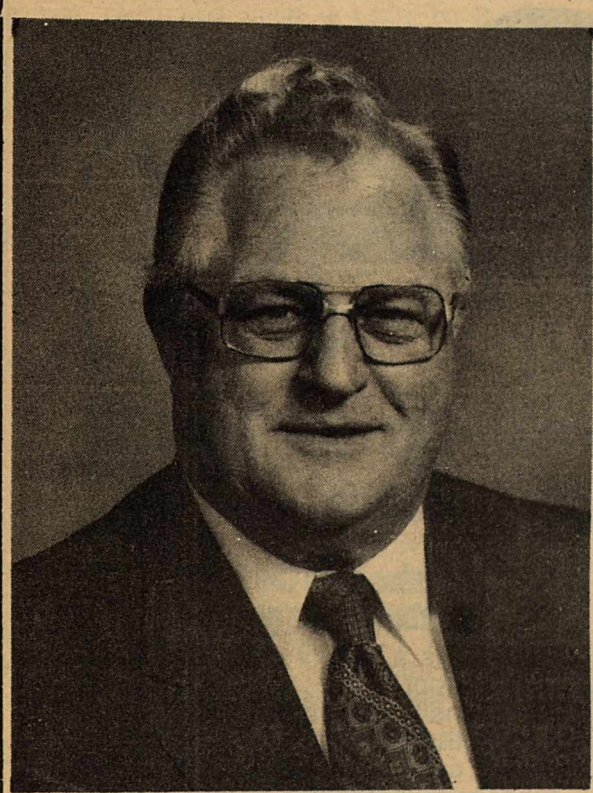

PENA VERSUS CITY COURT CASE

On Tuesday January 25, 1983 the Pena Versus the City of Brackettville Court Case was heard in Judge Thurmonds' District Court before a selected panel of twelve jurors from Kinney County.

The suit for \$5,000 in alledged damages was intitiated on November 6, 1978 by Mrs. Elvira Pena when she suffered a fall when she slipped in the mud and broke her left arm while visiting relatives at the public housing project complex on West Thorn street.

The jury found that the area in question was maintained in a resonably safe condition and that the plaintiff not the defendant(City was negligent.

One thing that was pointed out to me at the trial was that City Hall was a monster, an ugly institution. City Hall is not a monster, it is not an ugly institution-it is nothing but a green building that sits on the corner of Keene and Spring Streets.

City Hall is nothing but a building that provides a meeting place in which your City Government meets to coordinate and carry out the policies of City Government - a meeting place in which requests from the residents are coordinated with the abilities and capabilities of the means at our disposal in which to accomplish the requests based soley on the merit and what is best for the Community.

Major decisions are made and policy guidance is directed by the Mayor and City Council - Residents

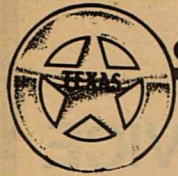
SANDRA KESTER, DIRECTOR OF DEAF MINISTRIES TO SPEAK

SHERIFF'S CORNER

The combined efforts of the Bracketville Police Department, the Kinney County Sheriff's Department and Juvenile Officers from Del Rio led to the arrest of two juvenile females Tuesday.

They are suspects in a residential burglary reported by Mrs. Irene Villasenor Sunday night. Mrs. Villasenor returned from a trip to Eagle Pass to discover that burglars had entered her home during her absence and took an estimated \$600.00 worth of personal property and jewelry. Investigation determined that the burglars had entered through a bathroom window.

Mrs. Villasenor called me Tuesday and reported that a young female at the elementary school was wearing a pair of her earrings. Chief of Police Donnie Nance and I went to Jones Elementary School to investigate. We interviewed six juvenile females and recovered the earrings. I then called Juvenile Officers into the case. They obtained statements from two of the young females and recovered approx \$200.00 worth of Mrs. Villasenor's property. The case is still under investigation and more arrests are probable. We hope to recover the balance of the property soon.

I wish to commend Mrs. Courtney Schwander and her staff at Jones Elementary for their assistance in this matter. This case is a prime example of the results of several different departments working together, thereby creating positive results. Teamwork of this kind is very important, not only in criminal investigations, but also for the overall welfare of our community. There seems to be a trend developing where the people of our county and community are pulling together for the common good. I for one, am extremely pleased to see this trend developing.

A set of keys were found in front of the Exxon Station last week end and are in the possession of Chief of Police Donnie Nance. Anyone who has lost a set of keys may contact Chief Nance or me and upon a proper description, the keys will be returned.

An electrical failure at the jail last weekend resulted in several of the cell doors opening and an

overall state of emergency existed in jail security. The jailers handled the situation very well. Chief Jailer Jim O'Halloran and I were contacted at approx. 5:30am and upon our arrival we found it was necessary to remove some steel plates from the lock system and operate the locks manually. The system has been repaired and the jail is operational.

