CITY COUNCIL PASSES 1983/84 BUDGET

City Council Orders NO INCREASE IN TAX RATE !!!

The City Council of the City of Brackettville met Monday evening at a called Special Meeting to consider, discuss and approve the City of Brackettville 1983/84 Annual Budget.

Highlights of the budget hearing revealed the uncertainty of the availability of revenue sharing funds (\$12,000) and the overall decrease in Sales Tax Revenues. The Council was unanimous in their desire to make up for any short comings in these areas by tightening our belts in others.

As the certified tax roll has not yet been offered the City the Council passed the estimated tax rate of \$.60 the same as 1981/82 and 1982/83 tax year. No increases in taxes are deemed necessary nor desirable.

No increase in Ad Valoum Taxes for the City operations and no increase in cost of utility services for the utility department were contemplated.

An aggressive program for application to EDA, FmHA and CDBG for grants to pave City streets; repair/replace Water Tower and 1928 City Water lines along with a request for

a Neighborhood/Elderly Citizens Center was approved and preliminary action taken.

The approved 1983/84 Budget is available at the City Manager's Office for citizen review and comments.

The City Council will meet again Monday, August 8, at the regular monthly meeting to decide on the TV Cable Company rate increase request, a rezoning request and consider grant application to FmHA.

Legislative Report

State Representative
DUDLEY HARRISON

AUSTIN--The century-old Val Verde Winery has been recommended for membership to the Texas Family Land Heritage Program, State Representative Dudley Harrison said today.

The program, which honors Texas farms and ranches which have been family operated for 100 years or more, is sponsored by Texas Agriculture Commissioner Jim Hightower.

In a letter to Hightower, Rep. Harrison praised the Winery for its contributions to the region, and state, including current cooperative efforts to test wine grapes with the 1,000-acare vineyard of the University of Texas land project near Bakersfield in Pecos County.

"After visiting the University of Texas project in Pecos County today, I learned that past of the Pecos County grapes will be transported to the Val Verde Winery for wine production and evaluation purposes," said Harrison.

"I am very proud that the young and the old..in this case the new scienific techniques developed in Pecos County and the 100 years of experience backing the Val Verde Winery..are combining knowledge to produce a greater industry for the state."

Val Verde Winery is the oldest winery in the state, and has survived several periods of harships during the past century, he said.

"now the winery stands at the forefront of what may be a prosperous new industry for Texas: Viticulture."

The Val Verde Winery, operated by the Qualia family, was founded in Del Rio in 1880. That year, Frank Qualia came to the Rio Grande Valley from Italy and discovered Spanish grapes still flourishing fron vineyards started the vineyard that is still next door to the winery and still grows Spanish missionary stock.

The winery grew and with other Texas wineries once combined for a wine-making industry that rivaled California's. But Prohibition closed them down, and the Texas wineries never recovered momentum after Prohibition was repealed.

Val Verde Winery was issued a license after the repeal, but soon became the only winery to survive ;the Depression and World War II era. Until 1976, it was the only winery in the state; now there are 13 others.

