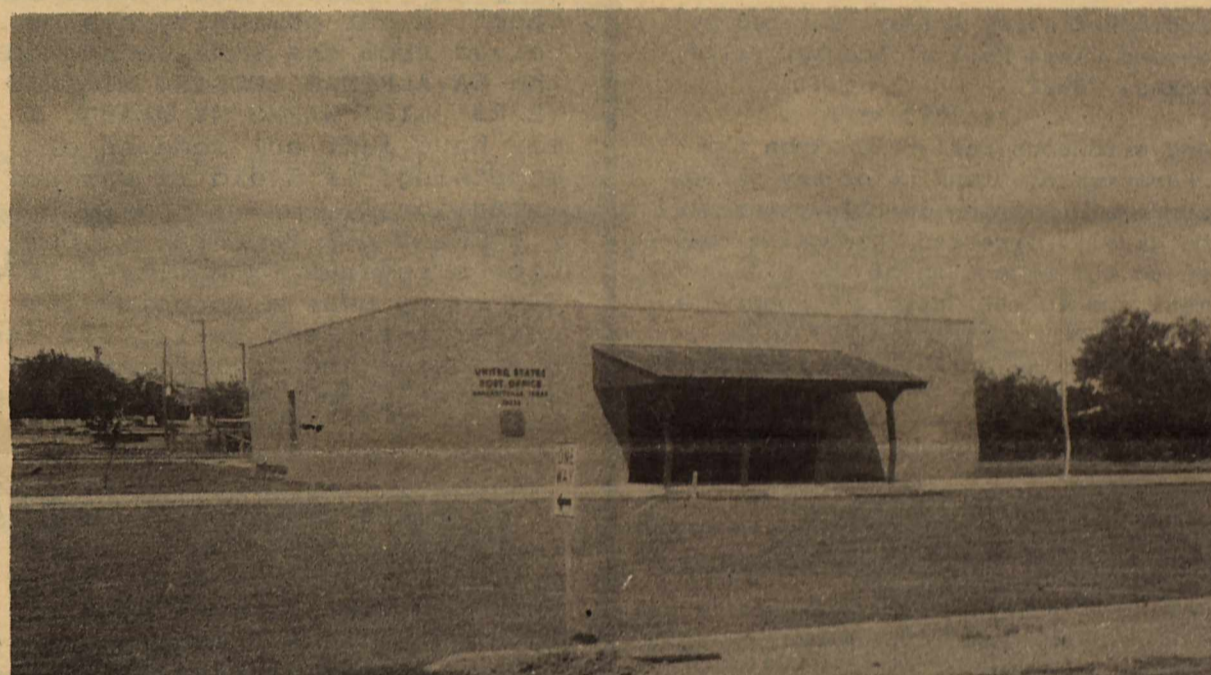

CHANGING ATTITUDES ABOUT DWI

Few things in this coun-
try have changed as much
during the past few years as
public attitudes on drunk
drivers. It is a change we
can all be thankful for.

Most of that change, in
my opinion, can be attrib-
uted to the organization of
Mothers Against Drunk
Drivers (MADD), and the
attendant publicity and edi-
torial support they have
received from our news-
papers. They have suc-
ceeded, where others have
failed, in drawing attention
to the tragedy that has
claimed the lives of thou-
sands of Texans.

It was not long ago, for
instance, when some public
officials who ought to lead
by example were openly
contemptuous of our laws
against driving while
drunk. Much of this prob-
lem started nine years ago
when my opponent became
Lt. Governor and helped
pass the law reducing the
legal drinking age from
twenty-one to eighteen
years of age. Now Mr.

Hobby, feeling the heat of
irate parents and loved
ones, and perhaps personal
remorse, has said he favors
tougher drunk driving
laws—another switch from
a previous position.

Political promises, how-
ever, are easily made. If a
politician can't get excited
about an issue of this mag-
nitude in nine years, it
seems unlikely that he
would get excited and pur-
sue corrective legislation in
another four years.

