The tour will be having a counselor from each of the bureaus which ring the state, plus representatives of DTA and the headquarters of the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation.

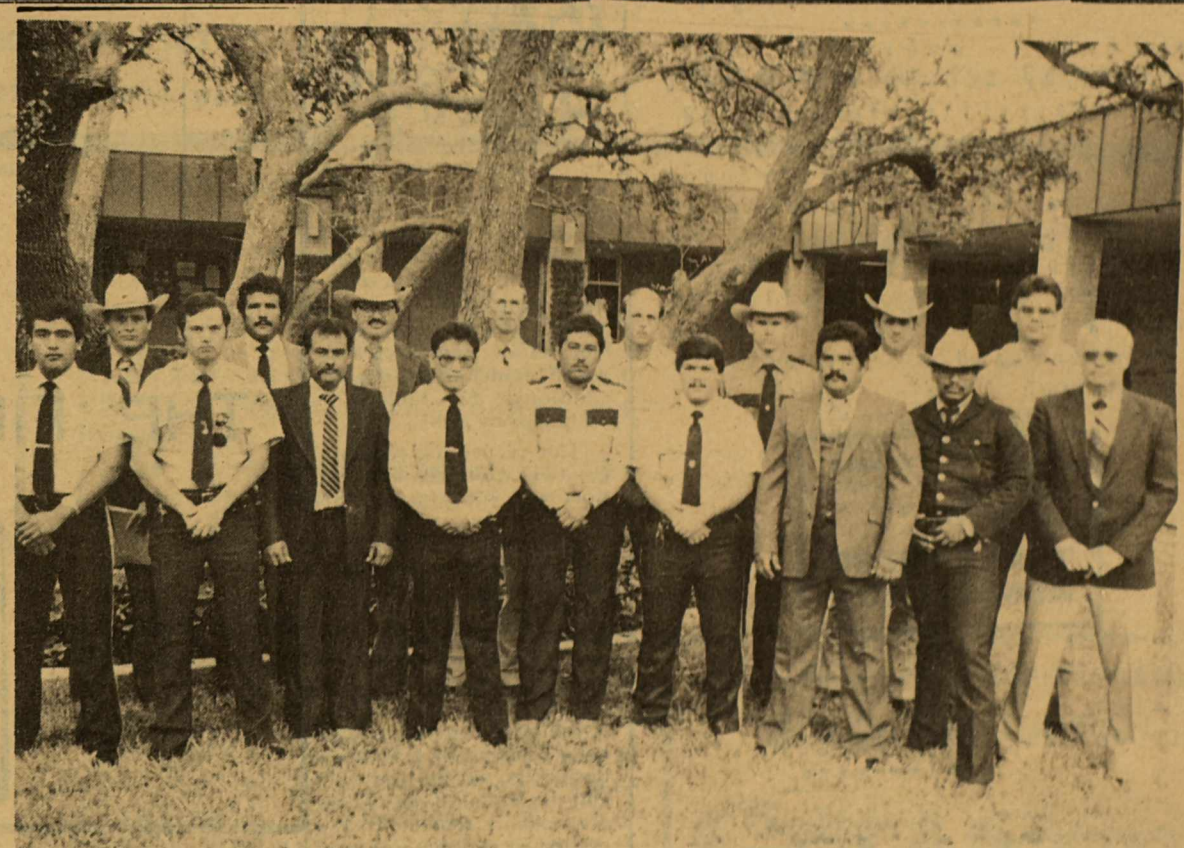
The route will take the counselors from Arlington to San Angelo and then on to Del Rio. Later, they will be visiting Fort Stockton,

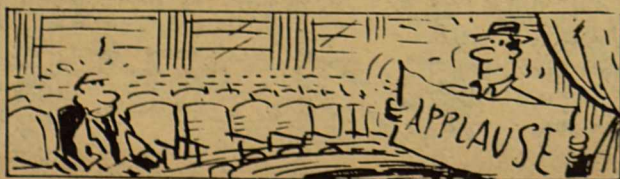

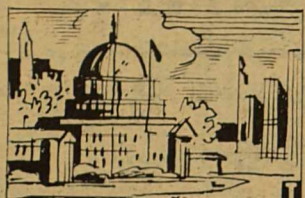

FACTS & FIGURES

To assist in the establishment and development of minority business firms, President Reagan has designated October 2-8, 1983 as Minority Enterprise Development Week. It's part of the Administration's goal of establishing 60,000 minority companies within the next decade, says the Department of Commerce. The President has also committed \$1.5 billion for credit assistance and \$300 million for management and technical aid to minority business between 1983 and 1984.