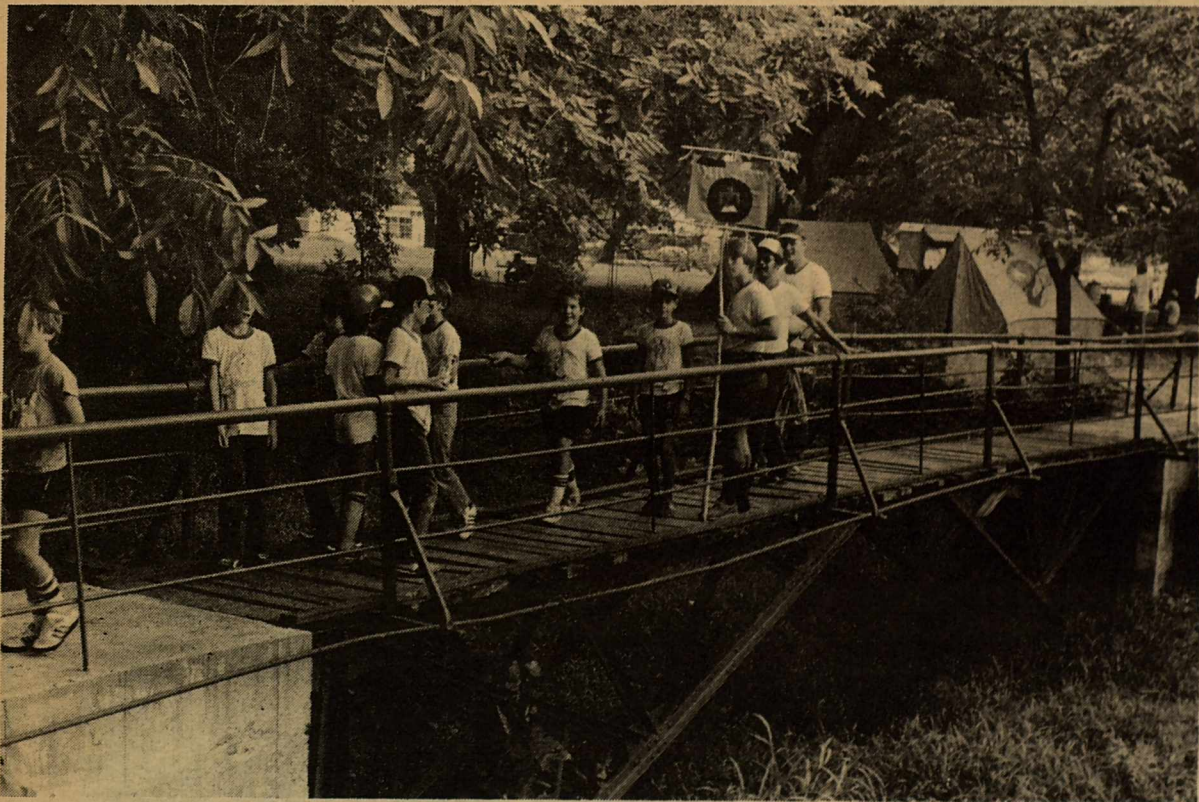

MAURO ISSUES ORDER FOR SALE NOTICE ON VLB TRACTS

AUSTIN-- Texas Land Commissioner Garry Mauro today issued an order for sale notice on approximately 120 tracts of land that had previously been ordered forfeited by the Veterans Land Board. The owners; of the delinquent tracts failed to comply with the July 22 deadline to bring payments current for reinstatement. The action was taken at the monthly meeting of the Veterans Land Board.

Mauro, who serves as Chairman of the Veterans Land Board, said, "The sale is in keeping with my commitment to run the Veterans Land Program in a sound, efficient business-like manner."

"In order for the Veterans Land Board to continue offering generous terms to our veterans, a strong delinquent collection policy must be maintained. Some loans on this list were as old as four years with no payments made. If we are going to continue to close loans in this program in 90 days, payments will have to be made on time," Mauro said. Delinquent contracts

holders have until August 15, to vacate the land.

"The Veterans Land Program has never cost the taxpayers a single penny. By running the program on a sound, business-like basis, I intend to ensure that it never will."

The September 30 sale will be by sealed bid only with a minimum bid set by the Board. A bid form, the list of forfeited tracts, bidding instruction and directions as to how to reach each tract for inspection will be available August 31 from the Veterans Land Board, 1700 North Congress, Austin, Texas 78701.

Mauro said that reducing the number of delinquent accounts will provide additional money for new loans to Texas Veterans who have applied to the Veterans Land Program.

"My commitment to a closely-monitored collection policy on delinquencies will ensure that not a single tax-dollar is wasted on this program. I believe this policy will best serve the needs of the state and our Texas veterans," Mauro said.

Approximately 40 of the more than 250 contract holders that received delinquent account forfeiture notices from the Board on July 1 brought their accounts up to date and were reinstated. An additional 65 contract holders have brought their account up to date but are pending reinstatement based on receipt by the Veterans Land Board of tax certificates showing proof of tax payments.

