NAKAI Breen, born in Adair County, Oklahoma in 1930. Her natural parents were full-blooded Cherokees named Hastings. She was adopted at an early age by the family of Fred L. and Felicia Hobbs raised in a Rio Grande border town. Her husband, Bud Breen, is a successful self-taught artist. The Breens live in Brackettville, 35 miles East of Del Rio, Texas.

Nakai has spent 38 years of her life trying to help a forgotten tribe of Kickapoo Indians. Most of her life has been dedicated to the improvements of the living standards of the proverty stricken Kickapoo Band of American Indians in Eagle Pass, Texas. She is devoted to these people who depend on this trilingual woman for everything from writing letters to saving children's lives. She has never received any compensation for helping the Traditional Kickapoos of Texas and Mexico.

Nakai is a member of various Indian organizations throughout Texas and Oklahoma She is a member of the Texas State Chapter of NAIWA. Her dedication to helping Indian People has been shown by her donations of paintings to help Indian Centers and organzatios in Texas and Oklahoma.

Nakai has served as Assitant to Senator Ron Clower of Texas; as Assistant to Native American Rights Fund;
Attorney Kurt Blue Dog and
she has appeared before Cone
gressional Committee Hearings
to testify on behalf of the
Kickapoos. She was commissioned to make a buckskin
dress for presentation to
the Head of State of Switzerland; this dress is on permanent display at the Bern
Museum in Switzerland. She





The changes are applicable to all areas to which the Utility provides electric utility service. All classes of customers are affected by the proposed changes. The Utility expects that the proposed schedule of rates will furnish an additional 7.4% in revenue as compared to the amount of revenue furnished by the existing schedule of rates.

The Utility intends to change its service rules and regulations incuding rules relating to obtaining service, line extension and line extension and line extension charges, the provision of electric service, service fees, and discountinuance of service.

U.S. SENATOR for TEXAS WASHINGTON, D.C. 20510

U.S. Senator John Tower(r-tx) announced today herhas joined in sponsoring legislation to protect children against sexual exploitation (S.1469).

"Passage of this legislation is critical to counter the growing incidence and severity of child sexual exploitation in this country," Tower said. "This legislation extends to

our nation's youth greater protection from the multimillion dollar child pornography industry."

"This legislation simply ... would make unlawful the distribution of any photographs which sexually exploit children under the age of 18, and increases the punishment for


a child pornography conviction,

Tower explained.

Under the leislation, stiffer fines and prison terms would be applicable against any person, including a parent or guardian, found guilty of employing, using, persuading, inducing, enticing or coering any minor to engage in any sexually explicit conduct for the purpose of producing any visual or printed materials. The first conviction carries with it a fine of \$75,000 or up to ten years imprisonment or both' a second conviction could result in a fine of \$150,000, or up to 15 years imprisonment, but not less than two years, or both.

"Child pornography is an outrage. Action must be taken immediately to a halt to this vile business and better protect our innocent children,"

concluded Tower.