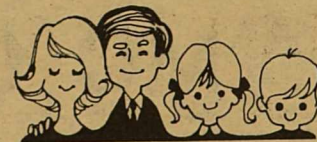
The goals of the Administration for boosting minority business also include purchasing \$15 billion worth of goods from minority firms over the next three years. This figure does not include procurements by recipients of Federal grants, which could amount to an additional \$6 billion to \$7 billion by 1985.

Our recovering economy created two-thirds of a million new jobs in the first four months of this year. The minority business community has played a major role in this revitalization. More than 100 Minority Business Development Centers, which provide management, marketing, financial and technical assistance to minority companies, have helped in starting 1,700 new businesses, saving over 900, and expanding 2,000. These centers have generated \$580 million in contract and sub-contract awards to minority businesses and \$140 million in loans.

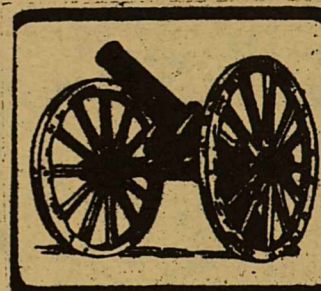

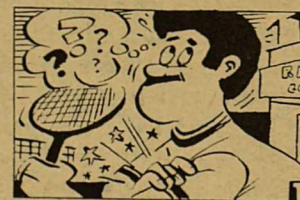

CANCER FACTS & MYTHS

Though cancer is a disease where early detection and prompt treatment can make a difference, there are some misconceptions many people have about this disease. Here are some of them.



MYTH: Blacks rarely get cancer.

FACT: Blacks have higher rates of some kinds of cancer than whites. This includes cancers of the lung, prostate, stomach, cervix, pancreas and esophagus. Cancers of the breast, large bowel, bladder and mouth are among other types of cancer on the rise in the black community.

MYTH: Cancer is contagious.

FACT: Cancer is not contagious. It cannot be spread from person to person by sneezing, coughing, kissing or in any other way.

MYTH: A bump or a

bruise can cause cancer.

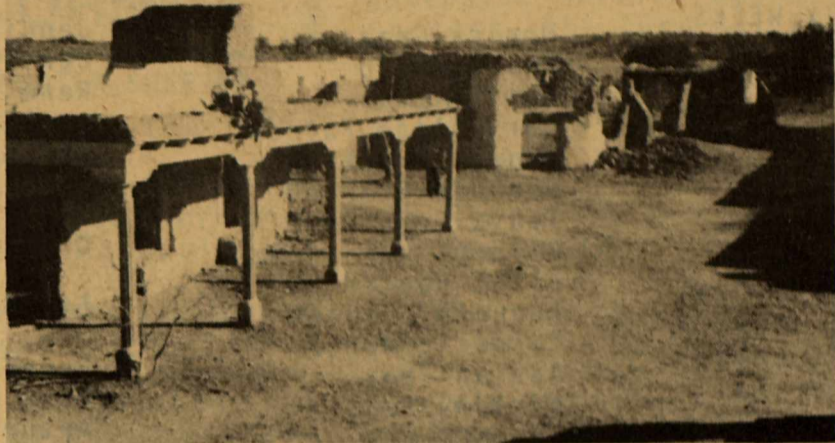
FACT: Bumps and bruises do not cause cancer. Sometimes cancer is found when a person is being treated for an injury. In such cases, the cancer was there before the injury. It just wasn't noticed earlier.