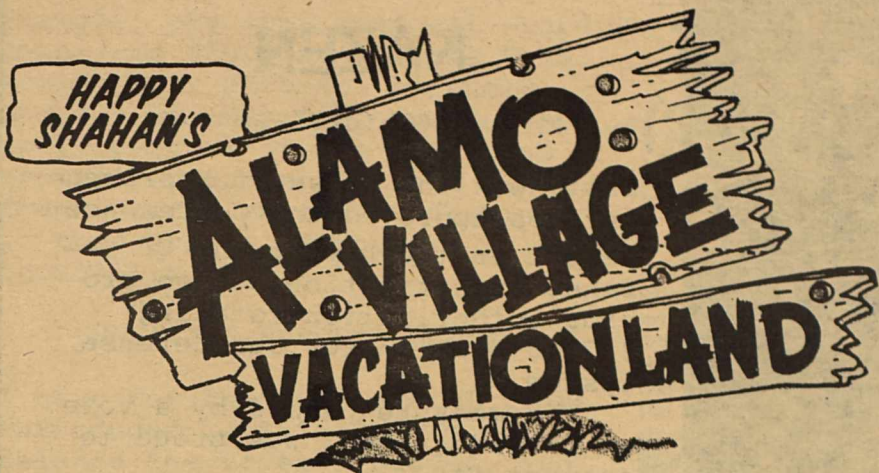
So I hope the Mothers
Against Drunk Drivers will
stick to their guns, and I
hope they continue getting
support from the people of
our state. Their efforts to
put an end to this carnage
on our highways has my
support, and I hope it has
yours.

Of one thing we can be
reasonably sure: Starting
next year we will have a
new Lt. Governor, and that
will make it easier. If you

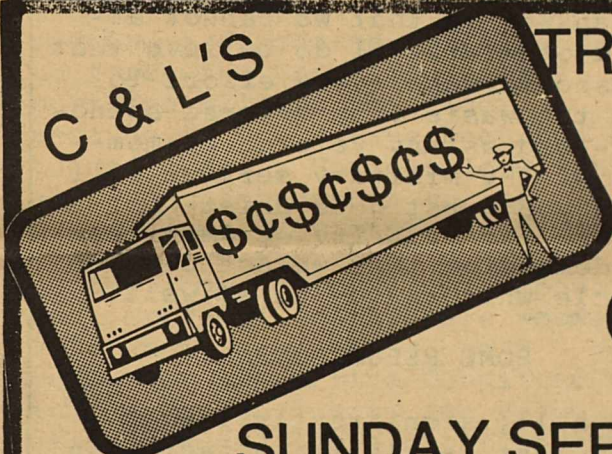

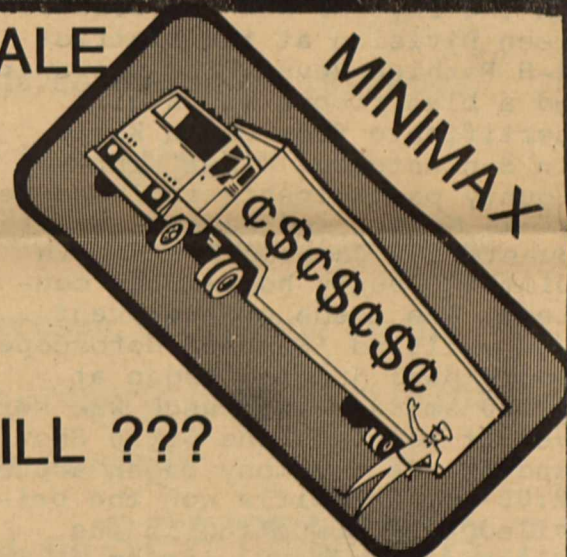

HUNTER'S SAFETY COURSE TO BE OFFERED AT FIREHOUSE

The Del Rio Council for the Arts will sponsor a Hunters' Safety Course which will meet for three consecutive nights on Monday, August 30, Tuesday, August 31, and Wednesday, September 1 from 7 to 10 pm. at the Firehouse, 120 E. Garfield in downtown Del Rio.

The Hunters Safety Course is sanctioned by the Texas Department of Parks and Wildlife and the National Rifle Association. The course will cover such topics as safe gun handling, wildlife conservation, wilderness survival, game identification, and the history of firearms.

