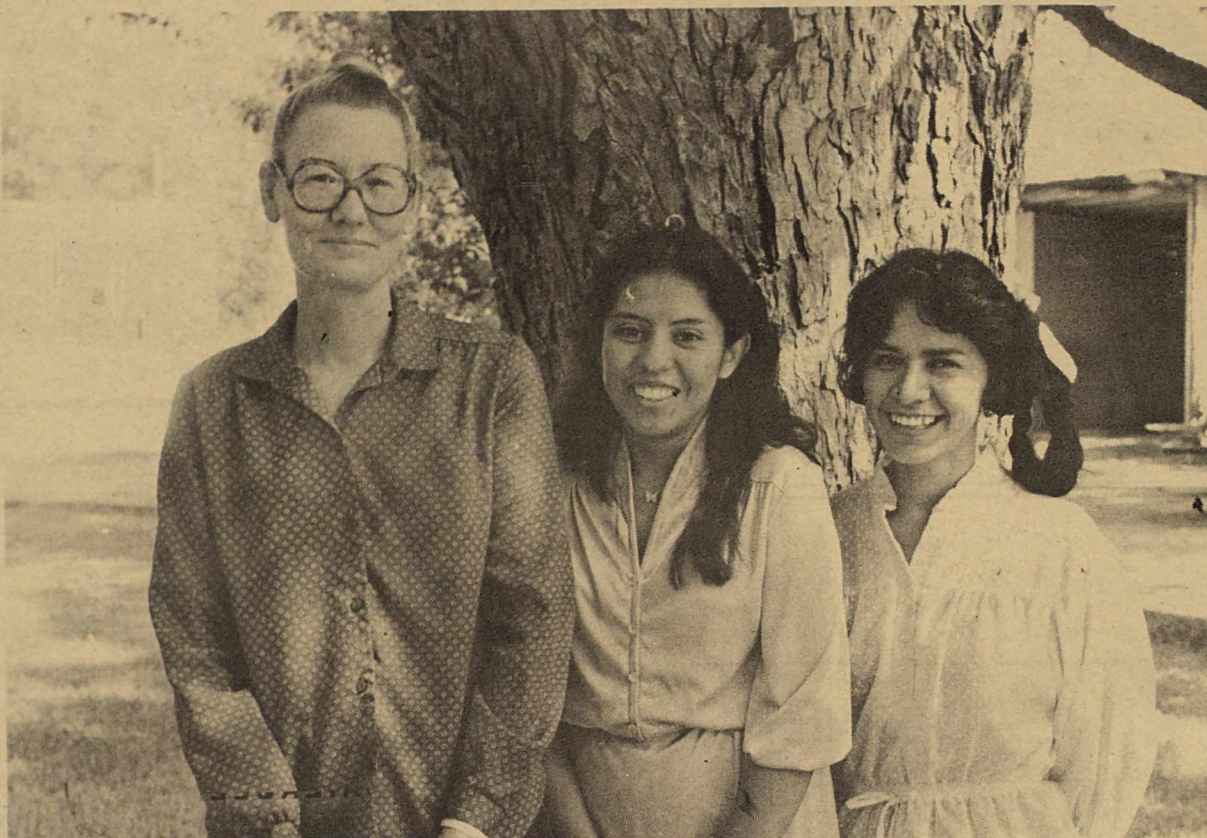

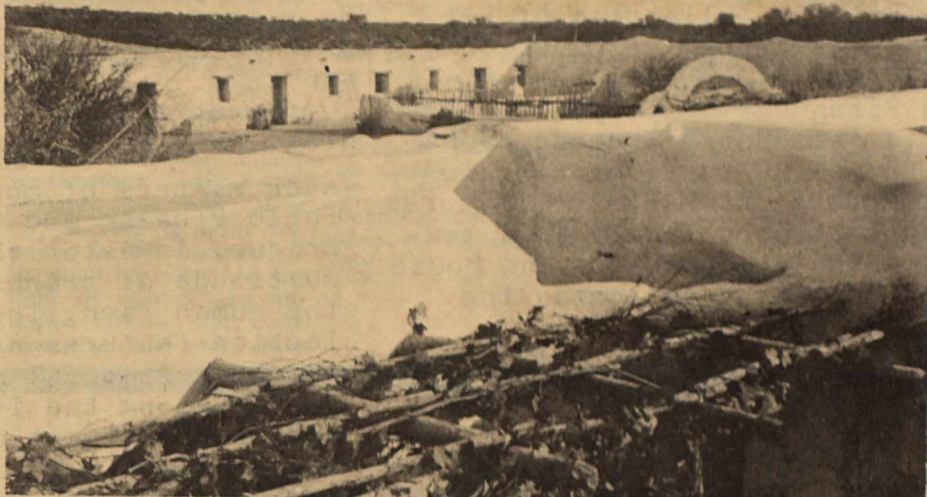

FLEAS FLEAS FLEAS

AUSTIN--The summer of 1982 may be the worst year yet for fleas in Texas--and dog and cat owners need to be aware of some safe, effective steps that can be taken to help control these irksome parasites.

"Dipping or spraying your pet is not enough. Treating the premises, your house and yard, and keeping your pets within the area that has been treated, are just as important," said Dr. Gred Soifer, president of the Texas Veterinary Medical Association (TVMA).

While dogs and cats are the main hosts for these parasites, fleas actually spend most of their lifespan off of the pet. So treatment of the premises is necessary, advises Soifer, a companion animal practitioner from Houston.

Three major reasons for the especially heavy infestation of fleas this year are the weather, a mild winter followed by a rainy spring and hot, humid summer. Products that had been safe and effective for killing fleas no longer seem to do the job--the fleas develop a resistance to some formerly effective pesticides. Population increases have added to the problem.

Scratching is the first obvious signal your pet has fleas. Pet owners should also watch for skin inflammation or bald spots. The fleas' saliva can cause a severe allergic reaction resulting in extreme itching,

scratching and chewing of the skin that may persist for up to two weeks after the death of the fleas. Fleas are carriers of tapeworms, and many animals with flea infestations will have tapeworms.

Kittens, puppies and small dogs are more easily made anemic because of their size. These small animals may become so anemic that they require a blood transfusion when the heavy flea infestation is coupled with hookworm disease.

Flea collars are not enough and in some cases if used properly are more harmful to pets than helpful. "Don't forget the improper use of flea and tick products can kill animals, so read the product label carefully," Soifer said.

The best method for controlling fleas varies from one part of the state to the other, and proper flea control measures differ from animal to animal. It is advisable to contact your veterinarian for individual flea control measures for your pet and premises.