(Editor's Note: The 12th paragraph of last week Sheriff's corner contained some typographical errors, below is how it should have read:)

Dr. Peale has a simple formula for getting people to like you. He says that getting people to like you is the other side of liking them. Take someone that you have distinct dislike for.

Willis Frank "Pete" Matterson, a 39 year old Del Rio man died in Methodist Hospital in San Antonio, Friday, October 14, from a self-inflicted gunshot wound to the head.

Better known to some of us as "Pete", the ButterKrust man, he was discovered at 11:30 am Thursday, October 13, by a U.S. Border Patrol agent approximately 14 miles West of Brackettville on Highway 90 near the Amanda railroad crossing

Cases of this sort are handled and investigated as homicide until all evidence and circumstances surrounding the case is examined closely to determine the exact cause of death. This was, without a doubt, a case of suicide by gunshot.

Many of us had known "Pete" for several years and were shocked and saddened by his death. He was a friendly, happy--go-lucky type and always had a smile and a friendly word for those he came into contact with. Our hearts go out to his family and friends in this time of sorrow and loss.

A crusty old Texas Ranger once told me that if a man wanted to see how much he would be missed when he passed on, to stick his finger in a bucket of water, pull it out, and examine the hole that was left. Though that statement has seemed true many times over the years, I have never really been able to believe it. All of us have family and friends who will be left behind to bear the burden of pain and sorrow at our passing. This is true in "Pete's" case too. He will be

sorely missed for a long time to come.

The Health Fair sponsored by the Texas Agriculture Extension Service was a great success. The turn out for the 3 mile run was big with entries from several counties of the surrounding area participating. There was a lot of hard work and preparation put into this project and we congratulate Carl Esser, Barbara Chalet, Mrs. Lois Forbes, Emma Gomez and the many others who spent so much of their time getting this project organized for the big success it was.

Congratulations are in order to Leisha Wardlaw for her 1st place win in her category of the Texas Farm Bureau District X Queen Contest and Talent find also held on Saturday, October 15, here in Brackett.

Leisha gave a prize winning speech on the Free enterprise System and what it means to the American Way of Life. She competed with several entries from counties in the south Texas district and will now advance to the state contest to be held in Houston. There she will compete with young people from all over the state. CONGRATULATIONS, Leisha on your recent win and GOOD LUCK at the state contest!

NEW CABLE INSTALLATION

The detours and bumps you may have to endure now in and around Brackettville should be compensated for in the future by improved telephone service, according to Southwestern Bell manager Lou Garza.

"Our current expansion and renovation program throughout Brackettville represents service improvement expenditures totaling \$1 million," Garza said. "The expansion is needed to meet the demand today and the growth for the future," he said.

Statewide, Southwestern Bell is spending more than \$1 billion to improve service during 1983.

The current project in Brackettville includes placing 238,000 feet of cable.

Southwestern bell will install six pre-fabricated manholes throughout Brackettville. The manager noted that those structures can be prepared in three days, while the older type of manholes took three weeks to pour.

One-hundred percent of the cable being place will be buries, which costs more that aerial cable initially, but produces savings in the long-run.

"Aerial cable, Garza said, "is used when we encounter solid rock or other terrain where underground cable isn't feasible, such as high-water areas."

Inside the buried cable, Southwestern Bell is using a jelly-like substance that helps protect lines from water damage.

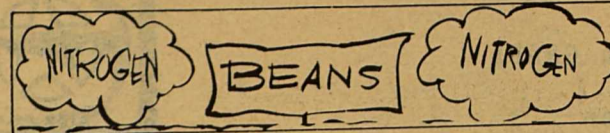
"The jelly compound helps insulate cable pairs when a cable is damaged," Garza said. "If a puncture should occur, the jelly compound retards water from spreading, and the

result is better service for customers," he said.

Residents should notice the work on ann and Third Streets, as well as along F.M. Roads 334 and 674.

Southwestern Bell will be removing 16 miles of aerial cable along F.M. 647 and replacing it with the buried jelly-filled cable.

The total job should be completed sometime during the first quater of 1984.
