This concept was initiated in 1973 and updated in 1978 by the State Historical Serving Committee.

The overall proposal was accepted by the commission and with the continued community pride and spirit displayed and generated by Chairman Alvin Hall and members Miss Charles Wilson and Peggy Miller, The City Council and Citizens of Brackettville can look forward to a sound, appropriate and timely addition to the City Ordinances.

There will be a called Special Meeting of the City of Brackettville Zoning Commission set for 7 pm Monday, 7 November, 1983 at City Hall.

The primary purpose of this meeting is to proceed to establish a recommended City-

wide plan to designate Historical areas and sites of historical interest and of cultural importance in the City of Brackettville.

The overall plan will enable the City to regulate and restrict construction alterations construction, or demolition of buildings and other structures in accord with the present zoning ordinance and in accord with Texas State Statutes which grants to General Law Cities the authority to promote the health, safety, morals and roe the protection of and preservation of places and areas of historical and cultural importance.

The public is invited to attend and provide additional input to this most worthy City Project.

Dear Editor:

Texas taxpayers have a lot to
gain and nothing to lose in
voting FOR Proposition 5, the
school bond amendment, in the
November 8 constitutional
amendments election.

The amendment could save our
schools and local taxpayers
\$435 million in interest
payments alone in just the
next 17 years.

It comes as a surprise to
many people that the awesome
resources the State of Texas
dedicates to education ARE NOT
taken into account by national
bonds markets when setting
local school district bond
ratings and interest rates.
Local bonds are judged solely
by the local district's
situation.

Proposition 5 would cure
that by permitting qualified
local school bond issues to be
backed by the state's \$3
billion Permanent School Fund.
the result would be better
bond ratings and lower
interest rates for our local
districts.

The state's Permanent Fund
would simply be lending its
good name; it would not be
paying off the bonds. Texas
Schools have a fine bond
record. In the unlikely event
of a default, the state would
simply pick up the payments by
withholding the local
disstric's state allotments.

I urge Texas voters to
approve Proposition 5.

the television program.

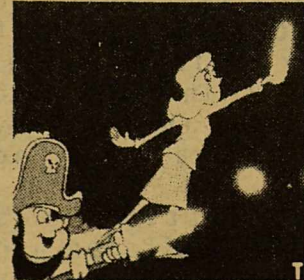

year:



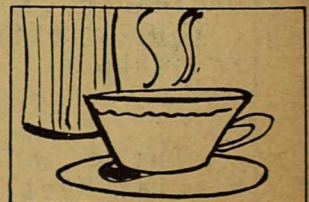
Light sticks are a bright

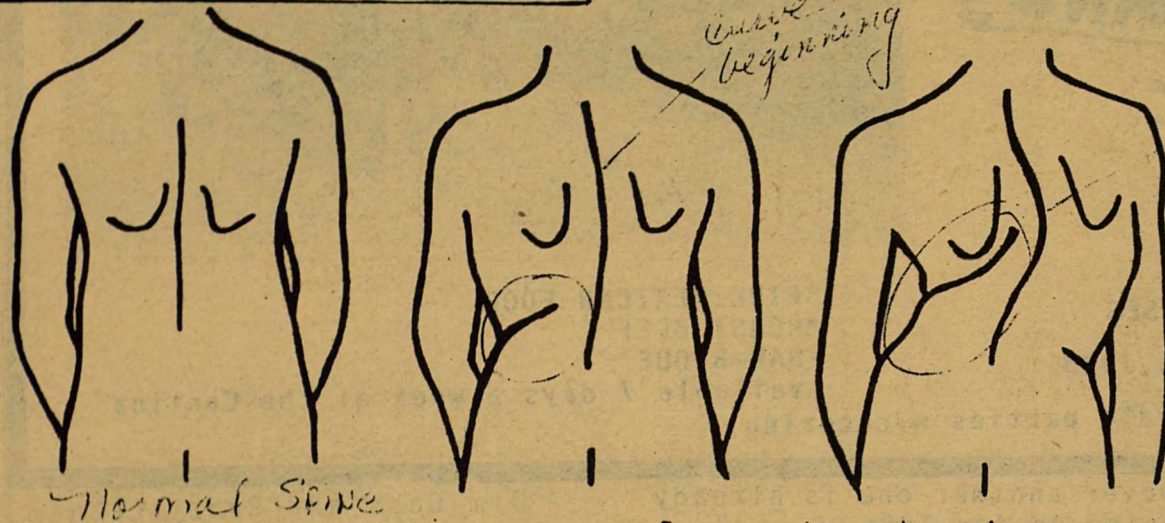

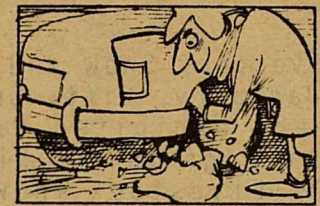

A look at the future

When Southwestern Bell is divested from AT&T next January and becomes a separate company, you can be sure that your local telephone service will continue working the way it always has. We're committed to providing high quality, dependable local service at affordable rates.

But there will be some changes in the way you do business with us... from how to handle telephone repairs to the way you're billed. Here's a quick look at what will and won't change:

Local service

As mentioned, Southwestern Bell will continue to be responsible for providing local telephone service. To start, stop, change or move service, you will do the same as you do now — call your Southwestern Bell business office.

Long distance service

Beginning January 1, Southwestern Bell will still provide long distance service within your surrounding area. However, calls outside this area will be handled by AT&T or other long distance companies. Since there will be more competition in the long distance market, there will be more choices for you as a customer.

Telephone sets

Between now and the first of the year, all single-line customers have the option of buying the telephones that they currently lease on a monthly basis from Southwestern Bell. If you decide to continue leasing your telephone sets, ownership of this equipment will be transferred to AT&T January 1. Of course, you'll still have the option of purchasing new telephone equipment from a variety of other suppliers. Telephone repair

There will be no charge for repair of these phones, provided you either mail your leased phone or return it in person to designated AT&T locations. However, if you wish to have a service technician repair your phone on your premises, there will be a charge for this service.

Telephones purchased from Southwestern Bell before the end of the year also will be serviced by AT&T, but you'll be charged for those repairs if your set is out of warranty. Of course, repairs of telephones purchased from companies other than Bell should be referred to the store they were purchased from or the manufacturer.

Billing

You'll continue to receive one bill for all services provided today by the Bell System, except for purchases of new equipment from AT&T.
