People living in Kinney County should call the Eagle Pass Social Security office to conduct Social Security business.

Using Social Security teleservice people can conduct most of their Social Security Business by tele-phone and save time and money too, according to Miss Elvia F. Fuentes, Branch Manager.

Unless information or service is needed immediately, it is best to call after the middle of the month. Office are usually very busy early in the month, and mornings are generally busier than afternoons. But do not delay calling the Eagle Pass Social Security office to conduct any business which affects benefit checks, stated Miss Fuentes.

The School district is expending approximately \$850,000 form Bond proceeds voted last fall. ******** GLAUCOMA--ONE OF THE LEADING CAUSES OF BLINDNESS

Glaucoma is one of the nation's leading causes of irreversible blindness, although there are readily available methods of treatment to control the disease.

TheTexas Society to Prevent Blindness (TSPB) reports that about two million Americans have glaucoma, and half of them do not know that they have it.

"The problem is that glaucoma, sneaks up on you," says Elvin Schofield of San Antonio, State President of TSPB. "In most cases it has no symptoms in its early stages and its victims do not realize that anything is wrong until they have already lost some vision. Sight lost to glaucoma can never be restored."

The disease can be detected through quick and painless testing. Adults should have their eyes exmined for glaucoma at least every two years; treatment can halt progressive loss of vision when the disease is found in time. People with a family history of glaucoma, those with diabetes and cardiovascular diseases and senior citizens are at greatest risk and should be checked annually.

In glaucoma, Mr. Schofield explains, the fluid circulating through the front portion of the eye does not drain properly. It backs up, causing pressure that eventually damages the retina, destroying sight.

Warning signs include loss of peripheral vision, difficulty in adjusting the eyes to dark rooms, blurred or foggy vision, or the appearance of halos around lights. By the time these symptoms appear, however, there may already be significient damage to the vision, and that damage cannot be corrected.

In most cases, he says, treatment consists of ey drops that enable the eye's drainage system to function effectively. In some cases, an operation may be Page 2

"With what we know today," Mr Schofield, adds, "there is no reason why people should continue to go blind or to have impaired vision from glaucome. An examineation every two years is not much af an investment in time and money when you measure it against the devastating consequences of blindness."

The financial aid department at Southwest Texas Junior College is urging all students seeking financial assistance to complete the application procedure and bring ll necessary forms to the college prior to registration.

"we are particularly interested in informing those students who have completed the 'Application for Federal Student Aid' and have

received their 'Student Aid Report' that theymust also bring a signed copy of their parents 1040A or 1040 income tax form before their PELL grant can be distributed." said

Ismael Talavera, director of fin ancial aid at SWTJC.

If these students can bring the 'Student Aid Report' and the signed copy of their parent's income tax return before regisitration process will be simpler, he added.

"The process can be completed during registration," Talavera said. "But to do so will necessitate that the student leave the registration area, and take some time in other affices before receiving the grant and completing registration."

Applying for educational assistance is a complicated process, as are most procedures that involve several federal and state bureaucracies.

Students who simply want to apply for a PELL grant, a federal grant named after the representative who origniated the bill establishing the program, msut complete an "Application for Federal Students Aid," which is available at SWIJC

and send that application to the appropriate federal processing agency.

The federal agency transfers the information to a 'Student Aid Report" form, which is coded to indicated how much financial aid the student is eleigible for, and returns that form to the student.

The student must then take the "Student Aid Report" form and a signed copy of his or his parents' income tac return to the college to have the college's financial aid department verify that the information on the form is correct and administer the grant.

"The verification process is copleted on thelocal level" Talavera said. "In the past, we have only had to verify a few of the reprot forms, but now we must verify themall. This is why we must have the signed copy of the income tax return."

Accoridng to a recent letter from the federal processing agency which originally receives the applications processing the application and getting the "Student Aid REport" form back to the student takes approximately 25 days.

Types of financial aid other than federal grants take less time. Other types of aid include the supplemental grant program, the Texas Public Educational grant program, the workstudy program and Hinson-Hazelwood state loans.

Students may apply for these and the federal grant by filing the "finanacial Aid Form" with the College Scholarship Service (CSS) for a \$6.50 fee. CSS processes these applications in two weeks, and then sned s theresults back to the student and to the federal processing agency.

The process for the federal grant still takes the 25 days, but the

process for the other types of aid takes only two weeks.

"I would like to urge all students applying for financial aid to bring these required forms to me as soon as possible, preferably before registration, "Talavera said. "Anyone with questions can contact me at 278-4401, ext.272."

Day class registration at SWTJC is Monday through Wednesday, August 23-25,with Uvalde evening registration on August 25. Del Rio Registration is August 19; Eagle Pass, the

FREE EDUCATION AND THE UNDOCUMENTED WORKER

On June 15, 1982, The Supreme Court ruled, 5-4, that Texas and other states must provide free public education for the children of undocumented workers people in this country illegally.

