Inflation - Fighting IDEAS Helpful Information

Q. Motor oil cans bear inscriptions such as SAE 10W, 20W/20, 30, 10W/40. What do these terms mean? How do I know what to buy?



Numbers such as SAE 10W, 20W/20, 30 or 10W/40 are Society of Automotive Engineers designations di-rectly relating to the viscosity of a particular lubricant. The lower the viscosity, the easier the oil will flow, so you'll want, generally, a low number for cold operation, higher for warm. A "W" simply means, say experts at Gulf Oil, that the product has been tested at low temperature and is a "winter grade". A product with two designations such as 10W/40 indicates that the product is multi-viscosity. That means that when cold, the product performs like a 10W fluid, and when warmed as the engine operating temperature increases, performs like an SAE 40 product.

Q. The little cans of motor oil additives one sees: What's in them? What do they do? Do I really need them?



A. Motor oil additives sold to be added independently to the crankcase are generally a throw-back to days when motor oil contained no additives and supplements were offered to the motoring public. Experts at Gulf Oil say that today, most well-known brands are fully fortified to perform the functions required of them within the service classification designated on the container, and additional additives should not be needed.

Industry changes will affect us all

The new year brings us significant changes for Southwestern Bell and the entire telecommunications industry.

As a result of a ruling by the Federal Communications Commission to introduce more competition into our industry, we are reorganizing how we provide your telephone service.

Helping you keep pace with change

As Southwestern Bell restructures and adapts to these new industry changes, you will want to know their impact on you and your telephone service. That's part of my job: keeping you informed about our plans. My duties also include recommending areas for service improvement, monitoring service problems in our area, and serving as the company's representative to our community.

While I've had the opportunity to visit with some of you about these telephone issues, it's impossible for me to speak personally to everyone. That's why I will be using this column to communicate with you. My address is listed at the end of the column. Please feel free to drop me a note anytime—I'll be glad to hear from you.

I can't guarantee that I will have all the answers or instant solutions. But I can promise that I will listen to you and help you in whatever way I can.

Most importantly, I will keep you posted on changes—local and national—that affect your telephone service.

Today's changes in telecommunications

For most customers, the FCC changes effective January 1 will have little impact. In fact, you probably won't be affected immediately unless you move, disconnect or change your service in some way. If you plan to alter your phone service, here are some areas of change you should know about.

Bell PhoneCenters

Bell PhoneCenters are no longer a

part of Southwestern Bell. Now the Southwestern Bell business office is the place to call for starting, stopping, moving or changing your service. Residence customers may call (toll-free) 1+951-1100 for billing questions or orders. Business customers may call (toll-free) 1+951-7181 to place orders or 1+951-2700 for billing questions.

Telephones

Southwestern Bell will continue to lease phones to our customers. However, during this year, we will not be permitted to add new phones to our inventory.

When you order phones from us, we will direct you to the nearest Southwestern Bell Service Center to pick up your phones. If you cannot go to the Center, we will deliver the phones. There will be a charge for this service.

Business customers with a single line or two lines with non-key equipment can pick up telephones from these Centers, too.


Repair Service

Maxie "BOBO" Morgan pled quilty to Theft charges in County Court last week and was fined \$750.00 plus \$69.00 Court Costs. He also received a 90 day County Jail sentence and was ordered by County Judge Albert Postel to pay \$97.50 restitution to the City of Brackettville for property stolen, damaged, or destroyed by him during the commission of the crime. Morgan was recently apprehended by Chief of Police Donnie Nance and yours truly after he broke a lock off a gas storage tank behind City Hall and attempted the theft of gasoline.

A Del Rio man received a 3 day jail sentence after he was arrested by me in Del Rio on a warrant issued by Justice of the Peace, PCT. 1, Raymond Talamantez. Charges of Disorderly Conduct were filed against the man after he made vulgar, profane and improper advances to a local woman. He was released Saturday, January 22.

A San Angelo man was arrested and placed in jail last Saturday night by Highway Patrolman Buddy Burgess. The man was arrested on a Felony Theft Warrant issued by Tom Green County. He was held under \$10,000.00 bond. San Angelo officers picked him up Monday and transported him back to Tom Green County to answer the charges.

