Building Permits issued by the City of Brackettville increased 500% in 1982 over 1981. The school building project contributed a major show to this outstanding record but with the telephone building expansion, 14 residential expansions and remodeling,, 2 business expansions, 2 new homes, and 5 new mobile homes the record shows a steady, solid base for continued growth in this important economic indicator. Building permits issued for 1982 were for \$1,013,000.00 compared to \$202,100.00 in 1981.

STATE SENATOR BILL SIMS

Sims was also appointed to the Education and Intergovernmental Relations committees, and named Vice Chair man of the Subcommittee on

Lt. Gov. Hobby was the Natural Resources Committee, and I am pleased and encouraged to serve on this panel."

Legislation affecting agriculture and oil and gas industies are generally assigned to the Natural Resources Committee which sits over energy and water.

"Agriculture and oil and gas are economic pillars in District 25," he said.

"Also, my election campaign pledged to conserve and

enhance West Texas water supplies. This issue is dear to my heart, and I'm grateful to Lt. Gov. Hobby for honoring our requests. "

Sims said his seat on the Education Committee would help him work for full funding for Angelo State University at San Angelo, Sul Ross University at Alpine and Midland College.

"I am wrapping up preliminary work on dedicated funds for colleges and expect to make an announcement on that issue some time this week," he said. ********

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

Burglars, vandals, and thieves are still at work in our community. Both victims were from the Houston area. One man reported the theft of approx. \$750.00 worth of clothing and personal property from his pickup near a local lounge. The other victim reported the theft of a shotgun valued at \$25.00 from his vehicle that was left unattended on a ranch in the southern part of the County.

The investigation continues in the Malone burglary. I have asked Texas Ranger Tol Dawson, to assist me in this investigation and we are putting togehter all the information we have in the hopes that we can determine, at least, an overall picture of the crime. We also have some leads that we are investigating. Many rumors and pieces of false information have been investigated and disposed of. We are getting close but still lack enough evidence to make an arrest. I would like to remind some of those who seem to be trying to cloud the investigation that Art. 37.08 of the Texas Penal Code provides a \$1,000 fine and six (6) months in the County Jail for giving information about a crime to a peace officer when the person giving that information know it to be false and misleading. We need informaiton, but false and misleading information waste valuable time and money.

We would suggest to those of you having guns an dother valuable property in your homes, that you record the serial numbers and descriptions of those guns and/or property and put them in a safe place. (If you will bring a copy by my office I will be glad to put the list on file.) Then, should you be the victim of a theft or burglary the serial number and descrip tion of the stolen property can be entered in the TCLC computer. Quite often this aids, not only in the capture of the thief, but also in the recovery of the property. WE would also suggest that you NOT leave your guns in your vehicles. They are a prime target for thieves and can disappear quickly if left unattended. The plan for the hoisng of Federal Prisoners is progressing, we have 15 in custody at this time. We have d to spend some money at the jail in preparation, but we are almost complete now and are in pretty good shape for equipment, supplies, and personnel. We still have the trip planned to San Antonio to pick up more equipment made available by the U.S. Marshal's Service. As soon as we get this equipment installed we will have

a capacity of 35. I hope to maintain an average of 20 federal prisoners year round. This will assist us in balancing the budget for the Sheriffs' Department and County Jail. ********

Paul Poag Theatre Receives Gift From The Larger Circle

The Paul Poag Theatre renovation fund has received a gift of \$893.45 from THE LARGER CIRCLE, an ecumenical organization originated by the women of the First Methodist Church in 1967. The LARGER CIRCLE functioned for 9 years from 1967 to 1975. The name was chosen from the thoughts of Edwin Markham's four-line poem:

"He drew a circle that shut me out,

Heretic, rebel, a thing to flout;

But Love and I had the wit to win,

We drew a circle that took him in."

Its purpose was to draw people of all faiths closer together in our community in a larger circle of Christian unity and friendship.

The first speaker was Dr. Hong C. Sit, minister of Grace Chaper, a nondenominational church in Houston. Interpreters were provided for those who could not understand English. The first meetings were held in Moore park, another in First Presbyterian church, and as attendance increased, it was noved to the Civic Center. Many will remember "The Sound Foundation," a wonderful singing group of young people from Trinity Baptist church in San Antonio in 1971, and then the appearance of Nicky Cruz in 1972 that filled the Civic

Center with the largest crowd ever assembled there. Through the years the cooperation of all churches of the city was sought after and in 1972 more than 30 churches cooperated and participated in the outstanding presentation of Nicky Cruz. In 1971 THE LARGER CIR CLE also began holding an annual city-wide Prayer

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BILL SIMS

State Senator Bill Sims of San angelo said today he is cosponsoring a proposed constitutional amendment which lawmakers hope will resolve the controversial college funding issue.

Among other provisions, the bill seeks a guaranteed annual \$125 million appropriation divided among Angelo State University, Sul Ross State University, and 15 other state universities.

It would make the University of Texas Permian Basin and the University of Texas at El Paso eligible for increased proceeds from the Permanent UniversityFund.

Seventeen state university , including Angelo State University and Sul Ross, saw their constutionally dedicated fund wiped out last year when voters repealed the state property tax. The repeal sparked renewed efforts to divide the PUF which funds the University of Texas and A&M University Systems. Component schools of those systems, also sought larger participation in PUF bond proceeds.

Since then, legislators have searched for a college funding plan which would satisfy leaders of all institutions, both PUF and non-PUF.

An apparent compromise is SJR 4 by Sen. Carl Parker, chairman of the Senate Educational Committee.

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Sims, who also serves on that committee, said he agreed to co-sponsor SJR 4 after talking with the presidents of ASU and Sul Ross.

He said SJR 4 will benefit all four institutions which serve his constituents. Specifically, SJR 4


