

Through practical hands-on learning experiences, 4-H members select and follow pathways that lead to success in personal and career development.

4-H, America's largest out-of-school program for boy's and girls' between the ages of 9 to 19, is the youth program of the Cooperative Extension Service of the state land-grant universities and the U.S Department of Agriculture. Some five million youth are involved in 4-H across the nation, with 140,000 of these in Texas.

The overall mission of the Extension Service in Conducting 4-H programs is the development of youth individually as responsible, productive citizens, says Esser.

4-H members learn specific skills in programs such as nutrition, animal science, forestry or gardening They also learn to keep accurate records, make oral presentations and develop life-long management, consumer and communications skills, explains.

They use their skills to contribute to community development through such projects as beautification, historic presentation, work with the elderly, energy conservation as in volvement in civic affairs, says Esser.



#### KAZEN

I have always said that the collective wisdom and experience of our senior citizens is a national treasure, and that we sould do everything we can to insure the health and happiness of these valuable Americans.

Nearly 26 million people in the United States are 65 or older—and each day there is a net increase of 1,600 Americans 65 or older. That is another reason why the grow ing controversy over Social Security is so troublesome, and why so many of our people are alarmed over their future at a time when they should be planning to enjoy the fruits of their retirement years.

First, there was the Administrations' proposal to eliminate the minimum Social Security benefit to those who need it to survive. I opposed this and, joined by the majority in Congress, overturned that proposal.

Now I see that Martin Feldstein, the president's nominee for chairman of Economic Advisors, favors changing the cost of living adjustments (COLA's) under Social Security so that venfits rise automatically by two percentage points less than the Consumer Price Index rather than by the full amount of the CPI increase.

I am pledged to consider any and all proposals to improve Social Security, but on the face of it, Feldstein's suggestion appears to be simply another penalty for reaching 65. Even those people who claim they support the Administration 100 percent of the time would have to think twice before approving a plan to treat senior citizens as second class citizens.

I think a better plan would be to idevote the full resources of this great nation to solving the problem of Social Security without penalizing older Americans. If we can put a man on the moon, we ought to be able to master Social Security.

Nearly 116 million workers pay into the system to build retirement benefits, diability and survivor protection for themselves and their families. About a fourth of the retired elderly depend upon Social Security for 90 percent or more of their total income, and for the majority of all others, Social Security is the major single source of income.

No other institution in our so0 ciety does so much for so many people, and any changes should be to strength the system, not weaken it

#### VETERANS EDUCATION

I was pleased to see that more veterans have received educational training under the Vietnam-era GI bill than under previous editions of the legislation.

The Bill permits a veteran to use the educational benefits within 10 years following discharge, or by December 31,1989, whichever is earlier.

This bill has assisted 1,397,000 peacetime post-Korean veterans and 679,000 persons who trained as service personnel. The remaining 5,819,000 are veterans of the Vietnam ear.

From June 22,1944, when the fist GI bill was signed into lay by President Roosevelt, through June 30, 1982, a total of 18.1 million have received benefits.

We can't calculate the direct and indriect benefits to our nation, but we know that it has assisted many, many young people to make farther valuable contributions to our country beyond thier military service. To me, this is the best example of a cost-effective program.

There are seven years remaining in the life of the current GI education bill. Another assistance program, which requires financial participation by service personnel is available to those who entered the military after December 31,1976.

Veterans who want more information on GI bill eligibility should contact the VA regional office.

#### Hypertension: Threat To Your Life?

Could you be one of the 35 million American adults who have hypertension? If you're saying to yourself, "No, I'm not a tense person," you may be all wrong. Hopefully you will not have the experience of being beitten by a Brown Recluse spider as have several people in Brackettville this past year. be cautious in open fields, rocky bluffs, outhouses, garages, dark closets, storerooms and in piles of sacking or old clothing as this is where the B. recluse may be found. It is also known as the "fiddleback" spider due to the dark shape of a fiddle on top of its head. If you are bitten, pack wound in ice and get to a doctor. Avoid nacrotics such as morphine, demerol, dilaudid, codeine, etc., as these enhance the effect of the spider's venom. Thanks to Carl Esser, our county agent, we have a Brown Recluse on display at the library along with literature about it.
