## 4H NOTES

Excitment and anticipation ran high for the $4-H$ Club members of Kinney County last Monday night, when the crowning event of the year took place in the Brackettville Civic Center. With all the hard work over, and done,it was a night for honors and recognition of those $4-\mathrm{H}$ members who had done their jobs well and finished their 4-H projects. Also, at this time, the $4-\mathrm{H}$ boys and girls were able to say "Thank You" to persons who had helped them to achieve their goals.

Master of Ceremonies for the Banquet, Warren Voss, President of the Las Moras 4-H Club, welcomed the leaders andparents. Lashawn Wardlaw gave the invocation.

A delicious assortment of covered dishes brought by 4-H families was served buffet style, along with Bar-B-Que Bisket furnished by the First State Bank of Brackettville.

Following the meal, Henry Schwandner began the Awards Program by leading the Pledge of Allegiance and the $4-\mathrm{H}$ Motto and Pledge. Our guests were offered a special welcome and recognized by Brad Gwart ney.

## SHERIFF'S CORNER

By: Sheriff Norman H.Hooten Dear Fellow Kinney County Citizen:

This will be a new column appearing weekly in this paper. The primary purpose of this column will be to keep you, the citizens and taxpayers of our county, informed on the various activities of the Sheriff's Department.

I am, by no stretch of the imagination, a professional writer so I will be reporting to you in a clear, clean, straight-from-the shoulder manner. This column is not intended to ofend anyone and no gossip nor character assassinations will be appearing here. Only activity reports and general information that, I hope, will tend to bring you and the sheriff's Department closer together and give you a better understanding of the problems faced by peace officers in this community.
The column this week will be a little longer than most as I feel that I need to bring you up to date on how and why I got here.
i was first appointed Interim or acting Sheriff by State District Judge Marvin Blackburn on September l, this year. This appointment was necessary because Sheriff Johnnie Sheedy, who had been appointed Interim Sheriff by Judge Blackburn after the suspension of Sheriff Morgan Bailey, decided that the process of the various cases against Mr. Bailey was going to be time consuming and he felt that he needed more time to tend to his personal buisness. Sheriff Sheedy had retired in 1980 after 32 years service to this county.

There were several applicants who had expressed interest in the job of Interim Sheriff and the final decision on the appointment was made by Judge Balckburn. this appointment
was to be in effect until such time that (1) Mr. Bailey was cleared of the charges against him or (2) an actual vacancy of the office occurred by either the resignation of Mr. Bailey or his conviction on any one of the felony charges against him or his removal from office by civil action.

October 18, this year was the date set for the Removal Suit, Cause \#2374, to be heard. Prior to the time set for the case to be heard a pleabargain agreement was worked out between Mr. Bailey and the District Attorney, and Mr. Bailey resigned his office effective October 18, this year.

At this time my appointment by Judge Blackburn became null and void and Kinney County was technically without a Sheriff.County Attorney Tully Shahan verified with the State's Attorney General's Office in Austin that the next legal and proper step was for an Emergency Meeting to be called by Commissioners ' Court to appoint a Sheriff to serve out the un-expired term of office. The meeting was called, the required 3 hour notice was posted and at the meeting I was appointed Sheriff by a 3 to 1 vote. Had a vacancy occurred prior to or by September 18 , this year a special election to elect a Sheriff to serve out the un-expired termcould have been held. Of course, since thisdid not occur then the process used by the Commissioners' Court was necessary and proper.

Well, that's about it for this week. I will bring you up to date on other activities next week.