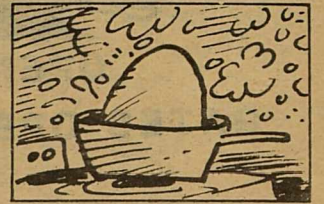

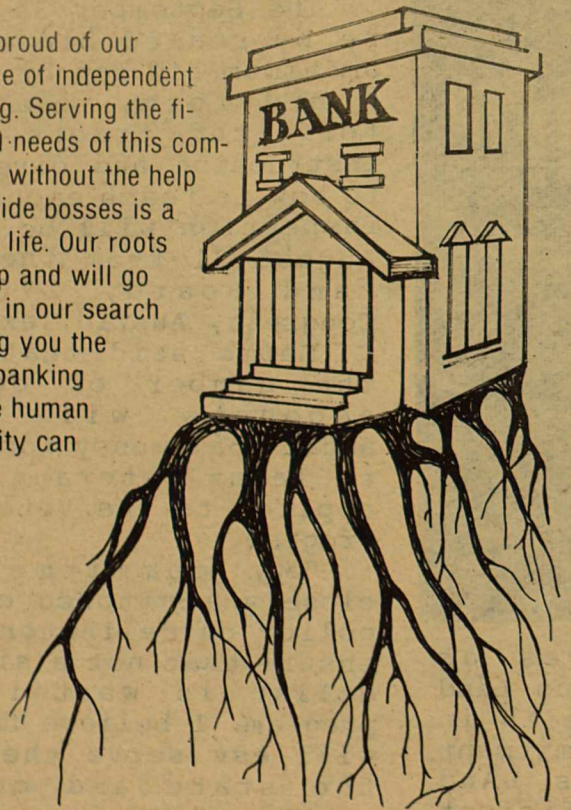

A seven-inch North African ostrich egg takes 40 minutes to boil.

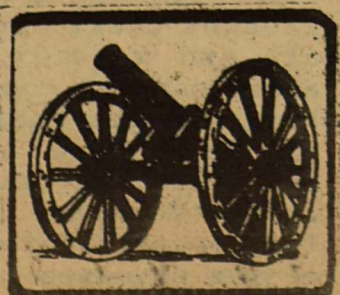

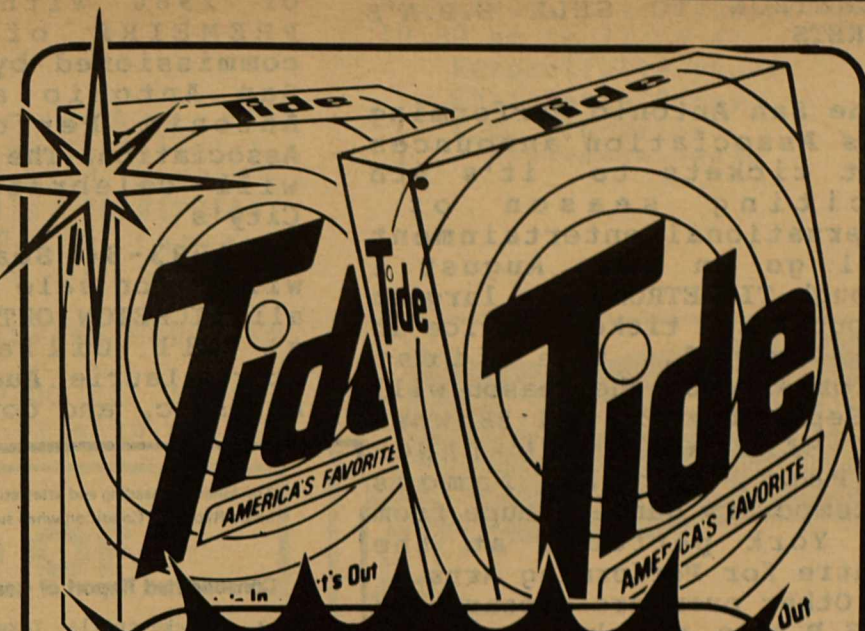



SURVEY SHOWS TEXANS REJECT TAX INCREASE FOR 24% BLANKET PAY HIKE FOR TEACHERS

(DALLAS)---Dick Collins, President of the Texas Foundation for Conservation Studies announced the results of a recent survey which showed that a plurality of Texans are opposed to increasing taxes for a 24% across-the-board teacher's pay hike.

The survey was commissioned by the Texas Foundation for Conservation Studies (TFCS), a policy research and education organization. The TFCS seeks to define critical problems facing Texas and develop practical and conservative solutions to these problems.

The survey was conducted by Arthur J. Finkelstein and Associates. They interviewed 606 adult Texans. The survey is accurate within +/-4% at a confidence level of 95%.