KINNEY COUNTY LIBRARY

Input from our local Librarian, Mrs. Charollette Corey, and lay representative, Mrs. Charles Shipman, helped to ascertain the direction in which federal and state funding given to S.A.M.R.C./District 10 will be spent. Library," chaired by Martha Blackwell, provided coffee and donuts.

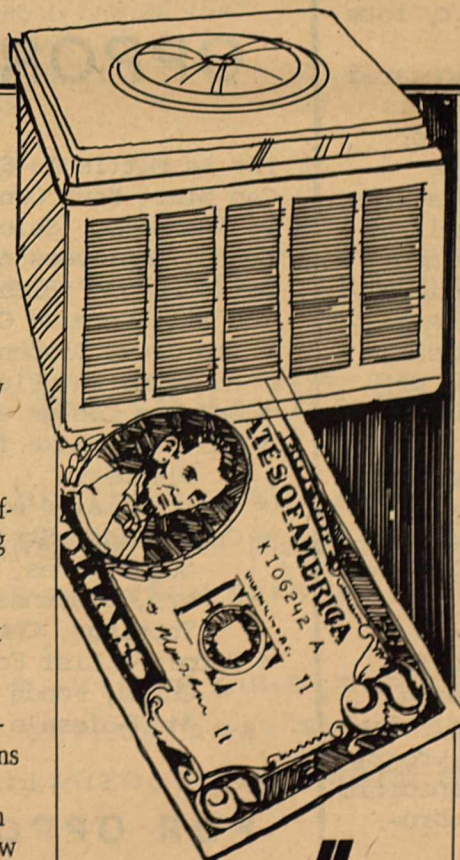

The City Council held their regular monthly meeting Tuesday 11 January 1983 at City Hall. The highlights of which included the Mayor calling for a city Election to be held the 1st Saturday in April to elect 2 Councilman for the expiring terms of Councilman Woodson and Councilman Davis.

The City manager presented the financial report for the month of December with a comparison of the financial status of the City for the close of 1982 versus 1981. The City staff has been working well as a team and the year and reports more than justify the pay raises and new equipment and supplies purchased by the City. Increased revenues with no rate increases have enabled the staff to continue to increase services and support for the residents.

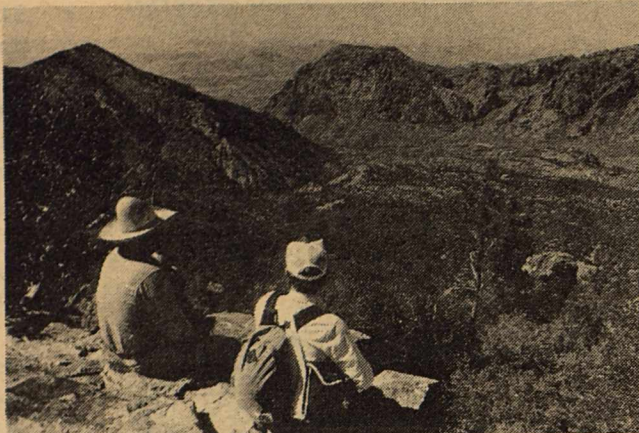
A new two year contract for Mr. Chester Young the City Tax Attorney was awarded and future plans made to include tax billings on the new computer to be put in operation by the City in March was discussed.

No bids on City owned property offered for sale were received and accepted by the Council so City will retain rights to all City lots previously advertised.

Sheriff Norman Hooten appeared before the Council to explain his decision to charge \$18 a day for City prisoners remanded to the County jail. The jail charges were accepted by the Council as well as approving and adopting ordinances 215 thru 219 as had been previously published in the Public Notice Section of this paper. The Ordinance covering Posting of Bills and Notices; Council Place Assignments; Rabies Control of Household pets; Personnel Policy for City Employees and Ordinance covering Emergency Disaster Operations were read, approved and adopted and are effective for City Operations.

Mr. Chris Gomez gave an interesting report on a program for community support for this years little league baseball season. The Council was receptive to the program presented and will consider specific request for support at the February meeting.

Any City resident who is a qualified registered voter is asked to contact the City Manager if they would be interested in performing the duties as the Election Judge, Assistant or election clerks for the upcoming election in April.

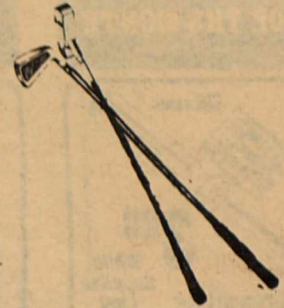

Is Your Child Hyperactive?

A bright child with a short attention span, lack of self-control, perceptual difficulties, regular frustration and learning problems, may be hyperactive. The child's doctor should be consulted.

Hyperactivity is a learning disability, ranging from mild to severe, affecting an estimated five percent of all grade-school-age children in the United States.

The causes are not yet fully understood, but may include genetic, biological, physiological, social and environmental factors.