The usual run of weekend DWI and Public Intoxication cases were filed and the persons charges released on bond or after they paid fines.

Wallace Morgan, retired U.S. Air Force, was recently appointed to the position of Chief of Security at Ft. Clark. Wallace is also a Reserve Deputy Sheriff with this Department and will act as liason officer between Fr. Clark Security and the Kinney County Sheriff's Department. We will work closely on incidents such as burglaries, theft cases, and other illegal activities that might occur on Ft. Clark.

I feel that this is a step in the right direction for increased law enforcement protection for our citizens who live on the Fort, and will strengthen the relations between the two departments. Mr.

Morgan has been authorized by me to use his authority as Deputy Sheriff in conjuction with his position as Chief of Security to provide faster, more efficient law enforcement protection to Ft. Clark residents.

"Students who drop out before the 12th class day are subtracted from the enrollment total, but we would have to lose over 150 students to dip below the record total," said Dean of Admissions/ Registrar John Allen Davis.

"We have 2,391 students enrolled now with another day of late
registration left in Uvalde, Del
Rio and Eagle Pass plus the special
drama class at the Opera House that
registers next Wednesday," he
continued. "We could easily surpass 2,400 since we usually only
have about 30 drop-outs. The old
record was 2,234."

ENROllment in the many different areas served by SWTJC was 954 for Uvalde day; 284 for Uvalde evening; 569 for Del Rio; 297 for Eagle Pass; 119 for the Asherton, Carrizp Springs and Crystal City area; 59 in Dilley and Pearsall; 29 for Leakey; 41 for Devine; 7 for Hondo; and 32 for Sabinal.

GROWERS NEEDED FOR SOIL FERTILITY DEMONSTRATIONS

Proper fertilization helps insure a respectable crop yield while increasing resistance to drought, disease, and insects. But how much fertilizer is sufficient?

Soil Testing has long been recognized as the best barometer for determining nutrient needs of any cropland. According to a Texas Agricultural Extension Service agronomist, soil testing is even more important in this time of rising costs and uncertain prices.

"We must test soils prior to fertilization to determine what is already in the soil and what nutrients should be added, based on our yield expectations," pointsout Dr. Noble Kearney. "Soil testing is a reliable means of predicting nutrient needs of crops."

However, Kearney says different soil testing labs may show different results and recommendations since they use three different concepts. These include the cation saturation ratio, nutrient maintenance, and sufficiency level.

Most university soil testing labs make recommendations based on the sufficiency level, or soil test calibrations that reveal no yield response to an applied nutrient when the soil tests above a certain level.

In an eight-year study that concluded in 1982, a Nebraska researcher found no significant yield differences for corn by following the recommendations of different soil testing labs. Yet, large differences existed in the cost per acre for the amout of fertilizer, amounting to over 100 percent in some cases. The lowest fertilizer cost per acre was from the University of Nebraska lab which made its recommendations based on the sufficiency level concept. Texas A&M's lab follows the same procedure.

Kearney stresses that grower's assistance is very critical in developing certain soil test recommendations for crop fertilization. "In order for the Texas A&M

soil testing laboratory to generate recommendations using the sufficiency level concept, information on yield responses from producers is essential," he emphasizes. "Some of this information is derived from Experiment Station test plots, county result demonstrations and production unit yields. But the bulk of this information eventually comes from producers in different parts of the state."

Kearney says producers can help fine tune soil test recommendations by taking representative soil smaples, fertilizing according to those recommendations and reporting results (yields, fertilizer amounts and costs) to county Extension agents of the lab.

Kearney is enxious to discuss soil testing and soil fertility with South west Texas growers. He's also looking forward to initiating fertility demonstrations on farms

throughout the region which can help increase profits by controlling input costs.

Southwest Texas Farmers desiring to cooperate with Kearney in developing thses soil fertility tests and demonstrations are urged to contact their county Extension agent of Kearney directly (278-9151).