When asked whether they would favor an increase in taxes to give teachers an across-the-board 24% pay increase, 62% of those

surveyed were opposed. Only 33.3% favor a tax increase.

Collins noted the opposition for a tax increase rises among conservatives, with 67.7% of the Texans surveyed who called themselves conservatives opposed to a tax increase to give teachers a 24% pay hike.

Opposition to a tax increase cut across party lines with 66.5% of the Texans who called themselves Republicans opposed, 61.6% of the Democrats and 63.6% of the Independents.

According to Collins, the survey also showed that the "overwhelming majority feels that public school education should be the responsibility of the state and local governments.

"The survey results showed that 45.2% believe the state government should be most responsible for public education, 35.3% said local government, and only 12.5% said federal government.

"Support for local control increases among conservatives, with 46.3% answering local control, 38% answering state government, while only 9.6% said federal government.

By party affiliation, 41.8% of the Texans who called themselves Republicans answered state government and 44.3% answered local government. Texas Democrats answered 46.6% for state government and 31.5% for local government, while Texas Independent favored state government by 49.1% and local government by 33.6%.

Collins said the survey "clearly indicated that Texans believe the state and local government should be responsible for public

education, but clearly reject a tax increase to fund Mark White's call for a 24% increase in teacher's pay across-the-board."

Another question in the survey dealt with Texas' attitudes about teachers' unions and how they affect education.

About one-third of the Texans interviewed believe that teacher's unions are good for education, while 44.4% felt that teachers' unions have an adverse effect on education.

Of the conservative Texans, 49.3% felt that teacher's union are bad for education, 31.9% felt they had a positive effect on education.

Of the people who described themselves as moderates, 43.3% felt that teachers' unions had a negative effect on education and 35.9% felt that they had a positive effect.

This year, the TFCS has published studies on state spending and bureaucracy, crime victims' restitution centers, state severance taxes on oil and gas, and the Texas prevailing wage law.

SHERIFF'S CORNER

The body of a 43 year-old illegal alien was discovered on Ranch Road 3199 (Tularosa Road) approximately 21 miles northeast of Brackettville early Thursday morning, July 28, by ranch worker Bruce Scipa of the Spring Ranch.

The discovery was investigated by this officer with the assistance of Rose Mary Slubar, J.P. Pct. 4, and Brackettville Police Chief Donnie Nance. Papers found at the scene identified the body as that of Trenida Barco Calvillo of San Felipe, Guanajuato, Mexico. Calvillo appeared to have died from internal injuries received in a fall or similar accident, and he had bruises and lacerations to the mid-

section, side and back. He had a rag tightly bound around his waist as though for support. The case investigation will continue, but preliminary findings appear to be death due to accidental causes.

The wife of the man was contacted by this office with the assistance of Mexican authorities. Indications are that the body will be buried in Del Rio.

You may recall we reported a few weeks back the discovery of skeletal remains in a grave on Ft. Clark. We submitted the bones and other items found in the grave along with soil samples to the Texas Archaeological Society in Austin. We recently received a letter from T.A.S. after their examination of the sample sent in. In their opinion the remains were that of a prehistoric American female, approximately 50 to 55 years of age at the time of death. Burnt rock and other items, such as deer antlers found near the skull, suggest a ceremonial burial.

Dr. Turpin of T.A.S.

contacted me by phone and advised that she would like to come to Ft. Clark as soon as possible and record the burial site. The remains and burial site will be cataloged and numbered by the T.A.S.

We will be working closely with Mrs. Majorie Moore, President of the Fort Clark Historical Society on this case and others of historical interest in the future.

The area round Fort Clark and Brackettville has been the site of many historical events through the ages, primarily because of the springs, a permanent source of water which was and still is the lifeblood of both man and beast.

I strongly agree with Mrs. Moore and other member of the Historical Society that any new discoveries of historical interest in our area should be carefully documented. This documentation and preservation will be of great interest to future generations.

For your information, \$15,434.00 was received by the county from the Sheriff's Department for prisoner care fees for the month of June at the County Jail. A total of 2,639 meals were served at the jail at the average cost of \$1.16 per meal. This means that each prisoner at the jail received three good, nutritious meals per day for a total cost of \$3.48 per day per prisoner. Try that at any cafe or restaurant nowadays!