Our current Lt. Governor. Mr. Hobby, was happy with the decision, praising it as the "only rational decision" the court could have made. On the contrary, I think it was a wrong decision that defied both law and logic. One of the principal underpinnings of an orderly so-ciety is that one should not benefit from breaking the law. All around the world. thousands of people stand patiently in line at our embassies, waiting for legal entry into this country. By its recent ruling, the Supreme Court told these people that, if they are smart, they will ignore our immigration laws, find some other way to enter, and then there's a good likelihood all manner of taxpayer-supported benefits

will be open to them and their families. We can all feel sympathy for people driven to emigrate by desperate economic conditions. And I believe we should be compassionate toward the children of undocumented workers who are here through no fault of their own. We have been told we must educate these children and we will: it is our duty.

But I am deeply concerned about the effect this will have on our school systems and the quality of education. We have only a certain amount of desks and dollars with which to address the problems of educating Texas' children.

The court was essentially establishing social policy under the guise of ruling on a constitutional question. The result was bad law and bad social policy. It should now be up to the Federal Government to help pay for the mess they have created by not properly policing our borders.



The House of Representatives last week took a positive step toward creating new jobs and cutting back on the critical problems of rising unemployment.

The National Development Investment Act, which I very strongly support, is the major economic development initiative of this Congress in that it provides badly needed funds to promote local economic recovery and to foster economic growth. The bottom line, of course, is jobs.

Byproviding \$500 million annually through fiscal year 1985 to assist State and local fovernments in their economic development efforts, this needed legislation emphasizes the point that economic recovery depends on the ability of our communities to create jobs and achieve economic stability.

In approving these matching grants to local governments, the federal government allows local officials the maximum flexibility to choose the best course of action--and no one knows th local needs better than those closest to the community.

The assistance is targeted to communities with thegreatest need, and the bill encourages communities to pool public and private resources to design the strategy best suited for their needs. One feature permits the establishment of locally administered revolving loan funds to support small business expansion and to retain existing firms.

While I recognize that the funding may be modiest in view of the critical condition of many local economies and hte great number of unemployed workers, the legislation offers encoruagement and needed assistance, and seems to me to be right on target.

RADIO MARTI

Among the many items of debate during a busy week in the House was a bill to authorize support to Radio Broadcasting to Cuba--Radio Marti. Frankly, it is the state of international affairs that demands this foreign policy tool which will utilize trouthful information to counteract the propaganda forced on the Cuban people by Fidel Castro.

Radio Marti will offer the Cuban people realistic and truthful information about their country which their government will not allow them to know. for example, why is the Cuban government spending millions of dollars to support thousands of Cuban troops inAngola when the Cuban economy is in such terrible straits?

An important amendment to this bill, which was apprived with my support, insists that the broadcasint to Cuba shall be accurate objective and comprehensive and that editorial opinion must be clearly labeled as such. We do not intend toestablish a prograganda agency,, but rather a source of accurate information to conteract Cuban-controlled broadcasts and the only other international broadcast targeted especially to Cuba That source of information is, of course, Radio Moscow. I supported this legislation, which was approved by the House.

The House, by a vote of 352-56, also approved new amendments to the Federal Insecticide, Fugicide and Rodenticide Act, which is vitally important to the regulation and control of pesticides in our nation. With nearly $\beta 00,000$ pesticide-related injuries and lamost 800 related deaths annually, there is a need and an obligation for us to look more carefully at the use of dangerous chemicals.

The legislation, written after careful consulatation with industry, environmental groups, labor representatives and private citizens, is an effort to improve our laws and protect innocent people. Although we cannot rid our society of danger, we can take logical steps to control at least some of the obvious perils.

One major provision will end the inequities that presently exist between some states, and put all farmers and users on the same competitives basis in the use of pesticides. Farmers in onw state will be able to obtain the same pesticides that are available in other states, thus the citrus fruit growers in Texas, California, and Florida, for example, will enjoy the same opportunities.



Bougainvillaes are easy houseplants to grow, and they provide lots of color in shades of red, purple and orange. The leaf bracts of these plants retain their vivid colors for several months.

Most species of Bougainvillaes are shrubly climers, originally from South America. The best type for room cultivation is Bougainvilla glabra. This type is colorful as a 'small plant. It can be kept compact and bushy with training. Various shades of purple and red bracts make this plant appealing.

Bougainvillaes must have good light for colorful bract production. Keep these plants well watered in summer. In autumn, when flowering is over reduce watering. These plants do need a rest period, so in winter, give only enough water to prevent the root ball from drying out. Gradually resume watering schedule in the early spring when new growth begins.



When using dried herbs, make sure to crumble them to release the flavor.






