



Business was as usual this past week. Local crime was down a little. This is normal. Crime seems to come in waves, it will be down for a few days and then all of a sudden there will be a flurry of activity.

Some criminal researchers have indicated that sporadic crime waves can be linked to the cycle of the moon and stars. I do not know if this is true or not, but records show that crime does rise and fall in cycles.

A Fort Clark youth was arrested and charges of Criminal Mischief filed against him after he broke out a window at the Teen Center in Fort Clark. He was released on bond and the trial is pending.

Another Fort Clark man was arrested and placed in County Jail after statements were obtained from local youths alleging that the man bought and/or provided access to alcoholic beverages to minors. The man was released on \$1,000.00 bond. That trial is also pending.

Vandals struck a cruel blow to David Bixby, owner of the Screen Door, a plant nursery in Brackettville. Someone climbed over a fence that is around his property and dumped sever hundred dollars worth of young rose plants on the ground. Nothing else was taken or disturbed.

Of all the crimes I have to deal with and investigate, vandalism is the least understood by me. What makes a person damage or destroy the property of another? In most vandalism cases there is no attempt at financial gain, just damage and destroy, like a sheepkilling dog that will slaughter sheep after sheep and leave them dead or dying and not because of hunger, simply for the joy of killing.

The First State Bank of Brackettville moved their burgler alarm indicator to the County Jail this past week. This was, in no way, a reflection on security personnel at Ft. Clark. Merely an attempt by bank personnel and law enforcement people to improve reaction 'i' time in the event of a signal from the alarm.

Prior to this, when the alarm went off, the security people at Ft. Clark would then have to notify the Dispatcher at the jail and the Dispatcher would then have to

notify a peace officer and dispatch him to the bank. Now, should the alarm sound, the Dispatcher knows immediately and can dispatch an officer to the scene.





School Finances

It seems only fair to me that the federal government should pay its share to school districts in neighborhoods where federal property places a heavy burden on schools and the taxpayers who finance them, but at present this is not the case.

In an effort to correct this, I have introduced H.R. 1141 to provide for payments in lieu of taxes to be made by the federal government to local governments for property exempt from taxation which is located within the jurisdiction of these local governments. Look at it this way: The federal government is the country's largest property owner, and much of it is made up of buildings which share neighborhoods with privately-owned structures. If this property were taxable, it would account for about 5 percent of the national property value, and the taxes collected would obviously be of great benefit to our hard-pressed local governments, schools, and taxpayers.

I introduced this new legislation calling for payments in lieu of taxes after hearing from many South Texans calling special attention to the budget crunch in many of our school systems.

Dr. Luz of the Kinney County Clinic will lecture on Medical Emergencies such as Heart conditions, stroke, diabetes and epilepsy. Other guest lectures from Del Rio and Uvalde will attend.

Students taking their final examinations on March 28th are members of local law emforcement agencies, Ft. Clark Security, K.C. Fire Department, and private citizens who wish to become part of K.C. Volunteer Ambulance Organization.

Research has shown that how often sugars are eaten, how long they stay in the mouth and the type of food eaten also play an important part in the decay process.



1/3 cup grated coconut 3/4 cup chopped pecans 1 teas. lemon juice 1 teas. lemon rind 1 teas. orange juice


3/4 cup dried apricots 1/3 cup water






