FAS, with awareness messages being disseminated to print and broadcast media.

"It is sad to think that there are children today who are retarded and who, genetically, had much greater potential," Ross Newby, TCA executive director, said. "I hope that women who are pregnant or planning to be will heed our slogan, 'A Pregnant Woman Never Drinks Alone'."

MORE THAN A PIE—IT'S A PARTY!

Summer is full of occasions that call for celebration—those delightful impromptu "events" you create as well as major milestones. And since warm weather entertaining should be as relaxed as possible—elegant can be easy—here's a deliciously chilly dessert to cap a special meal... or win praises on its own with, perhaps, a pitcher of iced coffee.



Filling for this Festive Black Bottom Pie requires no baking: you don't have to turn on the oven which saves fuel and keeps both you and the kitchen cooler. Since the extra-fudgy base begins with unsweetened cocoa, you'll save energy another way, too: unlike solid cooking chocolate, cocoa needs no pre-melting—measure and mix it in, directly from the can. That eliminates a pan and a lot of mess, plus a couple of steps.

Even more important, unsweetened cocoa is the purest, most concentrated kind of chocolate—Hershey has been the quality standard for decades—so flavor will be very rich. It blends readily with other ingredients, minimizing the risk of lumpy batters—consistency should be satin-smooth. As a bonus, it's also more economical: since it goes farther than baking chocolate squares, cocoa shaves one-third the cost off the "chocolate" in a typical recipe.

FESTIVE BLACK BOTTOM PIE

9-inch baked pie shell
1/2 cup sugar
1/3 cup Hershey's Cocoa
1/4 cup butter
1 envelope unflavored gelatin
1/4 cup cold water

1/2 cup sugar
1/4 cup cornstarch
2 cups milk
4 eggs, separated
1 teaspoon vanilla
2 tablespoons rum
1/2 cup sugar

Combine 1/2 cup sugar, cocoa and butter in medium bowl; set aside. Combine gelatin and cold water in small bowl; place bowl in pan of simmering water to dissolve gelatin.

Mix 1/2 cup sugar, cornstarch, milk and egg yolks in saucepan. Cook over medium heat, stirring constantly, until mixture boils. Cook and stir 1 minute. Remove from heat; blend 1-1/2 cups of custard into cocoa/sugar mixture. Add vanilla and pour into baked pie shell; chill.

Combine dissolved gelatin with remaining custard; add rum and set aside.

Beat egg whites until frothy; gradually add 1/2 cup sugar; continue to beat until stiff peaks form. Fold gelatin/custard mixture into beaten egg whites. Chill 15 minutes or until partially set. Spoon over chocolate custard in pie shell. Chill. Garnish with chocolate curls or shavings before serving.

TOON-UPS

Listen To Your Car's Early Warning Signs

Many a road service bill could be saved—and some dangerous problems averted—if drivers knew how to recognize early warning signs that say something's wrong with the car. Here are a few to watch for.



If you find light-colored powder on your battery cables, it's corrosion. Clean it off to avoid trouble.

You don't have to be a mechanic to check if your brakes are working properly. Push the pedal down. If it goes more than halfway to the floor—it shouldn't. If it feels spongy, you might have air bubbles in the brake lines. Here's another test. Push down hard on the pedal and count to ten. If it keeps going down, you might have master cylinder troubles (except for some diesel cars).

Ever notice those "drive-way drips"? They could mean a big problem. Clear condensed water from the air conditioner is okay. If the drips are oily or dyed, however, you could

be losing transmission fluid, coolant or motor oil.

Checking your battery cables could also save you a lot of time, trouble and expense. Make sure they're tight and not frayed. All corrosion should be cleaned off.