In the home, foggers that kill not only the adult but the larvae as well are available. Yards must be treated with a pesticide, preferably the granular form. A commercial pest control individual may also be consulted.

Veterinarians in some parts of Texas are prescribing a systemic insecticide--a liquid or tablet that is given by mouth an absorbed by the system. This

is no panacea, said Soifer. The systemic insecticides is not affective unless the premises are controlled and is not effective on animals that are flea bite sensitive. "The key to flea control is still regular treatment of the pet and premises," reminds Soifer.

AFRICAN ART COLLECTION TO GO ON DISPLAY IN FIREHOUSE GALLERY: EXHIBITS OPENS JUNE 27

DEL RIO--"Of Gods and Mortals", an exhibit of African Art from the private collection of Lee and Judy Hilburg of Laughlin Air Force Base, will open at The Firehouse Gallery, 120 Garfield, on Sunday evening, June 27 from 7:30 to 9:00 p.m.

"OF GODS AND MORTALS" features a collection of sculpture, textiles, body adornments and household objects from across the African continent.

Among the different African tribes and countries represented are the Senufo from the Ivory Coast, the Ibibo of Nigeria, the Zulu of South Africa, the Masai of Kenya and the Akan, Simma and Fonti tribes of Ghana.

Included in the exhibit are a variety of finely woven and ornamented variety of finely woven and ornamented baskets from Botswana and North Africa.

Several of the textiles are large brightly colored, geometric

patterned wool rugs from Mali and Ghana.

Body ornaments have traditionally been very popular among the diverse and widespread tribes of Africa. The exhibit includes a variety of shell, beaded and bone hair ins, breast plates, are bracelets, throat collars and earrings.

African sculpture, long recognized as having been influence on

such masters of modern art as Pablo Picasso and Georges Braque, is astonishing in its multitude of transformations of the human face. The Hilburg Collection features several carved wooden ceremonial masks from the Senufo along the Ivory Coast and as assortment of Ibeji children's dolls from Nigeria.