Instructor for the course is Roy Armstrong of Fort Stockton. Mr. Armstrong has been a volunteer hunter safety instructor

since 1977 and a boy scout master since 1973. He is employed as a seismic operator for Exxon. The fee for the 9 hour course is \$1, which covers the cost of a course handbook. A maximum of 20 participants can enroll in the course.

Last Week the House of Representatives approved the Conference Report on the Department Of Defense Authorization Act to provide authorization totaling \$177.8 billion for our defense system.

The measure passed by a vote of 251-148, and I was proud to support it.

It has been said that a strong national defense to protect the United States from aggression is the single most important duty of the Federal Government. If this statement sounds too strong, consider the fact that all of our cherished freedoms stem from our Constitution and our system of government, which must be guarded at all costs.

I am often asked how this nation can afford to maintain a strong deterrent force in this age of expensive weapons systems. My answer is that we cannot afford otherwise. I do believe that we should make every effort to cut the waste from defense spending--as any veteran or member of the military service will tell you, waste does exist--but I join the majority of Americans in demanding that we not cut the muscle which serves us so well.

SOME REDUCTIONS

The bill, significantly larger than last year's is in fact \$5.6 billion below the request of the Administration. This was possible in part because of favorable contract negotiations. In the M-1 tank program, for example, it is now possible to procure 855 tanks, 79 more than originally requested, for \$96.6 million less than requested.

In other programs, Congress approved reductions because the services simply could not justify the need. In other areas, programs were deferred because of competing requirements for dollars.

I was particularly pleased that the bill included authorization for \$200 million for the Guard and Reserve Forces, and that the chief of each Reserve component will list his spending priorities and report to the Armed Services Committees of the House and Senate.

As a member of the House Armed Services Committee, I recognize the contributions of the Guard and Reserve as a part of the Total Force concept. For

example, the Army National Guard comprises 33percent of the total Army combat division strength, and the Air National Guard Makes up 27 percent of the Air Force tactical fighter aircraft fleet. These forces must be modernized if they are to perform to full capability.

BALANCED BUDGET UPDATE

I have for the past several years introduced legislation to balance the federal budget, and I eas jointed this year by a large number of members and, more recently, the President, in support of such an amendment to our Constitution.

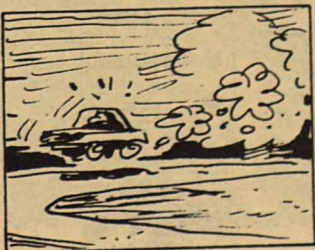
As I have said before, Texas has a long, successful history with a system of pay-as-you-go and there is no reason that the federal government cannot do the same.

I had hopes that the House Judiciary Committee would expedite its consideration of this bill, as we were told by Chairman Peter Rodino. I had avoided signing a discharge petition to force the Committee to report the bill to the floor because it would have been returned under a House rule which allows no amendments on the House floor. I prefer the flexibility of being able to open up the legislation if it appears that critical changes are needed.

In addition to that, as a member of two active Committees in the House, I know the value of processing legislation through an orderly system of hearings to ensure a thorough examination of the issues.

After waiting all summer for the Judiciary Committee to act, however, it is apparent that the subject is much too important to postpone any longer, and I have signed the discharge petition calling for the bill to be placed before the House.

Congress is in recess and I will be spending all of my time in the 23rd District, where I look forward to meeting and talking with South Texans on the many issues that affect us all.

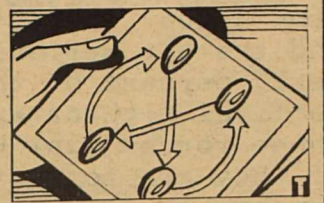

The right front tire is switched to the left rear and the left front tire is switched to the right rear position. The rear tires are brought directly forward as the diagram indicates:

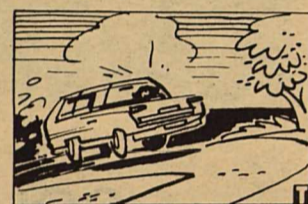

Some of the world's most famous entertainers have teamed up with more than 21,000 convenience stores across the country to help in the search for a cure to Muscular Dystrophy.

The stars will be entertaining the nation during the 21 hour Jerry Lewis Labor Day Telethon, while the stores are well under way raising funds by staging events from bike-a-thons to car smashes.