Its symptoms sometimes lead parents and teachers to consider a child "bad" or "uncontrollable." That can lead to inadequate learning opportunities. In addition, the hyperactive child suffers considerable emotional pain while struggling to learn in an environment which hinders rather than helps.

A hyperactive child can sometimes be helped with medicine or with a diet change. A restructured educational environment—shorter lessons, greater understanding and reinforcement may help, too.

Of the three to four million children in the U.S. who may be suffering with hyperactivity, under ten percent have been identified and are being medically treated or specially educated.



A bright child with difficulty in school may be hyperactive—and can be helped.

To help all hyperactive children, their parents and teachers, the Center for Hyperactive Child Information was created. It is a clearinghouse for research and provides a free referral service for parents looking for help from special schools and other organizations. It also maintains an ongoing nationwide campaign to tell parents and teachers about hyperactive children and the help they need. It is supported by voluntary contributions and all its services are provided free of charge.

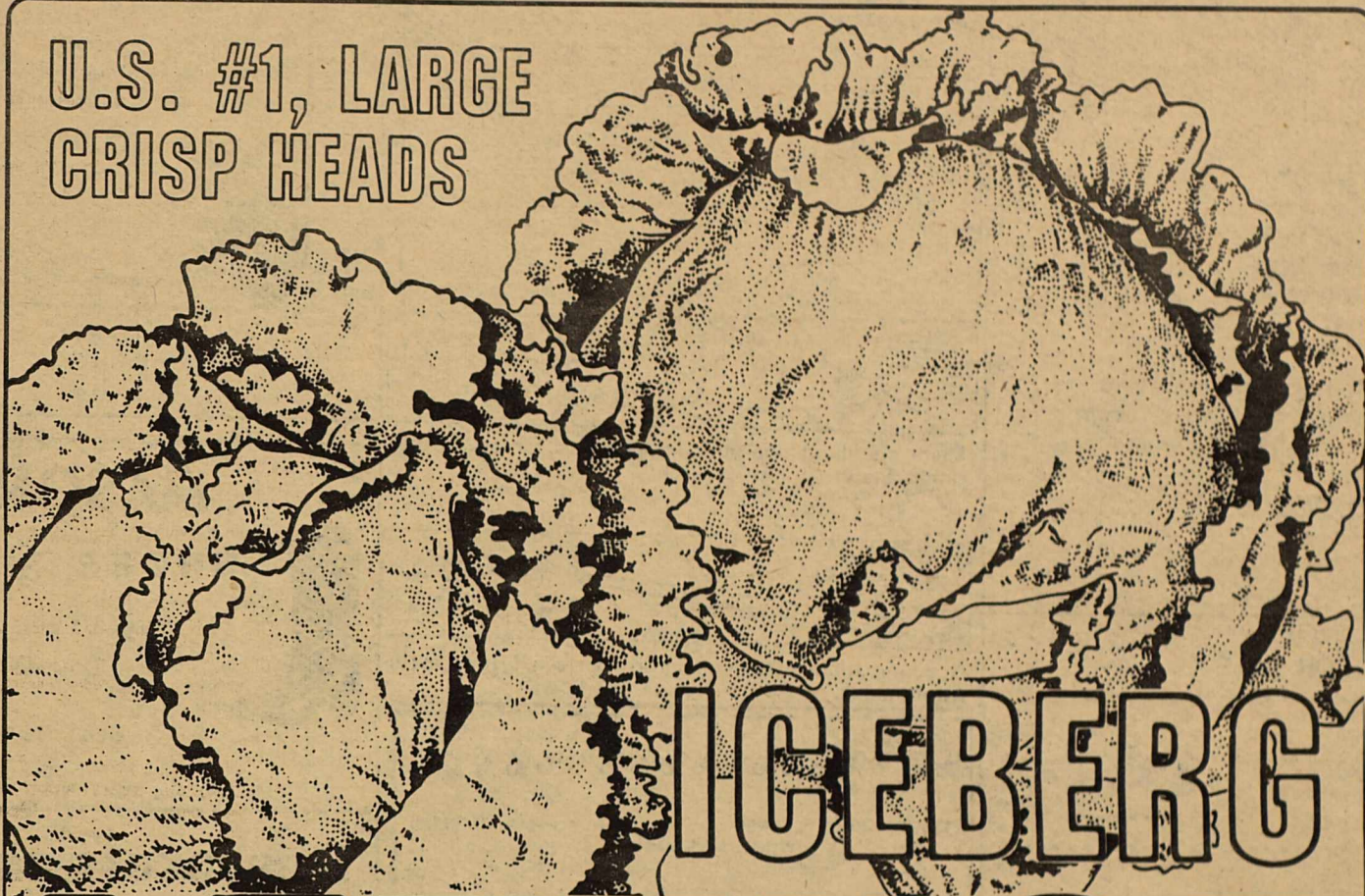