I would like to take time this week to brag a little on our local young people. They have been, for the most part, on their best behavior this summer. We have had very few complaints on their activities and I think this is most commendable on their part. Anyone who thinks we do not have good kids here in our community should be exposed to some of those who live in our larger Cities. The police reports in many of our neighboring Cities are full of complaints on juveniles, from minor infractions to burglary, assault, and even murder. So the next time you see one of our kids spin a tire, a little bit, have a little patience and remember when you were young. Things could be a lot worse.

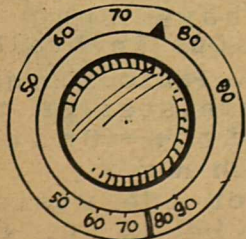

TUNE IT UP. Before the hot season begins, have your air conditioner cleaned and checked by a qualified technician. An annual checkup can prevent costly repair bills and keep your unit running at top efficiency.

DON'T OVERCOOL. Keep the thermostat at 78°. Each degree below that setting could add another 14% to the cost of operating your air conditioner.



KEEP IT CLEAN. At least once a month, clean or replace the filter. Clear obstructions away from outside unit so air can



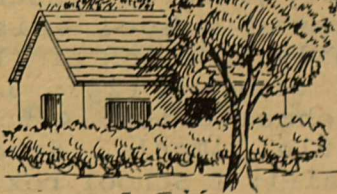
circulate freely.
STOP AIR LEAKS. A large amount of costly air infiltration enters through wall light switch outlets and plug-in sockets. For about \$10, an entire house can be sealed in these places with inexpensive gaskets. In addition, you'll want to caulk all cracks and

holes, and install weather stripping around windows and doors.

BLOCK OUT THE SUN. Keep direct sunlight out of the house with draperies, blinds, shades or awnings. Plant trees and shrubs for additional shade.



TURN ON THE FANS. You'll use less air conditioning comfortably at a higher thermostat setting with electric fans.

SHOP CAREFULLY. If you plan to buy a new air conditioner, choose a unit with an Energy Efficiency Ratio (EER or SEER) of 8 or above. You also need to make sure the unit is properly sized.

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VETERANS OUTREACH PROGRAM BRINGS LAND LOANS TO VETERANS

AUSTIN--Thousands of Texas veterans have learned first-hand about the Texas Veterans Land Program and the proposed Veterans Housing Assistance Outreach Program

Initiated when Commissioner Mauro took office, the Veterans Outreach Programs' mission is to establish contact with veterans groups and their representatives in every county in Texas and to acquaint Texas veterans with the benefits of the Veterans Land Program and the proposed Veterans Housing Assistance Program and assist them with questions concerning the loan process.

Since the inception of the Veterans Land Program in 1949, over 80,000 veterans have taken advantage of the program which will loan eligible Texas Veterans \$20,000 at 8.5 percent over a 40-year term to purchase a minimum of ten acres of land.

Commissioner Mauro's proposed Veterans Housing Assistance Program will be offered for voter approval as a constitutional amendment on November 8. It will allow veterans to borrow up to \$20,000 for the purchase of a home. Existing lending institutions will join with the program in making loans to eligible veterans for home mortgages.

Veteran Outreach field representatives work directly with the county service officers and county committee members in all 254 counties. Each field representative has applications for the land program and can provide the latest information, explain policy changes and eligibility requirements, and assist veterans with completing the loan application.

Felix Arambula, Jr., Veterans Outreach Program director, says, "Please note that if you applied for a loan in the past but never actually purchased land through the Veterans Land Program. Realtors can also receive lists of veterans in their area who have applied for the program. Both lists are available by county or zip code.

"Commissioner Mauro's goal is to enable every eligible

Texas Veteran to fully participate in these programs." Arambula said.

"We will be glad to hold a seminar on our program for any interested party or organization. Just call our toll-free number 1-800-252-VETS to request an appearance and we will have the outreach representative in your area call you and work out the details," Arambula stated.

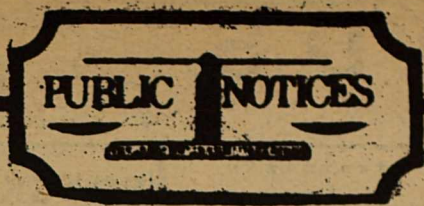