"OF GODS AND MORTALS" will be on display in the newly-renovated Firehouse Gallery through July 21. Gallery hours are from 8:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m., Monday through Friday. There is no admission charge.

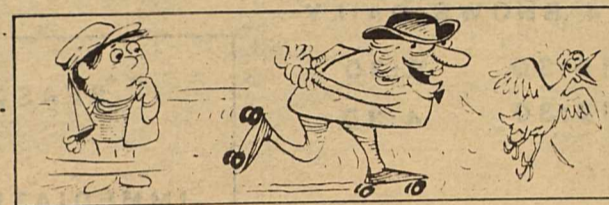

An estimated half a million children aged three through five in the United States have eye disorders — one in every 20 youngsters. Because children have no way of knowing how they should see, they may not complain about a vision problem. One of the eye problems of greatest concern, amblyopia ("lazy eye") may lead to permanent vision loss if not discovered and treated before age six — and it frequently gives no signals through appearance or obvious symptoms. 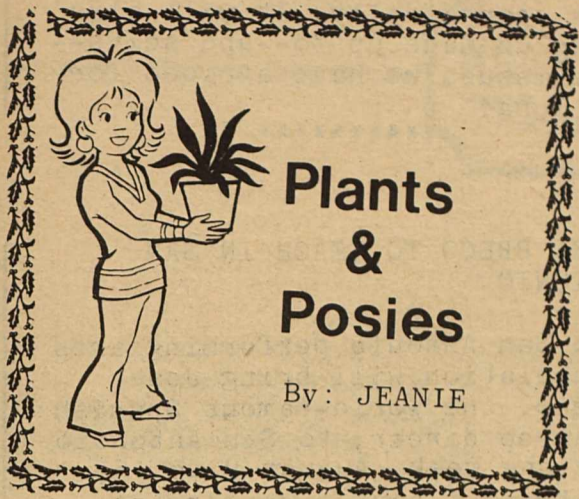

Plants & Posies

SUMMER PLANT CARE

A few tips to help your plants through the summer.

OUTDOOR PLANT--Your plants will need water more frequently this time of the year, perhaps every day. Be sure to keep them out of direct sunlight. Plants lose much of their moisture through their leaves, so thin leaves plants, (coleus, ferns, etc) will dehydrate fast. Misting and/of spraying with the hose will help to replace lost moisture and also cleans leaf surfaces. Be sure to mist early in the day, when sunlight is not hitting the plant. Leaf burn can result from direct sun on wet leaves). Fertilize your plants according to manufactures instructions.

INDOOR PLANTS--conditioning removes needed humidity from the air. Misting your houseplants will replace this needed moisture. Dry air causes leaf tips to brown. Spider mites thrive in dry air, and misting also helps to keep their population under control.

Lack of humidity can also cause dry crumbling leaves, and/or pale leaves and weak growth.

Do not place your plants in areas where air-conditioning vents will blow directly on the leaves. Cold blasts of air tends to dry out the plant and the temperature extremes can cause leaf drop. Drafts (hot or cold) and insufficient humidity can also cause bud drop from your flowering plants. Fertilize your indoor house plants according to manufacturers instruction.

behaved pets as guests. Including members of the country's largest chains!

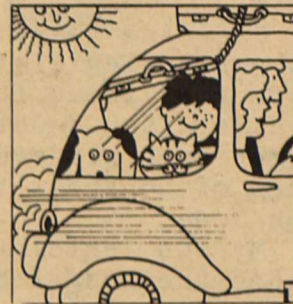

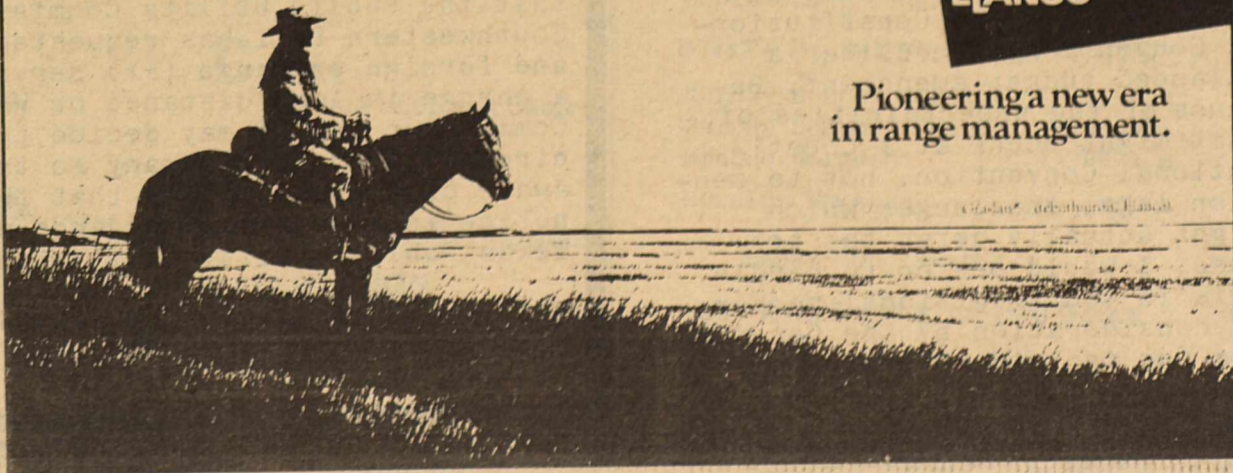

Over the years that I have supported legislation to mandate a balanced federal budget I have often doubted that we might ever win over enough Members of Congress to get the job done.

My own legislation to balance the budget has long been avoided by those who simply refused to face the fact that runaway federal spending had crippled our economy from top to bottom.

I am heartened to report that we may yet see this important budget relief. Those of us who have sponsored legislation to accomplish a balanced budget, joined of late by a growing number of Members of Congress who have seen the light, have joined forces on House Joint Resolution 350, the Tax Limitation-Balanced Budget Constitutional Amendment. There are already more than 200 members of the House who are co-sponsors of the Amendment, and there is a companion bill in the Senate.

We have now been joined by President Reagan, who recently endorsed a balanced budget amendment. This support will be most helpful, of course, and the President's endorsement of a balanced budget is even more important in light of his statement last March that budget deficits are a "necessary evil in the real world."

DEFICIT CONTROL

We are counting on the belief that deficits are not unavoidable. It is our position that balancing the budget may be painful, but it will go a long way toward solving our economic problems. Texas is the envy of the nation with a pay-as-you-go system of government which has helped us avoid at least some of the more damaging effects of the national economic problems.

Thirty-one states have already requested a Constitutional Convention to consider a balanced budget amendment. Because of the uncertainties of what might occur at a Constitutional Convention, not to mention legal challenges which might actually deter the process, I would prefer to handle this in the traditional manner of consideration by the Congress and the individual states.

This particular legislation H.J.Res. 350, which has been the project of the National Tax-Limitation Committee, contains what some openly describe as a "loophole" under which deficit spending could still be possible. In an emergency, three-fifths of the total membership of each house could vote to adopt a deficit budget. Also, a majority of the total membership of each house would be necessary to increase federal receipts at a rate greater than the prior year's rate of increase in national income.

There is some difference of opinion as to whether this clause allows Congress too much freedom to backslides. The other side of the coin is that we cannot box-in the budget and ignore the possibility of future spending emergencies. As I see it, the three-fifths vote should ensure that no frivolous spending would lead us back into a deficit situation. It is very difficult to get three-fifths of the Congress to agree on anything, much less money matters.

STILL PROBLEMS

The Amendment--if Congress and the States approve it--would be of great benefit to this country, but we would still face many painful decisions on where to place our spending priorities

The debates over "guns or butter" or what combination thereof have been going on for many years and no doubt will continue. After the balanced budget itself, this is the next great question we will face.

A balanced budget may not make this easier, but it will

certainly make it less dangerous economically. It will also make us face up to--and solve--the issues we have avoided for so long.

Jose Greco, who appeared last fall in S.P.A.'s sold-out performances in San Antonio, will hold auditions on Monday, August 9. Mr. Greco's residency in San Antonio is sponsored by the San Antonio Performing Arts Association and co-sponsored by Schlitz of San Antonio and other local contributors.

The dance classes will offer the San Antonio community a rare opportunity to learn from the "Master of Flamenco Dance". Classes are for students age 9 to adult with at least 3 years of dance experience.
